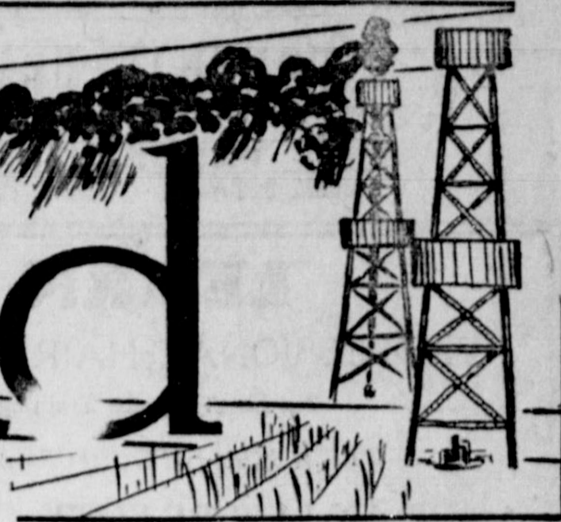

## Moffett Against Racing Gambling

The following statement has been released by Sen. George Moffett, who represents this district at Austin:

A persistent effort is being made to bring back race track gambling to Texas. It has been ousted from this state twice. However, the large profits which track operators hope to make if it is brought back, stimulate efforts to restore race track gambling at almost every session of the Legislature.

The proposal has been introduced by a member of the House from San Antonio who admits he is a retired gambler. This proposal will likely fail of passage, but it will probably be introduced again at future sessions.

I have always voted against it and expect to continue to do so. It is improper to pass a law to permit people at a race track to gamble on a horse race and at the same time make it illegal for people to gamble a few dollars in a dice game.

However, the best reason for opposing legalized gambling is that it constitutes a step backward in the progress of civilization. It weakens the moral fiber of the people who participate and benefits no one. Texas is better off without it.

**GREAT AMERICANS by WALDMAN**

**DANIEL WEBSTER**

Daniel Webster was born in New Hampshire in 1782, the son of rugged, New England farming people. An avid student of law, he began—as a child—to study a copy of the Constitution printed on a cotton handkerchief.

It wasn't long after his graduation from Dartmouth, that Daniel's brilliant oratory and impressive figure won him great popularity. It's said of the severe Chief Justice John Marshall, "his eyes suffused with tears" while listening to Webster plead for a defendant.

Webster's intelligent grasp of the problems of the times made him a sought after advisor. He and the other great statesman of the day would often confer while relaxing with Old Crow—favorite bourbon of many American "gents"—now in its 125th year of fine whisky making.

He died in 1852, never having attained the post of president which he sought, but working for his country to the very end.

## Hawks Win at Graham

Iowa Park Hawks went to Graham last Saturday and won the Possum Kingdom Relay. A total of 64 schools competed.

Iowa Park scored 53 points, St. Mark of Dallas 44, Azle 41 and Masonic Home of Ft. Worth 38. Hawks set records in the mile relay and the broad jump. Otha Woods, Jim Gard, David Parkey and Bob Gilbreath ran a 3:30.8 mile to set a new small division record. Gilbreath broke both the small and the large division records in the broad jump with a leap of 21 ft. 11 1/4 in.

Other winners were: Gilbert Stogsdill, 5th in the mile; Mike Davenport, 6th in the discus; Gilbreath, 1st in low hurdles, 1st in high hurdles. His low hurdles time tied that record.

This Saturday the Hawks will be in Stephenville for the Tarleton Relays. At present 48 teams are entered.

## Church Backs 23 Study Club

### New Cub Pack

Another Cub Pack is in the process of being chartered here, under sponsorship of the Christian church.

Mrs. W. G. Steele and Mrs. Fred Widmoyer were hostesses for a meeting of the 23 Study club recently. The home of Mrs. Steele was decorated with dried arrangements and ranch symbols to form a setting for the Texas Day program.

Mrs. Sam Hill directed the business session. An invitation from the Travel Club of Wichita Falls to attend their Golden Anniversary Seated Tea was read. The 23 Study club is one of 10 federated clubs organized by Travel club.

