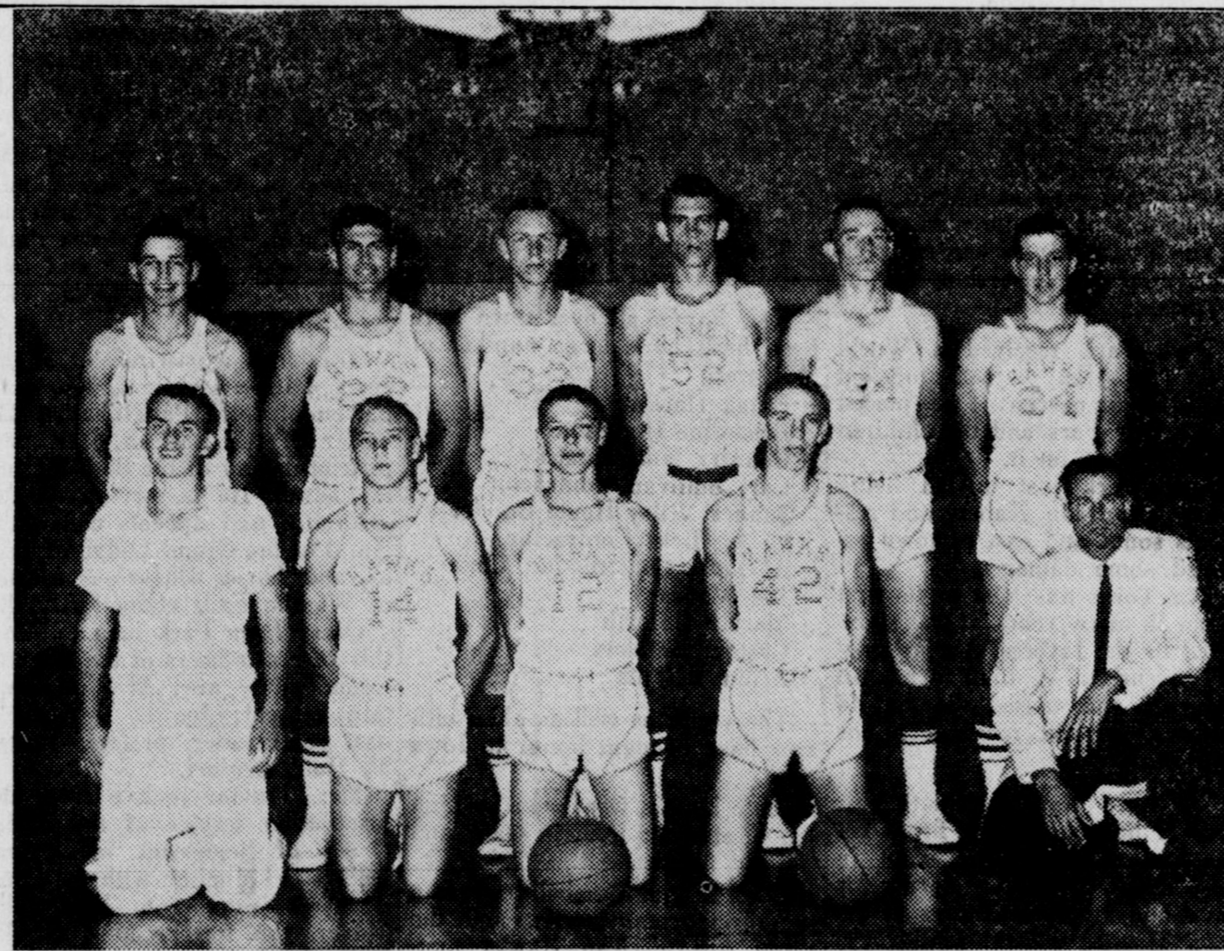
Susan Lively and Kathy Ricks were flower girls. Tommy Ricks was ringbearer and lit altar candles during an organ prelude.

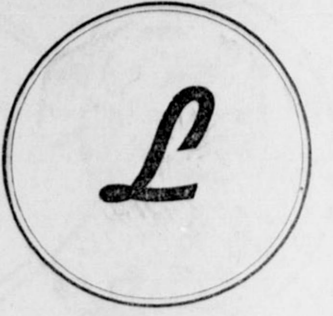

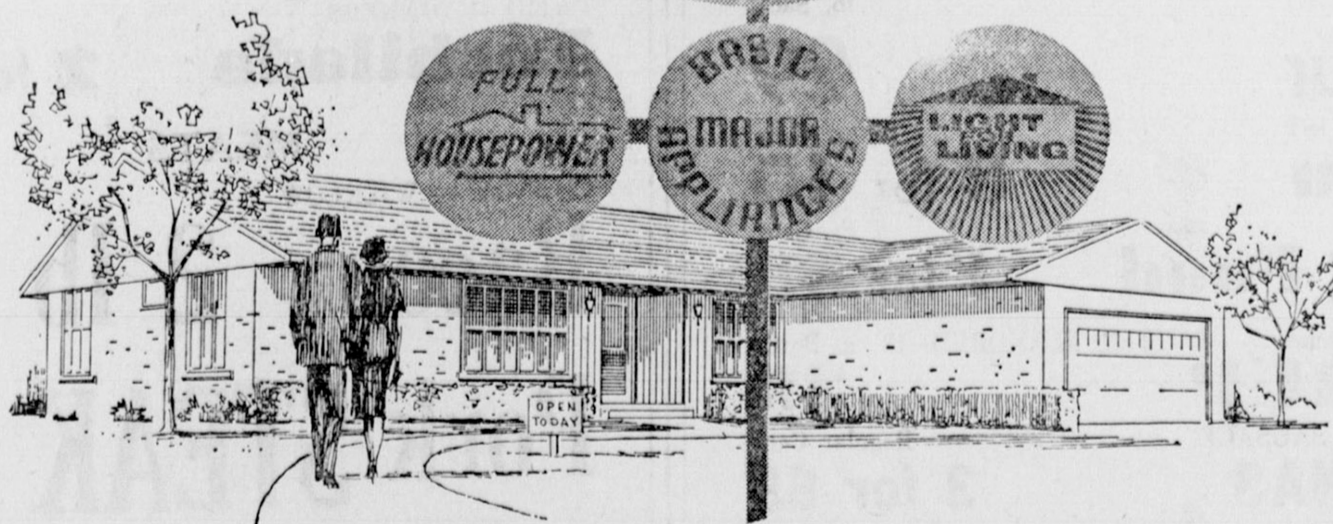
