What Price Apathy?

In that great classic of John Bunyan's, which all of us have heard about but too few of us have read, "Pilgrim's Progress," Presumption says: "I see no danger," and Sloth says: "A little more sleep."
And a modern parallel came through in music not so long ago but what most of us can remember in the popular lyric "Two sleepy people by dawn's early light, too much in love to say 'good night.'"
How wonderful it is to be in love, but did you ever stop to think that there is danger in it too? By this, I mean that when we love only ourselves or only our family and show no Christian love for our fellowman, we are in trouble.
It is elementary but most important that we should constantly remember the exhortation of Jesus that the second great commandment is "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Being true, however, only because the great and first commandment is "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind."
Glenn Shelton in an address to the Noon Lions this week expressed his belief that the greatest danger to our Nation today is not so much communism as it is a breakdown of our own morals.
There are evidences all around of this and he cited a few in the business world, but the greatest evidence of it is the terrible lack of concern Americans today are showing toward their neighbor.
In many respects our brothers and sisters in our own community need help but when approached too many people raise the standard marked: "I see no danger," and "A little more sleep," for we are "too much in love" with our own petty and selfish desires to worry about the other fellow.
Specifically we can illustrate this by the response our Community Fund committee has gotten here in Iowa Park the past few weeks. A goal of \$4000 was set this year for our city of "friendly living." But as of this writing after nearly every house has been canvassed a little less than \$1800 has been collected!
This is nothing less than disgraceful and yet it is indicative of the moral decay Shelton is talking about. We are too concerned about our own well being to worry about the other fellow, and it is precisely at this point of indifference, or apathy that we stand in the great danger of losing everything we hold so dear.
Maybe we should be reminded of what the Community Fund is collecting for, in that it is my sincere conviction that when the public is informed Christian action is much more likely to come to the front. The agencies that are working in our own community and seeking help through the Fund are:
