Iowa Park hearts were sad-
dened early Monday by the un-
expected death of Rev. Maynard
Gray Swart, 48, pastor of the lo-
cal Church of God.

Mr. Swart had been hospital-
ized for two weeks following a
heart attack on Sunday night,
March 25, at his home. He had
suffered a heart attack last fall
while hunting in Utah with
friends from Fort Worth. He had
just recently begun to take active
part in his church work.

Funeral service was conducted
Wednesday afternoon in the local
Church of God with Rev. P. H.
McCarn, overseer of Churches of
God for the state, officiating. He
was assisted by Rev. G. M. Gil-
bert of Dallas, a former pastor
of the local church.

Burial was in Crestview near
Wichita Falls under direction of
Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa
Park. Pallbearers were Graham
and Horace Wayne Kazer, Pete
O'Neal and Richard Atkins, all
of Fort Worth; Ray Bounds of
Weatherford; Clyde Skinner of
Iowa Park.

Mr. Swart was born in Louis-
ville, Ill., Aug. 6, 1913 and at-
tended school in East St. Louis,
Ill. He was married to Miss Dor-
othy Neudicker on July 13, 1932,
at Waterloo, Ill.

The family came to Texas 14
years ago. Mr. Swart held pas-
torates in Weatherford, Ft. Worth,
Paris and Houston before com-
ing to Iowa Park about a year
and a half ago.

supplies and maintenance.

will be happy to receive them.
Several organizations and persons
have already contributed.

This is an officially designated
county free library and proper
accounting will be made of all
funds received.

Everybody is invited, and new-
comers are especially invited to
come and get acquainted with the
library and with other people of
the community.

ministered the oath of office to
the two elected trustees—T. E.
Gilbreath and Harry Moore.
Clapp was re-elected president;
John Mixon was made vice-pres-
ident; Gilbreath was re-elected
secretary.

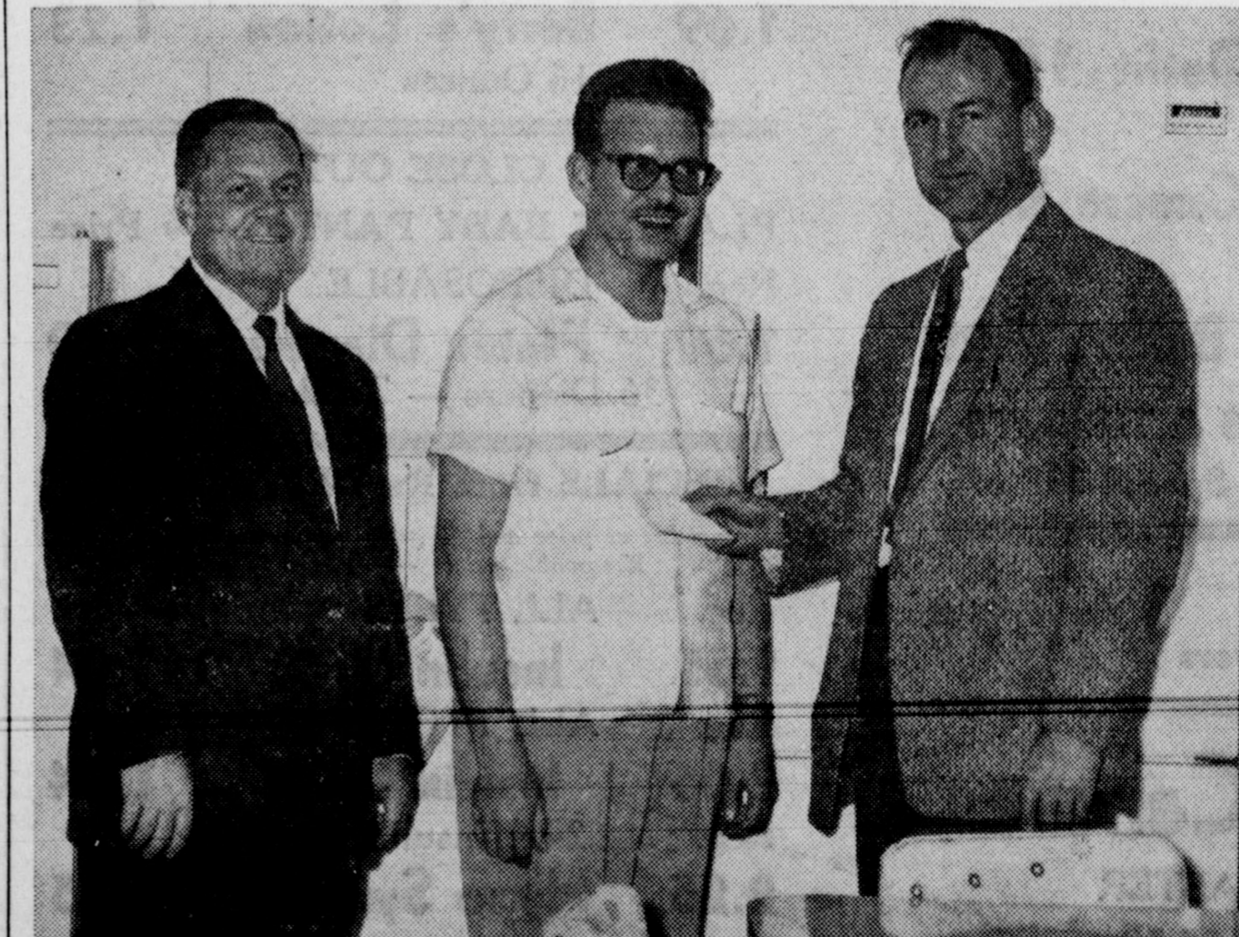
The board approved plans for
a new elementary school building
to be located in the south part
of town. They also approved a
new policy of selecting class of-
ficers and pep squad leaders for
the high school.

