

Texas products featured by 23 Study Club speaker

Mrs. L.E. Brooks was the featured speaker for the 23 Study Club's Texas Heritage program at a meeting last Thursday in the home of Mrs. N.E. McKinney, with Mrs. Fred Widmoyer, the co-hostess. Her topic was "Products Produced in

Texas." Mrs. T.M. Clark was leader for the program. Introducing the talk, Mrs. Brooks discussed briefly the early history, a dramatic story of Texas, a place abrim with life and promise from the time it was a young republic until the present time. She stressed how the environment of the land had been shaped not only by a frontier heritage but also by the indelible influence of six different flags which have flown over Texas.

She mentioned the main crops, foods and industries of the pioneer settlers, which were very limited, and to stress the contrast between then and now, she said "The sky is the limit; we can grow anything and Texans can live at home in Texas." She said, however, that Texas had made, and continued to make, a distinctive contribution to other states and countries through her products.

In considering the new products in the Lone Star State, Mrs. Brooks stated, "Ten years ago, fifty percent of the products that can be purchased today were not in

use." She attributed this to the methods of packaging, freezing and preserving that have revolutionized people's lives and to the research that has been done by the Texas Experiment Stations through the years. She told how cottonseed meal, sunflowers, soybeans, triticale and guar are now recognized and are being used for food value.

Mrs. Brooks confessed a special interest in guar since her husband, who was superintendent of Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Station for many years, played a major part in its development. For a period of 15 years, he reportedly was the only person in the world doing research on the now multi-million dollar cash industry, and for his efforts the highest producing variety of guar bears his name.

Among the Texas products on display were guar beans, meal, gum and jaguar. Mrs. C.E. Birk contributed the devotion using "Visions and Dreams" for a title. She stressed how Texas was the great state that she is today because someone had visions and dreams.

Mrs. Joe Singer directed the group singing of "Yellow Rose of Texas," "Texas, Our Texas" and "Red River Valley." Mrs. James A. Sewell provided autoharp accompaniment.

Preceding the program, Dr. E.F. Soell, a member of the Home Rule Charter Commission, spoke to club members about the upcoming charter election.

Mrs. Soell directed the business and heard reports concerning plans for the

Santa Rosa District Convention Friday and Saturday and the annual guest day luncheon March 20.

The refreshment table was laid with a crocheted cloth and featured Texas products in decorations and refreshments. The centerpiece consisted of fruits and nuts and the favors were vari-colored net bags filled with Texas grown pecans

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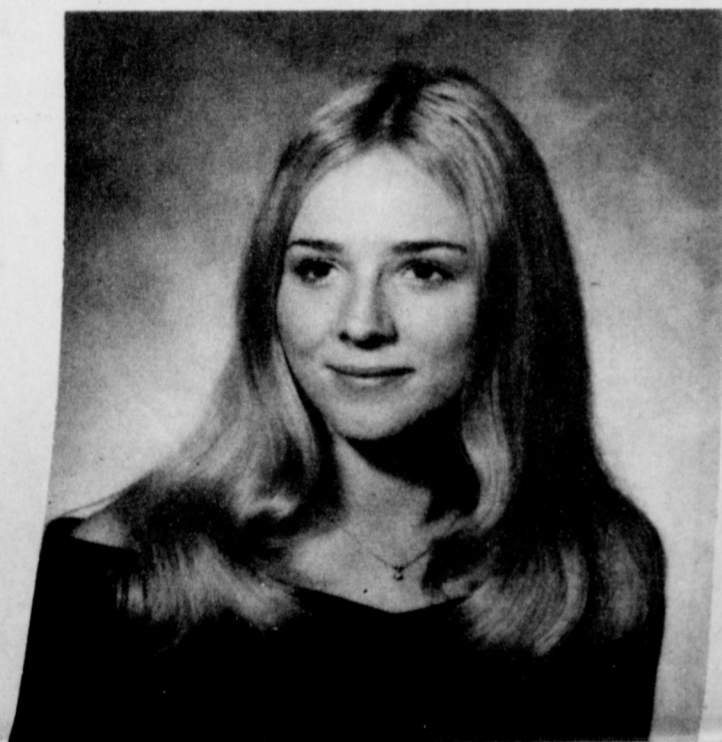
Couple sets July date

Science Fair this week at Vernon Junior College

Vernon Regional Junior College will be the host for the 1975 Science and Engineering Fair for this area.

This fair, formerly hosted by Midwestern University, is one of approximately 200 regional science contests throughout the United States. Sweepstakes winners will participate in the National Fair, in Oklahoma City, May 12-17.

The area served by this fair, officially named the Northwest Texas Science and Engineering Fair, includes the following counties: Archer, Baylor, Clay, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Knox, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

Any student of a public or private school in this area is invited to enter a project in the fair. Categories of participation are Senior High School Biological Science, Senior High Physical Science, and Junior High General Science.

The awards program will be as follows: First place award in each category - \$100 savings bond. Second place award in each category - \$50 savings bond. Third place in each category - \$25 savings bond.

The preceding awards are donated by Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas. In addition to the above awards, there will be several special awards:

1. The American Heart Association will present a \$25 bond.
2. Vernon Regional Junior College will present several miscellaneous awards and medals.
3. The Armed Services will present certain awards and certificates.
4. Eastman Kodak Company will award a \$25 gift certificate.
5. Numerous other awards and certificates will be given.

The fair will be conducted today through Sunday in accordance with the following schedule:

 - March 14 (morning) - students register and set up exhibits.
 - March 14 (afternoon) - judging of exhibits.
 - March 15, 1-6 p.m. - Open to public.
 - March 16, 1 to 5 p.m. - Official Open House.
- An awards dinner, sponsored by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, will be given for area science teachers, senior science students and science fair award winners on Saturday evening, in the Wilbarger auditorium.

Correct address must be on driver's license

The Texas Department of Public Safety advises that all Texas drivers should examine their Texas drivers license to verify that the address on their license is correct. If his address is incorrect, it will be necessary to contact the local Drivers License Office as soon as possible.

It is a misdemeanor offense for not changing your address within 10 days after moving. This particular law is going to be enforced more strictly in the future. The procedure for changing an address on a license is to have a duplicate license made with a new picture and a \$1 fee.

The Drivers License Law, V.C.S. 66876, Sec. 20, states that whenever any person after applying for or receiving an Operator's Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license shall move from the address named in such application or in the license issued to him or when the name of the licensee is changed by

marriage or otherwise, such person shall within ten (10) days thereafter notify the Department in writing of his old and new addresses or of such former and new names, of the number of any license then held by him, and such person shall apply for a duplicate license as set out in Section 14.

Section 14 states that in the event that an Operator's, Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license issued under the provisions of this Act is lost, destroyed or there is a change in pertinent information, the person to whom the same was issued may obtain a duplicate or correction thereof upon furnishing proof satisfactory to the Department that such permit or license was lost or destroyed or upon the supplying of the required information which has changed, together with proof acceptable to the Department supporting such change, and upon the payment of a fee of one dollar.

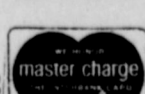

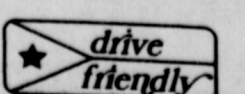

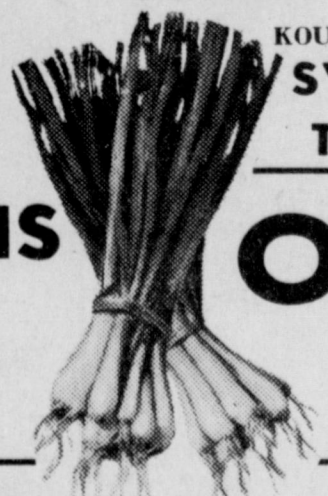

In this day when so many refuse to do anything, except they be paid in the almighty dollar, we are grateful for persons who will volunteer for any kind of civic responsibility.

