John White

White may be named to Washington post

Iowa Park may very soon have a friendly face in the nation's capitol. The Associated Press this week announced John White is "expected very soon" to be named deputy secretary of agriculture.

White, who has been the state commissioner of agriculture since

1950, was graduated from Iowa Park High School in 1942. His mother, Mrs. E.H. White, still resides here.

There was considerable speculation that White might be named secretary of agriculture until President Jimmy Carter announced Bob Bergland as his choice. His name was still mentioned for an office in the federal department after the naming, however.

White defeated incumbent Agriculture Commissioner J.E. McDonald for the state office when he was only 26 years of age. At the time he was head of the school of agriculture at Midwestern State Univ.

Born in Clay County, he earned his degree at Texas Tech in 1946, and then took more studies at A&M. White was outspoken in his criticism of Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz, of the former Republican administration, over the recent sale of wheat to Russia. He is known as a dedicated Democrat.

White's last appearance in public in Iowa Park was when he was guest speaker at the 1975 homecoming banquet for former Iowa Park High students.

Police here received a report early last Thursday that two windows on the east side of Kidd's Texaco, 1500 Johnson Road, had been broken.

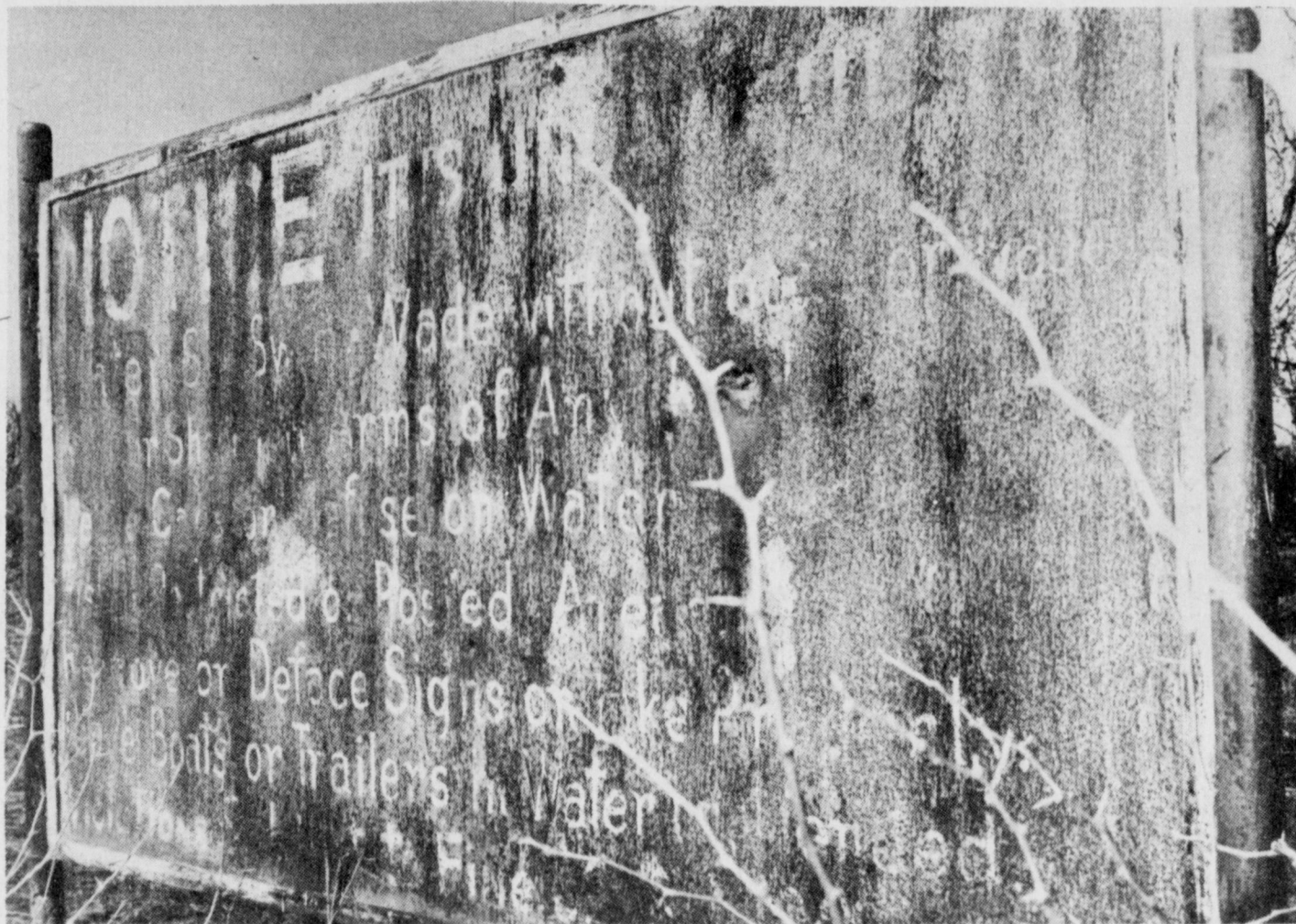

Absentee voting to start Monday

Absentee voting for the April 2 city and school elections will begin Monday morning, and continue through Mar. 29.

Ballots will be available at the city hall and school administration building, both named absentee voting polls for their respective elections.

Candidates drew for placings on the ballots Monday.

Order in which candidate names will appear on the city ballot will be Jesse Rowe, Bud Adams, Bud Thompson, Bill Gilmore, C.A. Hicks and Andrew Arrington.

