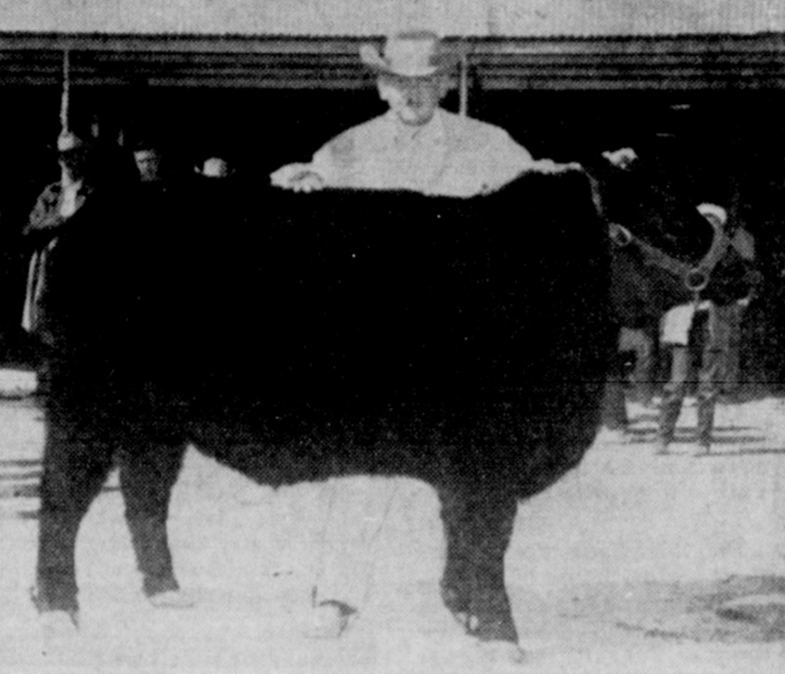

Your Police

Citizens of our community, remember that April 1 is the deadline for getting your pet dog's vaccination against rabies, and for buying your dog tag. You must get your dog vaccinated by a veterinarian and he will issue a certificate stating that the dog has been vaccinated.
Then bring the certificate to the City Hall and buy your dog tags. They cost \$1 for a male and \$2 for a female dog. This has to be done each year by April 1.
There is an alarming number of stray dogs in our city, and the dog ordinance must and will be enforced. This ordinance states that citizens whose own dogs must have them vaccinated and tagged and kept penned up or secure on a leash. At no time is a dog permitted to run loose in the city even though he has been vaccinated 3:4 tagged except if the dog is wearing a muzzle. The dog is then permitted to run loose.
Rabies isn't a pleasant thing. It is not worth taking the risk of letting your pet dog run loose so he might come in contact with animals that might have rabies, and then in turn bite somebody.
Since I went to work as a policeman for the city, the department has always had full support and co-operation from your City Government. The Mayor and City Council realize the bad situation and the results that could happen from having a large number of dogs running loose this time of year when rabies is apt to become epidemic. They are in full co-operation with the police department in enforcing the dog ordinance of the City.
Your police urge each and every one of you to obey this ordinance. If you see any stray dogs, please contact the police department. This will be of great value in helping us enforce the ordinance, and we will appreciate it.

Monday evening, March 27, volunteer workers of junior and senior girls, under leadership of Ben Hildebrand, will ring doorbells for donations to the Easter Seals campaign. Each girl will be wearing a blue and white tag as identification and will have sheets of Easter Seals for donors.
This year more than ever before Easter Seals need to be bought because a \$100,000 rehabilitation center is to be erected at Sixth and Denver in Wichita Falls for the benefit of crippled children of this area.
The building will replace an inadequate Cerebral Palsy headquarters in the basement of Memorial Auditorium in Wichita Falls.
The building will be designed so that cerebral palsy, polio, muscular dystrophy and muscular sclerosis patients can be treated.
The center is being financed by Kiwanis club trust fund, and private sources providing \$50,000 plus a matching \$50,000 from the Hill Burton Funds, a federal aid source.
Mrs. Nina Jackson, center director and speech therapist, and Mrs. Betty Wages, physical therapist, now operate in the Cerebral Palsy headquarters and will be in charge of the new center. An occupational therapist will be added to the staff.
When additional space is provided, volunteer workers will be used. Presently there is no room for volunteers to work.

Members of Ethyle Kidwell and Iowa Park Parent-Teachers associations will contact friends and neighbors on March 20 in a program of public information, concerning educational needs for the community's children and youth.
The project, known as Education Alert, is a voluntary service undertaken by the state PTA to awaken citizens to the need of support for quality education.
Information explaining the program will be left in doors March 29 so the people will know what it is all about.

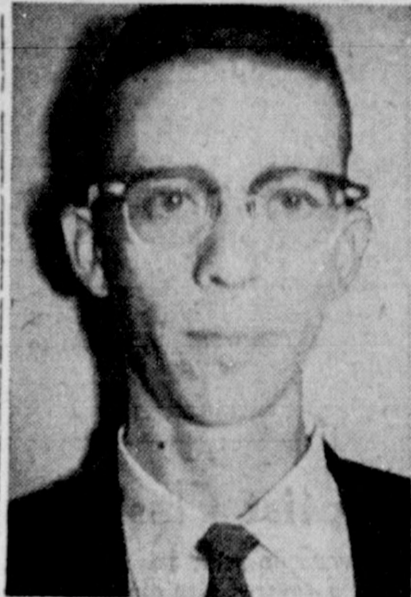

ancient world this feeling of kinship to the soil was expressed in the various bread and corn religions.

The Egyptians called themselves "sons of the black earth." Every major religion has symbolized in some form the genetic cycle of the soil. Religious observances anticipated the soil as a living thing deriving its energy from the sun. The essence of the primitive religious beliefs was the fact motivating today's conservation movement; namely, that the processes which strip the earth of vegetation threaten man with extinction.

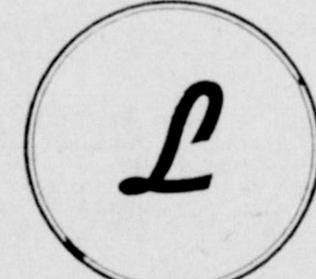
