Saturday is Clean Up Day

Saturday is Clean Up Day in Iowa Park.

The annual event is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, but utilizes the aid of volunteer help.

This year's project chairman is Richard Davis, who told Chamber directors Monday he expected approximately 100 youths to help in this year's effort.

They are to meet at the Chamber office at 8 a.m. Saturday, and Davis said he expected the work to be completed by noon.

Members of the 4-H Club, Girls Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Building Trades and Vocational Agriculture students are the major organizations which have pledged their support for Saturday.

Other volunteers are encouraged by Davis to help.

Primary targets for cleaning up will be ditches of major thoroughfares in the community, vacant lots, parks and the area around Gordon Lake.

Trash bags for volunteers who will be picking up roadsides and lots will be furnished by Cryovac.

Pupils at each of the schools are being encouraged to clean up their campus areas Friday, as a school project.

HOME CLEANING

Home owners are urged to participate in the day's observance and clean their own property.

The city government is cooperating by making trucks and helpers available to pick up bags of trash picked up by volunteers and placed along the roadsides.

A truck will also be available which will pick up large items, such as old furniture and appliances, to be hauled off.

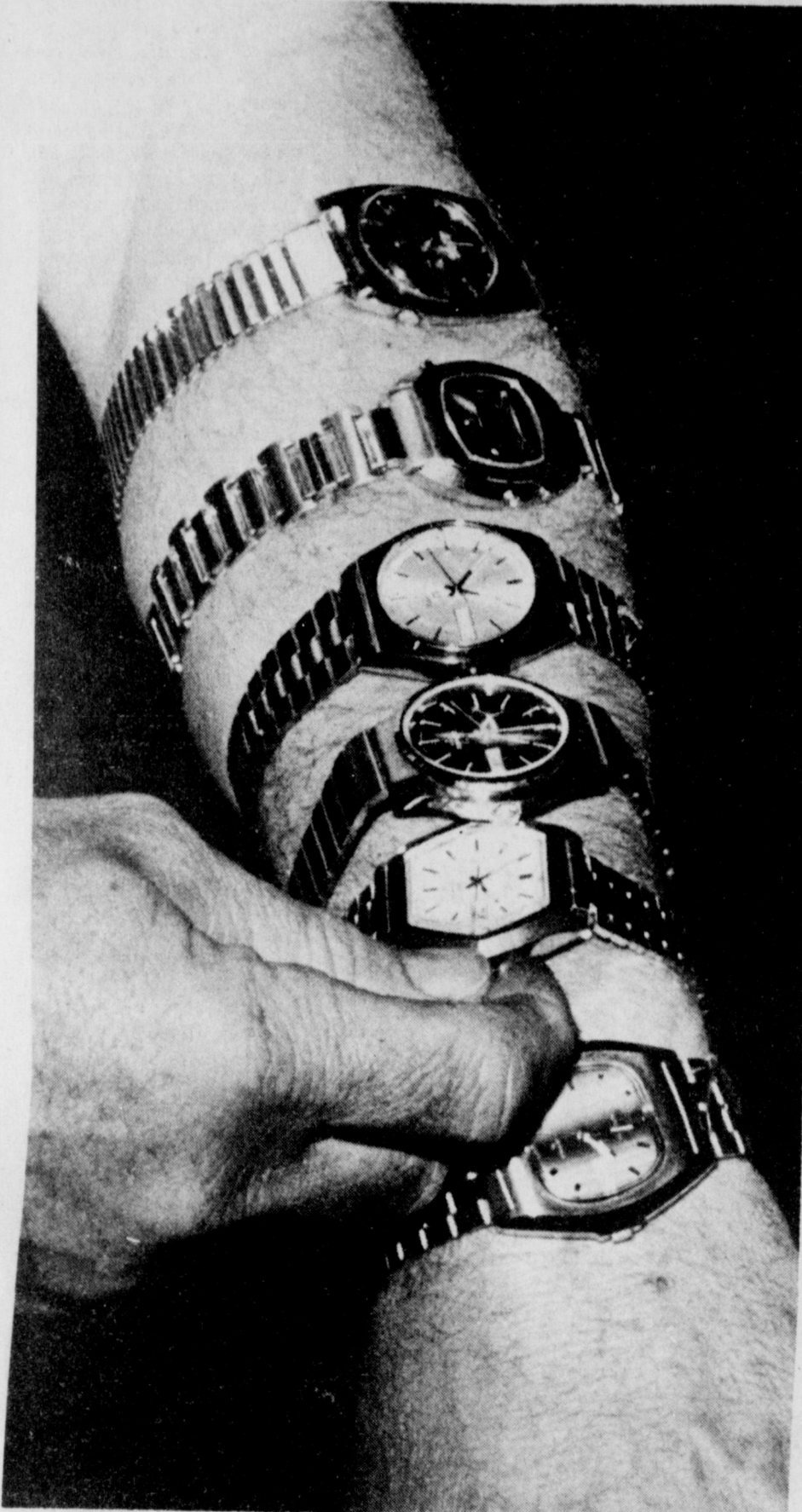
Residents should telephone the Chamber office, 592-5441, before the

