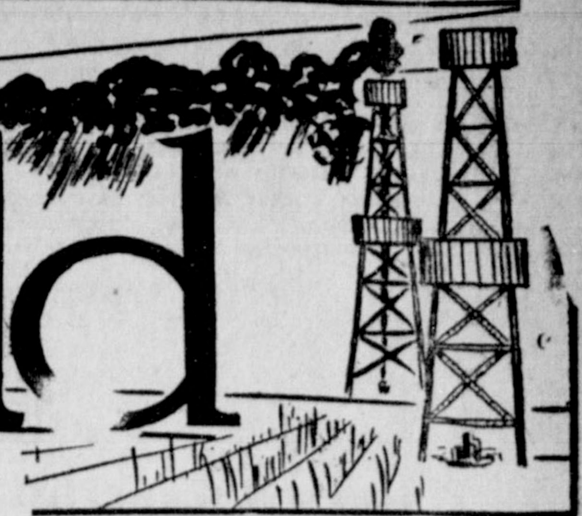

Chamber Adopts 1961 Program Buster Reaves Is Jaycee of Year

1. Encourage all businesses of town and area to join and support the Chamber of Commerce.
2. Sponsor Spring Tour of Wichita Valley Experiment Station for businessmen and farmers of Iowa Park school district; assist in various agriculture tours for this area; promote agricultural exhibits in T-O Fair; promote agricultural business relations; publicize cash awards offered by Holder Grain Co. and Williams Grain Co. for first load of wheat marketed here; award recognition to Outstanding Family and Outstanding Farm Youth at annual banquet program.
3. Assist and promote a retail trade program that would entice Iowa Park citizens to spend their dollars in Iowa Park.
4. Beautify City Park with flowers and painting benches; maintain Park boulevard; promote residential landscaping and beautification with contest; recognize business remodeling and beautification; influence all property owners to keep all vacant lots clean and clear of debris and rubbish.
5. Continue to work for improvement of traffic safety in our town, better streets and alleys and more adequate water supply.
6. Influence our representatives toward better government at less cost; keep informed of legislation; let our representatives know how we feel.

7. Co-operate with all organizations whose members are trying to promote recreational facilities for youth, little league, pony league, girls league baseball, swimming pool, bowling alley, community adult recreation.
8. Strive to create good will, understanding and friendly relations among the citizens and newcomers and businesses of Iowa Park by deeds and actions, promote Iowa Park as an ideal residential town to the visitor from other communities and other lands.

School Board Sets Policies

Trustees of the Iowa Park school met in called session April 17 with all members present. The meeting was opened by prayer by John Mixon.
Board passed a motion to erect two backstops at Ethyle Kidwell school and asked they be prefabricated by the agriculture boys.
They also voted to pay for certain curbs and gutters on Fourth street, approximately 600 feet, west of Kidwell school.
It was voted to accept a bid from Capitol Stage company for cyclorama curtain for the high school.
A board policy was made that no boys or girls on school sponsored trips be allowed to wear shorts of any kind.
A board policy was voted that all students attending school and driving a motor vehicle will be required to park in area designated by school board. Two school parking lots have been provided—the school property between what was formerly known as the Sherwood house and the Bryant property; the large parking area across the street north of the Church of God. No sitting in cars when parked in designated area will be allowed and no loitering in cars during school hours. No smoking allowed during school hours.
Motion to pay bills as presented was approved.
President John Clapp Jr. directed the meeting. Others present besides Clapp and Mixon were Stanley Williamson, T. E. Glibreath, Alan Berry, Dewey Spruell and Supt. Keith Swim.

Iowa Park Hawks entered the North Texas State Relays last Saturday at Denton and placed fifth in the meet. Only schools to outscore the Hawks were AAAA schools — Wichita Falls, Dallas Highland Park, Brownwood and Grand Prairie.

Iowa Park outscored Arlington, Dallas Samuel, Dallas Jefferson, Denton, Denison, Gainesville and Bowie in addition to all the AA and A class schools.

The Hawk sprint medley team of David Parkey, Jackie Brooks, Jim Gard and Bobby Gilbreath placed second to Brownwood.

