# Biggest parade in history to open Christmas season

The Christmas season is to be kicked off here in Iowa Park Saturday with a parade through the business district.

To begin at 10 a.m., participation is said to make the parade the largest ever held here, with more than 50 entries.

Included will be bands, marching units, floats, clowns, representatives of almost every organization in town and last, but certainly not least, will

be Santa Claus on a fire truck throwing gum to the children.

The parade is a promotion of the Retail Merchants Association. Tom Key is parade chairman and Danny Parkerson is president of RMA. Besides local entries, they've solicited numerous groups from Wichita Falls and Sheppard AFB.

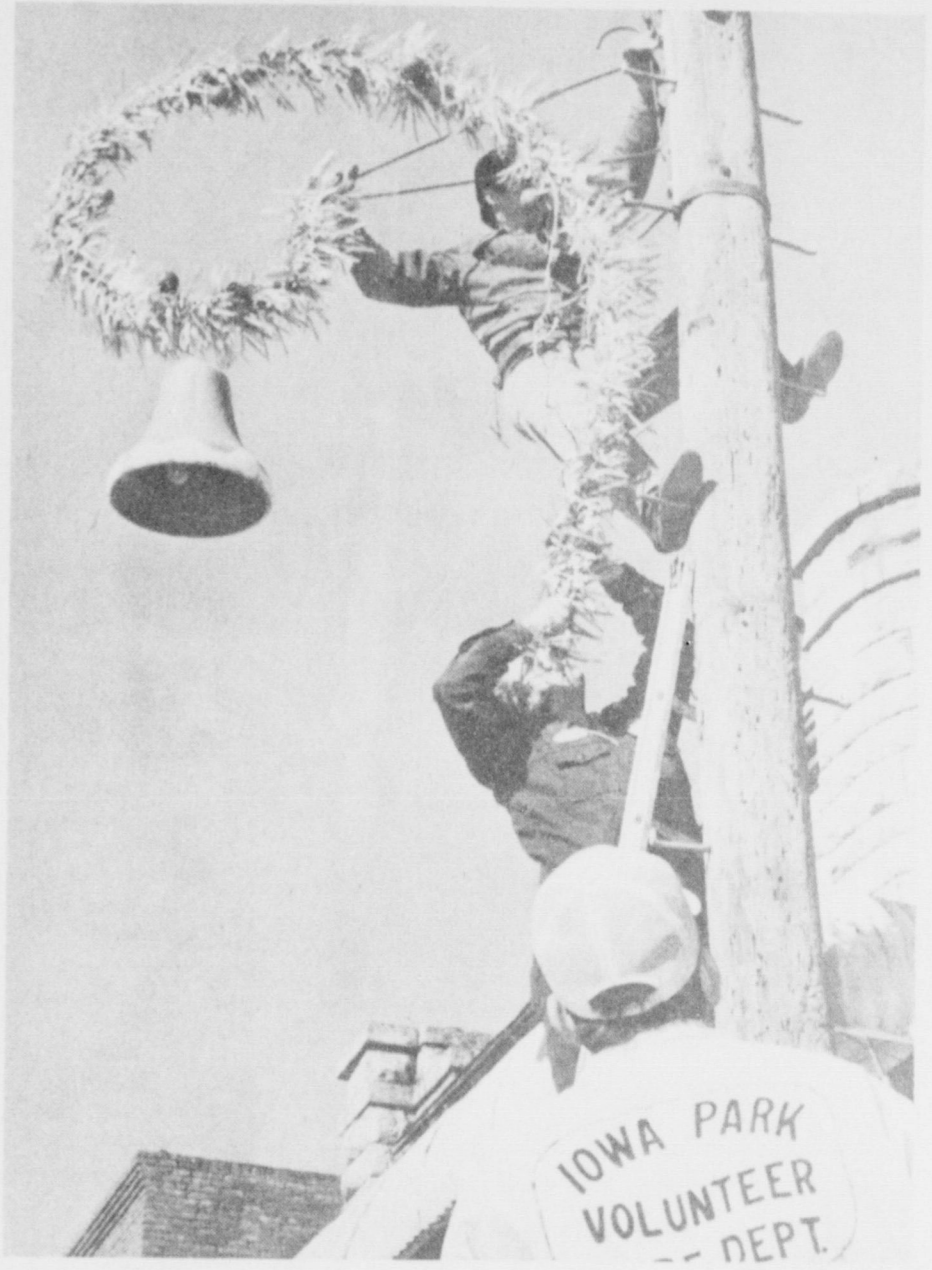
Formation of the parade will take place at the old fair grounds, west of the shopping center. It's route will be

east, through the shopping center, north to Bank, south to Yosemite to Park, returning to Yosemite and turning south to Cash, and east on Cash to the junior high parking lot, where it will disband.

Santa will then set up court in a small structure between Settle Drug and Iowa Park Florists, where he will receive visits from children, and distribute candy. He will remain there until 2 p.m.

Parade viewers will have the opportunity to vote on the "people's choice" entries. Voting will be at Parkway TrueValue on Bank. Ballots will be available. Plaques will be presented to the three entries receiving the most votes.

Santa will return to Santa's Hut the following Saturday. Another feature in the downtown area that day will be the junior high choir, which will be there singing carols.

## It's burglar season!

Beware of burglars!

That's the warning Iowa Park police are repeating these days, urging residents to lock up to avoid their Christmas being spoiled by thieves.

It's no secret home and auto burglars expand their activities during the Christmas season, but Jim Voyles, Iowa Park police chief, said there were some simple precautions persons can take.

The most obvious precaution, according to Voyles, is to remove the keys from your automobile, even if business at a store will take only a few minutes.

"Not only is it an offense in Texas to leave the keys in your car, it's inviting someone to steal it," Voyles said.

It's a good idea to lock gifts and other merchandise in the trunk, out of a potential burglar's view. Gifts laying in the seat in open view are an open invitation to thieves.

The need to lock automobiles almost goes without saying.

Voyles advised residents to leave their porch light on while they are shopping at night. Burglars hate light.

A service few people take advantage of is offered by Iowa Park police year around, but especially during holidays.

A simple telephone call to police headquarters here, and officers will patrol your residence regularly during your absence from the city, Voyles said.

## City grows in acreage

The overall size of Iowa Park increased more than 70 acres as of Monday night, when the final actions concerning annexation of five tracts of land were taken by the city council.

Oridnances were approved annexing Colonial Heights and a tract next to it designated as a city park, both being north of Cryovac plant, the waste water treatment plant, and two recreational areas on Magnolia, one owned by Little League and the other by Top of Texas.

Bobby Griffith, who has been superintendent of the waste water treatment plant for several years, was named superintendent over that department as well as the water department. He takes over the position held for a long time by Tom Compton, whose resignation is to become effective today.

Plans for utilizing the house occupied by Compton, next to the water plant, as an office and storage building were also proposed by Gene Britton, city administrator, and approved by the council.

The house has been part of Compton's salary, figured at \$30 monthly. Britton said that amount as

income to the city would not be worth as much as use of the structure as a storage facility.

**REC CENTER PROPOSAL**

Johnny Coker, one of the leaders in obtaining a charter for the RecCenter which is to be funded by United Way, presented a proposal to the council which includes use of the old Youth Center as a headquarter facility.

Coker asked that the city lease the building to the group, pay utility bills, keep up major repairs, continue general maintenance of athletic fields, and that the organization have the governing power of Burnett Baseball Field and the soccer field for the purpose of youth activities.

The budget calls for a total expenditure by the Recreational Activities Club during the first year of \$19,485, of which \$15,235 will be requested of United Way and the balance, \$4,250, raised locally through drives, activities and donations.

Aldermen said they found nothing objectionable to the proposal of using the building and fields, but they wanted to see a final draft of a lease agreement before taking action. It is to be ready for the next council

meeting, Dec. 12.

Council members approved Britton's making application for a \$3,000 grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs for city personnel studies.

The funds would be used to cover writing job descriptions for each employee, reviewing and making recommendations on personnel policies, procedures and training program.

"We would have to provide some matching funds, but they would consist of the time contributed by myself and the supervisors on job descriptions and the furnishing of office supplies and making of follow-up reports, and would not require any cash outlay by the city," stated Britton.

Also discussed was the Texas Electric Service Company's rate increase, recently approved by the Public Utility Commission. A final appeal hearing is scheduled for Jan. 25, but Mayor Johnny Crawford pointed out "I don't think we could add anything to what has already been presented", and the city will not send a representative to the hearing.

## City residents enlarging homes

Iowa Park residents are enlarging their homes, according to building permits issued by the city hall during November.

Of the 21 permits issued, only two were for new homes, two others were for move-in of a couple of mobile homes, and one was a business expansion.

Value of construction in the city during the past month was \$121,610, which brings the year's building permit total to \$1,202,036.

Permits had exceeded the million-dollar mark in October. Through all of 1976, permits amounted to \$987,699, less than the 1975 figure of \$1,547,648. That was the first time the city had exceeded the million-dollar mark since the early 1960s.

At noon, a catered meal will be served in the Junior College Physical Education Building.

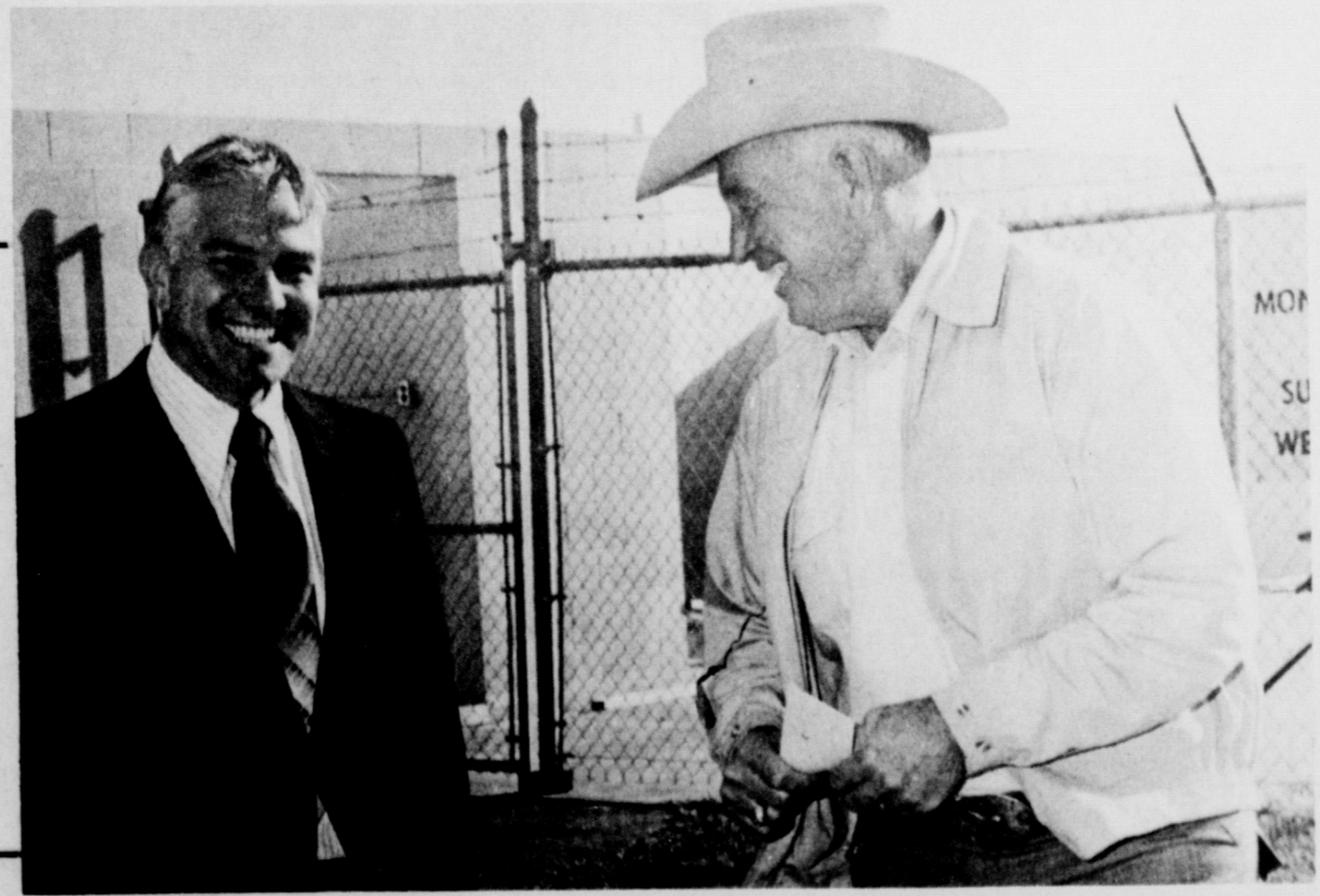
At 1 p.m., task force group meetings on beef cattle, cotton and swine will be held.