close of business Friday, for pickup at the homes. The caller or representative must be at the home when the truck arrives to direct which items

are to be carried off, and the items must be easily accessible to the workers.

For those who wish to haul off their

own trash and unwanted items, the city will have the sanitary landfill open free to the public all day Saturday.

Iowa Park, Holliday sales tax growing

An increase in the percentage of sales taxes being returned to Texas cities coupled with an enhanced business climate have fattened municipal coffers at Iowa Park and Holliday.

Effective this month, the Texas Comptroller's Office is increasing the percentage of sales tax collections it returns to municipalities.

The comptroller's office historically has retained 4.76 per cent of the cities' sales tax collection to cover refunds or bad checks. The amount has been reduced to 2 per cent, so that cities now will receive nearly 3 per cent more of their sales tax.

The change was reflected in this month's sales tax rebates to Iowa Park and Holliday, and an increase in collections by businesses shows a steady gain over the past six years.

IOWA PARK

The state's change in sales tax rebates shows Iowa Park is receiving 37 per cent more in returns now than in the past.

Iowa Park's sales tax rebate for March totalled \$1,445.77. Without the change in the state's return computations the city would have received \$1,228.64, according to figures supplied by the comptroller's office.

Since the first of 1977, Iowa Park has received \$16,314.02 in sales tax returns. For the same 3 1/2 month period last year Iowa Park received \$11,843.69.

Research into sales taxes returned to Iowa Park during the past six years shows a steady increase.

In 1971 Iowa Park received \$32,197 in sales tax rebates. Returns jumped to \$33,637 in 1972.

There was a substantial increase in

1973 when the city received \$42,000 in returns.

In 1974 returns totalled \$47,877, but dropped down to \$44,394 in 1975.

In 1976 Iowa Park's returns peaked at \$55,690.

HOLLIDAY

City coffers at Holliday are experiencing a 10 per cent increase in sales tax returns because of the comptroller's new computations.

Holliday's rebate for March was \$1,541, but without the change the return would have been \$1,468.07, according to comptroller figures.

For the first 3 1/2 months of 1977 Holliday has been reimbursed for \$6,575.67 in sales taxes. Absent the new change, the city would have received \$5,976.34.

Holliday also is experiencing a steady increase in the amount of sales taxes generated by businesses.

In 1971 Holliday was reimbursed for \$9,636, then the figure slumped to \$8,673 in 1972.

Annual rebates were up to \$9,040 in 1973, then took a substantial jump to \$14,585 in 1974.

In 1975 Holliday rebates increased to \$15,508.

In 1976 total rebates peaked at \$17,398.

School trustees retain closed campus policy

The Iowa Park school board voted Monday to continue its "closed campus" policy.

Trustees heard comments from several of the 15 persons in the audience before recording their vote

to continue not allowing students to leave the campus at noon, other than to walk home if they live near enough to the school.

The subject was brought before the board at its meeting two weeks earlier by Mrs. Gladys Wright. Because it was not on the agenda at that meeting, it was carried over to this week's meeting so a vote could be recorded.

