If you wish to sign a pledge stating you will give blood April 5, please contact any Jaycee or Joe Singer, blood chairman.

This is a must. Last time the mobile unit came to Iowa Park we showed little concern and only a few responded. Singer points out that if you go to the Blood Bank in Wichita Falls to give blood, always designate it for the Iowa Park supply.

A large number of local teachers attended the recent one-day district convention in Abilene.

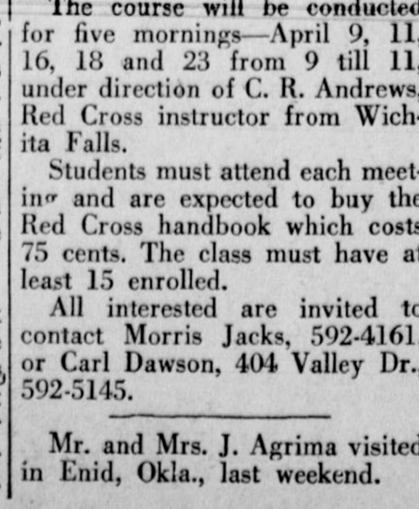
First Aid Course

Surviving are Mrs. Churchman and a large number of nephews and nieces.

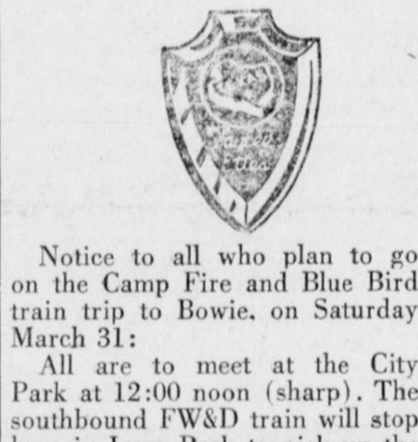


Beginning Sunday evening, April 1, and continuing through June 24, the Presbyterian church will present a 13-week course entitled "Christianity in a Changing World." Each session will be held in the sanctuary of the First Presbyterian church beginning at 6:30 and lasting from 45 minutes to an hour.

Will absentee owners or giant corporations work and waste the land for profit? Will this replace the pattern of thousands of rural communities which produced generation after generation of sturdy, industrious Americans?

Successful rural family living depends upon the existence of strong rural neighborhoods and communities. To build these requires development in rural areas

of adequate rural cultural centers including stronger churches and other religious centers, improved local government, better schools, provision for local discussion forums for all citizens, rural libraries and art centers, and healthful rural recreation centers.

There are a multitude of things that must be done to end current trends and rebuild rural communities. First and foremost step must be improving and stabilizing farm income to insure preservation of Family Farming in America, the bulwark of a strong rural community.

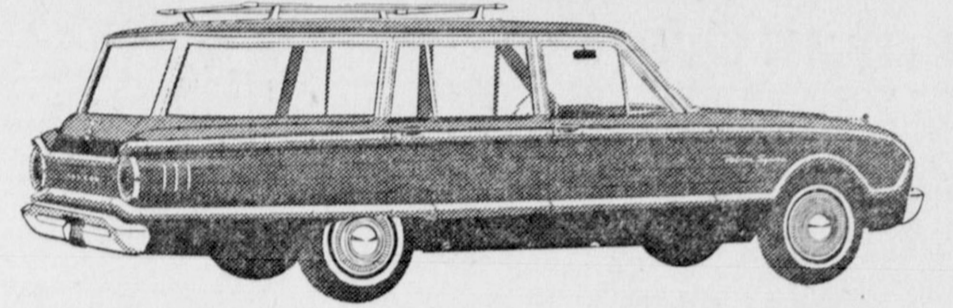

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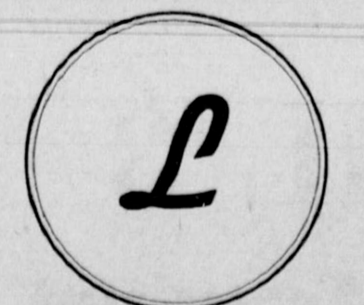