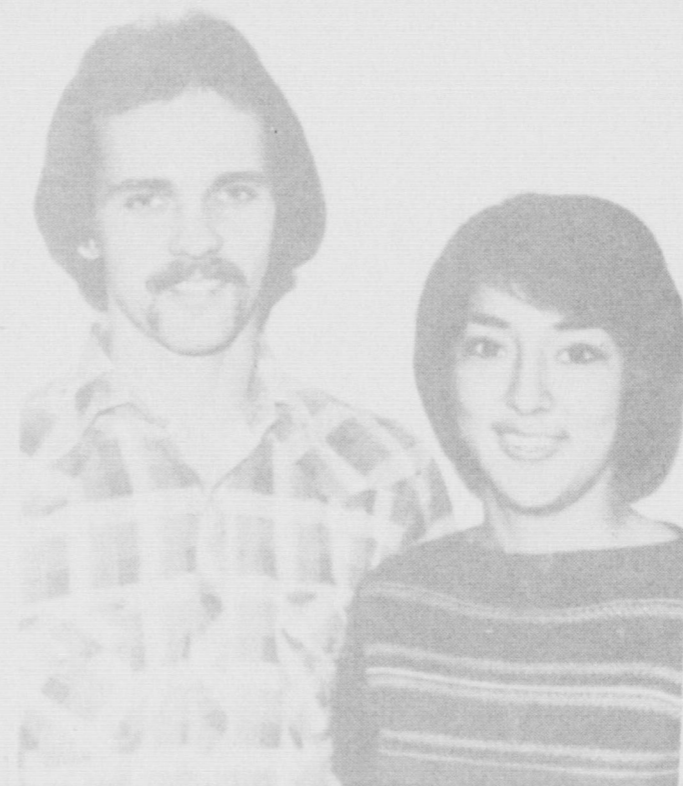

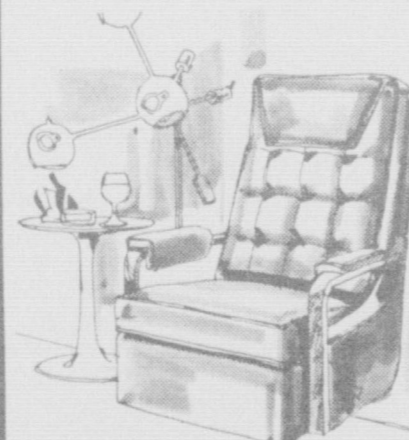

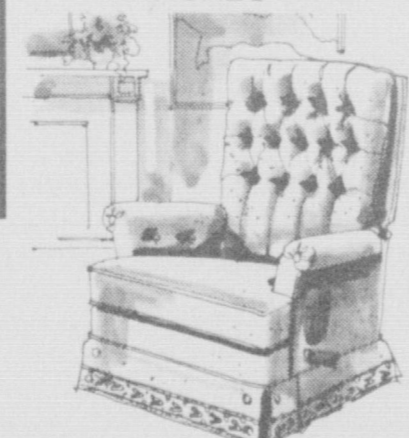

## Vernon to host preliminary for Miss Texas pageant

The Fourth Annual Miss Vernon Regional Junior College Scholarship Pageant will be held March 11 in the Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium at Vernon.

The application deadline for entries in the Miss VRJC Pageant, which is a preliminary for the Miss Texas Pageant, will be Jan. 23.

Entries for the Miss America preliminary must be between the ages of 17 and 26, a high school graduate by Sept. 1, 1978, and must never have been married.

The applicants also must be a resident of or a student in one of the following counties: Archer, Baylor, Clay, Childress, Cottle,

Foard, Hardeman, Knox, King, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger, or Young.

Janice Hensley, pageant general chairperson, said the Miss VRJC Pageant Committee will continue awarding five scholarships to contestants. The new Miss VRJC will receive a two-year, \$600 scholarship to VRJC, and the first four runners-up will also receive scholarships.

In addition, the winner will receive two all-expense paid trips to the Miss Texas Pageant in Fort Worth, as an observer in 1978 and a contestant in 1979. The winner will also receive a \$750 wardrobe, plus the

right to represent VRJC as Miss VRJC for a year prior to the Miss Texas competition.

Applications may be obtained at the local high school or by writing to entry chairman, Dr. James K. Fritze, 4400 College Drive, Vernon, 76384.

Under the rules of the Miss VRJC Scholarship Pageant, the winner will attend VRJC for one academic year prior to representing the college in the state competition, although the winner will attend the 1978 state pageant as an observer.

Judging of the candidates will be based on the same values as considered in the Miss Texas Pageant and at the national Miss America Pageant. Personality, poise, beauty, and talent are the major requirements. Each contestant will be judged in private interview and on stage personality, in swimsuit, and in the presentation of talent.

"Our major objective again this year," Ms. Hensley said, "is to provide a competition in which the

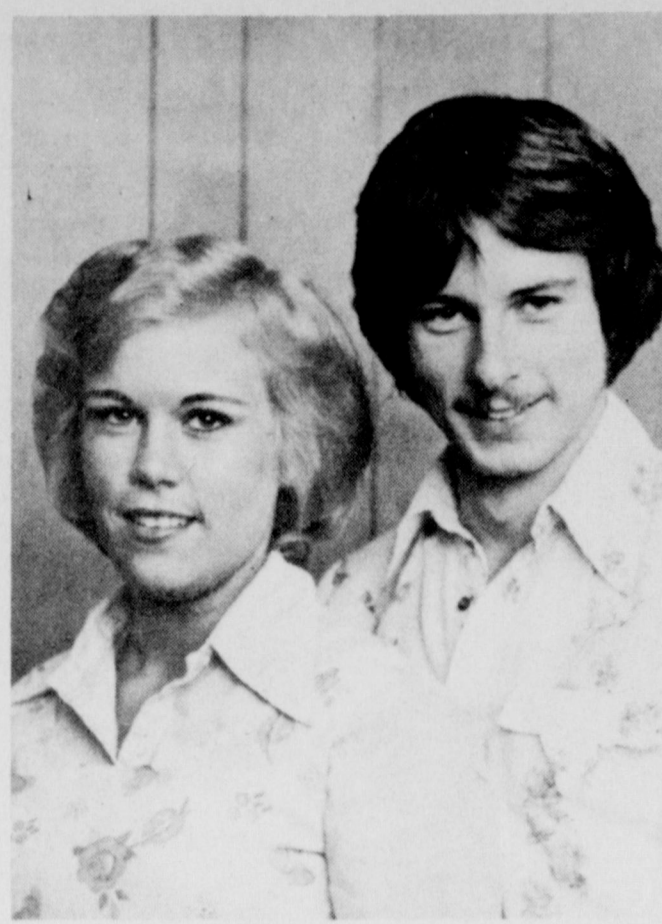

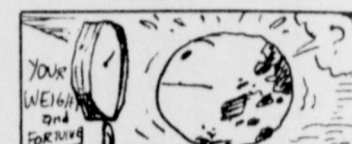

## Great News FOR THE World

### GREAT NEWS FOR THE WORLD HOW THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL FIT INTO GOD'S PLAN—PART I THE BEGINNING OF THE STORY

As we have seen, the story of the Israelites really begins with that faithful man Abraham. He received a promised son in his old age named Isaac, and Isaac had a son named Jacob, who was afterwards called Israel. Jacob had twelve sons, who were the fathers of the twelve tribes of Israel.

The next to the youngest of these sons was called Joseph, and the story of his life which we have in the Bible is one we never get tired of reading. But it more than a good story—it tells us about the important events in the history of the "people of the Bible"—the Israelites. It gives us, too, a wonderful example of the over-ruling care of God for His people.

We all remember the story of how Joseph's jealous brothers sold him as a slave; and how, after many trials, he became governor of Egypt. Then, in a time of famine, his father and his brothers came down to Egypt, because—thanks to Joseph, and thanks, of course to God—there was corn in Egypt.

For a time, the Jews (often called Israelites, or children of Israel) were quite happy in Egypt. But after Joseph's death, as the number of Jews in Egypt grew more and more, the Egyptians began to oppress them and treat them as slaves.

### FREEDOM FOR THE SLAVES

Perhaps you know the story of how God brought these Jewish slaves out of Egypt, under the leadership of a man called Moses, and led them through a barren and deserted land to the borders of Canaan. On this long and dangerous journey, God fed them and cared for them. As we read in Nehemiah 9 vv. 20-21.

"Thou gavest Thy good Spirit to instruct them, and withholdest not Thy manna from their mouth, and gavest them water for their thirst."

"Yea, forty years didst Thou sustain them in the wilderness, so that they lacked nothing; their clothes waxed not old, and their feet swelled not."

God drove out the wicked tribes who lived in Canaan, and gave the land to the Jews. He gave them laws, and chose Judges to rule over them. He said to them, "If you disobey, you will be punished." You will read in Deuteronomy 28 the blessings which God would give them if they obeyed Him, and the curses that were to come upon them if they disobeyed Him.

### THE JEWS DEMAND A KING

Nearly 400 years went by. During those years, God had appointed Judges to rule over the twelve tribes of Israel. (The descendants of Jacob were divided into twelve family groups, called tribes). But the Jews became dissatisfied and wanted a king like the nations around them. In asking for this, they were refusing to have God as their king. When Samuel, their Judge, told God how they had demanded a king, God said,

"They have not rejected thee, but they have rejected Me, that I should not reign over them." [1 Samuel 8 v. 7]

But God granted their request, and gave them the king they wanted. You may like to read for yourself the interesting story of the anointing of Saul, the first king of Israel. You will find it in 1 Samuel 8 and 9.

### A DIVIDED KINGDOM

Saul was followed by the great King David. After a long reign of 40 years, David died, and his son Solomon became king.

Solomon was very rich; he taxed the people rather heavily. This made the people discontented, and when Solomon died they came to his son, Rehoboam, and asked him to ease their burden. You will read, in 1 Kings 12, how Rehoboam listened to his young friends, instead of taking the advice of the wise old men who had been his father's counsellors.

When the people came to King Rehoboam to ask whether he would agree to their

request, he answered very unwisely. We read in 1 Kings 12 vv. 13-14 that the king "answered the people roughly," saying,

"My father made your yoke heavy, and I will add to your yoke. My father also chastised you with whips, but I will chastise you with scorpions."

No wonder the people rebelled against such a king! Ten of the tribes of Israel went away, and formed a kingdom of their own, under a man named Jeroboam. Only Judah, the tribe to which Rehoboam belonged, and the little tribe of Benjamin, remained faithful to him.

So from this time on we have two histories side by side in the Bible. There is the history of the ten tribes, often spoken of as "Israel" or the Northern Kingdom (because they lived in the northern part of the land) and the history of the two tribes spoken of as "Judah" or the Southern Kingdom.

