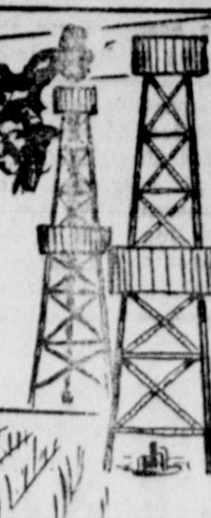

The bride is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd E. Bell of Iowa Park, and the groom is son of Mrs. Cassie Wells of Wichita Falls and the late Rawley Wells.

Elder Max Mann, pastor, performed the ceremony. Traditional wedding music was provided by Mrs. Max Mann, pianist, and Mrs. W. L. Berryman of Dallas, vocalist, cousin of the bride.

Nuptial space was lighted by white cathedral candles glowing in pyramid arrangements of wrought iron candelabra at either extremity. The candles were backgrounded by banks of green fir, which were repeated on the chancel rail.

The couple exchanged vows before a white satin covered prie-dieu flanked by tall baskets of white gladioli. Pews were marked by white satin bows ornamented with lilies-of-the-valley.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride was beautiful in a gown of Swiss Guipure embroidery styled with molded bodice featuring a scooped neckline with off-shoulder short sleeves. ## Presbyterians Revise Program

First Presbyterian church begins this week a new schedule, designed to offer the most inclusive program possible for Christian worship and study and fellowship. A brochure printed recently for the church describes the overall program in detail.

Wednesday evening service of worship begins at 7:00 and lasts until 7:45. This is a period of study and singing of great hymns from the heritage of the Christian faith. Fascinating stories behind the writing of hymns, plus practicing of new hymns, mark this service. Chancel choir of the church then rehearses at 7:45.

Presbyterians have felt that for too long the church has tended to pull families apart rather than together; that the church offered many differing activities, but that rarely, probably only at Sunday morning worship and at fellowship dinner, was the whole "family of God" able to share together.

Believing that this is what the church is—the community of believers—the First Presbyterian church has sought a program which would be inclusive of all ages, rather than exclusive. This desire has developed into the Koinonia, a Sunday evening fellowship program. Koinonia is a Greek word used in the New Testament to describe the deep redeeming relationship between man and man which comes from God in Jesus Christ. Therefore it is fellowship in its deepest sense.

The Koinonia will last from 6:00 to 7:30 each Sunday evening, beginning next Sunday, April 9. From 6:00 until 6:20 there will be light refreshments and activities in the Fellowship Hall. This will be for all ages. From 6:20 till 6:30 there will be fun-singing.

From 6:30-7:15 the group will be divided—adults in the sanctuary for study of the scriptures, junior and senior highs for their regular fellowship meeting, and a group for younger children. The nursery will be operated for infants.

At 7:15 the entire group again will come to the sanctuary for a closing service of worship. The entire program will be concluded by 7:30.

This will enable families and groups to use the evening, meeting each other all over again! It is hoped this will be an opportunity for families to do things together that they just do not usually find time for.

The rest of the congregation's program will remain the same: women's circles and meetings, dinners and programs for the men, Sunday morning church school classes, Geneva Fellowship (young adult discussion group), Trinity (Junior) Choir, and so forth.

It is hoped the entire life of the congregation will be strengthened, not by creating more activities to clutter our calendars, but by structuring the opportunity for people to meet each other as they really are; to discover in an age of whirlwind activity how to become people again. Is not this the message of Jesus Christ? Is not this the task of His church?

Hieserman received 77 votes, Voyles 80 in the precinct and 202 in the whole county, while J. S. Mills had 22 votes in his precinct.

In the Valley View school board election held Saturday, J. W. Birdwell and Joe Woodward were re-elected with 41 and 32 votes respectively. M. C. Kuykendall received 18 votes in his unsuccessful race for a spot on the Valley View school board.

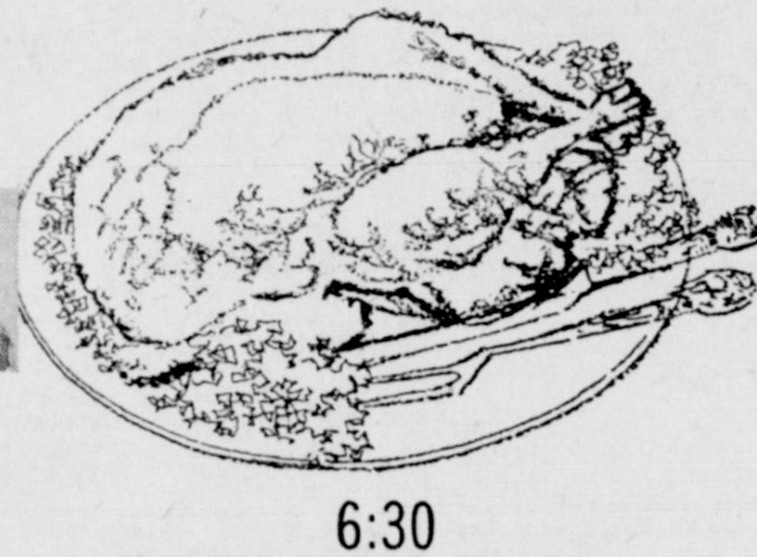

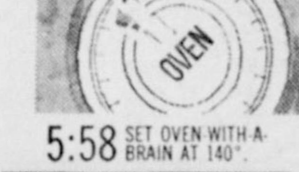

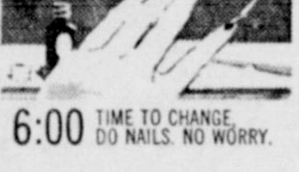

**FARMERS UNION BELIEVES**

"Publicly and privately owned land and resources should be administered in the interest of all the public."

"We urge further federal development of natural geographic areas such as entire river valley basins to promote better use of all natural resources for all purposes."

"Agricultural soil, water and related resource conservation programs and the small watershed flood prevention program must be protected, expanded and accelerated, both before and after establishment of such valley developments."

"We also favor an expansion of the existing pollution control program of assistance to the states by the federal government."

"We urge enactment of clear-cut federal legislation and policies to establish clearly federal responsibility to produce, regulate and control public power through programs of area development on the basis of all-inclusive support of a total national program."

There are many things America can do to meet the challenge of resource development and preservation. Most of these things were brought out by experts at the Western States Water and Power Conference in September 1960.

First of all we must change our direction from drift and indecision to dedication and progress.

It was recommended that a Council of Resources and Conservation be established to supervise overall resource development.

Regional planning commissions should be established.

Projects should be aimed at overall area development including hydro-electric power, water storage, flood control and irrigation.

The battle against water pollution should be undertaken on a large scale under federal supervision.

Research programs into desalting sea water, prevention of evaporation, weather control and other fields should be stepped up.

The United States should catch up in the use of atomic power for peaceful purposes.

A permanent Youth Conservation Corps should be established, and other educational programs concerning conservation and preservation of our national resources should be expanded.

**CABLE SNIFFER SAVES TROUBLE**

Telephone cables that carry your phone conversations must be air tight to prevent trouble on the lines caused by the weather. Now, if a cable develops a leak, we must locate it and fix it so your service will not be interrupted.

Thanks to the work of one of our Plant engineers, we have a new gadget that actually sniffs a cable leak and locates it for our line maintenance man to fix. The device involves the use of freon gas in the pressurized telephone cable. If a leak develops the escaping air will cause the "sniffer" to signal the location of the leak. It is so sensitive that if a cable leaks less than an ounce of air a year, it can detect it.

Now even the slightest break in the cable can be detected and repaired long before it could interfere with your service.