Mrs. James A. SeWell was elected delegate and Mrs. Homer Blalock alternate to the Santa Rosa district convention in Wichita Falls, April 12-13. Voluntary contributions were received for the Radio Free Europe project. The president reported on the Cuba Blue and Gold banquet held recently.

Mrs. T. M. Clark was leader for the program, introduced with a meditation on "The Beauty of Nature and Spring" by Mrs. Taylor George. Fine arts selection was an organ solo "Souvenir" (Drida) by Mrs. Steele.

Mrs. Clark presented talks on "Pioneer Families and Personalities" and "Cattle Brands and Ranch Histories," topics inspired by two of the divisions of the Texas heritage department. They were spiced with facts about Iowa Park from the 1880's till 1900.

The story started at Harrold, where the railroad stopped, and moved eastward to Daggett Switch, the settlement incorporated into the town of Iowa Park in 1891. She paid tribute to pioneer families, mentioning especially those whose descendants are among the club members. These include the Dale, Cain, Birk, Brubaker, Denny, Mitchell, White, Harbour families.

The talk revealed that the first band in Wichita county was formed in Iowa Park, and that Glen Warner, the famous football coach, lived here when a small lad.

Mrs. Addison's paper was also inspired by another division of the Texas heritage department, theme being Art, Music and Literature of the Southwest.

She stated that in Texas, writings of fact have surpassed those of fiction and listed historical factors are the contributing causes. Texas' pronounced natural contrasts, a land of contrasts, the long and eventful history of Texas frontiers, the rapid development of parts of the state, and the remaking of men and communities by the discovery of oil.

Some of the early literature produced in Texas was "Texas Cowboy" by Charles A. Siringo; "Log of a Cowboy" by Andy Adams. In the field of letters Texas boasts some notable names: J. Frank Dobie, Mollie E. Moore Davis and O. Henry.

Mrs. Cutter stated that perhaps the first artist worthy of note in Texas was Pedro Huizar, the sculptor-architect who carved the Rose Window at San Jose mission in San Antonio. She named Julian

Ondernook as the most distinguished painter of Texas.

In conclusion, Mrs. Cutter observed that in Music Texas and the Southwest have won a significant place. As early as 1838 Houston had a theater of popular musicians and singers. David Guion is Texas' best known composer.

During the social hour Mrs. Hill and Mrs. C. E. Birk presided at the refreshment table laid with a white embroidered handkerchief linen cloth and centered with a silver candelabrum entwined with red carnations.

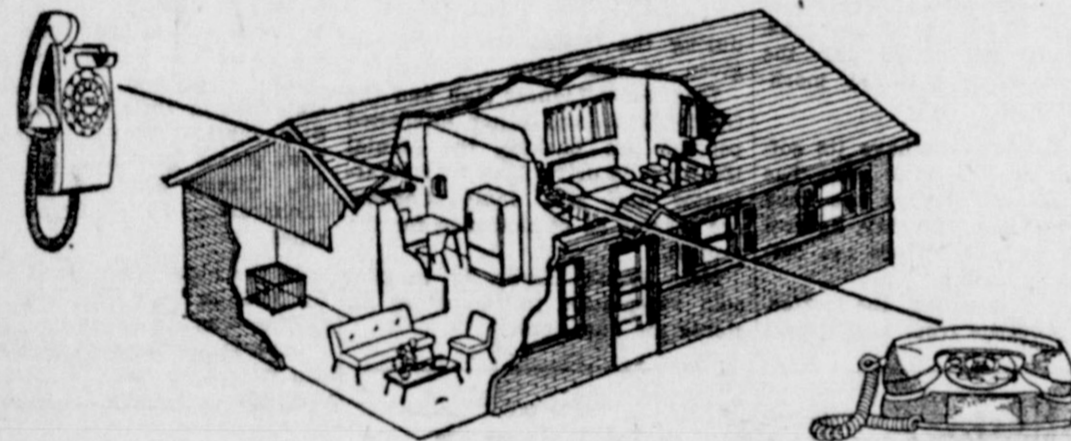

## Farmers Union

National Farmers Union has called for an end of the "tight money—big business" fiscal philosophy of the past eight years and hailed the early actions of President John F. Kennedy as an indication of change.