A student must have passed all
subjects the preceding semester
and be passing all subjects at the
time of nomination in order to
be eligible for any office or honor
within the school. He must have
and maintain an average of B
plus in citizenship.

Married students—or previous-
ly married students—are not eli-
gible for any student office or
position of honor, nor are they
eligible to participate in Inter-
scholastic League activities.

Pep leaders must be financially
able to purchase and maintain
their own uniforms.
Members also discussed proj-
ects for the summer: Extension
of the bleachers at the football
field; remodeling of the science
laboratory and the library; re-
modeling and enlargement of the
office.

Supt. Keith Swim was instruct-
ed to make a survey of transporta-
tion and mechanical mainte-
nance expenses and report at the
next meeting.

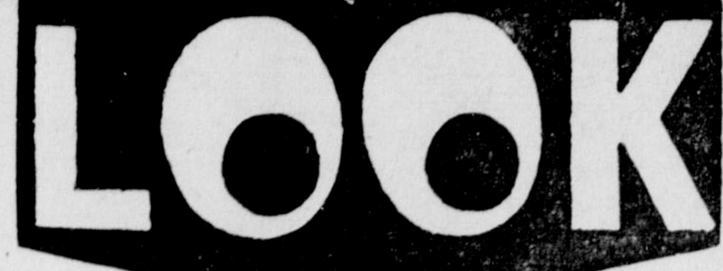

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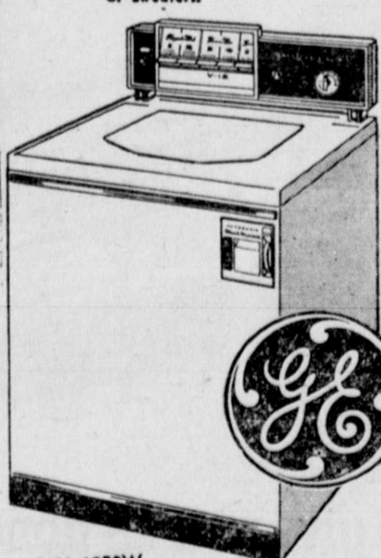


