Farmers Union speaks

Keystone of a free progressive democratic national society, as well as of a strong rural America, is the efficient, economically adequate and prosperous owner-operated family farm.

Each of the policies and programs of our international, federal, state and local government bodies should contribute to the maximum extent possible, and none should detract from this goal.

A "family farm" is an agricultural production unit using land and other capital investment that can be operated efficiently by one or more typical farm operator families who provide the management, take the economic risk and do most of the work.

Policies and programs of the federal government should be reviewed annually to determine if each is helping the nation insure the protection and promotion of adequate owner-operated family farming.

Operators should be encouraged and enabled to own the farms they operate. Concentration of farm land ownership and of farm operation into larger than family units should be discouraged.

Every possible means should be used to eliminate the conditions that cause substandard inadequate family farming in our country and throughout the world.

Bargaining power of family farms in commodity and credit markets must be balanced with the rest of the economy through programs and policies of the federal government.

Farm and foreign policies and programs should be utilized to the maximum to insure that families who operate family farms in any nation can earn and get a parity income defined as returns on family labor, management, capital investment and risk comparable to returns similar production resources receive elsewhere in the national economy.

Miss Janie Brown of Wichita Falls spoke to Noon Lions at the weekly meeting on the Wichita Area Eye Bank.

Homer Thompson offered the invocation. Sam Hill introduced Dr. Erwin Soell as a guest.

The men voted not to have a meeting July 4. Beginning July 11 the club will meet in the Kidwell elementary school cafeteria.

Claude McDonald introduced Miss Brown, who is a graduate of Hardin junior college and the University of Colorado. She has been a court reporter in Wichita Falls the past 11 years.

Miss Brown began her talk with the scriptural account of Jesus' healing a blind man. She went on to say there are 4,000 people on the waiting list for eyes.

Wichita Area Eye Bank serves people in a 150-mile radius. Anyone over the age of 21 may donate his eyes for the repair or replacement of eyes in another human. Miss Brown pointed out the eyes must be removed from the donor within three hours after death and used within 48 hours after death.

Wichita County Medical Society approves the eye bank, and national averages of success in cornea transplant operations is 90 per cent.

Soil Conservation 40 Years

Soil Conservation Service is in progress of gathering information for planning surface and subsurface drainage for East Pond creek, according to Elvy Sargent, conservationist here. This planning is being done as a part of co-operative effort of Wichita County Water Improvement Districts 1 and 2 and Wilbarger-Wichita SCD.

To plan the improvements, water tables and soil salinity will be determined. Conditions of natural drainways and their sizes will be checked, facilities needed to provide adequate surface and subsurface drainage, estimated costs and benefits will be made.

SCS is also taking soil salinity tests on several farms in Wichita Valley to determine effects of salts on soil. Where salt accumulations exist, an effort will be made to assist farmers plan corrective measures.

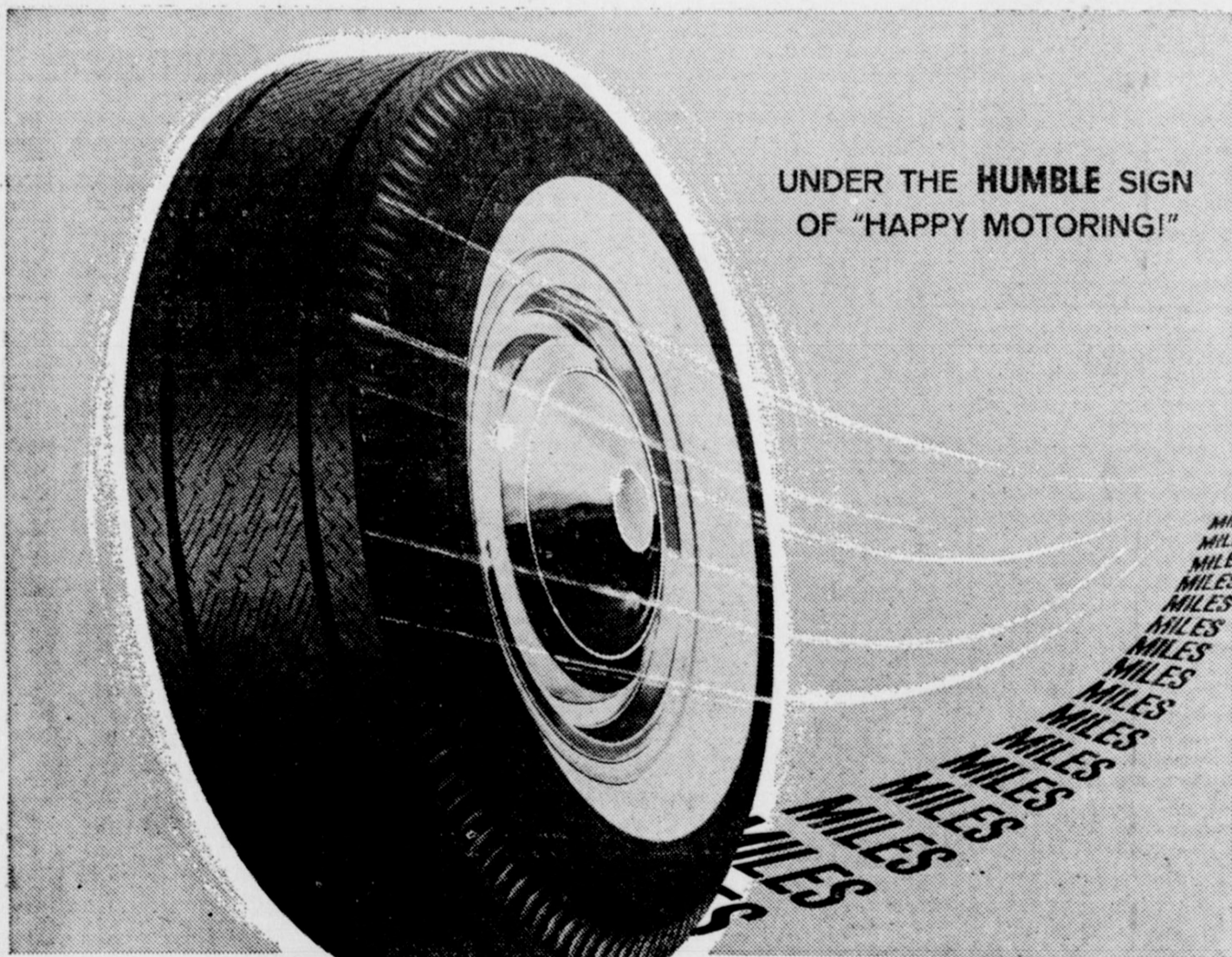

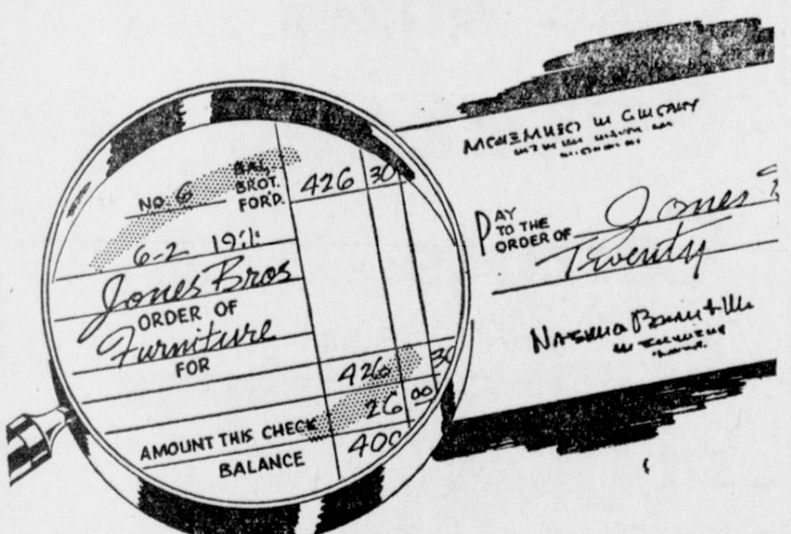
