## Grandma's Rocking Chair

Last week I casually mentioned that at this Thanksgiving season, we should count our blessings. Now our preacher says that is fine, just don't count the other fellow's — you may find cause to envy him — he may have more blessings than you do!

There's just one place however where I defy anyone to have reason to be jealous of his neighbor. A person's own memories far outshine any that anyone else may have, be he beggar or king. But many times these memories are of our own making or that of our family and friends.

When Thanksgiving comes I always remember one in my childhood when we lived on a farm and attended a nearby 1-room school.

We had the usual Thanksgiving program the night before the great day and on this particular pro-gram my oldest brother and I into our costumes which consisted of night gowns over our clothes, but did not include shoes and stockings. We lived on the high plains just a few miles south of Amarillo.

I shall never forget kneeling on my eight-year-old scrawny knees with my bare feet sticking out from under my flannel gown and that cold wind fresh from Amarillo whistling across that school-house floor as we valiantly struggled to sing:

*Father, we thank thee for the night  
 And for the pleasant morning  
 light.*

*For rest and food and loving care  
 And all that makes the world so  
 fair.*

*Help us to do the things we should  
 To be to others, kind and good.  
 In all we do in work or play  
 To be more loving every day.*

Yes, to purloin a phrase from a famous comedian, "Thanks for the memories," for surely to each his own, is his memory of happy times and bad. Of depression and plenty, for the survival of our nation and its founders. For our leadership, and even for our hav-

ing had such leadership as that which left us this week in the person of "Mr. Sam." His going left some terribly large shoes for some one to fill. His was the Voice of Experience for these many years.

But we are thankful we had him and his wise thinking through so many crises in our nation's life.

Another memory of the oldest grandson. He was sitting beside me in church. A bald man came in and sat in front of us. Now he had never seen a bald man in all his four years. 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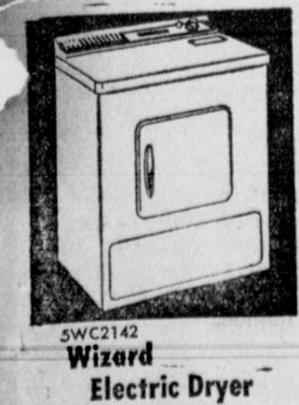

### Garden Club

Iowa Park Garden club met at the Youth Center recently for a study of borders, types, propagation and cultivation of chrysanthemums. Participating in discussion were Mmes. L. C. Hill, W. L. Yost and Maude Hanes.

Prayer by Mrs. Homer Blalock opened the meeting. During the business period directed by Mrs. Clyde Hutchinson, it was voted to contribute crape myrtle plants toward the landscaping project of the entrance gate at Sheppard Air Force Base. It was decided the club will be responsible for a table at the Christmas Idea Show in the Woman's Forum, Dec. 7.

Invitation was read from the Dig and Delve Garden club of Wichita Falls to attend the White Elephant club at Cunningham elementary school last Saturday.

Mrs. Hill began the program with discussion of borders, observing that they should be planned as carefully as arrangements for the inside of a home. She said flowers in borders, around fences, along drives and walks should be arranged according to height, producing a graduated effect.

Mrs. Hill recommended for borders: phlox, petunias, peonies, delphiniums, candytuft, sweetpeas, snapdragons, pansies, thrift, sweet alyssum, bleeding heart. She described a border in a garden in East Texas she saw last summer, which featured only shades of yellow and orange against a white picket fence background.

Mrs. Yost discussed chrysanthemums and told the history of the flower. "To know the chrysanthemums which came from China, you should study the types and their particular characteristics as to form, size, color and adaptability to your landscaping or house decor," she said.

Mrs. Hanes discussed propagation, cultivation and soil conditions desirable for best flowers. She said the annuals provide beautiful cutting material as well as mass color in the garden. They have good color with single, semi-double and double bloom, and produce from July to frost.

Perennial chrysanthemums are listed as single, anemone, flowered, decorative, pompon, butter, spoon and spider.
