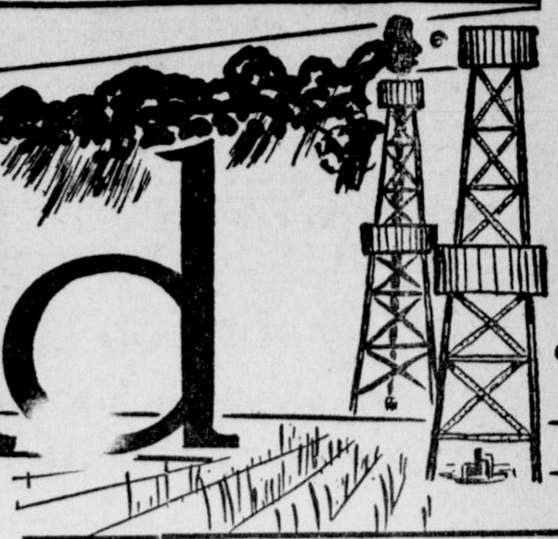

There are 131 first graders: 65 in Iowa Park elementary and 66 in Kidwell elementary.

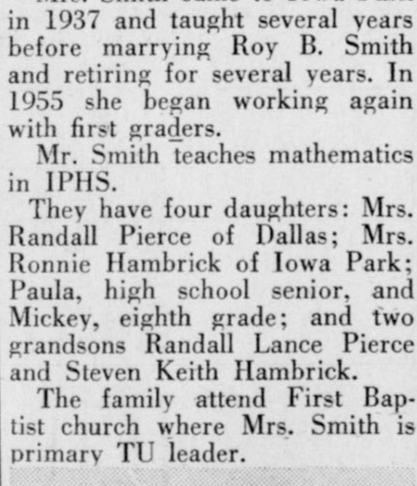


Mrs. Letta Bryan teaches in Iowa Park elementary and resides at 409 W. Aldine.

Mrs. Tommie Smith teaches in Kidwell school and resides at 200 W. Washington.

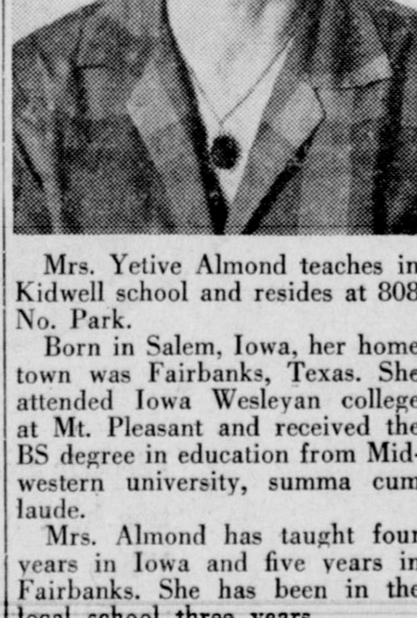
Born in Era, she attended Decatur Baptist college and received the BS degree from Midwestern university and is working toward a master's degree.

Board Needs Money, Books and Volunteer Help; Sets Up Rules

On this the 12th day March, 1962, the Commissioners' Court of Wichita County, Texas, being convened in a regular meeting, considered the designation of a County Free Library under Art. 1677 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas and related articles, and being of the opinion that it is to the interest and welfare of its citizenry that a County Free Library be designated, and that Iowa Park is centrally located in the county and numerous citizens of Iowa Park have taken an interest in such County Free Library; a motion was made by Commissioner Buck Voyles, and seconded by Commissioner Clark Greshma, that for the present time the Southeast Corner Room of the Chamber of Commerce Building in Iowa Park is hereby designated as the Wichita County Free Library under Art. 1677 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas and related articles;

and further, that there is hereby created a Wichita County Library Board consisting of eight members, with four members being appointed for a period of four years and the other four members appointed for a period of two years; and with the further provision that the Commissioners of Wichita County shall bi-annually appoint four members who shall serve for a period of two years. The duties of the Wichita County Library Board shall be to investigate the ways and means necessary to extend the services of the Wichita County Free Library; to receive any gifts or bequests that might be made to the Wichita County Free Library on behalf of Wichita County; to recommend rules and regulations to the Commissioners' Court for the checking out of books from the Wichita County Free Library; and to make whatever reports and recommendations that are felt necessary by said Wichita County Library Board to the Commissioners' Court for the purpose of extending the services and facilities to all the citizens of Wichita County as provided by law.

Passed unanimously this the 12th day of March, 1962.

Books will be checked out for two-week periods with no renewal privilege, and one book will be permitted each borrower. The rules will probably be made more liberal as the library's stock of books is expanded.

Principal needs at present are volunteer helpers, money and books. All persons who wish to help should contact Mrs. J. D. Rowntree. Books can be brought to Western Auto Store or to the Herald office. Money should be mailed to: Wichita County Free Library, Box 1962, Iowa Park, or sent to the State National Bank for deposit to that account.

Driver Seeks Election as District Judge

He has also been vice-president of the Blackstone Club of local lawyers, treasurer of the Wichita County Bar Association, and was originator and chairman of the Law Day USA program for three years. He is a member of the American Bar Association, the American Judicature Society, and has been vice-chairman of State Bar Admissions Committee.

Judge Driver is a leader in church and civic affairs. He has been an elder, Sunday School superintendent of First Presbyterian church of Wichita Falls, and is now a teacher of the Senior High School class there.

Judge Driver is interested in all people and their problems. He is convinced that a judge has a responsibility to give service not only in the courtroom but in his community life as well. He is now serving as director of the Children's Aid Society, the School of Listening Eyes, the Wichita County Red Cross, Tuberculosis Association, USO, and Mental Health Association.

He continues his interest in Boy Scouting as a Citizenship Merit Badge Counselor which he began years ago as an Eagle Scout and assistant scoutmaster of Troop 10 of Wichita Falls.

He is a director in the Wichita Falls chamber of Commerce and was formerly a director and officer in the University Kiwanis club, the Wichita Falls Junior chamber of commerce, where he was Jaycee junior tennis chairman for six years.

He has been active in Democratic Party affairs and was a precinct delegate to the County Convention and attended the State Convention as a Wichita County delegate in 1960.

A business administration graduate of UCLA, he attended the Harvard Graduate Business School one year. He was graduated from the University of Texas Law School, passed the state bar examinations and began his law practice in Wichita Falls in 1953.

He served a year as Wichita Falls city prosecutor in 1956 and was elected County Judge in 1958.

Judge Driver is married to the former Jacquelyn Culbertson of Vernon and they have one son, Robert Temple jr., age one. They reside at 1602 St. John. Judge Driver's mother, Mrs. Charlotte Driver, and his aunt Miss Mary Driver, live in Wichita Falls.

In announcing his candidacy, Judge driver said: "If elected to serve as District Judge, I shall continue the policy which I have practiced as County Judge these past four years of attempting to administer justice fairly and impartially to all citizens in my court."

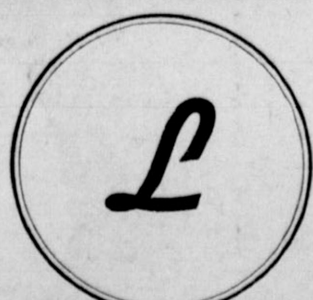