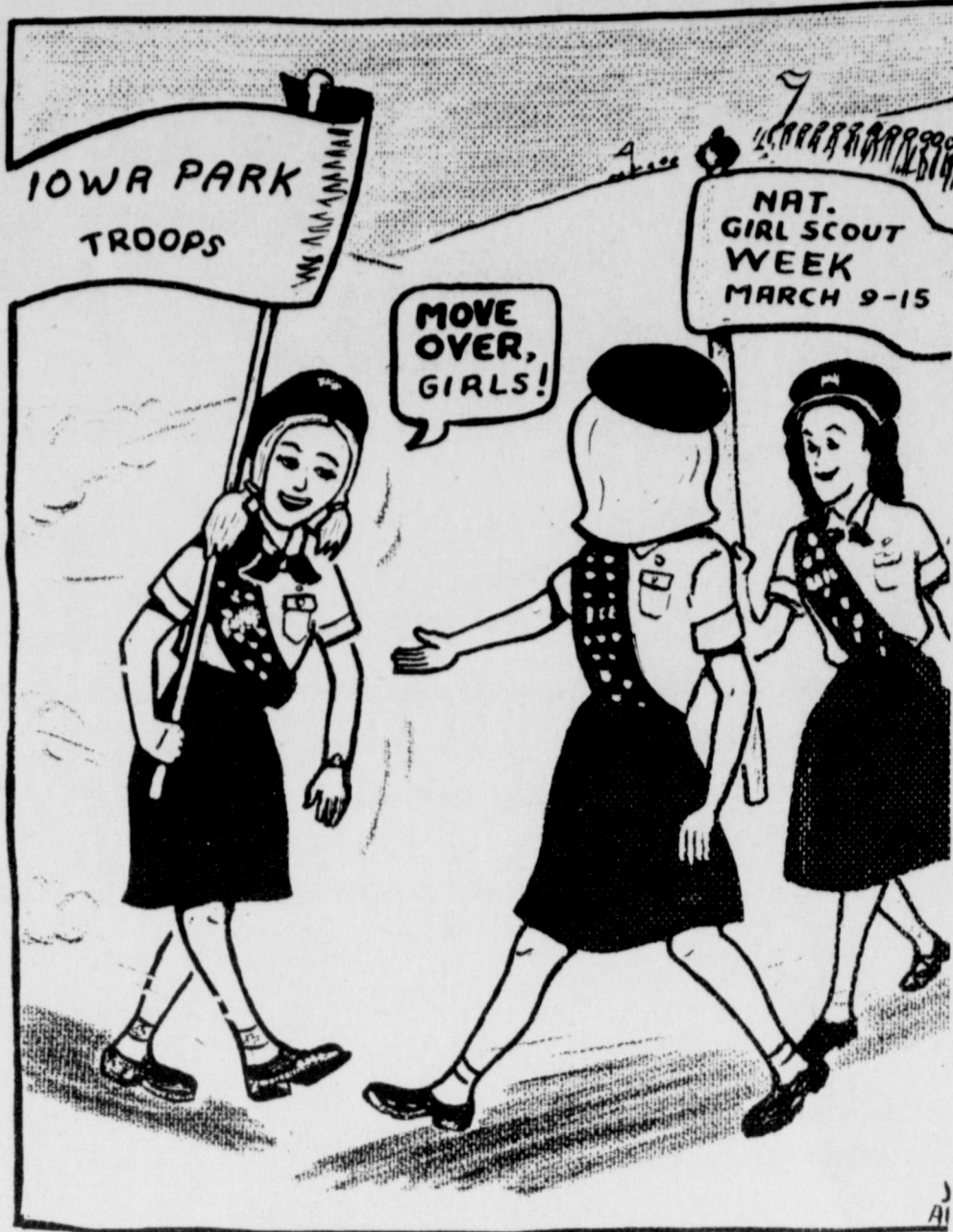

It's always nice to hear that someone agrees with you, or you with them, and it seems I have a lot of

people seeing a situation the way I do. A news release from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce concerning a survey of members on the nation's economy indicates 60 percent of those responding to the survey agrees with me. Or was it that I agree with 60 percent of them.