Mrs. Wright proposed that students be allowed to leave the campus at noon, in their cars if they desired, as a "learning experience" to aid in their maturity.

She acknowledged that there would be mistakes and misbehavior, but she said now was the time to make them and be corrected, rather than being made to wait until they were on their own or in college, where mistakes were more costly.

Asked to respond by the board, high school principal Bob Dawson said the closed campus policy was originated by former trustee Harry Moore some 10 years ago, when numerous problems arose from an open campus policy.

There was a high absentee rate in afternoon when students failed to report back for their classes; businessmen complained large groups of students would gather in their stores during the lunch hour, many of them shoplifting; and there were not enough eating places to handle both the students and working people at the same time.

Dawson pointed out that those problems existed when enrollment was less than half what it is today "and I'm afraid problems would be much more than then if it (open campus) were put into use."

The principal said the 750 high school students are now eating in

Seven students to regional meet

Iowa Park students racked up 115 points in the District 4-AAA literary meet Saturday at Mineral Wells,

qualifying seven entrants in nine events for the regional meet at Denton this weekend.

Diana Krajcik earned first place in shorthand competition, turning in a perfect paper in the contest which is the first time such an achievement can be remembered by local school personnel.

Two entrants in journalism competition earned a pair of first places each. Kevin Hamilton was first in feature and editorial writing, while Paul Dunsmore was tops in news and headline writing.

Second places were awarded to Holly Burrell, in spelling and plain writing; Charles Franks, number sense; and Janice James, typing. Sandra Hammack was third in poetry interpretation.

Principal Bob Dawson said he had not yet received the scores of the other schools, to know Iowa Park's standing in the sprint meet competition.

A trophy is awarded to school winning the spring meet, which

consists of literary events along with boys' and girls' athletic competition in golf, tennis and track.

Iowa Park had already earned the district title in one-act play, which also counts in the spring meet, but lost in its bid to compete at the regional. The loss was determined in area competition, also held last weekend.

the valley and the silver coffee service.

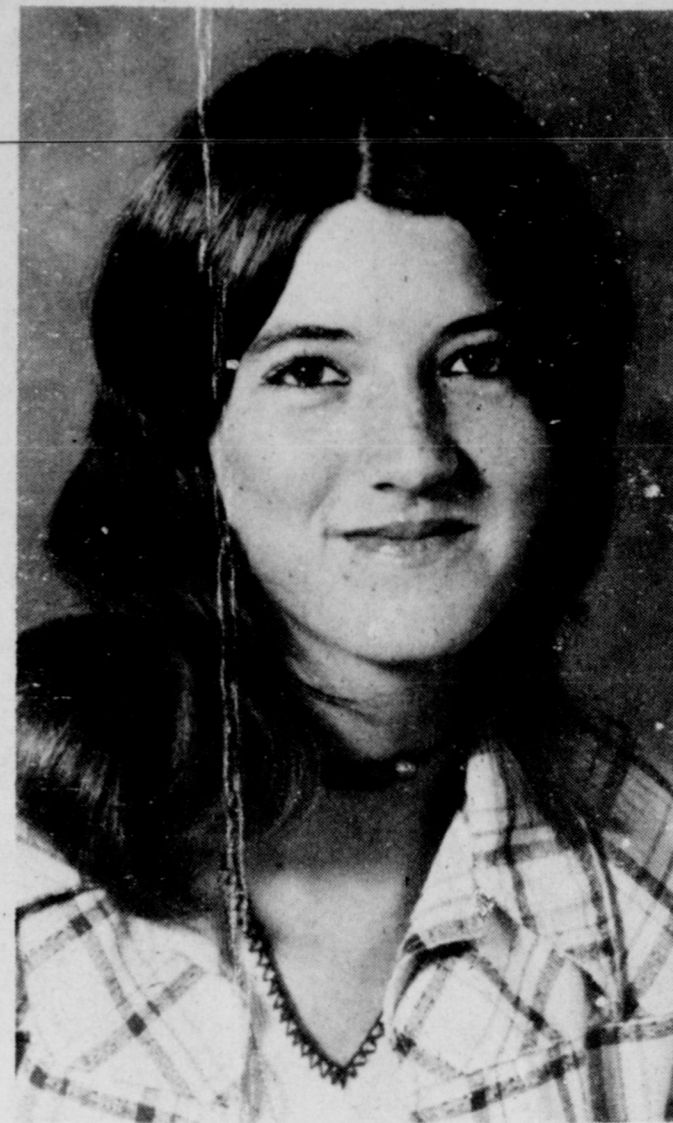

In the area of sports, Charles has played football four years, basketball and golf three years, tennis and baseball one year.