Angus McDonald, NFU assistant director of legislative services, reviewed the last Economic Report of ex-President Eisenhower as a witness before the Joint Economic Committee of Congress.

He said the position of the past Administration represented a philosophy "which would have been more applicable in the 19th century." He noted there had been some change of heart by the Eisenhower Administration in the last weeks it was in office.

As an example McDonald cited Eisenhower's recommendation in his budget message of a \$50,000,000 appropriation for pollution abatement, although Ike had strongly opposed it previously and had vetoed bills calling for a similar appropriation.

McDonald said the theory of the past Administration that inflation can be controlled by monetary policy has been proved fallacious by the recessions of 1954, 1958 and 1960.

In viewing the present and the future, McDonald said: "We are hopeful that misguided policies of the last eight years will be reversed. We applaud the action which increased the amount of food distribution to those in depressed areas. According to President Kennedy, the Commodity Credit Corporation value of the food distributed only amounted to 5 cents a day per person. We hasten to add that even doubling this piddling amount of food does not afford adequate nutrition to needy persons.

"Although the outlook in regard to agriculture and employment is grim, we are hopeful that recent emergency measures taken by the Kennedy Administration will soon take effect and that eventually a long-range farm program will be enacted which will bring production in balance with consumption."

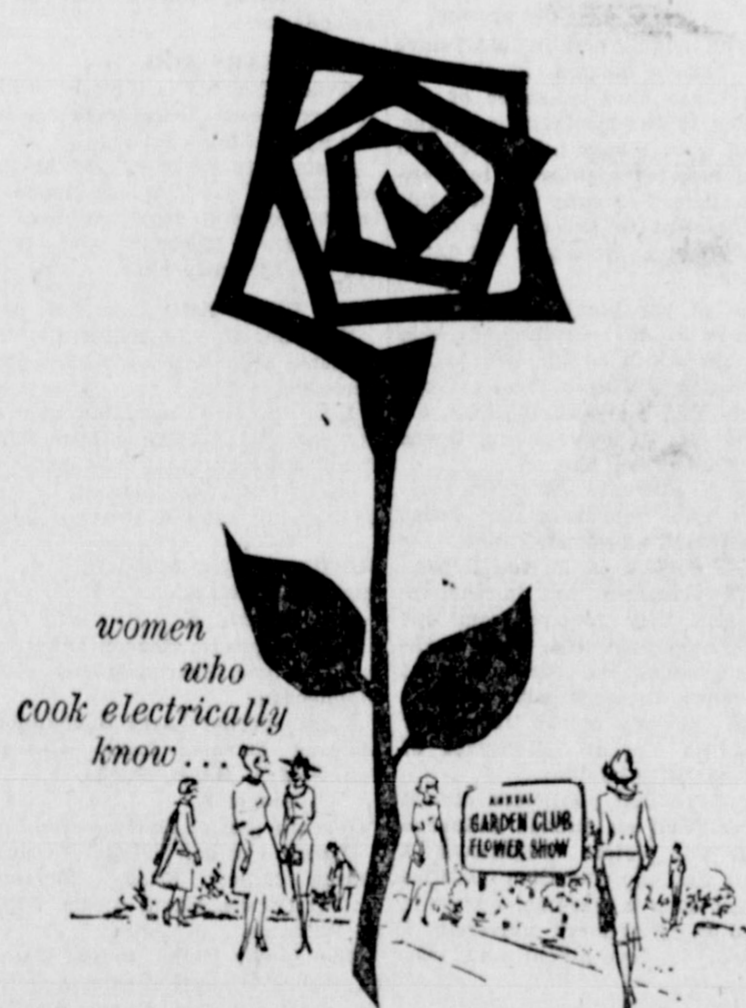
