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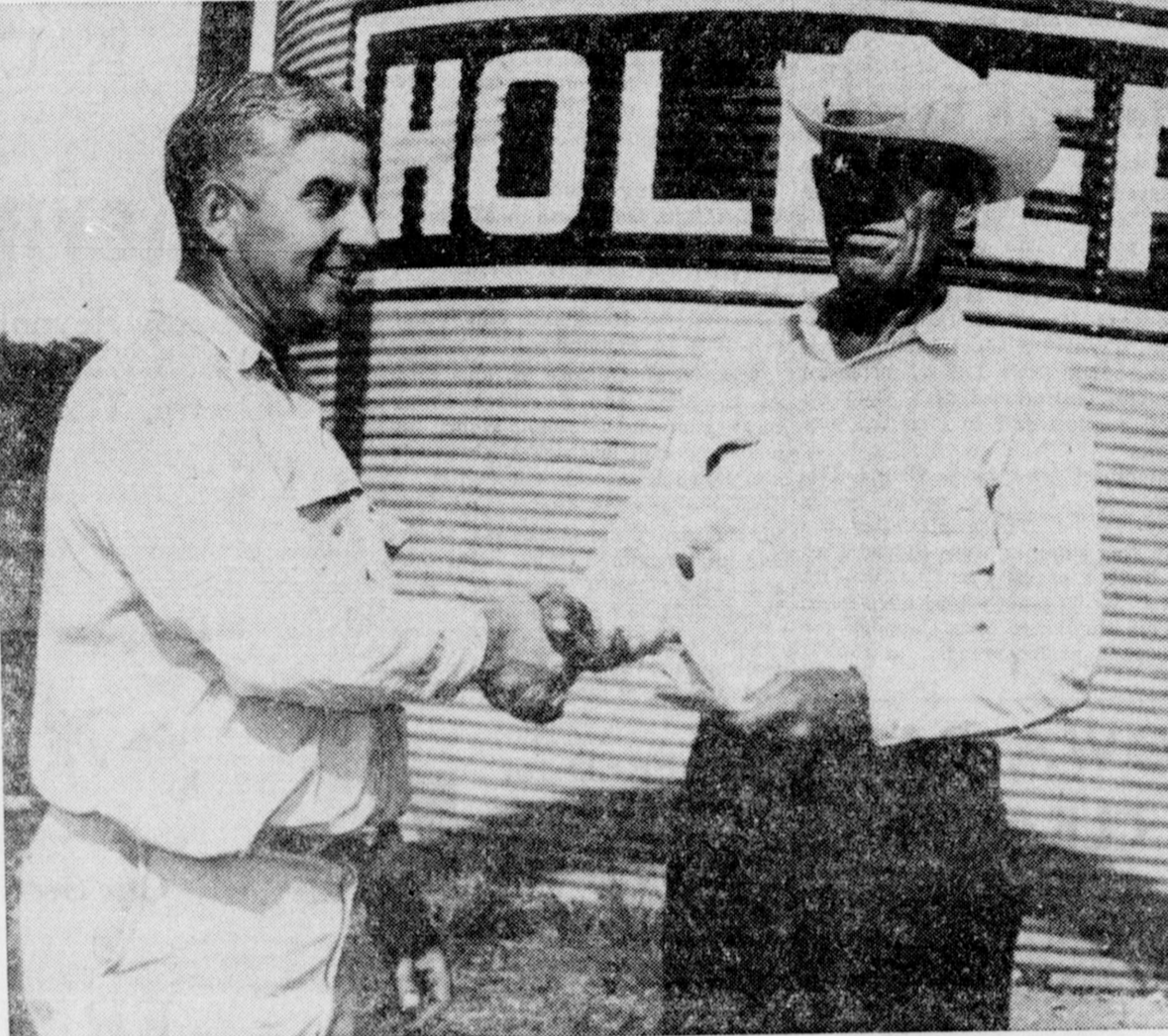

Born April 29, 1909 in Fayette county, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Chas. E. Kiesling, she came to Clara with them in 1917.

Miss Kiesling was a member of Clara church and was a former employee of Sheppard AFB. She died in a Wichita Falls hospital Tuesday morning after several years of illness.

Surviving are two brothers; Herbert of Clara and Werner of New Braunfels; two sisters; Mrs. E. A. Birkman of Iowa Park and Mrs. Clara Klinkerman of Burk Burnett; five nephews, five nieces and a host of friends.



Mrs. Mae Tanner, Pioneer Queen, Lived Full, Rich Life of Service

Funeral service was conducted for Mrs. Mae Tanner, 84, Monday morning, May 22, in the First Baptist church with Rev. Homer Thompson, pastor, officiating.

