Funeral service was conducted Sunday afternoon, Feb. 18, in Wichita Falls for Mrs. Aaron Kriss, sister of Ben Levinson of Dallas and formerly of Iowa Park. Burial was in the Hebrew Rest cemetery.

Mrs. Kriss died Friday morning in a Wichita Falls hospital.

Mrs. Kriss and her late husband and the two sons Larry and Stanley were well known here as they were frequent visitors with the Levinson family, who owned and operated the Famous Department store here.

Born March 8, 1906, Mrs. Kriss had resided in Wichita Falls the past 36 years.

Surviving besides the two sons are her father Max Levinson; two brothers Joe and Ben; six sisters: Miss Lilyan Levinson, Mrs. Jack Olsiof, Mrs. Hymie Schwartz, Mrs. Harry Kirtman, Mrs. Simon Barshop and Mrs. Mike Levine—all of Dallas; and three grandchildren.

Car-Train Collision Kills Local Pair

A double funeral service was conducted Wednesday morning for Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Morgan in the Presbyterian church with the Rev. Mr. Boyd Schlenker, minister, officiating.

Mr. and Mrs. Morgan were instantly killed in an automobile-passenger train collision at about 1:00 p.m. Monday at the Wellington Lane crossing just off Iowa Park road.

The southbound train struck the Morgan vehicle on the right rear door, ripping the car apart and hurling its occupants from the wreckage.

Mr. Morgan was thrown about 55 feet from the collision, Mrs. Morgan was found 162 feet from the point of impact. The automobile's rear section was thrown across a concrete culvert some 225 feet away.

Railway engineer said the car had turned onto Wellington Lane from Iowa Park Road and was going south. Apparently the victims did not notice the approaching train.

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
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23 Study Club

Mrs. W. G. Steele planned and directed presentation of a fine arts program for a meeting of 23 Study club last Thursday afternoon. The meeting was in the home of Mrs. C. W. Coppock with Mrs. C. J. Thurber as co-hostess. Theme was Accenting the Latin American Way of Life Through Music.

A meditation by Mrs. Sam Hill began the program. Using Psalm 93 for scriptural background, Mrs. Hill used the topic "Sing Praises unto Thy Name." She closed with a poem "The Greatest of These" by Nona Thompson.

Mrs. Steele gave a discussion of the topography, locale and diverse strains of people in the 20 republics in Latin America to show how these things have influenced the growth and development of music. She said music in Latin America has progressed in the way all things young in nationality progressed. Folklore and native themes have progressed to combinations of those themes and dances of varied races.

Mrs. Steele said the literature and music known as Afro-Cuban for instance, has a liberal sprinkling of words utterly foreign to most South Americans. These were introduced into the Spanish language by Negroes who came to Cuba from Africa. Today some of the most representative new music in Bolivia, Peru, Mexico and other countries with a strong Indian heritage is appropriated directly from native sources or is a mixture of melancholy Indian and more joyous Spanish strains. The result is known as Mestizo music. In Brazil the music has been influenced by Portuguese, Indians and Negroes.

Mrs. Steele said that in the Caribbean countries Negro and Spanish music have been combined to produce a type of which the rumba is one of the best known examples. However the rumba and tango rhythms do not exemplify the highest type of music. Music in Latin America has grown up, and in the cities some of the world's finest musical productions are presented. Buenos Aires boasts the world's most famous opera house where both foreign and national artists are heard and many leading orchestras and concert singers are cordially received.

Mrs. Steele praised the Inter-American Music Festival held in Washington, D.C., beginning in 1958 as having made a great contribution of music in the Americas.

Howard university at Washington, predominantly Negro school, has the finest choral group in America if not in the world. Howard Mitchell, conductor of National Symphony Orchestra, said that these singers made 30 concert appearances abroad in 1960. Their itinerary included Latin American countries. Everywhere they went the reception was terrific.

At its first concert in Mexico City the group sang Villa Lobos No. 10 and the audience went wild. The number had to be repeated, and Carlos Chavez, director of Mexican National Symphony, said, "In 30 years of conducting this is the first time I have ever repeated an orchestral piece."

U.S. composers and arrangers were represented on every concert. So much good will was created by means of the tour that the director suggested to the State Department that music students be sent from the U.S. to Latin America.

Mrs. Steele presented the musical program in the form of friends dropping in for tea, with each performer dressed in appropriate costume.

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



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

Christ and a Faith for Our Day

Often people wonder why it is that Christians pray in the name of Jesus Christ. Is it just some kind of magical formula to be placed at the end of a prayer? Does it simply signify that the prayer is over? Why pray in the name of Jesus Christ? After all, "I believe in God."

But the problem is that to pray means nothing unless we know to whom we are praying. If we are constantly kneeling before a great "spiritual blur" that some call "God," it will be just as futile as our worshipping an "Unnamed God." To pray in the name of Jesus means that we know to whom we are praying; we are praying to that God who has revealed Himself in the life, death and resurrection of a Man, Jesus Christ.

To pray in the name of Jesus means that we pray in the spirit of Jesus. It would be impossible for a Christian to pray for evil to come to someone he disliked. This might be prayer in its broad sense, but it could not be prayer in the Christian sense, prayer in Christ's name, for it would not be prayer in the spirit of Christ.

When we pray in His name we confess before the world that we are His disciples, that the place we find God is in the person of our Master. John Calvin said that some people "have been beating the air with supplications to an unknown God." And this is exactly what happens when we do not pray in the name of Jesus.

The Christian cannot pray in any other name than that of Jesus Christ; for that is what makes him a Christian. As the scriptures tell us, "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him." (Col. 3:17)

Soren Kierkegaard, the great Danish theologian of the 19th century, said that to pray in the name of Jesus may be explained in this way: An official orders a particular thing in the name of the king. This means that I myself am nothing. I have no power, nothing to say for myself—but in the name of the king. Thus to

pray in the name of Jesus means that I cannot approach God without a mediator; if my prayer is to be heard, then it will be in the name of Jesus; what gives it strength is that name and spirit.

Next, when an official gives a command in the name of the king, it naturally follows that what he commands must be the king's will; he cannot command his own will in the king's name. The same thing is true of praying in the name of Jesus; I cannot pray in the name of Jesus and have my own will, if it is alien to the will of Christ.

And, finally, when an official gives an order in the name of the king, it means that the king assumes the responsibility. So too with prayer in the name of Jesus; He assumes the responsibility and all the consequences for us. Just as the minister, if he understands his task aright, does not preach to you in his own name, so too, we pray not in our own names, but in the name of Jesus Christ.

And so prayer is not the way to get something out of God; but prayer is the on-going conversation between the Lord God Almighty and man. This conversation calls us to be honest, to trust fully that when we pray in the spirit of Christ our prayer will be answered: either "Yes" or "No" or "Wait."

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And we know that when we pray in the name of Jesus we are involved in Christian prayer, prayer in which we ourselves will become involved. It is told that there was once a man who wished to pray but did not know how to begin. A wise friend said to him: "Sit down alone in your room. Put an empty chair opposite you. Imagine that Jesus is sitting in that chair. Talk to Him as you would to the closest friend you have." And soon the man found that Jesus was the closest friend he had.

Prayer in the name of Jesus is not a way of making use of God. It is a way of offering ourselves to God in order that He should be able to make use of us.