### THE CONTINUAL DISOBEDIENCE OF THE JEWS

In the first and second books of Kings we read the sad story of how the people continually forgot about God, and forsook His ways.

At last, things became so bad that God said He would punish the people, as He had warned them continually that He would, by causing them to be taken from their land as slaves.

You will see from these words from II Chronicles 36 vv. 15-16 how God had done everything He could to bring His people back to His ways.

"And the Lord God of their fathers sent to them by His messengers, rising up betimes and sending; because He had compassion on His people, and on His dwelling place:

"But they mocked the messengers of God, and despised His Words, and misused His prophets, until the wrath of the Lord rose against His people, till there was no remedy."

### PUNISHMENT AT LAST

The punishment which God had promised for the Jewish people's sins finally began. Israel, the Northern Kingdom, was first taken captive. The king of Assyria came and carried the people into Assyria, and as a nation they never came back to their own land. You can read about this in II Kings 17 vv. 6-18, and in v. 23, where the writer says, "...the Lord removed Israel out of His sight, as He had said by all His servants the prophets. So was Israel carried away out of their own land to Assyria unto this day."

Later, the kingdom of Judah was taken captive by the king of Babylon. But their state was not as hopeless as that of Israel; God promised that after 70 years they should be brought back to their own land, and the Temple which had been destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, should be rebuilt.

### BACK IN THEIR OWN LAND AGAIN

Some of the Jews had grown so comfortable and wealthy in Babylon that they did not want to go back to their own land. But a faithful company led by men raised up by God were prepared to make the difficult journey, and to start to rebuild the Temple, and settle down to a new life.

They met with many difficulties, but God sent prophets to encourage and correct them; and the last three books of the Old Testament—Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi—are the writings of these prophets.

Through the prophet Micah (Micah 3 v. 6) God had spoken of a time when the "sun should go down over the prophets." And from the time of Malachi onwards until the coming of John the Baptist, of whom we read in the New Testament, there was no word from God for the people, except what had already been written.

Yet the Jews were, and still are, God's people, and in our next article we will follow their history right up to the present day. Christadelphians, 1508 Kell, Wichita Falls, Tx.

A great way for Miss Grace Churchman to show her sisters, brother and their families each year just how much she loves them is to entertain them at a buffet dinner on the Sunday before Christmas. She has done this for 10 years and is looking forward to the family dinner December 18 this year.

Most everyone likes the ease and flexibility of buffet entertaining and Miss Churchman's life is conducive to a relaxed atmosphere. That seasoned with the love she has for her family and the joy she experiences in preparing the meal by herself for between 50-70 enhance the happiness of the occasion.

She does not serve turkey because she knows that each family will have its own turkey dinner on Christmas Day. She does prepare and serve the foods that they especially like and always has a big pot of red beans and corn bread to remind them of "their raising." For those who have problems with meals squeezed in between Thanksgiving and Christmas, Grace's recipes this week are sure to please.

Miss Churchman, a well known businesswoman in Iowa Park, is a bookkeeper at Iowa Park Insurance Co., a position she has held for 26 years. Born in Arkansas, she came to Texas with her parents at the age of five. She was graduated from Valley View High School. She worked for W.T. Grant Co. and Greener Insurance Co. in Wichita Falls before she accepted the position that she presently holds.

The recipes below are among the favorites of her relatives and will be a part of the fare for the annual dinner this year. She does not bake pies, but she has several cakes and a variety of cookies.

### CHICKEN HUNTINGTON

- 1 five pound hen (or fryers)
  - 1 can pimentos, chopped
  - 1 can cream of mushroom soup
  - 1/4 lb. butter
  - 1/2 cup flour
  - 1 qt. milk
  - 1 small can chopped mushrooms
  - 1/2 dozen boiled eggs
  - 1 lb. wide noodles
  - Garlic powder
  - Salt
  - Pepper
- Cook chicken until tender; debone and cut up. Cook noodles in broth.  
 Sauce: Melt butter, add

- 1 t dry mustard
- 1 t Worcestershire sauce
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 medium green pepper, chopped
- 1 (8-Oz.) can whole kernel corn (optional)
- Boil carrots in salted

### BEAN SALAD

- 2/3 cup cider vinegar
  - 3/4 cup sugar
  - 1 t salt
  - 1 lb. can cut green beans
  - 1 lb. can cut wax beans
  - 1 lb. can kidney beans, rinsed and drained
  - 1 lb. can lima beans
  - 1 medium size onion, quartered and finely sliced
  - 1 medium green pepper, chopped
  - 1/2 t freshly ground pepper
  - 1/2 cup salad oil
  - Lettuce
- Blend vinegar, sugar and salt in small saucepan. Heat until the sugar is dissolved and set aside. Drain all beans and toss with onion, green pepper, vinegar mixture and pepper. Pour oil over all and store in a large covered container in refrigerator for at least 8 hours. Better after 2 or 3 days.

### CRISP COCONUT COOKIES

- 3/4 cup shortening
  - 3/4 cup granulated sugar
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
  - 1 t vanilla extract
  - 1 egg, beaten
  - 2 cups sifted flour
  - 1 t soda
  - 1 t baking powder
  - 1/2 t salt
  - 1 cup rolled oats (regular or quick cooking)
  - 1 cup flaked coconut
  - 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy; stir in vanilla and beaten egg. Combine other ingredients and stir into creamed mixture. Dough will be very stiff.
- Drop teaspoonsful onto a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375° for 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool a few minutes on cookie sheet before removing to cooling racks. Yield: about 5 dozen.

### CARROT SALAD

- 1 lb. carrots, scraped and sliced
- 1 t salt
- 1 (10 1/2-oz.) can tomato soup
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup corn oil
- 3/4 cup vinegar
- Salt and pepper to taste

water until tender. Combine other ingredients and pour over carrots in a covered casserole dish or suitable container. Marinate overnight. This salad will keep in refrigerator for three weeks and liquid may be re-used. Yield: 8 servings.

### CHICKEN SALAD

Grate one small apple on the smallest part of your grater into one can of tuna and add the juice of one-half lemon.

Take any leftover meats that you have in your refrigerator such as lean pieces of ham, pork, beef or chicken (whether it's fried, boiled or baked, use it) and grind it in your meat grinder and add to the mixture. While your meat grinder is out, also grind a few sweet pickles into the mixture.

It really doesn't make any difference how much other meat you add to this so long as you start with one can of tuna fish.

Add just enough salad dressing to the mixture to make it the consistency that you prefer. Chill thoroughly before serving.

Any one, two or even three different kinds of meat can be ground into the mixture at the same time. To vary it, some day use ham, the next day, use pork, and the next day, use turkey. It is always good and varied.

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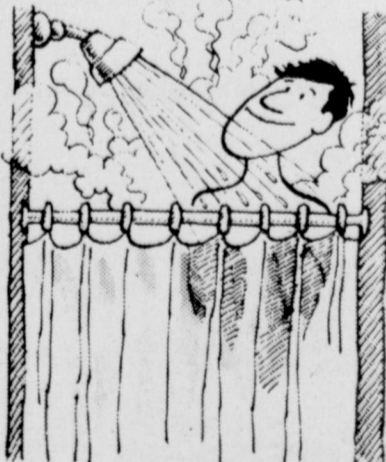

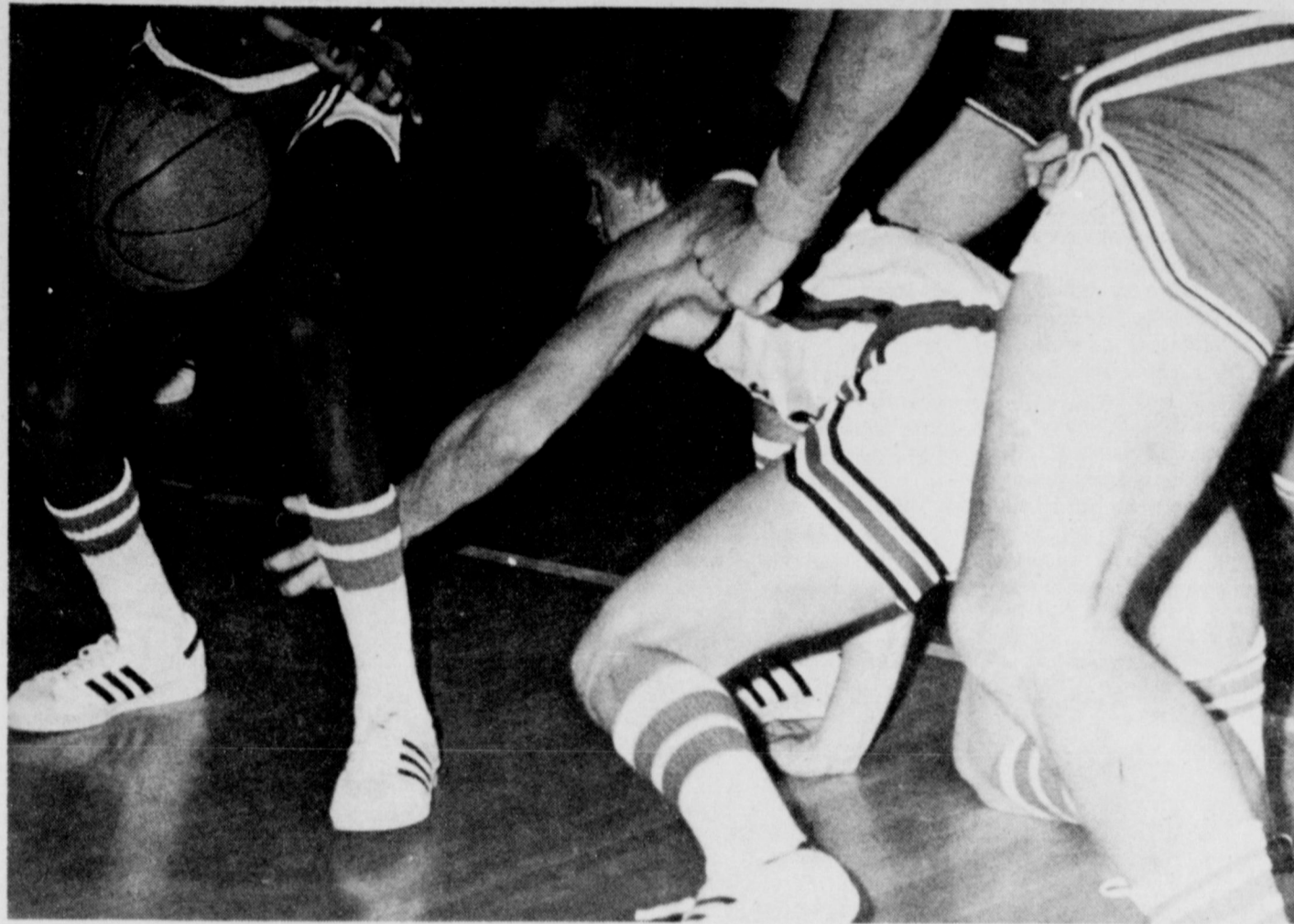

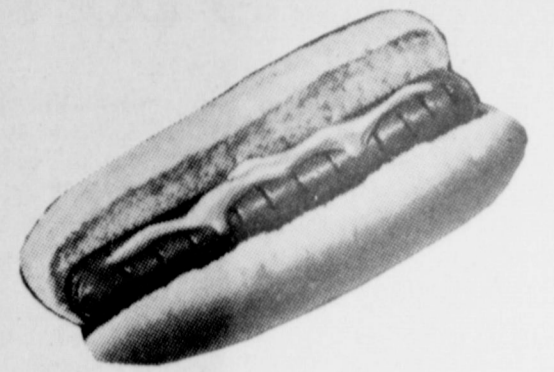

# How to insulate your attic yourself

Homeowners can insulate their unfinished attics with a few tools, the correct amount of insulating material, strict safety precautions and several easy preparation steps, says Mrs. Dee James, County Extension Agent.