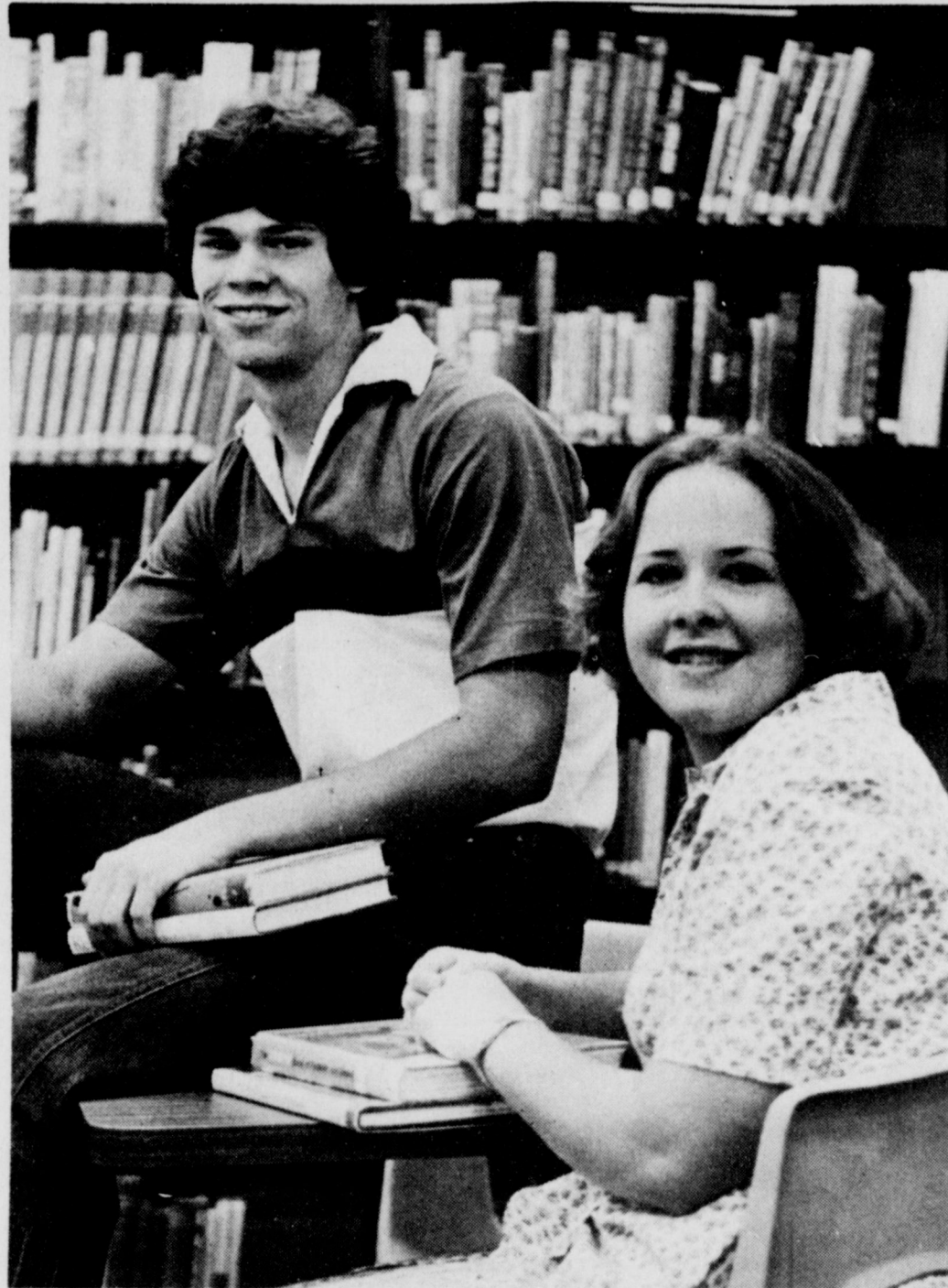
A four-year member, Charles has distinguished himself in A Cappella Choir.