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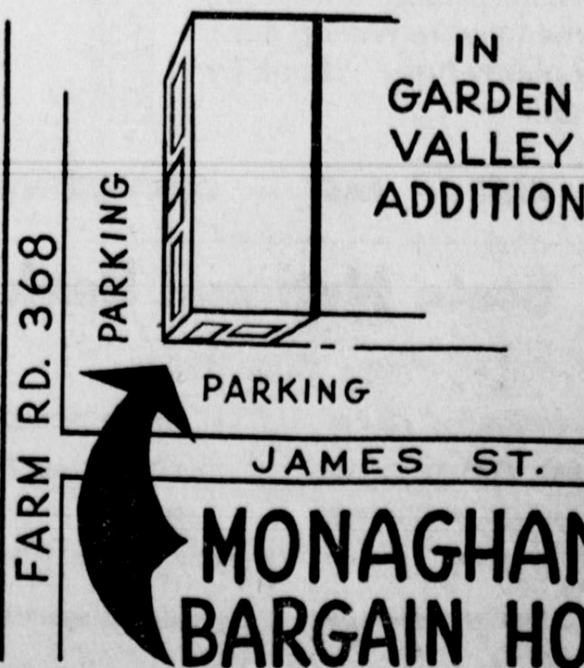
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23 Study Club

WHEN GOD VISITED A GENERAL

During our Charleston, South Carolina Crusade, I had the privilege of visiting the Citadel, South Carolina's "West Point." General Mark Clark was my gracious host, and while I was there, he told me the following inspiring story, which I believe he will be glad for me to share with you. God visited the general in a crisis and helped him through one of the most desperate problems of World War II.

At the last moment, before the invasion of Europe, orders came from Washington altering the invasion plans and removing the protective covering of 15,000 paratroops who had been designated to protect the landing of General Clark's men. The general tells in his own words how God helped the Americans to meet this emergency and gave their leader strength and wisdom to lead his men to victory.

"There I was on the night of September 5—my plans twisted, yet knowing we must sail the next morning.

"Did the Germans know about the invasion? How much did they know?"

"All these things were running through my mind, and with the fate of so many thousands of men, as well as the hopes of the free world, resting upon the success of the invasion, I was literally overwhelmed with a sense of my responsibility.

"Troubled and worried, I went to my cabin. A sense of my own helplessness swept over me. I desperately needed help

from some greater power. "I picked up a little book of devotions and began to read. I turned to the prayer for September 5. There I read the following inspiring lines:

*Father, in Thy name I pray,
Let me know Thy will today,
With Thee I am unafraid,
For on Thee my mind is stayed,
Though a thousand foes surround,
Safe in Thee I shall be found.*

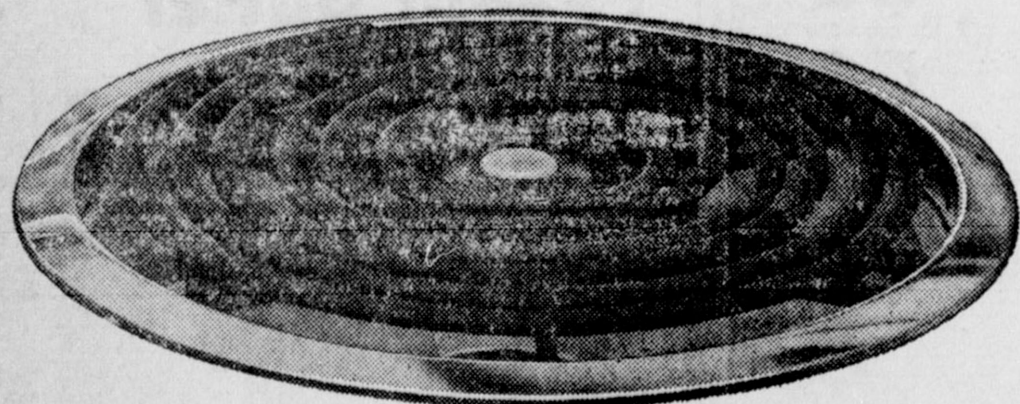
"As I began to read, the words seemed to leap off the page at me. A sense of another presence overpowered me. A great reassurance of the rightness of our cause, as well as the certainty of ultimate victory, came. God was with me. I knew it. I felt His presence! And a glad thankfulness rose in my heart. I knew we would succeed.

