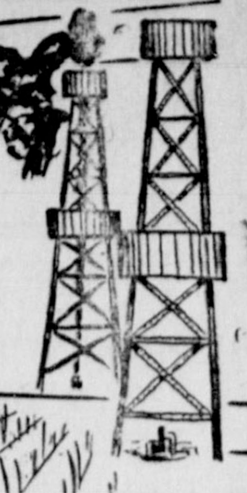

ADMINISTRATION STEPS UP FARM CREDIT ACTIVITY

President Kennedy and Agriculture Secretary Freeman have recently taken the following steps to improve the availability of credit for farm operation and living:

1. Created a Rural Areas Development Board, headed by John A. Baker, who is Freeman's director of agricultural credit and will be in charge of the special program for low-income, smaller farmers. Baker started his career in the old Farm Security Administration and was head of National Farmers Union's Washington office.

2. Relaxed eligibility requirements for farm operating loans available through the Farmers Home Administration. This will particularly help young farmers, farmers nearing retirement and farmers who are not supplementing their income by off-farm work.

3. Appointed Murray D. Lincoln as the Secretary's only representative on the Federal Farm Credit Board. Lincoln, who is president of the Co-operative League of the USA and of Nationwide Insurance companies, is widely known for his liberal views on credit and finance.

4. Kennedy asked Congress to extend rural housing legislation and liberalize its loan terms somewhat. The President declared that "almost a fifth of the occupied houses in rural areas of America

are so dilapidated that they must be replaced" and that "hundreds of thousands of other rural homes are far below the level of comfort and convenience considered adequate in our nation."

For example, he said, "Only one-third of our farm homes have adequate plumbing," largely because of inadequate credit in rural sections.

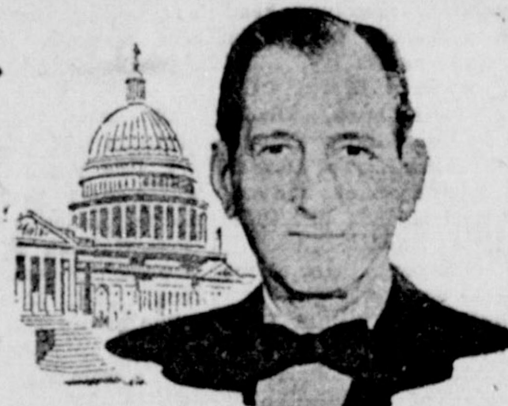

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon trial hereof, she have judgment for divorce, care, custody and control of said minor children and for such other and further relief, in law or in equity, to which she may show herself justly entitled.

As is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unanswered.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

Tunisian Student Visiting Here

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Parkey and family have as houseguest this week a classmate of their son Paul, who is attending Oklahoma State University at Stillwater — Habib Hizem of Monastir, Tunisia.

Mr. Hizem is a sophomore at Oklahoma State majoring in agronomy. He came to America by jet from Paris, France, Jan. 7. He is sponsored by his government and plans to be in the US two or more years working on a science degree.

Habib plans to go back to Tunisia and work with his government in soil conservation.

Habib is 22 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mohamed Hizem of Monastir and is the oldest of four brothers and 1 sister. He attended elementary school in Monastir for seven years and then received his high school education in Paris, studying English the last 6 months before coming to America.

Tunisia is on the northern coast of Africa with 4,000,000 population and area of 43,600 square miles. It was a French protectorate until 1956 when it was given independence. Habib Bourguiba is president of Tunisia and his son is ambassador to the USA.

Climate there is similar to that of California. Products are tobacco, wheat, cotton, sugar, bananas, dates, citrus fruits, grapes and olive oil. The most important port is Bizerte, on the Mediterranean Sea.

Religion in Tunisia is mostly Moslem, with some Jews and some Christians. Hizem says there are American missionaries and medical missionaries working with his people.

American cars, tractors and other products are used in Tunisia.

Elementary schools are not co-educational and go through the 7th grade. Most high schools are co-educational and all universities are co-educational. Many Tunisians go to France to complete their high school training.

Day laborers are paid about \$2 a day and it takes around \$1 for food and lodging.

