Mrs. Williams is former teacher of Sunshine Hill school, which has been abandoned many years. At present she is correspondent for the Madison Courier and Weekly Herald Madison, and the Vevay Newspaper Inc. Though she is 31, Mrs. Williams is quite active in civic and church affairs.

She has taught Sunday school since she was 16, and presently is teacher of a ladies class in her church. She is author of a book "Master Sunday School Guide," which has been acclaimed by ministers, bishops, district superintendents and newspapers.

Mrs. Williams is known throughout the Methodist denomination for her leadership. Several years ago she was selected Best Sunday School Teacher in Indiana at a state convention, competing with ministers, lawyers and other professional men.

She was a member of the Iowa Park Christian church.

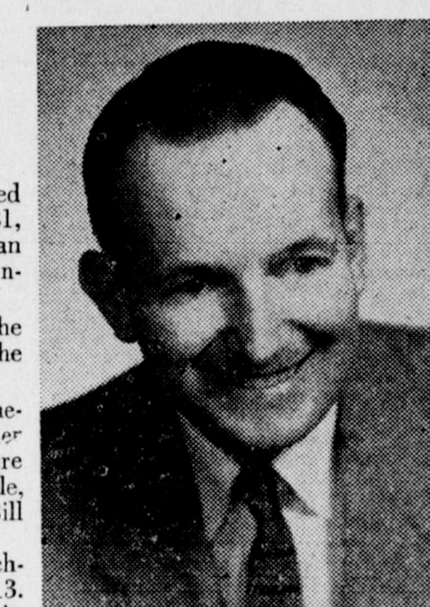

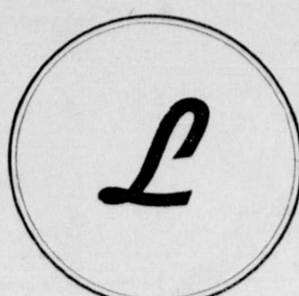
