## No More Is He 'Game Warden'

An old title in conservation and law enforcement in Texas will fade into history after Sept. 1, with the re-organization of the Game and Fish Commission. In the future, wardens will be known as "conservation officers."

There are approximately 200 of these uniformed officers in the employ of the commission. They started out strictly as law enforcement officers, but as times have changed they have become much more.

They spend much more time on prevention of violations than in actually making arrests. They help land owners develop wildlife programs, work constantly with biologists and appear before service clubs and other organized groups.

As wardens they have done a great job. As conservation officers their work will continue for the benefit of all renewable resources.

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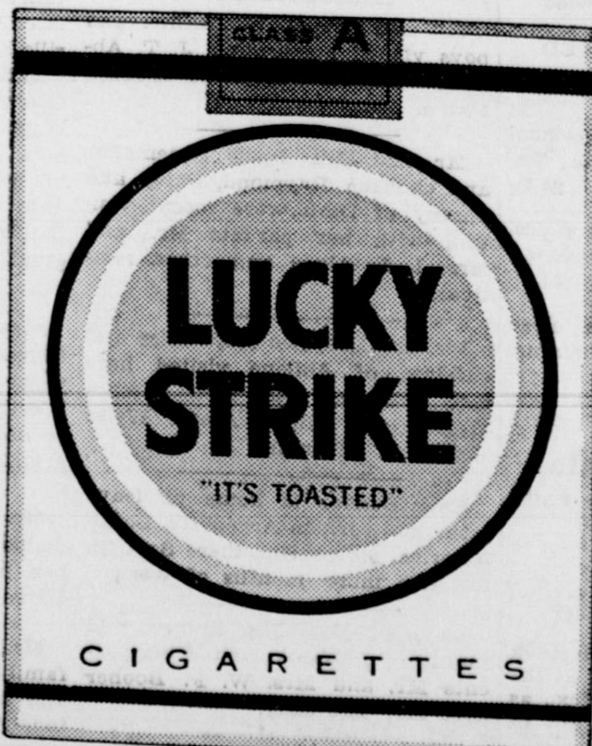

**Fishing, Hunting Licenses for Sale**

Hunting and fishing licenses are now on hand with local dealers and are being issued. They become effective Sept. 1.

Hunting license sells for \$3.15 and fishing license for \$2.15. A non-resident hunting license will cost \$25, that entitles a person to hunt any of the wild game during open season. A non-resident may hunt migratory birds for 5 consecutive days with a \$5 license.

The \$2.15 fishing license applies to both resident and non-resident.

A hunting license is not required of anyone under 17 or over 65 years of age outside the county of his residence. A license is required of anyone hunting deer or turkey. An exempt license may be obtained by persons under 17 or over 65, or by a person hunting on property on which he resides. A fishing license is required for all persons 17-65 who fish outside their home county or who use a rod and reel.

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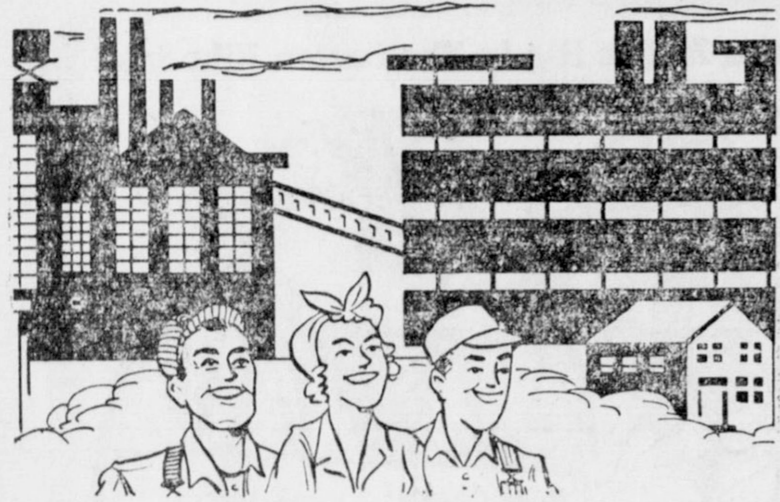

### "GET OFF THE LINE!"

Suppose you have a party line telephone. One day your house catches fire—or some other emergency arises—and you try to call the fire department or the police. Others are using the party line. They refuse to yield the line. Your house burns down or the robber gets away.

What is the law on this?

57th Texas Legislature passed a law which provides a fine up to \$500 (and-or confinement in county jail for up to one month) for refusing to surrender the use of a party line to permit another person to report a fire or summon police, medical or ambulance service in case of emergency.

