L. B. Lovell Represented Farmers Union at Meet With Agriculture Head

L. B. Lovell of Iowa Park was among the more than 350 members of the National Farmers Union's cattlemen's caravan which descended on Washington this week and demanded of Secretary of Agriculture Benson that price supports be placed under cattle.

Mr. Lovell of the group met with the secretary in the agriculture department's auditorium Monday. After hearing from representatives of the group, Benson addressed the supporters were, in his opinion, "impractical."

The same day the group heard addresses from Sen. Frank Carlson (R-Kan.) and Sen. Lester Hunt (D-Wy.). Both expressed grave concern over what the latter described as the serious and appalling economic situation of the livestock industry. "And both declared they were determined to do something to rectify the situation."

More than 30 states were represented in the caravan which was sponsored by National Farmers Union in order to give Benson an opportunity "to hear directly from working cattlemen."

James G. Patton, National Farmers Union president, described the conference as "an expression of real grass-roots opinion. Regardless of its ultimate effect, it has served to crystallize and dramatize the plight of thousands of farm and ranch families who stand now in grave danger of seeing their entire life's work vanish before their eyes."

Mr. Lovell returned from Washington Friday. He said he was impressed with the determination of the men who attended the conference to do something to correct the "drastic price decline that has plunged the livestock industry into a major depression."

Early in the game Claburne Lindley took a 45 yard touchdown pass thrown by Mickey Sewell. Again in the first quarter, George Clemens raced through a broken field for 25 yards and Iowa Park's second score.

In the second quarter Lindley intercepted a Bearcat pichout and ran untouched 60 yards for another counter. James Williams raced 60 yards for a touchdown to make the halftime score 25-0.

Iowa Park continued its high scoring attack in the second half. Williams scored twice and Sewell passed to Leonard Luckett for 32 yards and a score.

Final Iowa Park score was made by Sewell on a keeper from 22 yards out.

Henrietta got 8 points in the third quarter. Donald Rabe ran 20 yards for a touchdown, and Williams got out of the end zone on a punt to give the Bearcats an automatic safety.

Game Commission Issues Hunting Regulations

Only two changes from last year mark the new waterfowl regulations, according to the executive secretary of the state game and fish commission.

The shooting period was extended until sunset, and baiting was forbidden altogether.

Here are the major rules for shooting ducks and geese:

Season—from noon on November through January 4.

Hours—from one half hour before sunup to sunset.

Bag limit (ducks)—five per day or ten in possession.

Bag limit (geese)—five per day or five in possession, including in such limit not more than either two Canada geese (or its subspecies, Hutchins or lesser Canada), or two white-fronted geese, or one of each.

Weapons—Use of rifles to kill waterfowl is forbidden; guns must not be larger than ten gauge; no repeaters or automatics must be plugged to a limit of three shell capacity.

Boats—Ducks or geese may be taken from outboard motorboat provided motor is removed from boat and placed inside the bat, or boat is secured to a shooting blind.

Federal duck stamp costing \$2 is required.

Ikard Advocates More Careful Defense Buying

Unless there is an outbreak of shooting war, Congress will probably cut taxes when it meets again next year, Frank Ikard told members of the Lions club here Tuesday.

He predicted a 10 per cent cut in individual income taxes, removal of the excess profits tax, and reduction in luxury taxes.

Congressman Ikard, however, set out the reasons why the total tax load will probably be as great as before. In simple words, it is because the expense of government will be so great that taxes must be levied to meet the outgo.

The defense and foreign aid programs take 85 per cent of the total government expenditures, and it is in those fields that Mr. Ikard hopes the government will make savings.

He is strong for defense and for aid to our friends, but believes economies can be used which will make the over-all cost smaller without weakening the program.

Year end spending is one fault he believes can be corrected by convincing the Pentagon that the Congress will never let the defense program down in emergency.



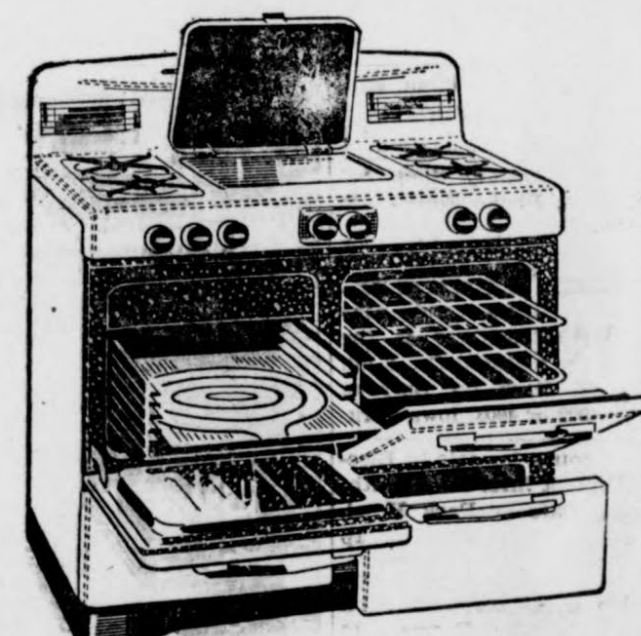

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Soil Conservation

Detailed land capability maps have been made on 20,000 acres of land in Wichita county since May 1953. These surveys were made on farms of co-operators of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district by the Soil Conservation service soil scientists.

Fifteen different kinds of soil were found on slopes ranging from nearly level to moderately steep with erosion ranging from slight to moderately severe.

Nearly all of the surveys were made on dryland. Most of the land has been planted to wheat for the past few years.

Most of the land was found to be deep. Only small areas were found to be shallow or to have rock outcrops, salt, overflow, etc., that would

be a hazard to the maintenance of the land.

Fine sandy loam underlain by heavy clays and loams composed most of the soil textures. Clay and clay loam surface textures underlain by heavy clays and clay loams were found occasionally; the largest bodies being found east of Electra.

Movement of air and water, referred to as subsoil permeability was slow on approximately half of the soils. This is due to the heavy clay subsoils which underlay most of the nearly level land. Movement of water and air was slow to moderate in the remaining half of the soils examined. Soils in the northern portion of the district had the faster movement of air and water regardless of slope, since the soils of this area are sandier.

Approximately 30 per cent of the land was found to be nearly level. Sixty per cent of the land fell into a gently sloping class with the remaining 10 per cent falling into a steep slope class. Terraces are needed for soil and water conservation on the gently sloping land. The steeper areas are best suited to permanent types of vegetation for erosion control.


The nearly level land has slight erosion with some moderate erosion. The gentle slopes are predominantly moderately eroded. A small portion of these soils has only slight erosion with an equal portion having moderately severe erosion. The steeper slopes were found to have the highest degree of erosion.

This type of survey is designed to provide needed information regarding soils slopes, erosion and land use conditions, that is basic to farm conservation planning. Only those land facts that are usable by the technicians and farmer or rancher in developing a plan of soil and water conservation are mapped. The detail of mapping is governed by land conditions that determine cro adaptability and treatment requirements.

The maps are made on aerial photographs and have explanation legends. Copies of individual farms of co-operators concerned will be distributed to them as soon as drafting and other cartographic work is completed.

Wichita county has an area of 624 square miles or 400,000 acres. Approximately 40 per cent of the county has been mapped since the district went into operation in 1946. Nearly all of the irrigated land in the Wichita Valley has been mapped.

The remaining acres will be mapped as soon as time and facilities permit, so that each farmer can get a more thorough understanding of the capability of his land and the treatment of its needs for maintenance and improvement of the soil fertility.
