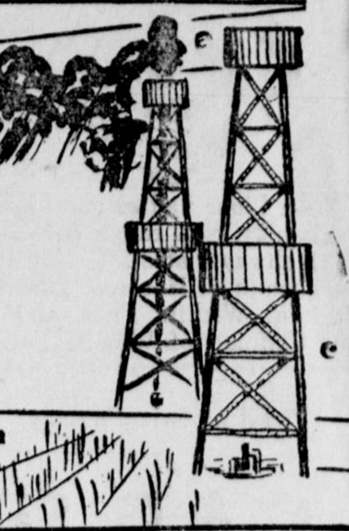

Site Bought for School Building

Iowa Park school district has purchased 12 acres of land from Mr. and Mrs. Ruben Parish, east of South Texowa street. Concrete corner posts have been planted to designate the property lines.

Application has been made for federal aid under Senate Bill No. 815. In announcing acquisition of the land the Board of Education said this does not mean a building is to be started immediately, but it is hoped in a few years the district will be able to construct another elementary school.

There is a 5-year clause in the contract, if a school building is not started within 5 years, the original land owners have option to repurchase the land.

John B. Barbour, Patriot, Builder and Leader, Taken by Death

Funeral service was conducted for Mr. John Buchanan Barbour sr., 63, well known business and church and civic leader of this area, Saturday, Jan. 13, at 2:30 p.m. in the Christian church with Rev. Claude McDonald, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Bovt Smith, John Nixon, Paul Craft, Everett Stephenson, Rollins Woodall, Loyd Bell.

Mr. Barbour, known to a host of friends through the nation as just "John Barbour," died at his home, 306 E. Washington, Thursday night following several years of ill health.

Born Oct. 25, 1898, in Norman, Okla., he came to Iowa Park in 1911 with his parents the late Mr. and Mrs. Wylie Barbour and family.

They settled on a farm east of town. John was graduated from IPHS in 1915 and attended Decatur Baptist college in 1915. In 1916 he transferred to Oklahoma A and M college. In his junior and senior years he attended the University of Oklahoma in 1917-18, where he received the BS degree in engineering and geology.

Mr. Barbour served in both World Wars. Following World War I he returned to Iowa Park and started the John B. Barbour Trucking company in 1919.

He served at one time as teacher of the men's Sunday School class. With rare ability and complete devotion John Barbour gave of himself time and financial assistance to the church he loved.

Barbour served Iowa Park and Wichita Falls in civic and community affairs. He was a former mayor here; past president of the Chamber of Commerce; and three times president of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair. He served on the foods committee for Pioneer Day since 1938 and was instrumental in starting the Junior Livestock department and construction of the junior livestock building and of the front ticket office at the Fair grounds. He was a longtime director and at time of death one of the vice-presidents of the T-O Fair.

In Wichita Falls he was a life member of the Rotary club active in the North Texas Oil and Gas association served two terms as president of the Texas Area Council of Boys Clubs of America, a former director of the Oilfield Haulers association, member of TMTA and America Trucking association.

John was a director of Wichita County Water Improvement District and was on the Voluntary Parole Board of this county.

He was a member of the Gem and Mineral Society. As a rock hobbyist, he made many beautiful items from rocks and gave them to his friends.



Mr. Barbour became interested in Aberdeen Angus cattle in recent years and now the Barbours have some of the best Angus cattle at their Hilltop ranch northeast of town. He was a past president of North Texas Angus association. In 1959 Mr. and Mrs. Barbour were awarded the Outstanding Farm Family trophy from the local Chamber of Commerce.

In his busy life John Barbour was never too busy to help the youth of this area and encouraged them to become good citizens.

Surviving are the widow; a son J. B. Barbour jr.; a daughter Mrs. W. D. Kitchell of Weslaco; three sisters: Mrs. Guy Hawkins of Bartlesville Okla.; Dr. Helen Barbour, assistant dean of home economics, Oklahoma State university, Stillwater, and Mrs. Edith Bray of Norman; three brothers: Wayne of Oklahoma City, Ed and Bob of Norman; and six grandchildren.

John truly was a trail blazer in the oilfield hauling industry. At that time trucks were just beginning to replace wagons and teams in moving oilfield equipment.

Barbour started with one truck and drove it himself. In 1924 he added two trucks and by 1925 was operating nine trucks, doing all kinds of oilfield work, including stringing hundreds of miles of pipeline in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma.

Since that time the John B. Barbour Trucking Company has grown under his leadership and with the help of many good men who have been associated with him. The company trucks now operate all over the United States and Canada.

During World War II, Barbour served as a major in the army in England with the engineering corps.

John was married to Miss Verna Lindsey, a high school classmate, Jan. 22, 1921, who has been his constant companion and co-worker. She helped to keep the business going while John and their son J.B. were in the armed services during World War II.

Mr. Barbour was a longtime member of the Christian church.

He served in many places in the church: as chairman of the board three times, as a deacon and later as an elder and trustee. He was chairman of the building committee for the present church plant and of the parsonage building committee.

Wiggins Asks Elected Term as Dist. Court Clerk

District Clerk Wayne Wiggins has authorized the Iowa Park Herald to announce his candidacy for election subject to the Democratic Primary May 5.

With more than eight years experience in the District Clerk's office, Wiggins has headed this office since Oct. 16, 1961, when he was appointed by unanimous vote of the three district judges of this county. He had previously served as chief deputy for eight years under Miss Flora Cobb.

Wiggins is endorsed by a majority of the more than 100 members of the Wichita County Bar association who acclaim the service of his office to the public. The district clerk's office maintains records of all matters pending before the three district judges.