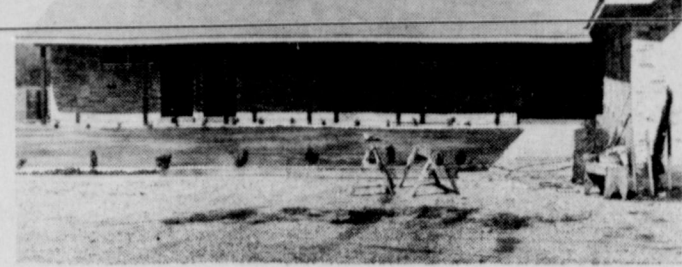
She also introduced lab officers who were Donna Klinkerman, president; Cheryl Frederick, vice

In 1943 the church secured the property at Lafayette and Jackson Streets and during the years built the church building, Sunday School building and a two-bedroom parsonage. In the early 1960's the buildings were remodeled and an extra lot purchased.

In 1975 the church purchased an additional three and a half acres of land located on the corner of First and Aldine Streets, the site of the new structure. Construction was started on the building in July 1976.

The church sold bonds for \$40,000 to finance the building and members are repaying the note by the ladies making and selling peanut brittle each week.

The new brick building has a sanctuary which will seat 300 or more, a pastor's study, two prayer rooms, nursery, six Sunday School rooms, fellowship hall, kitchen, two bathrooms, central air and heat and wall to wall carpeting. It also has new blue padded pews and choir chairs. On the front of the structure there is a five ft. covered porch.

The church lot is landscaped. Playgrounds for children are going to be provided on extra lots. The baseball area is already in shape and later basketball, tennis and others will be added.

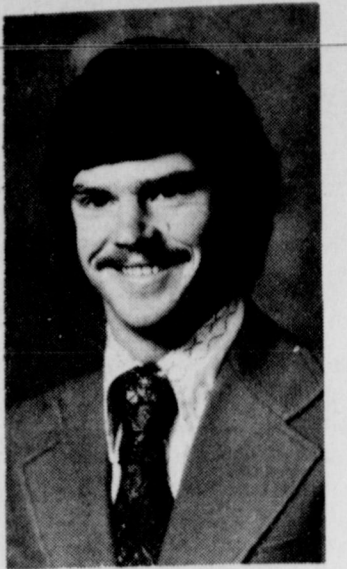

THE SPIRIT AND THE DISCIPLES

Jesus promised His twelve disciples that they also would be given the Holy Spirit, after He had gone away from them. In John 14, vv. 25-26, He says,

"These things have I spoken unto you, being yet present with you. But the Comforter, which is the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you."

Here Jesus speaks of the Holy Spirit as if it were a person; and some people actually think that it is a person -- a God. But we have already seen quite clearly from the Bible that the Holy Spirit is the power of God; so we know this idea cannot be right. Why, then, in some places does Jesus speak of the Holy Spirit as if it were a person? Just turn to Psalm 65, and read v. 13, which says,

"The pastures are clothed with flocks; the valleys also are covered with corn, they shout for joy, they also sing."

Now when we read this, it gives us a beautiful picture of the ripe corn standing high in the valley; but we don't for one moment imagine that the valley is shouting and singing -- that is just the Psalmist's way of describing the picture.

So when Jesus speaks of the Holy Spirit as if it were a person doing this or that, He is just showing us what a very real thing this Spirit or power of God is.

THE SPIRIT COMES TO THE DISCIPLES

We have seen that Jesus promised power to His disciples, before He went into heaven. He told them to stay in Jerusalem, and

"...wait for the promise of the Father." [Acts 1, v. 4]

and promised them that they should

"...be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days hence." [v. 5].