In the 440 and mile relays the Hawks placed 5th.

The team goes to Denton again this week for the Regional meet. Because they are competing with AA schools only, the Hawks expect to win this meet and qualify enough men for the state meet to be contenders for the State Class

AA championship.

Iowa Park junior high was host to three other junior high schools last Thursday night in a track meet. The competition was divided into 7th grade division and 8th grade division.

Iowa Park won both halves. The 7th grade results were: IP 164; Archer City 95; Seymour 62; and Jacksboro 59. Carlton Walls was high point man with 39; Jerry Carter was second high with 32. Both are Hawks.

8th grade won with 167½ points; Jacksboro made 100; Seymour 89½; Archer City 56. High point man was Larry Thompson with 39. Bill Williamson of Jacksboro scored 33 for second high.

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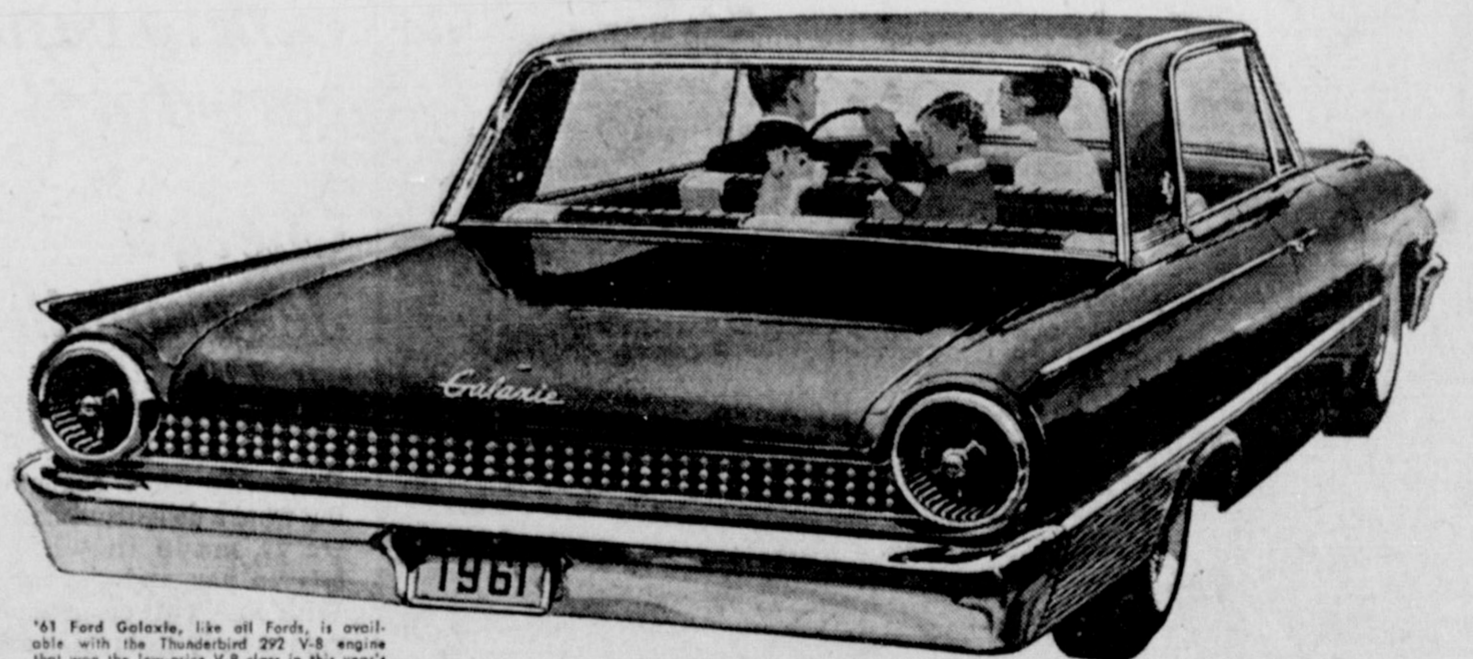