A native of Vashti, Clay county, Wiggins was graduated from high school at Bellevue and attended the University of Texas briefly before entering the navy during World War Two. He saw duty in the Pacific aboard an electronic supply ship.

Following his service he worked in the bookkeeping department of Morgan Motor Co. and M & V Tank Co. and as a salesman for American National Life Insurance Co. before taking the post in the courthouse.

He is married and with his wife Jan and three children—Debbie 10, Angela 5 and David 4—makes his home at 2712 Pennsylvania, Wichita Falls.

Members of his staff include Irene Crass, chief deputy, and Sue Harrell, both of Electra; and Lenna Cutbirth, Carrie Key, Alma Armstrong and Don Longley, all of Wichita Falls.

In addition to prompt service to lawyers and officials of the courts he serves, Wiggins is well known for his service to members of jury panels and those of the general public who have cause to inquire into matters on record in his office.

"This office is a service office for the people of Wichita County, particularly those with litigation before the courts, their lawyers and the judges, and it is our desire to give them a full measure of service," Wiggins declares.

During the period the courthouse has been under construction, Wiggins has maintained a smooth operation despite the fact he has had to serve two courts in the Post Office building and one in the Panhandle building. Most of the permanent records are maintained in the Panhandle building, but the courts in the Post Office building have never been delayed because of lack of records. Some old records which must be referred to occasionally are on file in the attic of the courthouse now under construction.

In making his vote appeal, Wiggins says: "I will continue to operate this office under the high principles set down by Miss Cobb and earnestly solicit your vote in the Democratic Primary May 5."

Pastor's Thoughts Regarding a Beloved Elder

In this day and age we expect men and women to speak well of the business for which they work. We are accustomed for salesmen to laud and magnify the product they sell, but it is the exception rather than the rule for a man to be day in and day out singing the praises of his church. In fact, this is indeed rare.

One of these unusual persons who did just this, however, was John B. Barbour, elder emeritus of the First Christian Church, Iowa Park, Texas.

When Mr. Barbour died the physical death last week it silenced a golden voice which had sung out for forty years in behalf of this fellowship. And this in itself is a tremendous loss to us, but John did more than merely praise the Lord and His church with his lips, he praised the Lord daily with the very way he lived his life. Constantly he thought of the welfare of others and ways he could offer assistance, and this was his concern even throughout his long period of illness.

Not more than ten days ago he talked with me about the need for better church office equipment to facilitate our work here, and the plans for a new educational wing to give us some much needed educational rooms.

Progress was his keynote, and "Onward Christian Soldiers" was certainly a theme hymn for his life. One man made the remark just this week: "John Barbour didn't come to church to be a Christian, he left the church each Sunday to go out and practice his Christianity the remaining six days of the week." This indeed was the way he lived.

Those of us who find an empty place in our lives this week because his physical body is no longer with us, have the consolation nevertheless of finding the spirit of his love just about everywhere we turn in this church building and in the parsonage, for his was the leadership which was in great part responsible for moving ahead in the building of both.

John Barbour, a great citizen, a devoted Christian, is dead, but his spirit still lives and always will. May that spirit be calling you and me who knew him and loved him so much to a more complete giving of ourselves to our Lord.

She was married near Sherman to William Fleming Cobb Dec. 24, 1878. They resided near Paris for several years before moving to Indian Territory. He was a cattleman and rancher near Tishomingo on a 320-acre farm one mile from Devil's Den, not yet excavated. A neighbor was Bill Murray, who later became governor of Oklahoma.

Mr. Cobb died in 1898. Mrs. Cobb moved back to Texas in 1912. She resided in Kamay community for many years with the J. A. Pautsky family. After Mr. Pautsky's death she moved to Iowa Park in 1954 with a daughter Mrs. Pautsky and family.

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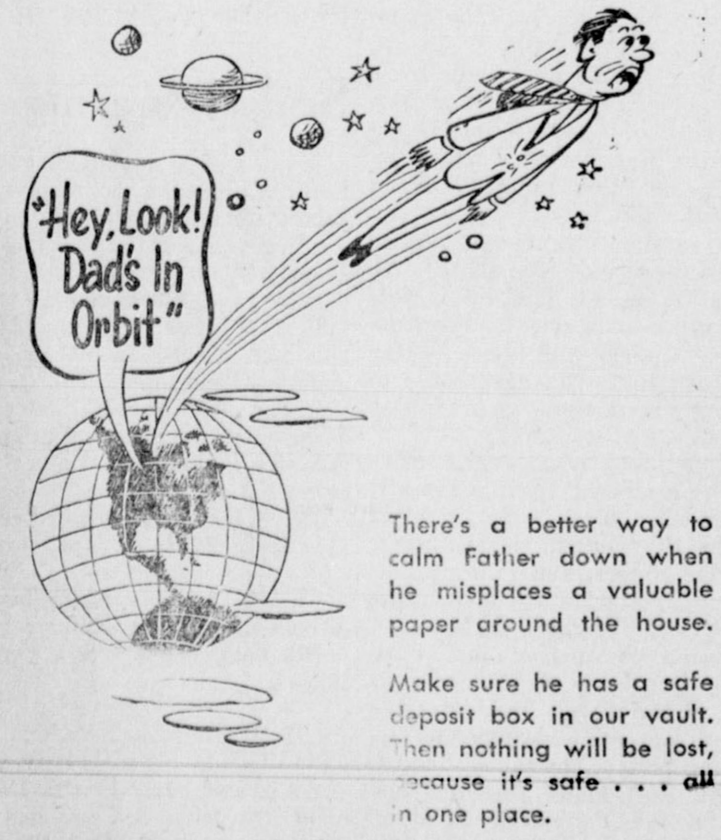
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City Election