School trustee candidate order will be Mrs. Charles (Martha) Dudley, Jesse McCullough, G.R. (Rusty) Rusk, Glen Miller and Robert Wilcox.

Louis Sefcik, who had filed for the school board race, withdrew his candidacy late last week.

Two positions are open on both the city council and school board, and incumbents are seeking re-election in both races. Incumbents in the city election are Gilmore and Adams, while Miller and Wilcox are trustee incumbents.

Absentee balloting will also open Monday on the proposed new city charter. Available also at the city hall, voters are being asked to vote for or against the proposed home rule charter for the city.

Any registered voter in the city who did not receive a copy of the proposed new charter is urged to contact the city hall, according to Administrator Gene Britton.

He said a number of booklets were returned through the mail due to incorrect or old addresses. "Any registered voter who did not receive a copy and wants one, should contact the city hall and give us a proper address, or drop by and pick one up," he said.

One new, one relocating

Creditors appeal salary being paid

Litigation surrounding the disappearance of Iowa Park grainman Robert Johnson continued to mount when an appeal was filed by creditors in an involuntary bankruptcy suit protesting a \$1,500 monthly allowance being paid Johnson's wife, Anita.

The notice of appeal was filed by Construction Agricultural Special Equipment, Bing Miller, Celeste Miller, Keith Miller, Fred Eastman and Willard Frye, the same petitioners who initiated involuntary bankruptcy proceedings against Robert and Anita Johnson and three of the Johnson family businesses.

"We don't think she (Mrs. Johnson) deserves receiving \$1,500 a month," said Cletus Schenk, attorney for one of the creditors.

Schenk said the creditors do not know any more about Johnson's businesses than they did at the outset of the proceedings, and that the money being paid Mrs. Johnson should be placed in deposit for later return to creditors.

Federal Bankruptcy Judge John C. Ford on Feb. 24 signed the order effective Feb. 1 after bankruptcy receiver James Dugger requested the allowance for Mrs. Johnson.

Ford's order authorizing the payment states no adverse interest

appeared regarding the decision, however, the creditors allege the application and order were entered without notice to the creditors, without adjudication of bankruptcy and without any authority whatsoever in law, and without support of evidence in the case.

Dugger said Mrs. Johnson has helped him by locating assets, seeking a purchaser for the McFaddin Ranch in Knox County and by advising Dugger on creditors' accounts.

"There is no evidence that Anita Johnson is rendering any service whatsoever to the receiver as alleged in the application," the creditors maintain.

The appeal claims no payment is due since an allegedly bankrupt party has a duty to render services to the receiver in locating assets without demands or requests for compensation.

"Funds being utilized to pay Anita Johnson are funds which belong to the creditors in this action," the appeal filed in federal court states.

GRAIN SOLD

In another major development, a Dallas attorney last week purchased the remaining 379,738 bushels of grain in Johnson's Geronimo Elevator

Co. in Wichita Falls.

Edwin L. Cox Jr. of Dallas purchased the grain for \$733,817.52.

The bid submitted by Cox was submitted by Dugger and approved by Ford.

Cox's bid included buying all the grain and leasing Johnson's elevators in Texas for one year.

In addition to the bid price, Cox agreed to pay 7 1/2-cents for each bushel handled during the year against a guarantee to pay the taxes and insurance on the elevators for a year. The bid also included Cox's agreement to pay an additional \$10,000.

Dugger said that at the end of the year, the bushels of grain will be counted and if the handling cost is more than the price of the taxes and insurance, Cox will deduct the taxes and insurance.

Cox is paying about \$1.93 per bushel for the remaining grain in Geronimo Elevator which is about 80-cents on the dollar when compared to the \$2.44 farmers would have received if they had sold their grain on Jan. 11-the day involuntary bankruptcy proceedings were initiated and the day Ford fixed the price on the remaining grain.

With bonds on the elevators

remaining to be cashed in and other means of raising additional cash such as leasing some of Johnson's farm land, Dugger still hopes farmers will receive about 60 per cent of what Johnson owes them.

Dugger said the next step is to get all the farmers' claims in, begin the process of cashing bonds on the elevators and accounting for all of Johnson's assets.

While the only other bid considered was submitted by Joe Parker of Byers, a financial statement filed by Cox revealed his concern.

Cox does business as Valley View Cattle Co. and on Jan. 3-the day Johnson disappeared off a fishing

boat in the Gulf of Mexico near Port Aransas-Cox filed financial statements against Robert and H.C. Johnson and three of the Johnson family businesses.

Cox filed 11 financial statements including four against Robert Johnson, two against H.C. Johnson, two against Robert Johnson Grain & Molasses, two against Geronimo Elevator and one against Robert Johnson Land and Cattle Co., according to Wichita County records.

Upcoming in the case is another pre-trial hearing slated for March 24. On March 21 a federal grand jury which spent three days in February probing Johnson's disappearance is scheduled to reconvene in Abilene.

Local charged with burglary

An Iowa Park man, Moses Ray Barber of 505 E. Washington, has been charged with burglary of a Wichita Falls building.

Barber was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Ed DeMontel. DeMontel charged Barber with burglary of a building and bond was set at \$7,500.

Barber was charged last week after Wichita Falls police arrested a man in connection with the burglary of the Bailey Meissner Co.