Anyway, 60 percent expect an upturn in the nation's economy while 24 expect a downturn and 16 percent expect no change.

Results of the survey of a cross-section of the WTCC membership were announced by exec. vice president J. Fike Godfrey, who said 338 of the 822 members responded with answers.

West Texans were about evenly divided on whether the recession would take an upturn in six months, or would be a year or longer, 58 to 42 percent.

Can you guess what those participating in the survey said were our national problems? Try these: (and they are in order as importance) inflation, recession, government spending, leadership by the administration, national regulations on business, actions by Congress and welfare reform, actions of Supreme Court, health care, detente with Russia and China, and the U.S. Post Office.

Does that sound familiar to you? It seems one doesn't have to live in Springlake, or Fort Stockton, or Abilene, or Marfa to have an opinion all his own. It appears all us West Texans share our common opinions.

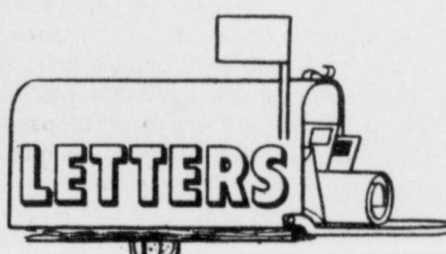
But the thing I liked about the WTCC survey was the optimism. Now remember, not all those surveyed were from oil-producing areas. Think about those who are in areas where the economy is based almost entirely on the cattle industry. But still, most were optimistic.

That always seems to be the outlook of West Texans.

I've stood on the turn row of a cotton field with a farmer, who had a bumper crop just days away from harvesting, tell me, "Well, there's always next year."

He didn't rush to his federal office and apply for welfare. No sir, he made the best of what was left in the field, got his loan renewed, and came back to make his crop the next year.

It's almost impossible to hold down an optimist. I think we need more faith and optimism in our country today. . . who think like West Texans.

- 14. Purchase additional academic textbooks for CVAE academic program to meet state requirements.
- 15. Recommend garbage disposal and rodent control for home economics program. (\$100)
- 16. Shelving in auto shop and outside paint storage be provided. (\$300)
- 17. Partitions for restrooms in Auto Mechanics and Auto Body Shops. (\$100)
- 18. Recommend office equipment be purchased for high school counselors. (\$375)
- 19. Recommend full-time arts and crafts program be initiated. If student enrollment will not justify a full program, recommend effort be made to share art teacher between junior high and high school. (\$13,000 includes teacher and equipment)
- 20. Additional teaching materials and audio materials for social studies program.

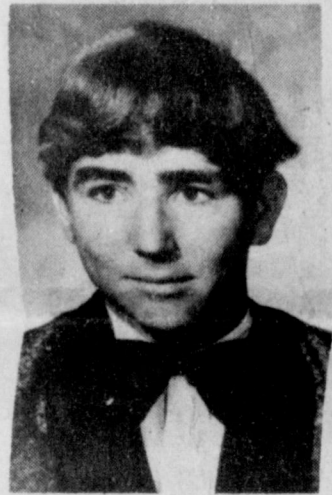

Chamber adds more awards

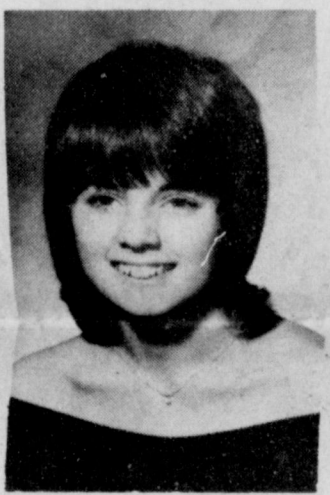
