Christmas Safety

Iowa Park is looking forward to a merry and happy Christmas, but with the joys of the season often come needless tragedies resulting from fires, falls and traffic accidents.

Fire Chief George Huckaby and Fire Marshall John Nixon say: "To prevent fires you should be sure to choose a Christmas tree that has not dried out and place it in a stand which has a water container in which the trunk can rest. Fill the container daily."

"Keep your tree some distance from stoves and fireplaces and make sure electric toys or toys fueled with flammable liquids are not near. Do not use candles or combustibles near the tree."

"Flowers and paper decorations should be kept away from electric bulbs, candles and fireplaces. All gift wrappings should be disposed of outside."

"Tree decorations should be flameproof. Use only decorations made of glass, metal or other fire-resistant material."

"Be certain to check tree lights for loose connections, broken sockets or frayed wiring. Do not use more than a 15-amp fuse on the circuit and do not overload it. Turn tree lights off when you retire or leave home."

"If you are using a metal tree, use off-the-tree lighting. Placing strings of Christmas lights upon any metal tree sets up the possibility of electric shock if the cord becomes frayed or the interior of a light socket comes in contact with the tree."

The firemen also warn against buying flammable plastic toys to be operated with gasoline or alcohol or kerosene.

To avoid falls during Christmas time, don't obstruct your vision by carrying too many packages. Do not let children scatter toys around the house. Use a sturdy ladder when trimming the tree. Keep packages off stairs where people could trip over them. If you're having a party, roll up slippery throw rugs.

To cut down traffic accidents, drive carefully and watch out for children running out into the streets. In their excitement they often forget safety rules—you must protect them from their own carelessness.

Plan all your trips so you will have time to drive carefully. The traffic will be heavy, so allow few hours extra for that long trip, and use all the time that your safety demands.