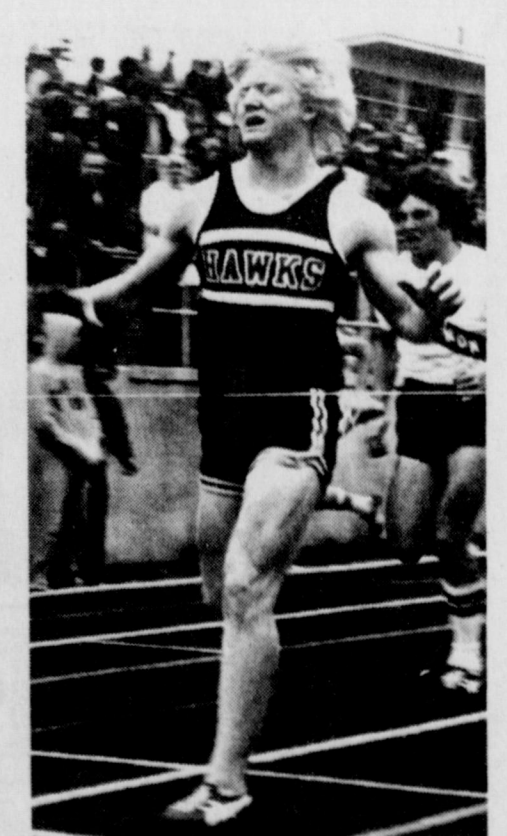
Exhibitors will be vying for trophies and cash. Two local firms, State National Bank and Texoma Agriculture Products, are sponsoring

Personnel possible subjects for city, school meetings

The topic of personnel possibly will be on the agendas of both the city council and school board when those groups meet next week.

The council is to meet at 7 p.m. Monday, and the board at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

It was not certain yesterday afternoon whether the council would consider naming a police chief when it meets Monday.

According to City Administrator Gene Britton, the screening committee of Mrs. Lita Watson and Bud Adams still had a lot of work yet to be done by Friday, if that subject were to be put on the agenda.

Britton said considerable amount of time is being spent checking on applications from applicants in at least three different states. And if more applications should be received before the weekend, a delay of a week would almost be assured before the council was ready to make a decision on the naming of a replacement for former Chief Charles Beaver.

There is also a possibility that Lone Star Gas Company's request for a rate increase might also be postponed again until the following Monday, Britton said.

Britton said four items were sure to be on the agenda: identification of

streets to be resurfaced; contract renewal with Wichita Falls for treated water, which includes a three percent rate increase; purchase of a water pump for the water department; and portable monitors for the fire department.

Teacher contracts will be one of the major items on the school board's agenda Tuesday evening. Contracts will be offered for the 1977-78 school year.

Also expected on the agenda are a report from Dr. John McFarlin on the school policy book, and adoption of textbooks for the coming school year.

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Study Club observes Texas Heritage Day



TEXAS PARTICIPANTS exchanged ideas with national leaders during the General Federation of Women's Clubs/Shell Oil Company Conservation Seminar held on the University of Southwestern Louisiana campus in Lafayette, La., recently. The theme of the four-day conference was "Improving the quality of life through the prudent development of our natural resources."

The outstanding detail of the Texas Heritage Day program, one required by Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, for the 23 Study Club meeting Thursday afternoon was a panel discussion by four of the members on "Texas Interests and Institutions", emphasizing the increasing opportunities offered by the Lone Star State.

Mrs. O.E. Lochridge was the "Texas Brag" program leader for the meeting held in the home of Mrs. James A. Sewell with Miss Ethyle Kidwell the co-hostess. Composing the panel were Mmes. C.E. Birk, C.A. Hicks, L.E. Brooks and E.F.

Soell. Each gave a short history of her assigned subject, bringing it up to date. Mrs. Birk's topic was "Texas Rangers", the oldest law enforcement agency in America which dates back from the Austin colonies formed in 1823 and 1826 when the government graciously permitted citizens to protect themselves by organizing "ranging companies." She said that the Rangers, originally referred to as Indian fighters, at first operated without uniforms, badges or even government-supplied horses or arms. She described the Texas Rangers today as an elite force of hand-picked

men under the Department of Public Safety. The group comprises 92 men with high qualifications divided into six companies located in strategic places in Texas. Continuing, Mrs. Birk described the modern Ranger's dress, training, major duties, equipment, the flag and Texas Ranger Hall of Fame built in 1971. She dosed with the Ranger Creed.

Mrs. Hicks discussed the Texas State Fair at Dallas which has been known as the largest in the nation since 1888, two years after it was founded, now more like a major fair. She devoted a major part of the talk to the Fair Park created for the Texas Centennial Exposition in 1936 which has since become the home of the annual State Fair in October. "The plant is unequalled", she observed in telling its impact on the economy, industry, growth and prestige of the city, intensified by the vast improvements made in 1976.

Mrs. Brooks' topic was "Justin Boots", a tradition on Texas ranches, "Boots have become prominent because men are vain about

their feet" she said in her introduction. Beginning with H.J. Justin's venture in the boot business in 1890 at Nocona, she spotlighted Miss Enid Justin who worked hard and sacrificed to continue the business after her three brothers opened a boot and shoe factory at Fort Worth. Describing Miss Justin as "The First Lady of Boot Making" and an outstanding representative of Texas, Mrs. Brooks said that her factory at Nocona had been expanded to 100,000 feet and that she would open another factory in Vernon in April.

Mrs. Soell, chairman of Santa Rosa District's Department of Texas Heritage, spoke on "See Texas First". She said that promoting tourism was Texas's major industry without smoke stacks and that thousands of visitors came to the state each year to see the ranches, cattle, wildflowers, space center at Houston, Six Flags over Texas, museums, libraries, historic sites and parks. She said that the highest percentage of visitors came from California, then Oklahoma and next Florida.