The body lay in view at the church one hour before the service. Burial was in Highland Cemetery under direction of Hampton-Vaughan Funeral Home of Wichita Falls. They were assisted by James Totien of Electra and J. D. Craft of Henderson, both funeral directors and close friends.

The well known pioneer and business woman of this area died suddenly in a Wichita Falls hospital Saturday evening following surgery Wednesday afternoon.

Born in California, Mo., April 10, 1877, daughter of the late George and Martha Akers. The family came to Iowa Park in 1890 after a brother Judge Jimmy Akers, first county judge of Wichita county, told them of the land and climate in Texas. Mrs. Akers brought a small Paradise tree with her because there were no trees in the area.

Mrs. Tanner, known to a host of friends as Mae-Mae, was among the first group that attended the first school here.

She became a member of First Baptist church the year after it was organized in the early 1890's. As a young lady she worked in her father's grocery. May 17, 1899, she was wed to Jesse Alvin Tanner. They later established J. A. Tanner Hardware and Furniture in Sept. 1905, the day their son Richard Alvin (Buddy) was born. Later the Tanners added the funeral business.

In 1929 the business became the J. A. Tanner and Son. On Jan. 31, 1933 Mr. Tanner died suddenly. His widow and son continued the business. In 1935 Mae-Mae became a licensed funeral director and assisted Buddy in business until the time of her death.

Mrs. Tanner had served as chairman of registration for the T-O Fair Pioneer Day celebration for the past 33 years. She was named the first Pioneer Day Queen because of her contribution to her community, church and family.

She was charter member of the Iowa Park chapter Order of the Eastern Star and assisted in organizing the Wichita Falls OES chapter. She was a past matron and last year was presented a life membership by her chapter. She received a 50 years membership certificate from Grand Chapter several years ago.

A tribute was paid to her saying "Her life had touched more people in this community than anyone else's." Young and old,

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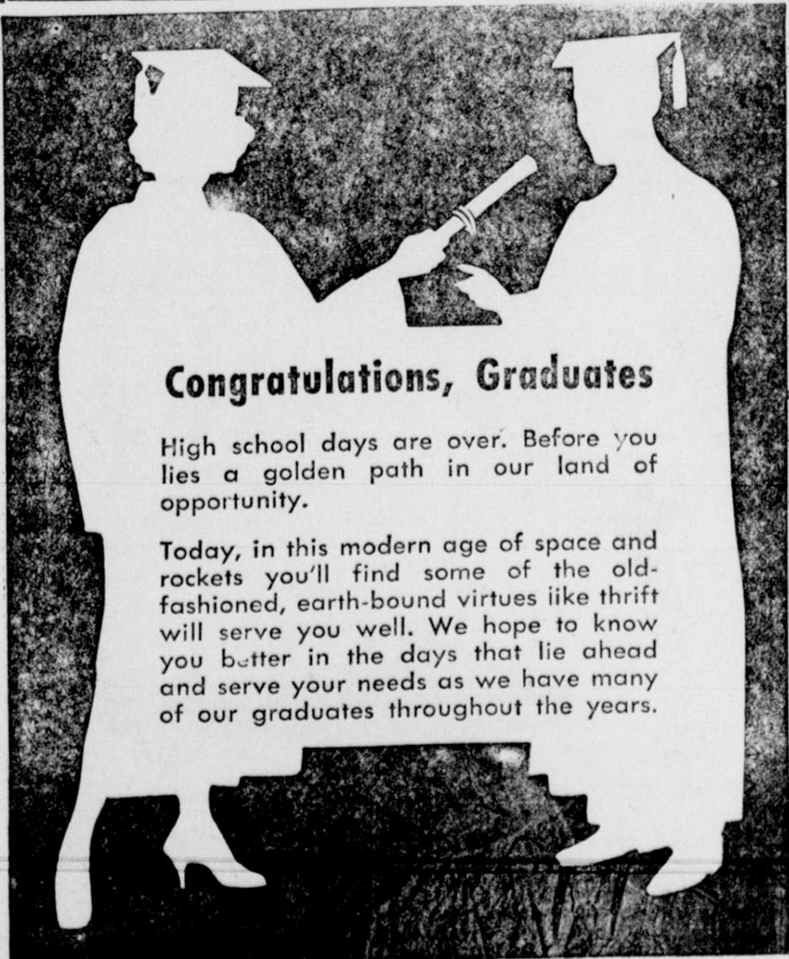