An "emergency" means a situation in which property or human life is in jeopardy and the prompt summoning of aid is essential. This would include a fire, a robbery in progress, or a critically injured or ill person.

But don't be a Smart Aleck and ask for the line if there is no real emergency. The law also provides like penalties for requesting the use of a party line on the pretext an emergency exists.

If you face a real emergency, want to call help and find the line busy, interrupt and explain briefly and clearly that an emergency exists. Identify yourself and ask the other parties to surrender the line so you can call the fire department, police, sheriff, as the case may be. If they refuse, you should insist on your right to the line, informing them that the law so provides.

Violations of this law should be reported promptly to the county attorney for prosecution. In addition, if a person's property is damaged because someone refuses to yield the line, the property owner very likely may recover the damages in court.

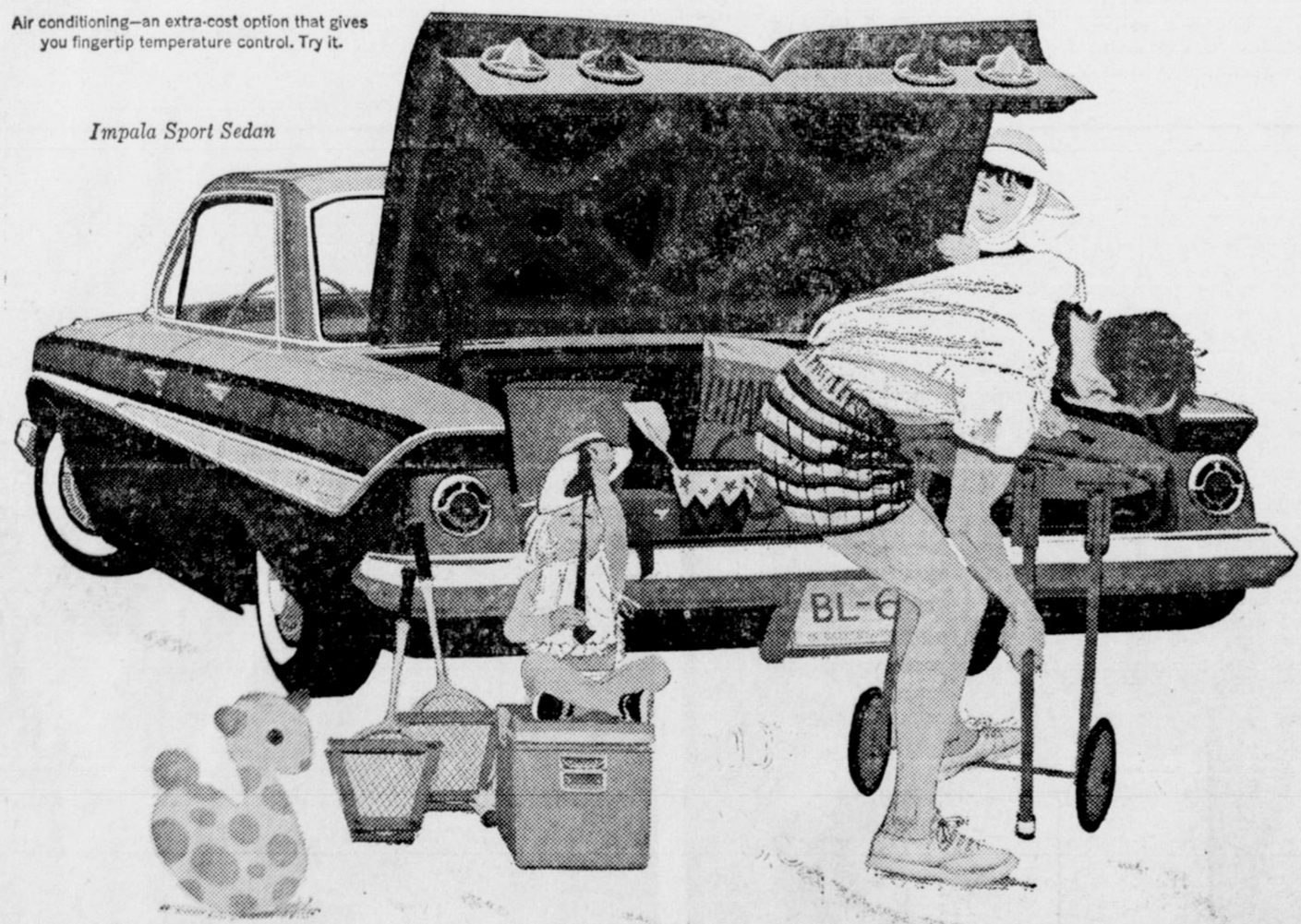