To encourage club members to "See Texas First", she gave each a 1977 Texas map. Mrs. T.M. Clark gave the federation counselor's report describing recycling projects of federated clubs aimed at cleaning up and beautifying the cities. For the arts number she read two poems, "Call Out Their Names Again" and "Somewhere I Hear A Robin Sing". Mrs. Rollin Woodall used "Opportunity" for the theme of her devotion.

Mrs. Sewell, pianist, played "The Yellow Rose of Texas" and "San Antonio Rose" both by Bob Wills. Mrs. Joe Singer directed the group singing of "Deep in the Heart of Texas" (Williams) and "The Eyes of Texas" (Marsh).

During the business, Mrs. Singer was elected delegate to the Santa Rosa District Convention at Memphis March 25-26.

SQUASH CASSEROLE
2 lbs. yellow squash (2 cups cooked squash)
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 can chicken soup (or chicken broth)
1 cup sour cream (or canned milk with 1 t vinegar)
1 cup shredded carrots
1-8 oz. pkg. herb stuffing mix
1/2 cup oleo (melted)
Cook squash and onion five minutes, drain. Combine soup and sour cream, add carrots. Fold in squash and onion; combine stuffing and oleo. Spread half in baking dish; spoon vegetables over and rest of stuffing on top. Bake at 350° 25 or 30 minutes.

RHUBARB-STRAW-BERRY PIE
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 T flour

1 pkg. (3 oz.) strawberry gelatin
1 qt. diced rhubarb
Pastry for 2-crust 9" pie
Combine sugar, flour and gelatin; add rhubarb and mix. Put in pastry-lined pan. Brush rim of crust with cold water. Cover with remain-ing crust and prick with fork. Make a fluted rim. Bake at 375° for 1 hour. Makes 6 servings.

STEAK AND KIDNEY PIE

[From England]
1 1/2 lbs. stewing beef, diced
6 ozs. kidney, sliced
1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms or 1 can mushrooms
1 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup parsley
1/2 bay leaf, crumbled
1 t salt
1 cup butter
3 cups sifted self-rising flour
1 cup milk

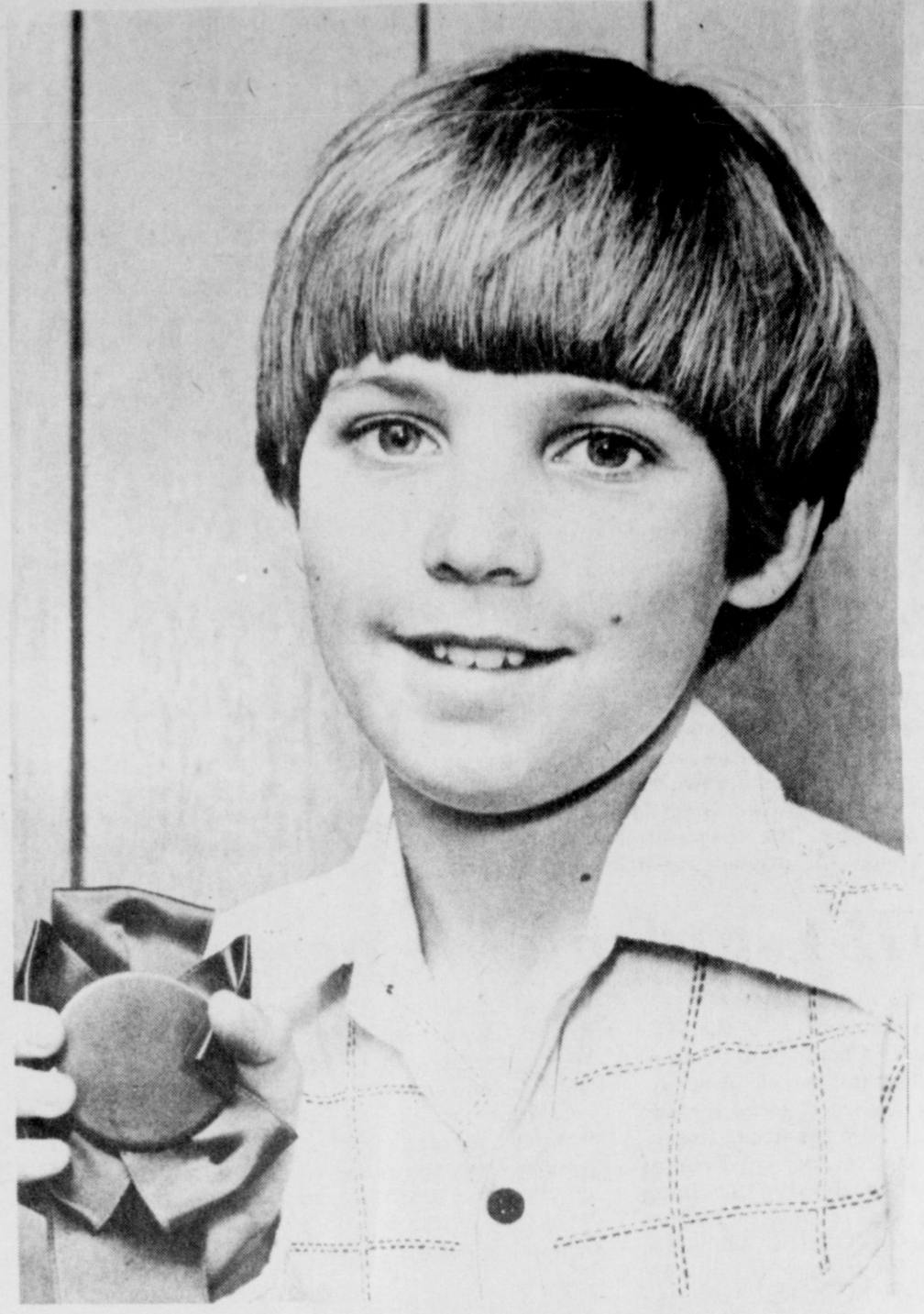
Place beef, kidney, mush-rooms, onion, parsley, bay leaf and salt in baking dish with 2 cups water. Cut butter into flour until it resembles coarse meal; add milk and mix to form soft dough. Roll out on floured board to 1/2" thickness. Place on top of beef and kidneys; cut slits in dough to let steam escape. Bake 325° for 1 hour and 45 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