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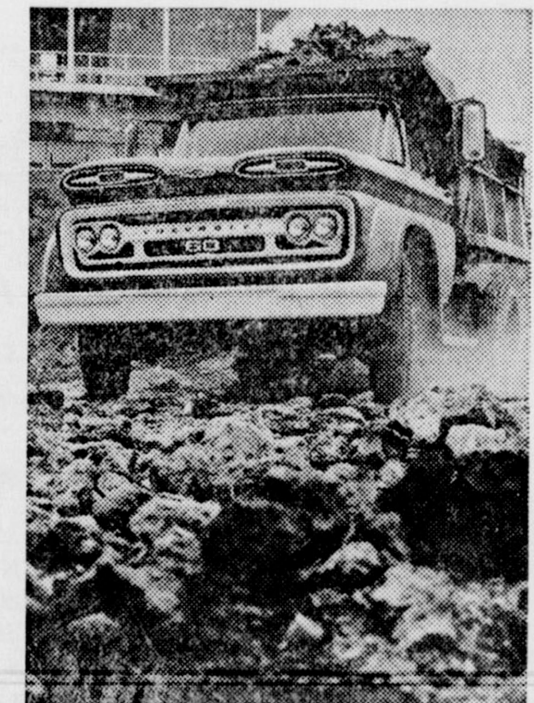

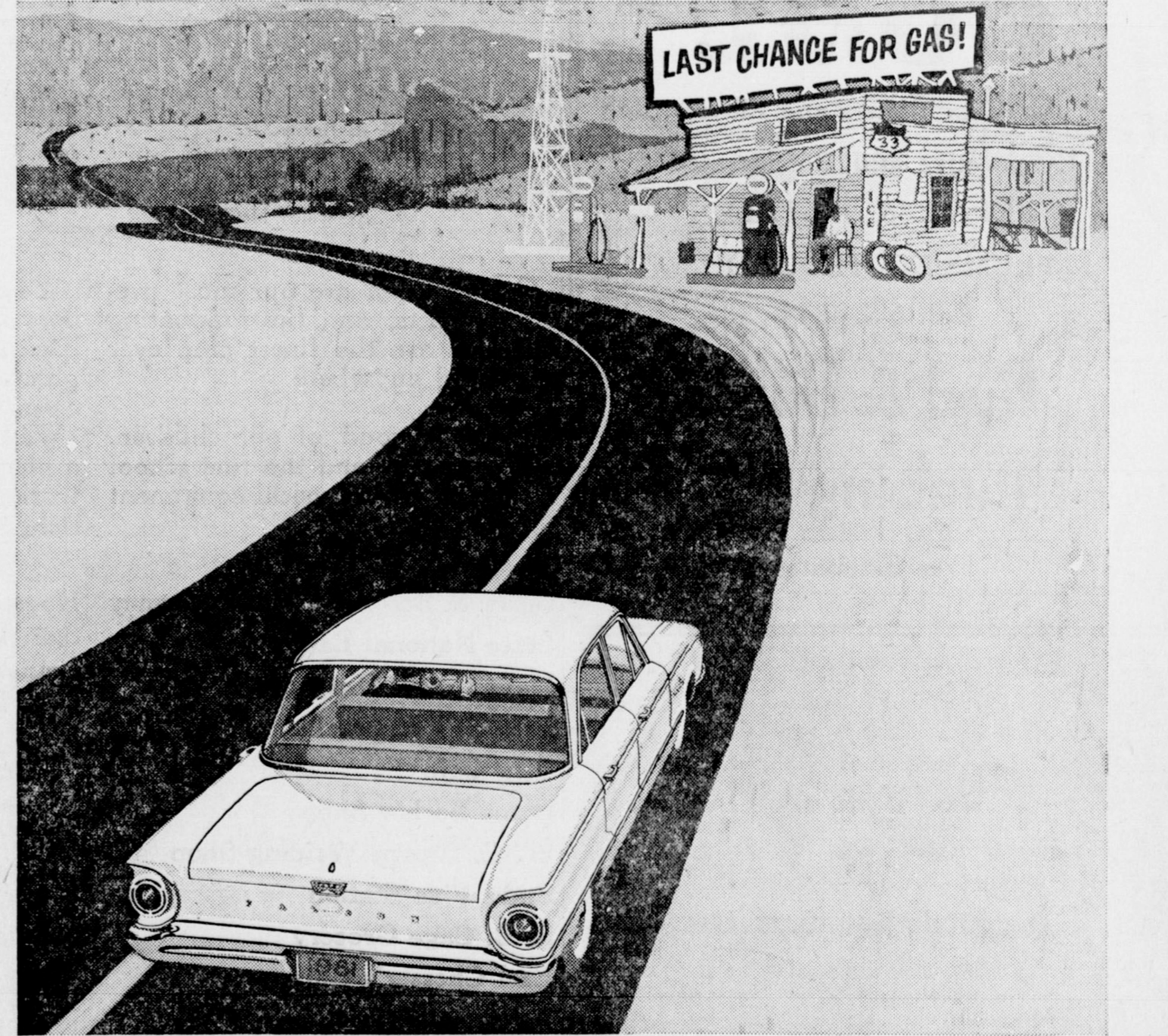
