J. F. Davis Dies at Caviness

Relatives and friends received word here funeral and burial services were held for Mr. John Frank Davis, 60, at Caviness, near Paris, Wednesday afternoon, April 19. Mr. Davis, a longtime resident and farmer of the Emberson community near Summer, died Monday morning after several years of illness.

Born Sept. 7, 1900, in Watonga, Okla., son of W. R. and Alice K. Davis, he moved with his parents to Iowa Park in 1911, residing just east of town. He attended the local school. On Dec. 20, 1921, he was married to Miss Eva D. Dunagan in Paris. They resided in Iowa Park until the early 1930's. Surviving are the widow and a son John D. Davis of Greenville; a sister Mrs. Elizabeth Keyse of Parsons, Kans.; and a sister-in-law Mrs. Lee Ora Davis of Iowa Park.

Iowa Park Hawks won the Region II AA track and field meet last Saturday at Denton. This was the second regional championship in succession for Iowa Park.

Point totals were: Iowa Park 68, Gladewater 42, Pine Tree 42, Hughes Springs 34, Neocoma 34. There are four regionals in the state.

The 440 relay team of Jackie Brooks, David Parkey, Bobby Gilbert and Jim Gard placed second.

Jimmy Gillipie threw the discus 145 ft. 5 in. for 4th place. Bobby Gilbert won first in broad jump with 22 ft. 6 in. and set a new record in the 180 low hurdles with 19.3 seconds.

David Parkey was 6th in 440. Otha Woods was third in 880. Gilbert Stogdill was 6th in mile. The mile relay team of Brooks, Gard, Parkey and Gilbert set a new record of 3:30.4.

The Hawks qualified six men for the state meet to be held in Austin on Friday, May 5. They are Gilbert, Gard, Parkey, Woods, Larry Brooks and Jackie Brooks.

Last year Iowa Park won State Class A championship, but we are now in Class AA and the competition is stronger.

Bill Carter and Bob Howington are coaches for the track and field team.

Who Pays?

Approximately 40 per cent of all tax money collected by municipal governments goes toward local schools.

Almost 30 per cent of total tax dollars of states is spent on public education.

Property tax has borne a bigger share of the educational load. Last year 54 per cent of the financial burden of education was placed on the property tax. Some agricultural states channel all or almost all property tax collections into education.

Who pays the property tax?

Despite the fact that farm population continues to decrease over the years, the property tax on farm property continues skyward.

Agricultural Research Service of the US Department of Agriculture reports that in 1958 state and local governments levied \$1.1 billion in taxes on farm estate, almost double the amount levied 15 years ago. An additional \$250 million was levied on farm personality, such as automobiles, farm machinery and livestock.

Size of farm property tax has almost doubled in 15 years while the number of farms has been cut almost in half during the same period.

The Department of Agriculture sees no letup unless new sources of tax income are found.