HUSH PUPPIES
2 cups self-rising corn meal
1/2 cup finely chopped onion
1 1/2-2 cups boiling water
1 egg, beaten
Vegetable oil for deep frying.

Combine corn meal and onions, stir in 1/2 cups water, mixing well until blended. Stir in egg and add more water if needed to make a thick batter. Preheat vegetable oil, 2 or 3 inches, in a deep saucepan to 375° (or use electric frying pan). Drop batter by rounded teaspoons in hot oil and fry until golden brown for 3-4 minutes, turning once. Drain on paper towels and serve hot. Makes 2 dozen.

BAKED CHICKEN

[Good for company dinner]
3-4 lb. cut up chicken
Brush chicken with melt-ed oleo, roll each piece in crushed Ritz crackers. Salt and pepper each side and place skin side down in a buttered glass baking dish. Bake at 350° for 1/2 hour; turn chicken over and bake 1/2 hour longer.
Good with scalloped pota-toes and tossed salad.

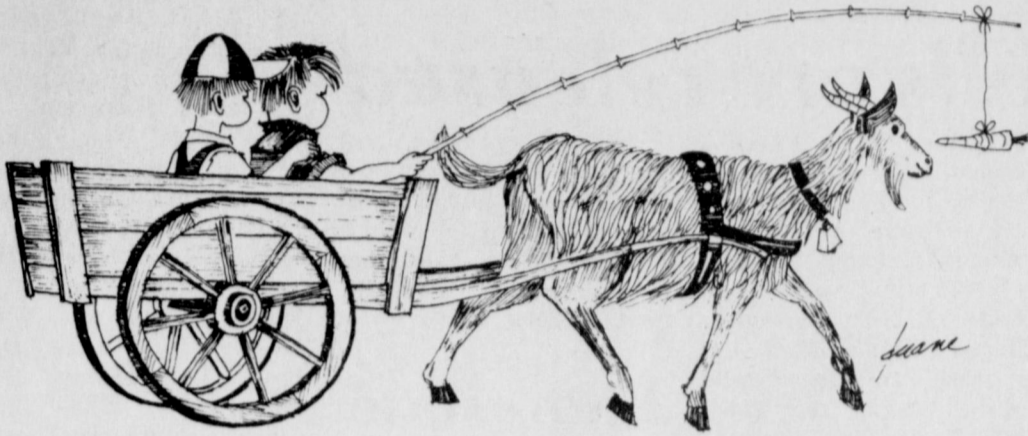

Dear Mr. Hamilton and all Concerned Citizens,

This is in response to Mrs. Nelson's Letter printed in the March 3rd issue of the Leader concerning the siren signals.

She has shown an interest in a very important item which serves the citizens of the community to some degree each time the signal is sounded.

The signals are as follows; one single short blast gives 30 minute notice there is a training or work session of the Fire Department, either scheduled or special. Four long blasts lasting for a total period of two minutes indicate an emergency which requires the fire department services. The tornado warning is sounded as several (twelve) short blasts lasting for a total period of two minutes. This signal is and has been for several years tested at 7:00 P.M. on the second Tuesday of each month

providing there are no threatening clouds in the area at the time.

Other than for test or maintenance purposes the tornado signal is sounded only when a tornado which is confirmed by an authoritative source (Law enforcement, fire dept., Civil Defense or an organized and recognized storm watch organization) threatens the immediate area.

There is no all clear signal given by siren as this information will be given by roving public announcements by the Police and Fire Departments and over the commercial radio and Television stations.

Magness is given probated sentence

James Louis Magness of Wichita Falls was found guilty of attempted murder and sentenced Tuesday to four years in prison, probated six years, for the October stabbing of an Iowa Park woman.

A jury of eight men and four women found Magness guilty of attempted murder in 30th District Court, and Judge Calvin Ashley sentenced Magness to four years in prison, probated for six years.

Magness was charged with stabbing Connie Sue Oakley of Iowa Park three times Oct. 26, 1976, during a disturbance at K-Mart on Southwest Parkway in Wichita Falls.

Less than three weeks earlier, on Oct. 10, Magness had been charged with aggravated assault with a moving vehicle stemming from an incident at 1003 Park Plaza here when Oakley reportedly was struck by an automobile.

As I See It....

There may be a number of you parents and other persons interested in the Iowa Park school system who missed one or more open houses this week, because we didn't notify you through the pages of the Leader.

