Next Governor Visits Iowa Park

Don Yarborough, who has good reason to believe he will be next governor of Texas, made a short visit to Iowa Park, Wednesday, in the interest of his candidacy. He declared a substantial increase in the oil allowable is a major part of his program to abolish the general sales tax. Yarborough said the "lobbyist-politicians clique" which passed the general sales tax is the same clique which has worked hand in glove with the big out-of-state oil monopolies to depress artificially the Texas economy. "Oil wells stand idle 22 to 23 days a month while politicians in Austin wring their hands, saying they can't do anything about it," Yarborough said. He predicted the present eight-day allowable would be cut to seven if the same leadership remains in power. "A substantial increase above the 8-day oil allowable would give an upsurge to the saving Texas petroleum industry by providing a great increase in jobs to oil employees and creating a prosperous climate for small businessmen," he said. Don Yarborough's goal for the people of Texas are to make them 1st in Personal Income 1st in Economic Growth 1st in Old Age Assistance 1st in Education Young and vigorous, he will lead the campaign to put Texas first in all important areas of economic life—business, labor, agriculture—plus education.



Nipper Is President of State National, Replacing F. E. Hill

W. F. George, chairman of the board of directors of State National Bank of Iowa Park, announced this week that F. E. Hill, president of the bank, has accepted the position of vice-chairman of the board and will continue as an employee for the next two years. In his place as president is Cleo A. Nipper, prominent Wichita Falls banker formerly associated with First-Wichita National there. Other board changes include H. M. Nipper and C. A. Nipper, directors, and John C. Murphree, advisory director. Holding positions on the board are J. W. Van Horn, Earle L. Denny, C. E. Birk and W. A. George. Also serving as officers of the bank are W. A. George, executive vice-president; Mrs. Mildred Traylor, assistant vice-president; Miss Roberta Hill, cashier; Mrs. Lorene Callahan, assistant cashier.

Mr. Hill said this week the growth of the bank since 1939 has been outstanding. At that time the Capital and Surplus totaled \$66,409.59 and the total deposits were \$401,223.25. As of March 1 this year the Capital, Surplus, Undivided Profits and Reserves had risen to \$377,203.69 and the deposits were \$4,680,465.17. Thus the bank is roughly 10 times as strong as it was in 1939. Mr. Hill added the following statement: "I wish to express my sincere appreciation to all the people of this community for the loyal support they have given me and the bank during the past 39 years. I assure them they will receive the same helpful service and financial assistance from the new administration they have enjoyed in the past. "I also wish to thank the loyal employees of the bank who have been so faithful to me and my family all these years. I will continue to be active in the bank and will help its customers in any way I can, consistent with good banking practice."

It was assumed the fire started from wiring or an electric welding machine.

Several items exploded during the fire. The main telephone and electric wire in the alley were burned and caused a break in the service in the neighborhood for awhile.

Vernon J. Stewart, 33, native Wichitan, has authorized the Herald to announce his bid for reelection to the state House of Representatives. Having been elected in 1952, Stewart is now serving his fifth term as representative for Wichita county, Place 1.

He has risen to a position of leadership and influence in the Legislature and has served on such committees as: Banks and Banking, Insurance, Municipal and Private Corporations, Revenue and Taxation, Congressional and Legislative District, and Motor Traffic.

Vernon Stewart is presently chairman of the Committee on Oil, Gas and Mining. "I was extremely fortunate," he said, "to receive this appointment. The livelihood and well-being of our citizens is dependent to a great extent upon a healthy oil industry. This is especially true of our area of the state. Although the Legislature has little authority concerning foreign import, it can prevent the enactment of hasty, possibly destructive measures on the state level."

"As chairman, I was able to control to a large degree the progress of such legislation and to protect the interests of the independent producer."

He sponsored and guided in the House a bill recommended by the Railroad Commission which allowed Texas to continue to participate in the Interstate Oil Compact and which also allowed the Texas Petroleum Research program at Texas A & M to continue.

He sponsored and passed the bill creating a state school at Midwestern university. "The final passage of the Midwestern university bill was the highlight of my legislative career. Not only will it remove the Junior College tax from our district taxpayers, but it will also provide unlimited possibilities for the future growth and progress of our school. Outside of oil and agriculture, Midwestern is the second greatest economic asset to our community. This will be increasingly evident each year as enrollment continues to grow."

"A state school also provides for lower tuition so more students can take advantage of a higher education."

"One of the main reasons I am seeking re-election is to try to place Midwestern under the constitutional building program. The program is re-enacted every 10 years. Every other state school except the University of Texas and A & M is under this program."

"When Midwestern University came into the state system, it could not automatically participate in this building fund. To do so, it requires the passage of a constitutional amendment. If I am successful, then many new needed buildings can be started on our campus within the next three years without requiring any state appropriations or additional taxes."

"Every university should be centered around an adequate library. I was responsible for, and successful in obtaining the necessary funds for the construction of a new \$795,000 library on the university campus. This fulfills one of the greatest single needs of our school. The old library has been outgrown for many years. Books and periodicals that should be on display and easily accessible have been stored away in other buildings. Great historical collections have been offered the school, but to date there are no adequate facilities for taking care of them. The new library will provide excellent facilities for students and residents alike for the next 20-25 years and with provisions for expansion."

At 7:15 p.m. the Precinct Convention will be held in the west end of the City Park, when delegates to the County Convention will be elected.

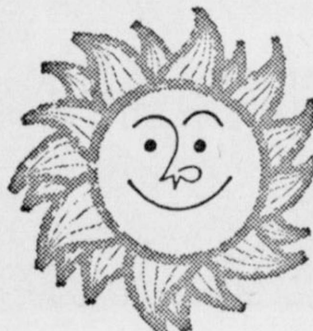
