Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe has made the following comment concerning the special session of the legislature just closed:

"The recent 30-day special session of the legislature worked harder and spent less money than any session in many years.

"The construction of both our main highway system and the Farm-to-Market road system was placed on a sounder basis.

"The proper disposition of bank accounts whose owners are unknown was settled fairly.

"The question of small loan interest rates was not settled, principally because many members including myself, were opposed to the legalization of an interest rate of 36 per cent per year, which is what the bill which failed would have done. Thirty-six per cent interest even on a small loan is unreasonable.

"This question can properly wait until the next session of the legislature, when a better solution than authorizing a 36 per cent interest rate per year can be found.

"There will not be any more special sessions soon."

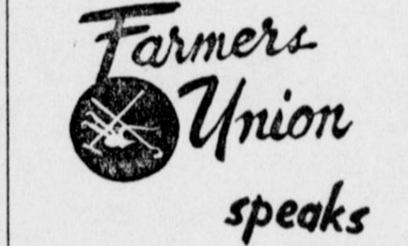
Galloway Cleans and Remodels Dairy-Land

Recent government reports are good news to the consumers of the nation. Consumer price index increased only 1/2 of 1 per cent, the smallest rise since 1955. Another report predicts 1962 will be another year of near-stable consumer prices, with increase in living costs not expected to go over 1 per cent.

If the predictions hold true, the country will have enjoyed a spell of near stability in consumer prices such as has been experienced only twice since World War II.

Average increase over the past 10 years has been over 3 per cent yearly.

Cost of food, household goods, furniture, cars and appliances contributed only about two-fifths of last year's increase. Medical cost, rents, public transportation, repairs and other items accounted for most of the increase.

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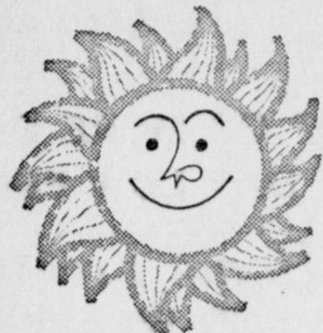

Christ and a Faith for Our Day

There is a story about a minister who went with his small son to preach in a country church. At the door was a box, "For the Poor," into which the minister plunked a 50-cent piece. At the close of the service a deacon said, "Sir, it is our custom to remunerate the visiting minister with the contents of this box."

On opening it, he found in the dust the half-dollar, nothing else. As the coin was passed over to the preacher, the little boy spoke up: "Daddy, if you'd put more in you'd have got more out!"

Something of the same meaning may be applied to our understanding of Christian prayer; you've really got to put something into it if you want the prayer to be answered in a positive way. In reality, we must put ourselves into our praying.

If we are concerned with the petitions and intercessions we are making, then we will allow ourselves to become a part of our prayers; in other words we will allow our Heavenly Father to use us to bring about that for which we pray.

There is little point in praying that God will convert the unconverted and then give a dime to make it possible to bring them the gospel. There is little point in praying for our home and for our loved ones, and then to go on being as selfish and inconsiderate as we have been.

And there is little point in praying that the sorrowing may be

comforted and the lonely cheered, unless we ourselves set out to "give feet to these prayers," to bring comfort and cheer to the sad and the neglected in our own community.

In a day when we tend to get someone else to do the things which we ourselves should be doing, it is a fascinating temptation to make of prayer another way to get someone else to do what we will not make the effort to do. It is no accident that the Lord's Prayer begins "Our Father," not "My Father." This word "our" indicates our relationship to all mankind; it indicates that we are all wrapped up together in the great bundle of life; it indicates that the "closest" into which I go to pray is only a niche in the cathedral of the whole Church of Jesus Christ.

I know that when I pray as our Saviour has taught us to pray: "Our Father," I am immediately involved in the responsibility for that for which I pray. The "amen" at the end of prayer, then, is not the ending, but only the beginning, as we would do everything in our prayer to see our prayers realized.

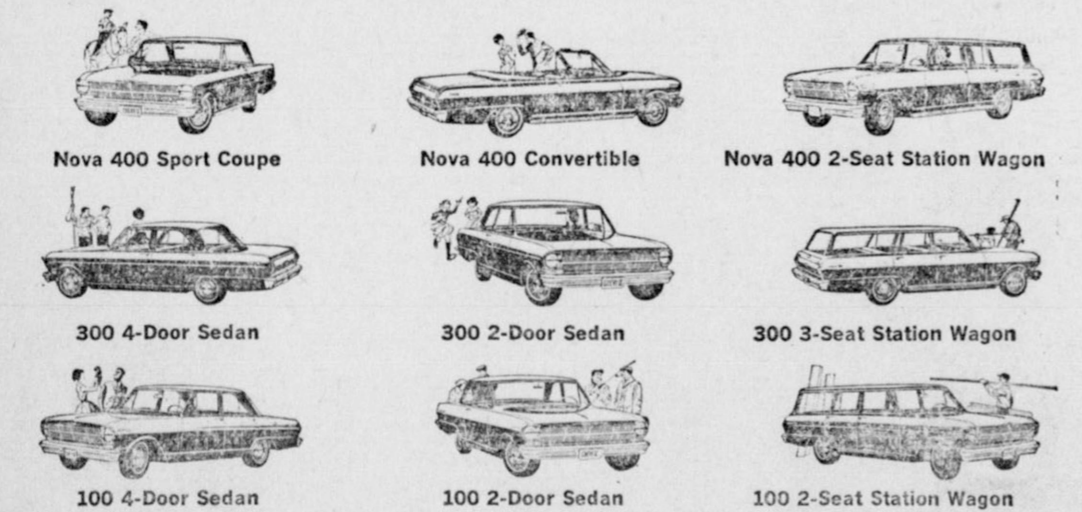