I'm sorry, but I didn't know this was Public School Week, either. One of my daughters got home with a note from school, which she promptly gave to her mother. But I just missed it.

One of these years, I hope to know enough in advance about plans for Public School Week in the local system to let everyone know in time they can make plans to attend.

We're all proud of our schools. While on the subject of public schools in Texas, there's another problem I've been mauling over in my mind. That is the number of days students are required to attend in a school year: 180.

We now have bills in the legislature to excuse any school for days lost due

to fuel curtailment, such as the one which has been accepted in the house which was offered by Rep. Charles Fennell along with Dave Allred, Bill Heatly, Elmer Martin and Bill Sullivan.

Fennell explains that 154 school districts have closed their schools at one time or another due to curtailment, inclement weather or lack of water supplies. Fuel affected 146 of them.

"Without the approval of this bill, many schools in this area would lose thousands of dollars per lost day," he explains.

I agree, that no school should lose money if they can't hold school.

My question, if the children can be adequately trained in fewer than 180 days a year, how much money would the entire state save, let alone each individual district?

If someone down in Austin has figured out the students need 180 days a year to receive a proper education, then let's hold it at 180

days. If they don't need that many, then let's cut it to where it ought to be.

I suspect that, if a district loses a day or more and doesn't have it worked into its schedule as an alternative, the actual term would be lengthened. And if that happened, some teachers wouldn't get to enroll in summer college in time, or some parents wouldn't get to take off on their vacations when they planned, or something disastrous as all that.

Let me take my tongue out of my cheek and flatly state: school is for the students, always has been and always will be. They should receive the number of days education they need.

If we can save money by shortening the length of a school year, let's do it. If we need more time to give students the desired education, let's do it.

The education of our children (and that doesn't include extracurricular activities) is the important proposition; not the pocketbook.

Not only did the freshman team finish well in its division, but an individual gave local track followers something to look forward to.

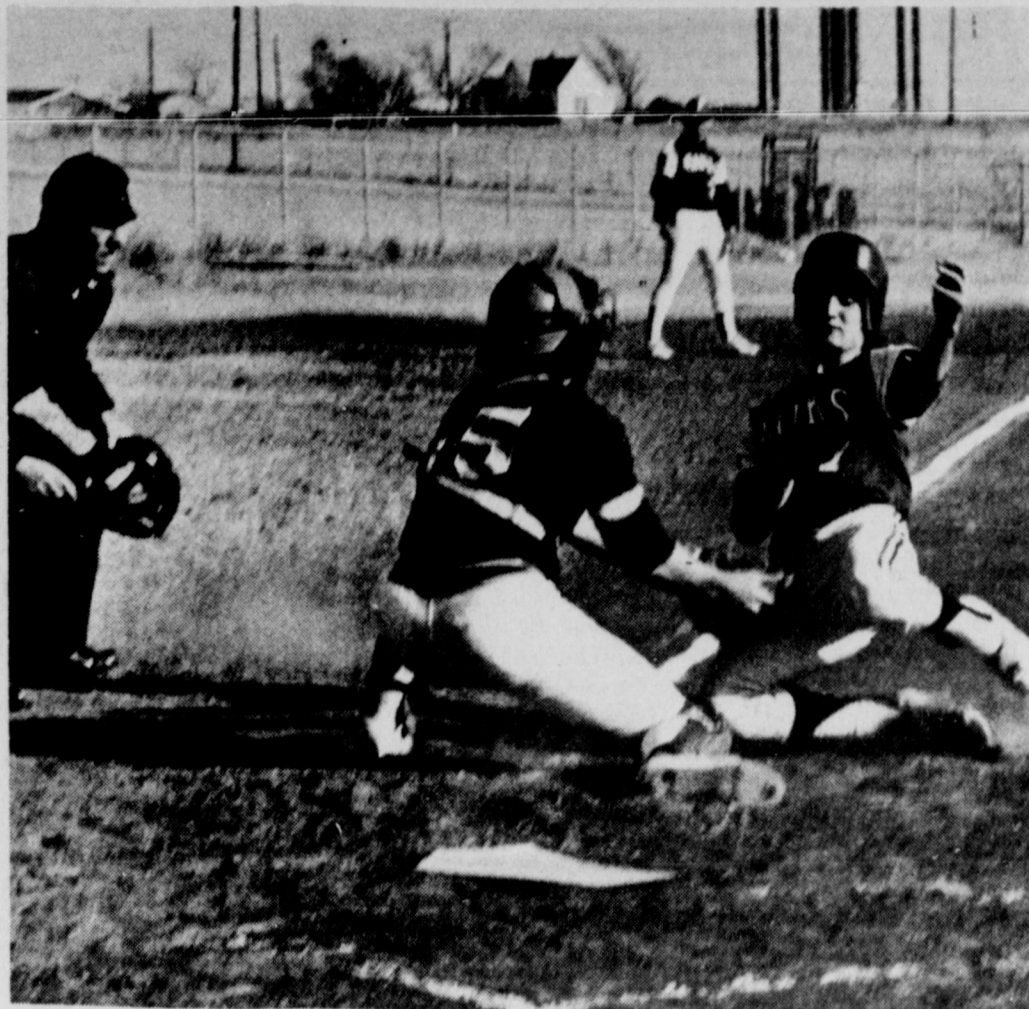
He is a sprinter, something Iowa Park's not had in a number of years.