In Acts 2 we read how, as the disciples were waiting, the Holy Spirit came to them. Read vv. 1-3. The Spirit came with a sound "as of a rushing mighty wind," shaking the house where they were gathered together. Tongues of fire were seen over each one of them; and this was a sign that the Holy Spirit had been given to them. From then on, they were able to work many miracles, as Jesus had promised them.

THE SPIRIT COMES TO US

We have seen that those who wrote the Bible did so by the power of the Holy Spirit. Furthermore, Jesus once said,

"The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit and they are life." [John 6, v. 63].

When we read the Word of God, we are in a sense receiving the Spirit of God. This can cause a powerful change in our lives, helping us to grow more pleasing to God.

Let us, then, read the Word of God diligently and prayerfully, remembering the words of Peter in his first epistle,

"As newborn babes, desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby." [1 Peter 2, v. 2].

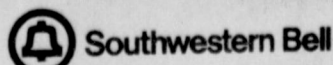

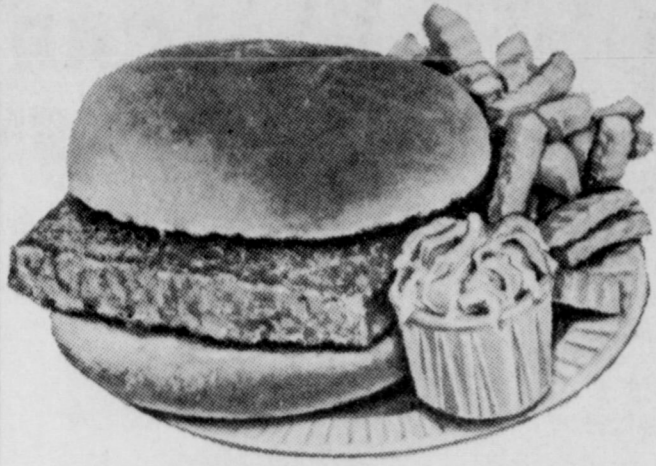

One coach resigns, another is hired

One coach resigned and another was hired during Monday's Iowa Park school board meeting.

Greg Clary, who has produced the only athletic championships since Iowa Park was moved up to AAA competition, tendered his resignation, which was approved by the trustees.

Hired was David Fuller, now coaching at Seymour High School.

Clary, who says he has no immediate plans for the future but intends to stay in the coaching field, will remain until the end of the school year.

Joining the faculty in 1969, Clary was Iowa Park's

first high school girls' track coach, taking the former Jody Frazier to the state meet in the triple jump. He has also coached football and basketball.

He was named baseball coach when the sport was resumed after several years dormancy, and won the district title the first year, 1972, again in 1974 and his 1975 club was a state tournament semifinalist.

The 1973 team lost in a playoff and last year the Hawks tied for second in the conference.

This year's club has two wins and a pair of losses, but with four games remaining is still in the running for the

north zone title.

NEW COACH

Fuller, 31, was highly recommended by Head Coach Pat Tone to the school board.

A graduate of Castleberry High in Fort Worth, 1964, he received his B.S. degree from Abilene Christian College in 1968, and is certified to teach in social studies.

His playing background includes all district defensive halfback in high school, a

four-year letterman in college and two years with the Fort Worth Braves of the Continental League.

At ACC he was honorable mention All Texas College and second team All Southland Conference in 1965; set an ACC record in 1966 for most interceptions (four) in a single game and (eight) in a season, the records still standing; and in 1967 as quarterback set six school passing records including 24 completions in

40 attempts, and was honorable mention All Texas College.

He coached at Castleberry in 1968, Grand Prairie 1969, and was secondary coach at Seymour 1975-76 seasons.

Commissioned in the Marine Corps in 1970, he played service ball three years, besides seeing combat action.

Fuller is married and has two sons, one and seven years of age. His wife's name is Sandra.

ANOTHER COACH

Fuller is the second coach to be hired by the trustees this month. Charles Williams is the other, whom Tone says he will be his number one assistant.

Williams, 41, is a Nashville, Ark. native, receiving his Bachelor's in 1961 and Master's in 1964 from Henderson State Univ.