Habib said, "I am glad to be in Texas with this nice family. They are most kind to me. I hope all American families are like that. I heard of Texas before I heard of Washington, D.C."

Since arriving in Iowa Park, Hizem has appeared before classes of the high school and has taken trips with the soil conservation technicians who work out of here.

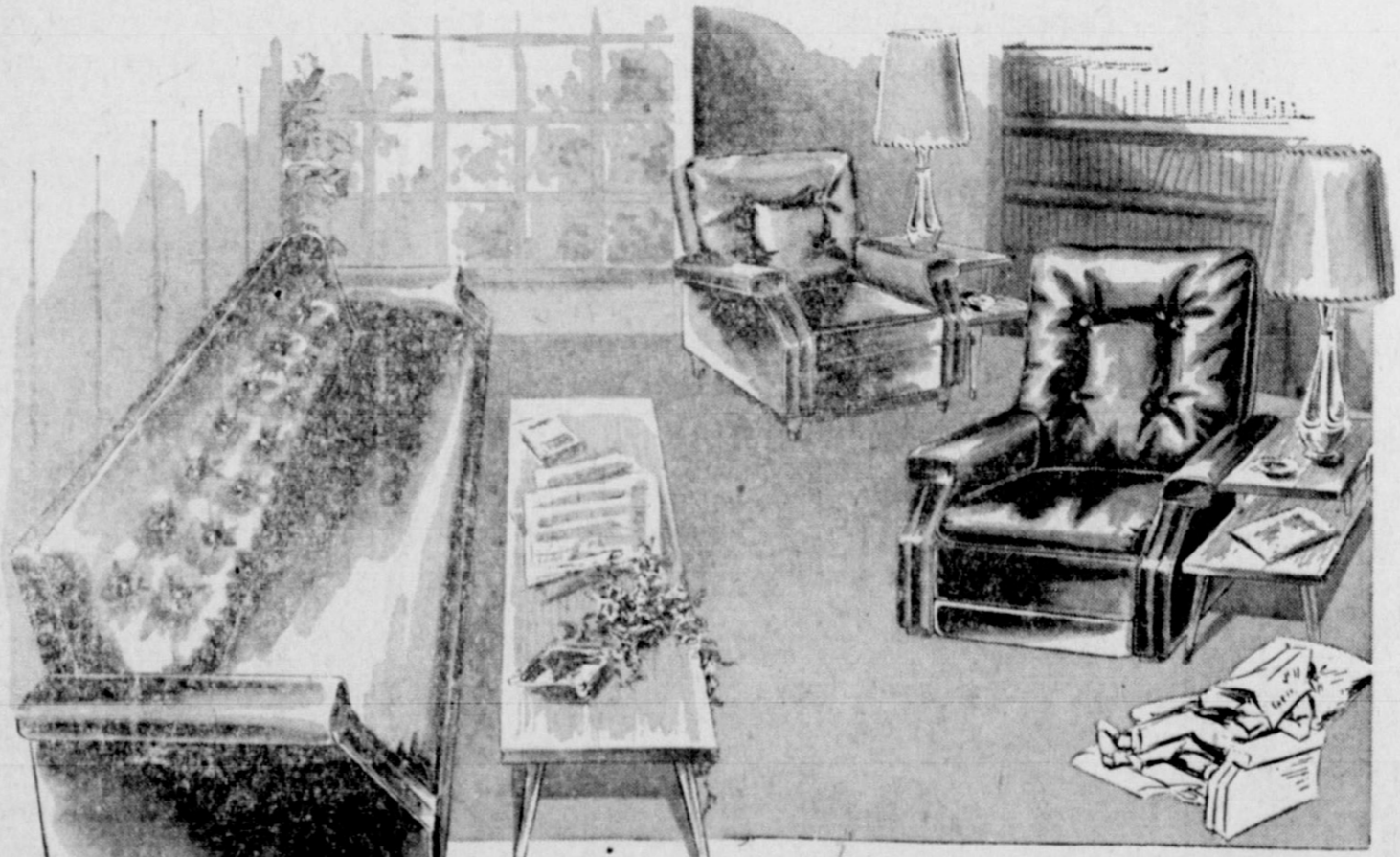