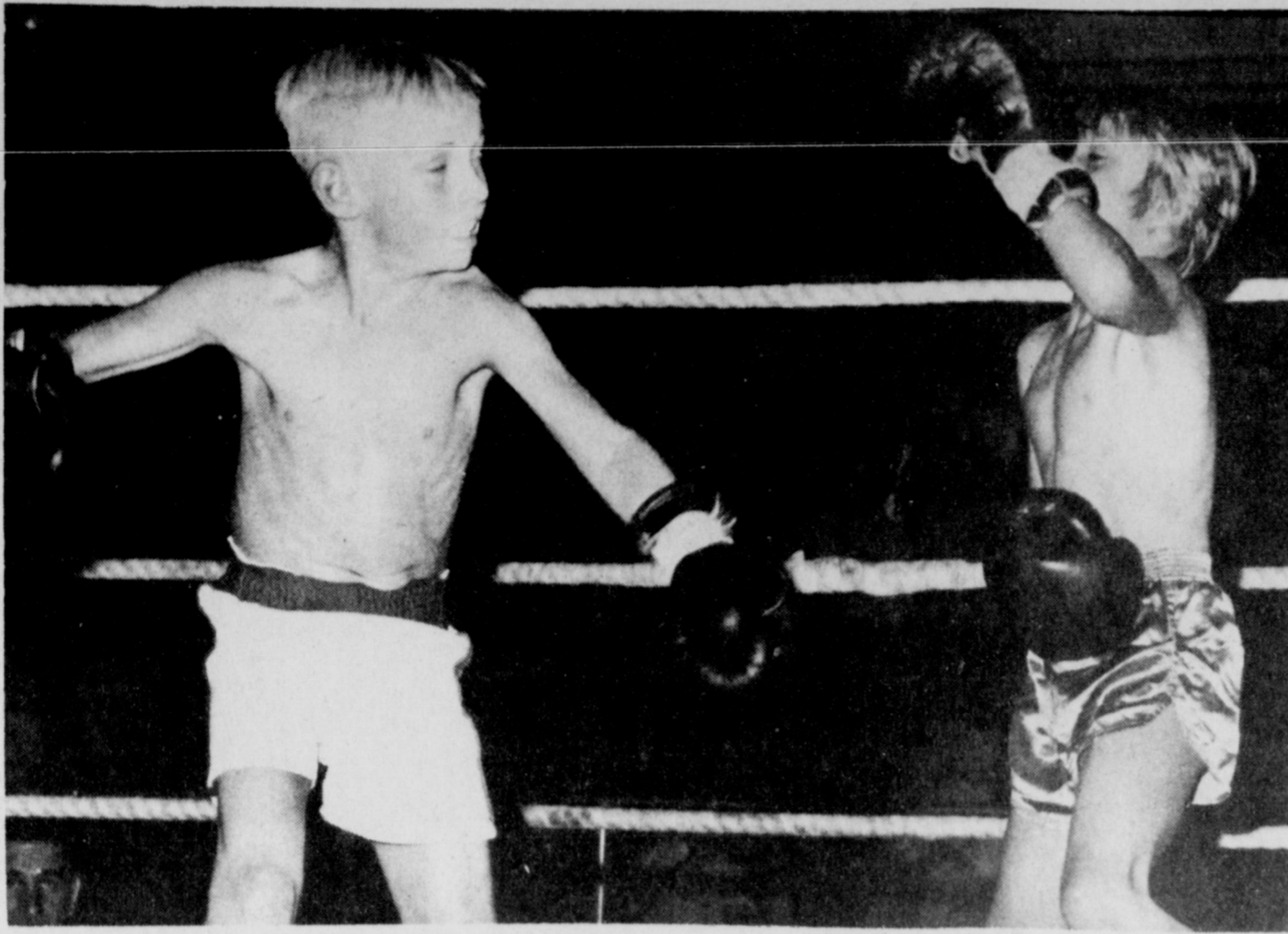

Aldermen deny payment to Ezzell for services

A skimpy quorum of the Holliday City Council convened in regular session Tuesday night when it was disclosed an alderman had billed the city for services rendered—a direct violation of state laws.

It appeared city water superintendent Hershel Mc-

Daniel had secured the services of Alderman Ben Ezzell, a welder.

Included in the stack of city bills examined by the mayor and council Tuesday night was a \$35 bill from Ezzell's business.

"It's illegal. He's (Ezzell) been told," said Alderman Fred Maier, who discovered the illegal billing.

Ezzell and McDaniel were not present Tuesday night. Alderman Gene Harmon also was absent.

Maier cited the state statute which outlaws contracts or purchases from the business of an elected official and the governmental entity he represents.

The event uncovered Tuesday night was a case of city government doing business with a city councilman.

Maier earlier made a motion to pay the bills, excluding payment to Ezzell for the welding job.

However, Alderman Red Denney left the meeting early so the council did not have a quorum when it decided to vote on Maier's motion.

There appeared a consensus between Maier, Councilman Jimmy Blankenship

and Mayor Leo Chappell that the bills should be paid, excluding the bill from Ezzell.

An additional twist to the situation is that Ezzell co-signs all city checks. Checks also must be signed by the mayor.

In other action Tuesday night the council asked City Sec. Evon Carter to contact the Texas Railroad Commission in regard to spillage from an oil well being drilled at the city dump.

The mayor said he would investigate the different types of insurance coverage available to the city when workmen's compensation coverage of all city employees becomes mandatory here July 1.

The council tabled action on a state program to replace street signs in the city. If the council decides to participate in the program it will be seeking the donation of about 1,000 feet of pipe to be used as post material for the new traffic signs.