## TOOLS

Necessary tools are temporary lighting, temporary flooring (such as 1x12" boards or plywood laid across ceiling joists), dust or masking tape (2" wide), a heavy duty staple gun and staples or a hammer and tacks, and heavy duty shears or linoleum knife to cut the insulating materials.

## MATERIALS

Insulation is available in batts, blankets or loose fill - and it's important to know which ones include a vapor (moisture) barrier or which ones need it.

Batts and blankets are made of glass fiber, rock wool or cellulose - and loose fill is generally made of rock wool, glass fiber, and cellulose fiber.

Batts are generally 15" or 23" wide pre-cut in 4' or 8' lengths. Blankets 15" or 23" wide, in long rolls, can be cut by the installer. They are compressed and will expand when wrappers are removed. Loose fill comes in bags.

When selecting insulation, consider composition, fire safety, moisture resistance, odor, corrosiveness, thermal performance (or R-value), cost, and installation forms and methods.

If you choose batts and blankets, buy the width that will fit snugly within the joist spacing.

A vapor barrier prevents most of the moisture in the house from getting into the insulation and reducing its effectiveness. Between home laundry, cooking and bathing, about 18 gallons (68 liters) of water vapor can be produced each week.

For un-insulated attics, select batt or blanket insulation with an attached vapor barrier - or if you select loose fill insulation

with an attached vapor barrier of heavy polyethylene sheeting (4-mil or 6-mil thick) is necessary.

If the attic already has some insulation - and you are simply adding to it, no additional vapor barrier is necessary. However, if batt or blanket insulation with an attached vapor barrier is all you can buy for the new job, its barrier should be slashed approximately every six to 12 inches.

The slash in the new layer of insulation prevents moisture from being trapped in the first layer of insulation.

## HOW TO MEASURE MATERIAL AMOUNTS

To determine the amount

of vapor barrier material and insulation material to buy, you don't even have to go into the attic. Just follow these two steps:

-Step 1. Measure the area of the first floor of your house - not counting garage, porch and other unheated areas. The first floor area will be the same as the attic area.

If it is a rectangle, measure length and width in feet (to the nearest foot) and multiply - length x width equals area.

If it is a combination, break it down into rectangles; find the area of each one; then add the areas to get the total.

-Step 2. Figure the estimated insulation area by multiplying .9 times the total attic area (90 per cent of the total area). In other words: .9 x total attic area = estimated amount of insulation material (and vapor barrier material) needed.

## SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

Do NOTHING until you have carefully read these safety rules:

- 1) Provide good lighting.
- 2) Lay boards or plywood sheets down over tops of joists or trusses to form a walkway - the ceiling below won't support your weight.
- 3) Be careful of roofing nails protruding through roof sheathing.
- 4) If you use glass fiber or rock wool, wear gloves and breathing mask, and keep the material wrapped until you are ready to put it in place.
- 5) Work when temperature in attic can be tolerated - winter, nights, cool weather.

## PREPARATION STEPS

After installing temporary lighting and flooring - before insulating, check for leaks and make necessary repairs. Also, seal all places where pipes or wire penetrate the attic floor.

After collecting necessary tools and materials and following safety precautions and preparatory steps, it is a fairly simple job to insulate

an unfinished attic.

- 1) Install separate vapor barrier if needed: lay polyethylene strips between joists and trusses. Staple or tack in place. Seal seams and holes with tape - seams may be overlapped 6" instead.

## LOOSE FILL

- 2) If you are using loose fill, install baffles - made of cardboard - at the inside of the eave vents so that insulation will not block flow of air from vents into the attic. Be sure insulation extends out far enough to cover the top plate.

Pour in loose insulation between joists. Use a board or garden rake to level it. Fill all nooks and crannies but do not cover recessed light fixtures or exhaust fans.

## BATTS OR BLANKETS

Lay blankets or batts between joists or trusses if blankets are used, cut long runs first to conserve material, using leftovers for shorter spaces. Slide insulation under wiring wherever possible.

Cut ends of batts or blankets in to fit snugly around cross bracing. Cut the next batt in a similar way to allow ends to butt together tightly.

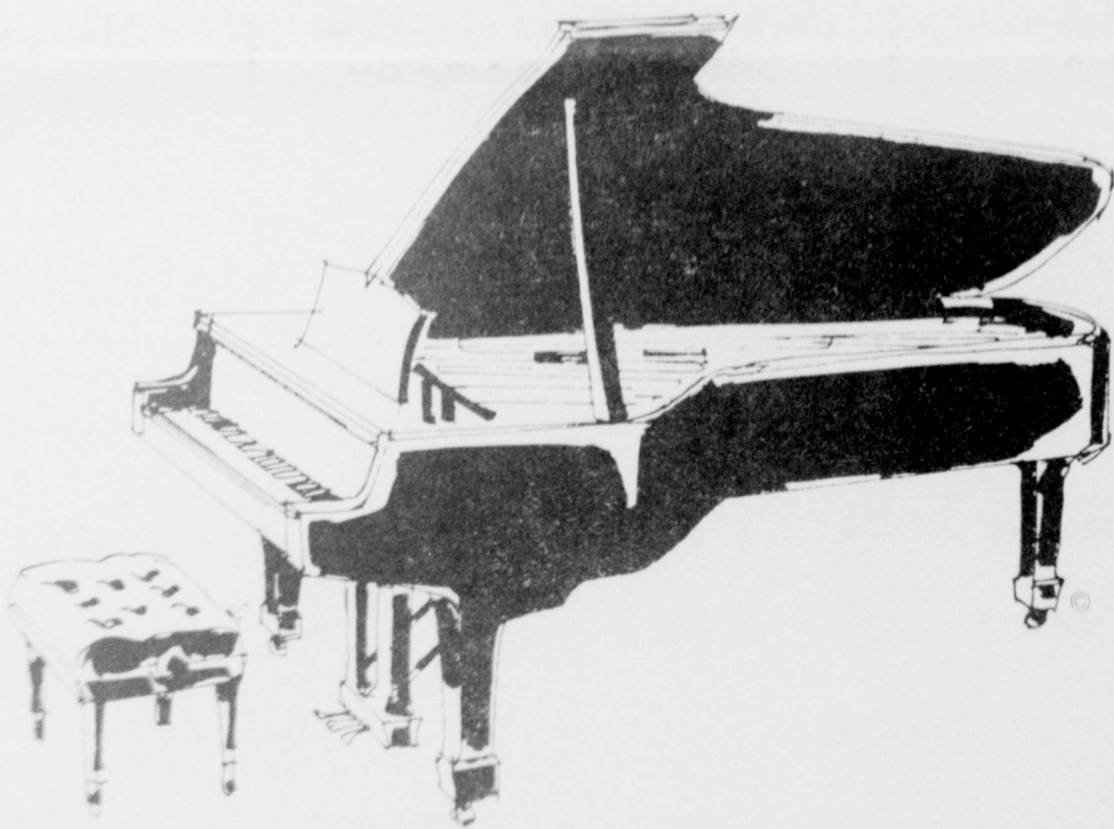
3) The space between chimney and wood framing should be filled with non-combustible material, preferably unfaced batts or blankets. Also, the National Electric Code requires that insulation be kept three inches away from light fixtures.

