Strong Packages; Clear Addresses

Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath and his staff are asking everyone to co-operate and "mail early for Christmas."

Of course everyone wants his packages and cards to reach their destination before Christmas and there are some simple rules to follow so your loved ones will not be disappointed.

Wrap your gifts securely; be sure they are addressed clearly and correctly; and mail them early.

Says Gilbreath, "Despite careful handling, too many packages break open in transit, and too often we have to puzzle over names and addresses which are incomplete or cannot be read."

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the post office before attempting to mail them," Gilbreath says.

As an extra precaution, place your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

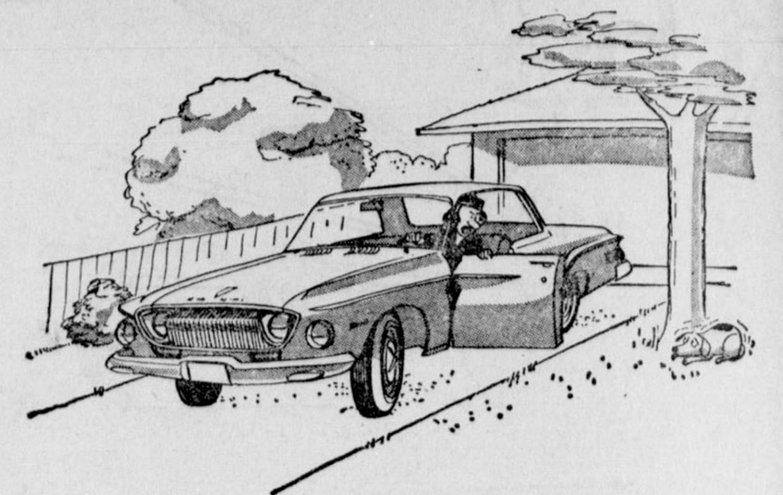
So, until the City of Iowa Park takes plans for a community shelter and carries through with the plans, I will drag out my .45 and my shovel and make myself a shelter.

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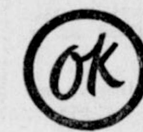

TESCO Sets Up Symposium

Texas Electric Service company and 10 other electric utility companies in Texas again in 1962 will join with the University of Texas in sponsoring a nuclear science symposium for high school students and teachers.

The symposium will be held in Austin next June 10-13. A similar program last June was attended by 400 selected students and teachers.

"The symposium is part of a continuing program of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation to advance knowledge of nuclear science through research and education," says Beeman Fisher, president of Texas Electric.

"Purpose of the meetings is to supply basic information to high school science students and teachers about nuclear science and related fields of mathematics and physics, and to give them opportunity to meet with outstanding scientists from across the country."

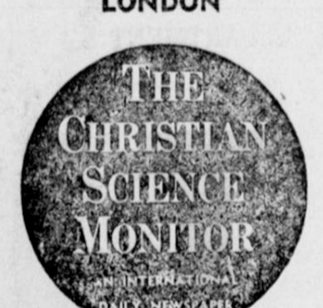
With this plan, young men can enjoy the holiday season with the family and still draw full pay and allowances from the army.

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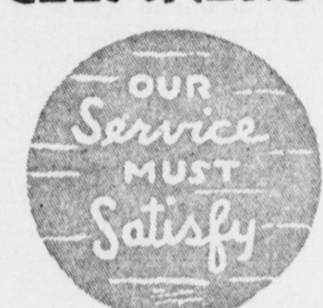
Buttons 'n' Bows

The tax dollar is spent in the following percentages: Education 45.4; Public schools 32.2; Higher education 9.6; Teacher retirement 3.5; Highways and Roads 26.3; Legislature 2; Health, hospitals and special schools 4.5; Law enforcement and eleemosynary institutions 2.5; All other Executive Branch operations 4.4; Welfare 15.8; Judiciary 4.

Sources of state tax dollar: Sales tax 52—retail sales 15.8, Alcoholic beverages 2.2, Motor vehicles 3, Cigaretts, cigars and tobacco 9, Other .6, Motor fuel 21.4; Major business taxes 11.4—Corporation franchises 5.8, Insurance companies 3.6, Public utilities 22; Severance and production taxes—Oil 12.2, Natural gas 6.3, other .5; Motor vehicles 9.5; Other taxes 2.6; Inheritance 1.3; Property 4.1.