Councilmen approved a bid from CASE Inc. which estimated it would repair the city track loader for about \$1,850.

The council voted to finance the equipment repair from federal revenue sharing.

The committee was empowered to approve routine construction changes that do not involve any additional expenditures.

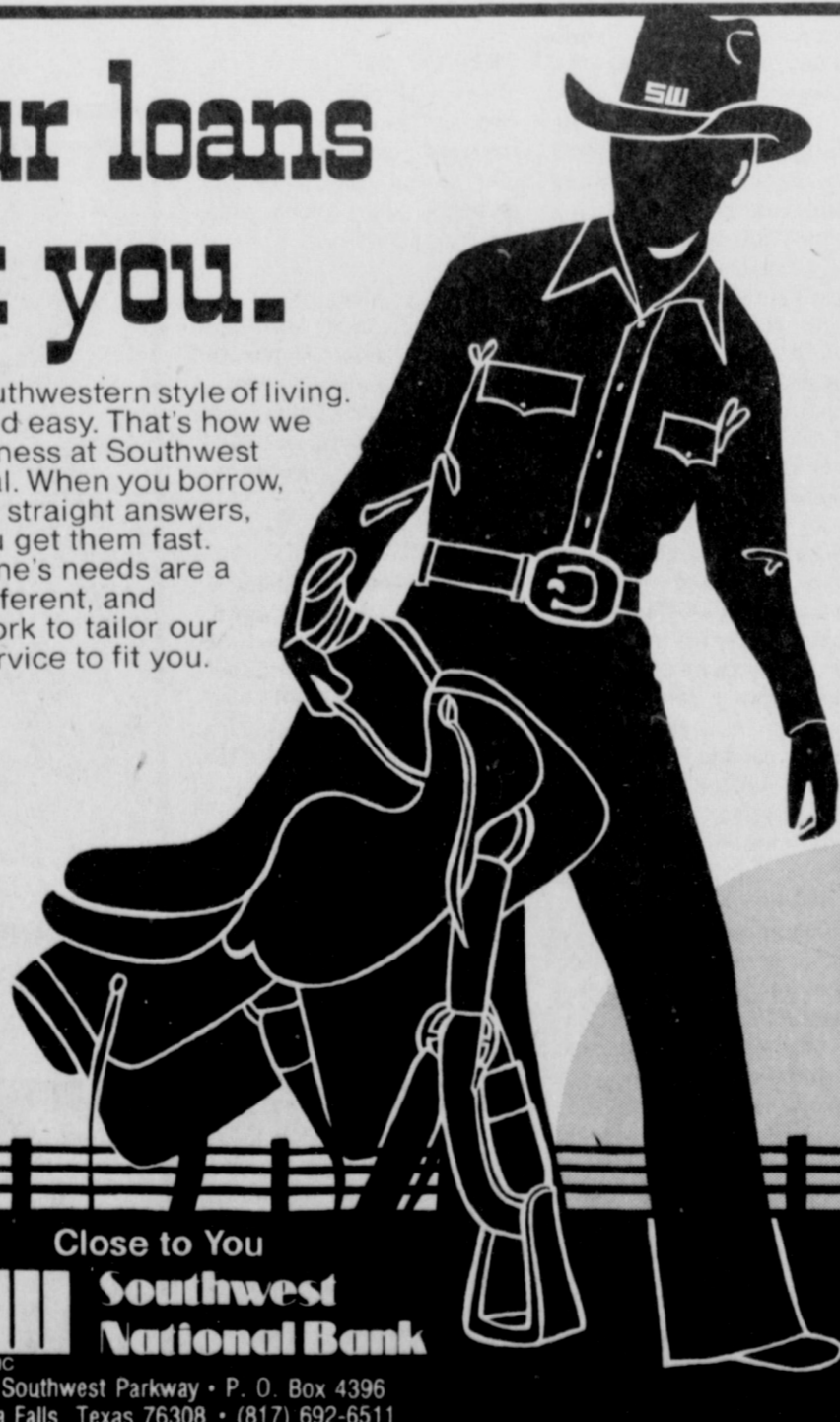
Changes requiring additional costs still must be approved by the school board.

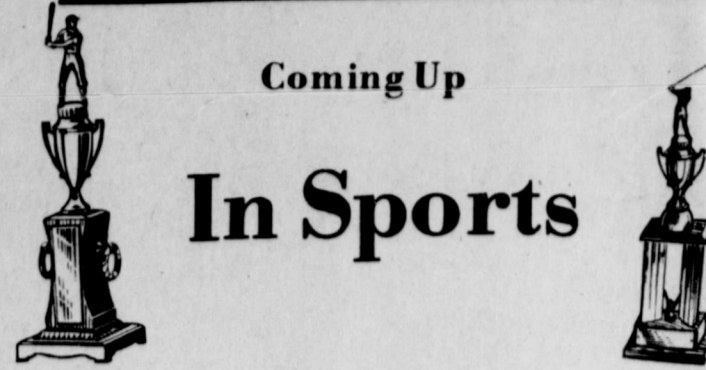

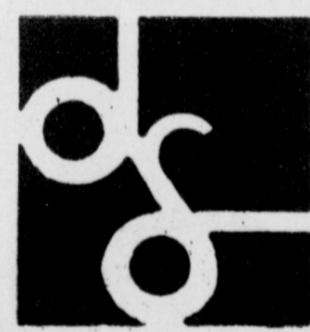