He has 15 years coaching experience, including one and a half at R.L. Turner at Carrollton, where he is now employed; five and a half years at Hobbs, N.M.; and eight years at Carlsbad, N.M.

He served four years in the Navy. Williams and his wife Donna have one son, Scott, seven.

Brown district champion; heads for regional meet

Karen Brown will be representing Iowa Park this weekend at the regional track meet at Denton's North Texas State Univ. campus.

She earned the right by running away from the field Thursday in the mile event, where she set a time that completely shades all competitors in this area, 5:44.5.

However she was the only local athlete to place first or second in the tough District 4-AAA championships held at Graham, won by Stephenville.

The winning team amassed 177 points, followed in order by Vernon, 138; Burkburnett, 66; Weatherford, 57; Iowa Park, 44; Mineral Wells, 34; Brown-

wood, 10; and Graham, 0. Iowa Park's relay teams almost made it to the regionals, placing third in both the 880-yard and mile events.

Miss Brown took the lead in the mile after the first of four laps, and steadily increased her lead to finish more than 50 yards ahead of her nearest competitor.

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Tripping incident costly to team

In the wake of a controversial incident where a Holliday runner was tripped up on the cinder, Holliday's junior high boys track team placed fourth in district competition Monday at Saint Jo.

The incident that caused delay at the annual track meet came during the running of the junior high 1320 yard run.

John Dyer, one of Holliday's entrants and a favorite to finish first, was among the leading half of the pack when it entered the first straightaway.

Another runner tried to pass Dyer on the inside, then stepped to the outside, tripping Dyer. Dyer was tripped up a second time when he tried to get up.

Dyer was deep in the back of the pack when he finally regained composure and resumed his run.

A knee injury was visible as he ran past the timers.

With a remarkable burst of speed down the last leg of the race, the red-haired Dyer finished fourth in the 1320.

Holliday junior high track coach Cody West protested the incident and asked that the race be re-staged.

However, officials declined to run the race again because a judge nearest the incident said he did not see Dyer tripped. Several coaches, contestants, fans and at least one newspaper reporter witnessed the incident.

West said Tuesday that if Dyer had won the race it would have given his team the winning edge instead of finishing fourth behind Petrolia, Callisburg and Lindsay.

Holliday's Eddie Flowers earned two first place awards for the junior high Eagles. With a time of 8.6 he won first in the 60 yard high hurdles, and he was clocked at 13.4 to win the 100 yard low hurdles.

Randy Stubblefield finished sixth in the 100 yard low hurdles with a time of 15.0.

Carl Martin took third in the 100 yard dash. He was clocked at 12.0.

Ray Looney and Robbie Northcott finished second and fourth, respectively, in the 330 yard dash with times of 43.3 and 44.9.

Martin took second and Northcott took sixth in the 200 yard dash.

Martin, Looney, Stubblefield and Northcott teamed up to win the fifth in the 440 yard relay.

Doug Peters was second and Joe Chase was fifth in the 660 yard dash with times of 1:42.5 and 1:45.0, respectively.

Looney, Charles Lowder, Flowers and Chase, all seventh graders, teamed up to take second in the 1320 relay.

Todd Grace and Flowers were fourth and sixth, respectively, in the long jump.

In the shot put, Grace took second, Ricky Davis won fourth and Looney claimed fifth place.

Davis finished second in the discus competition.