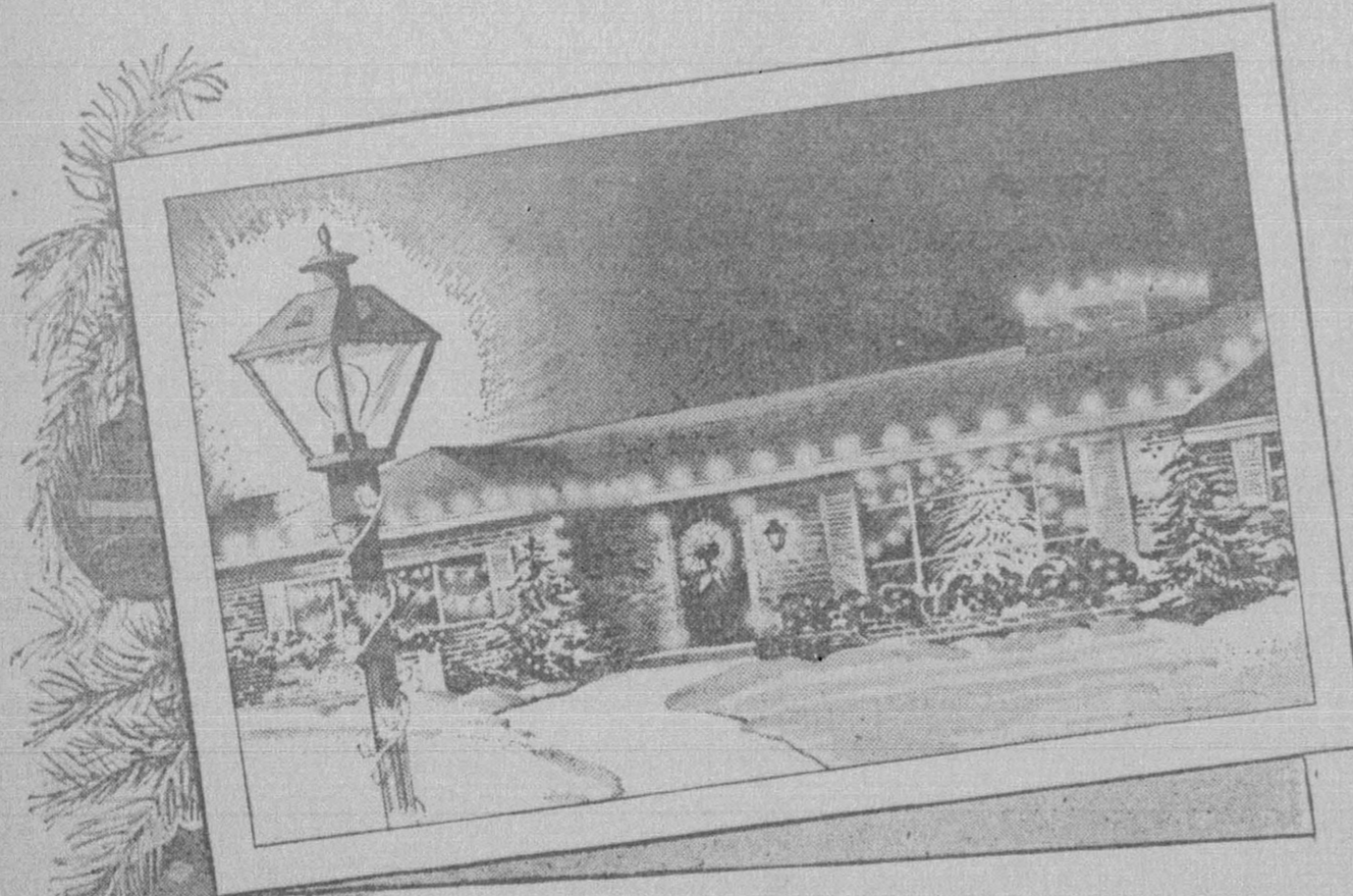

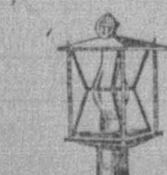

Introduced by Keith Swim, president of the county tuberculosis association, Duncan said, "I believe in the TB Seals drive."

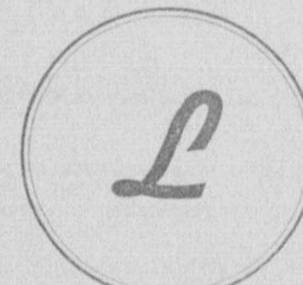
Every 50 minutes tuberculosis takes the life of someone in this country. At present there are 176 persons in Wichita county who are known to be active cases.