"As I finished reading, the peace of God flooded my soul. I slept better that night.

"We sailed early the next morning with a convoy of about 70 ships. . . . Ten minutes before midnight, I stood with Admiral Hewitt on the bridge of the USS Ancon. The naval phase of the assault was completed.

"Then the incomparably brave officers and men of the Fifth Army started that last dash toward the beaches. Their fierce fighting, their countless inspiring acts of heroism and the ultimate victory are written in our nation's history—but that is another story. My purpose here is to say very simply and sincerely that I will always thank God for His visit to me in my hour of desperate need."

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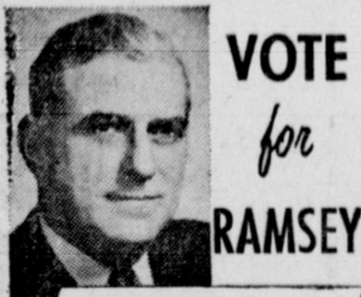

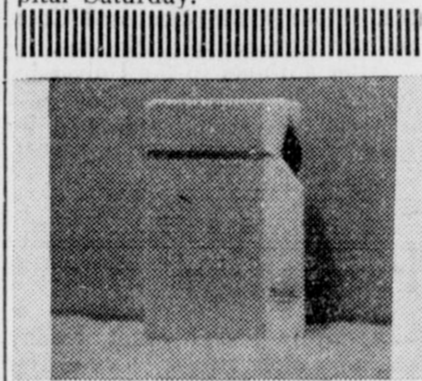

Andy Kenyon fell last week and received a head injury. He was admitted to Wichita General hospital Saturday.



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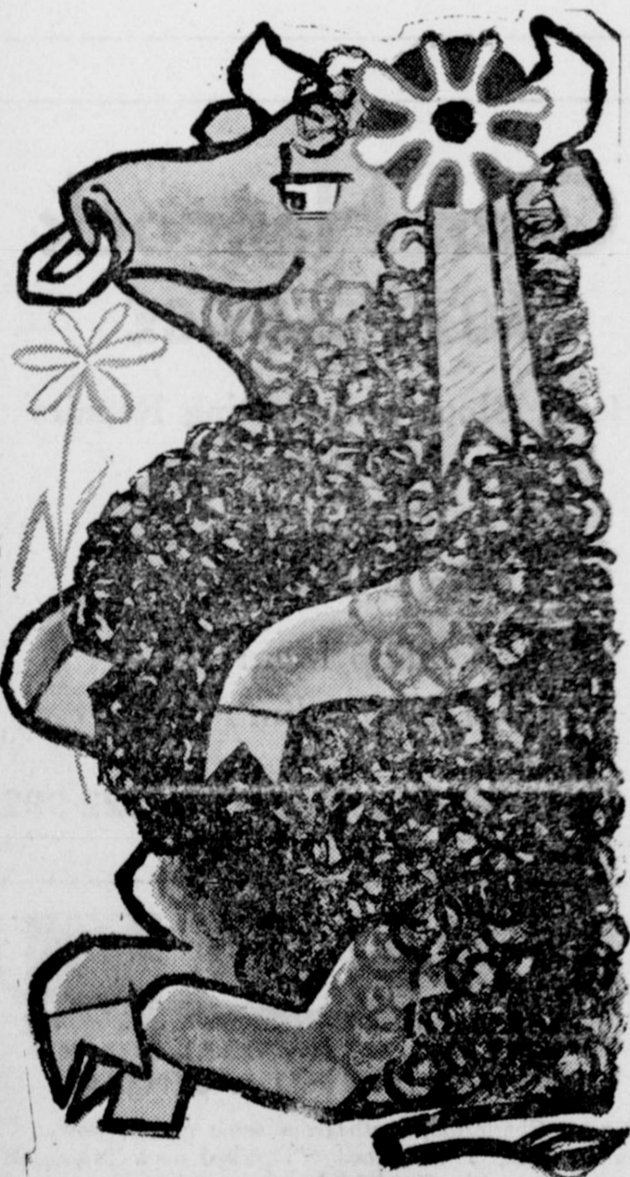