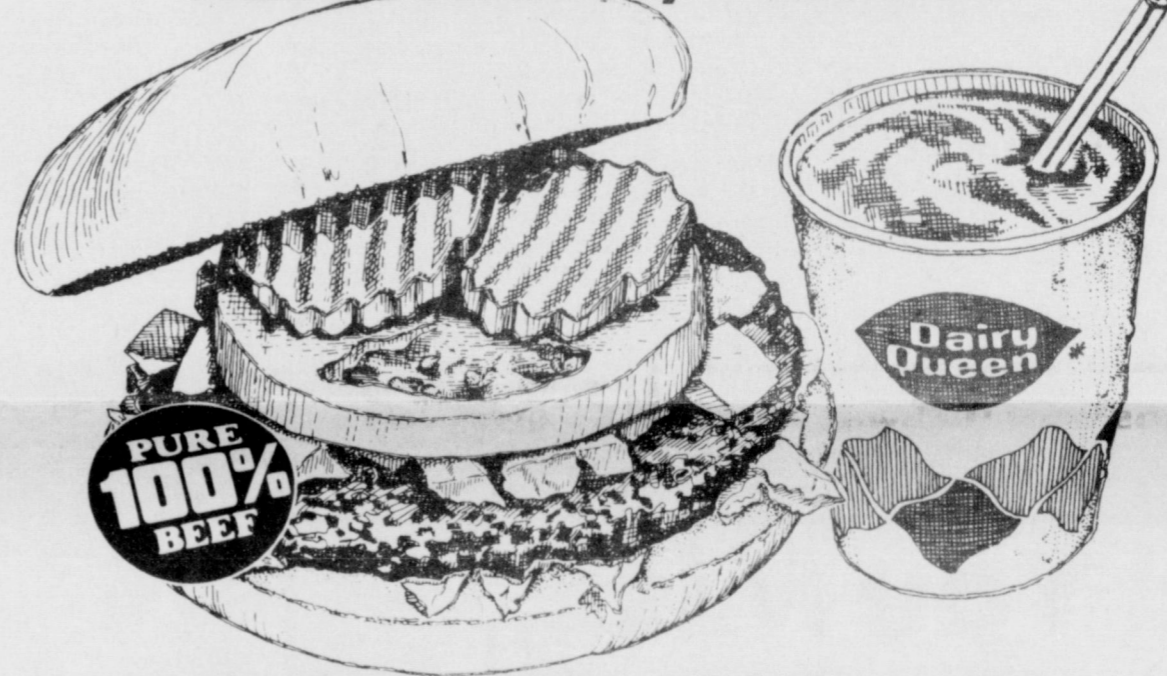

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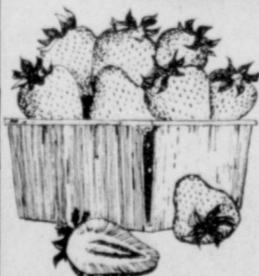
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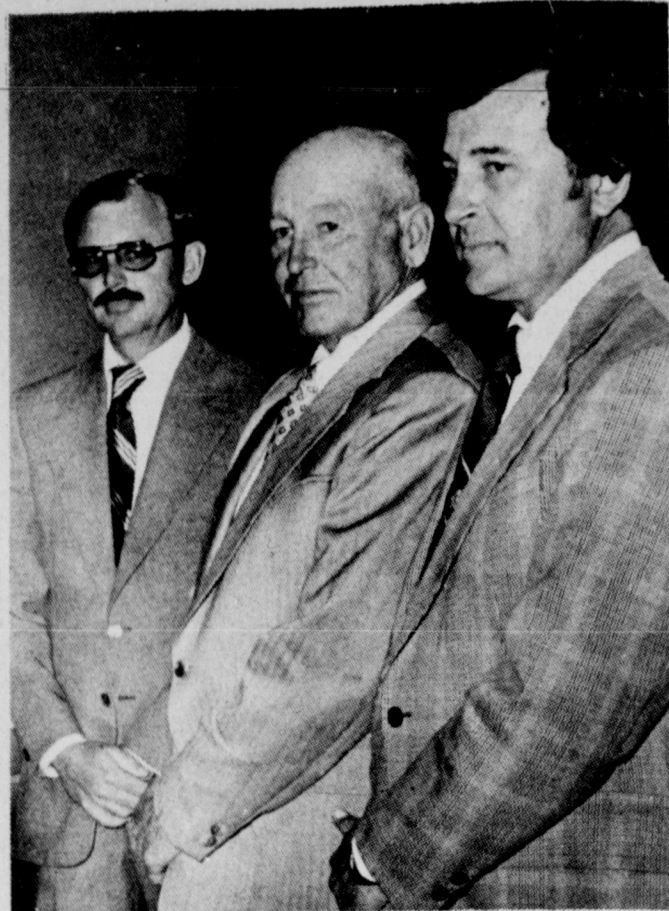