## ADDING TO EXISTING INSULATION

If your attic requires a second layer of insulation, place batts of blankets at right angles to the joists (across the joists).

If the batts you are using have a vapor barrier, either remove it or slash it to prevent moisture from being trapped between the insulation layers. Loose fill insulation can be used on top of a first layer of batts or blankets.

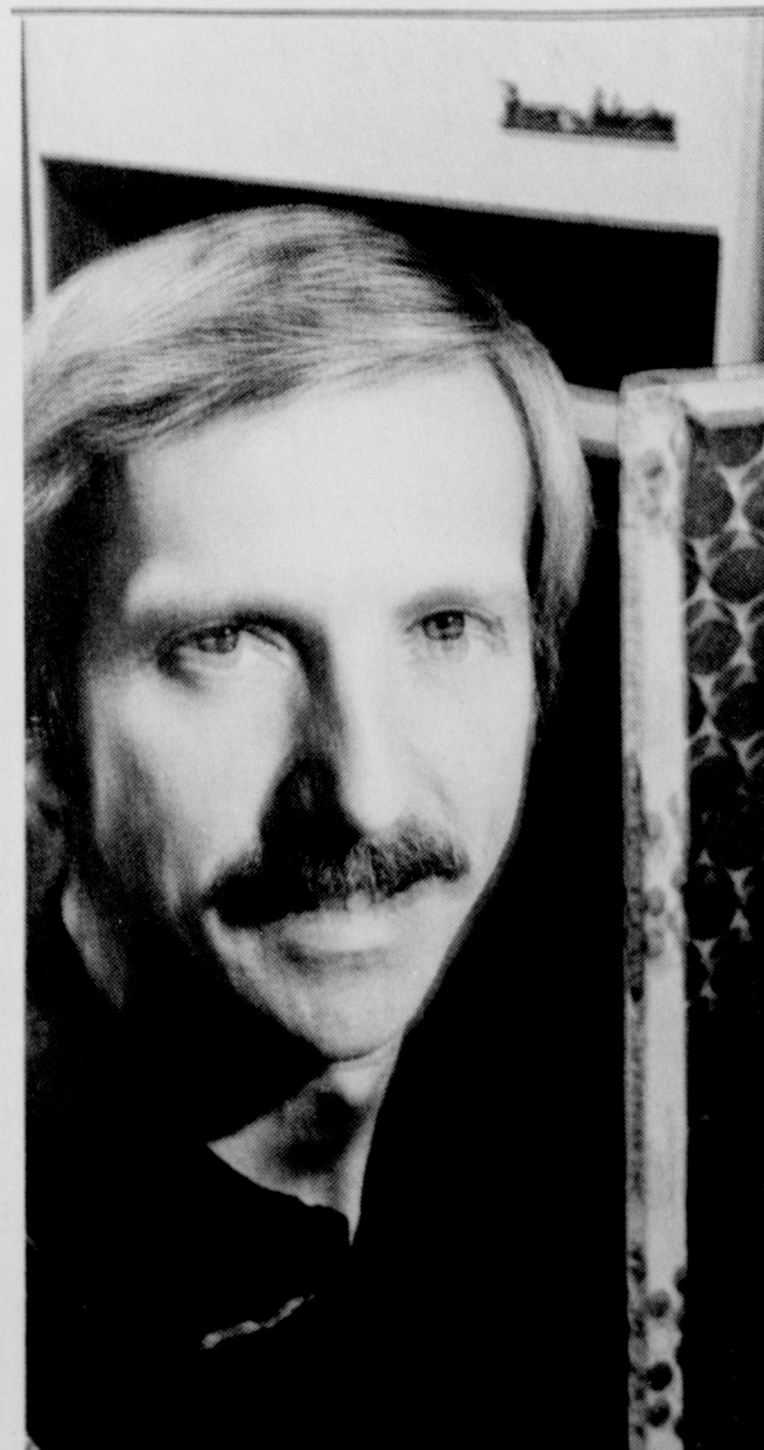

## Wichita County shares Texas tourist dollars

Wichita County received \$54,682,100 of the State's \$6,075,952,000 travel receipts in 1976, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed.

The county's share ranked 16th among the state's 254 counties.

The 1976 figures reflect an increase of 13 percent in travel receipts over 1975 when Wichita County's travel business accounted for \$48,303,000.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Wichita County in 1976 had 1,991 of the state's 227,258 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$12,240,800.

It also estimated \$2,174,300 in state and \$428,200 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1976.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model which breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight

trips away from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model. It was the latter which estimated that in 1975 Texas had displaced New York for third place in the nation's travel industry. The 1976 figures, however, show

Texas back in fourth place behind California, Florida, and New York.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county-by-county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."
