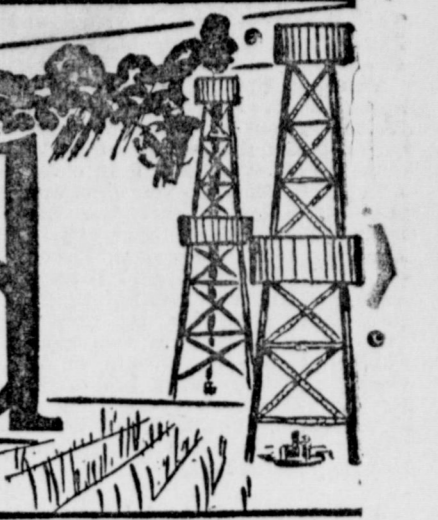

McDonald Book Goes on Sale

Claude C. McDonald Jr., minister of Iowa Park Christian church, has just had his first book published. "There's Comfort in His Life" (Revel, \$3.95)—and it can now be found in bookstores. He will be in Lovelace Book Store of Wichita Falls next Wednesday just to autograph his book for all the friends and book lovers who drop in for that purpose.

McDonald has been active in Iowa Park's religious life the past 11 1/2 years. He was born in St. Joseph, Mo., and attended elementary and high school there. He also attended Junior College in St. Joseph before entering the Air Force during World War II. He served three years as a navigator.

The achievement of a bachelor of science degree was strangely unsatisfying until Claude realized he had a devotional calling and enrolled at Phillips Seminary in Enid, Okla.

First appointed Student Minister to the Christian church in Arnett, Okla., he was later installed as pastor of the church here in 1959. He has served this congregation since then.

Mr. McDonald decided to write his book because a spiritual aspect has permeated his life since boyhood. He felt compelled to express his great love of and innermost thoughts about God and the meaning of life, and to share with others these heartwarming episodes of the victory of the living Christ over adversity.

"There's Comfort in His Life" contains sixteen taken-from-life vignettes beautifully and simply told showing how the spirit of Jesus daily influences lives.

The stories tell of encounters between the author and a person or family struggling with seemingly insurmountable problems. Experiences of frustrations and heartache, growth and understanding, victory and defeat are all found in these dramas of a pastor's daily life with people.

The author lives with his wife Jaunice and son Jeff at 509 West Texas. Their son Mike lives in Ft. Worth.

Claude has been president of the Ministerial Alliance several times, president of District 19 of the Christian church, served on a variety of civic committees during his tenure here.

McDonald has been named Man of the Year by area Jaycees, and Town and Country Minister of the Year in Texas.

City Council

Shearson, Hammill Bonding Co. of San Antonio was authorized last Monday to sell \$225,000 worth of revenue bonds for Iowa Park. Aldermen set the interest rates at 6.75 per cent for five years; 7.00 per cent for the next five years, and 7.25 per cent for the five-year period after that.

Money derived will be used for improvements to the City's sewage facilities.

The council passed on first reading Ordinance 37a which will extend the primary fire zone to cover certain industrial and commercial areas here.

It was decided to present the application of Dub Crawford for a permit to building a retail store building at Fourth and US 287 access road to the City Planning Commission. Their recommendations will then be a guide to the aldermen's decision.

23 Study Club

"Pollution: Great Threat to America" was the title of a timely ecology program presented as a symposium last Thursday when Mrs. M. L. Hines and Mrs. Chauncey Weiler were hostesses to the 23 Study club at the home of Mrs. Hines.

Mrs. J. W. Cantrell defined ecology and introduced the four speakers.

Mrs. N. E. McKinney described the automobile as perhaps the greatest cause of air pollution, but reported the oil industry has recognized this danger and is spending great sums of money to improve their products.

She said great concern hinges on the condition of water in rivers and lakes and even oceans, leading to a concerted effort by six international agencies joined by private groups to formulate plans to remedy the situation. Lake Erie and the Potomac river were also named as sad examples of pollution.

Electric power companies are now installing expensive cooling units to remedy water pollution, which will make electric power cost more but will improve the ecology of the world.

Hearing efficiency as affected by noise, as presented by Mrs. Fred Widmoyer, depicted industry, home appliances and musical instruments as the most common offenders. She quoted psychologists who say unless we curb noise, a deaf generation is due in the near future. Industry is doing much to help by installing draperies, carpeting and insulation to muffle loud sounds.

Mrs. Sam Hill reported that federal administrators found one out of every three food firms inspected violates the federal sanitation regulations; and in spite of the fact that more inspectors are needed, inspection programs are curtailed because of lack of funds. A probe has been demanded by the Department of Agriculture because filthy meat plants continue to operate after being reported.

Mrs. Hill described danger from sprays and insecticides, stating that misuse rather than use seems to result in harm from insecticides.

The pollution of minds and morals was presented by Mrs. E. F. Soell as the most dangerous of all and quoted the "War Cry" question: What shall it profit America if it does clean up its rivers and waters and does not clean up the hearts and minds of its people? She also named leaders who disagree with the Presidential commission that reported pornography is not dangerous for adults.

The meditation by Mrs. Earle Denny and poems read by Mrs. Rollins Woodall emphasized the contrast between beauty and ugliness in today's world, and gave guidelines for looking for the beautiful.

During the business period the club voted to participate in the Community Clubs Award program sponsored by Channel 6; and Miss Kidwell and Mrs. James explained what it means. Co-operation in placing the name of Mrs. Overton Neal, Santa Rosa district president, on a plaque at headquarters in Austin was approved.

Miss Kidwell presided at the coffee service during the social hour when refreshments were served from a table decorated with autumn leaves, berries, fruits and flowers. Favors were delicious miniature pumpkins, to be eaten and not kept as souvenirs.

He told of one of our fans' getting severely injured by a thrown bottle and just what could happen to Breckenridge if our school should file a protest with the UIL.

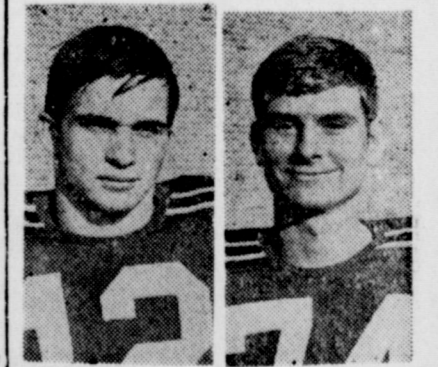

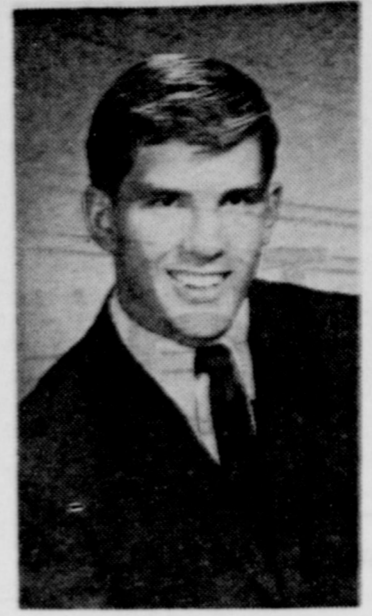

Whereas, the land hereinafter described in Section One of this Ordinance adjoins the present corporate limits of the Town of Pleasant Valley, Texas, and the members of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Pleasant Valley, Texas, have concluded that said area, being contiguous to portions of the Northwest and Southwest corporate limits of said town, and being within the extra-territorial jurisdiction of said town, should therefore be annexed to, so as to be made and constitute a part of, the Town of Pleasant Valley, Texas; and,
Whereas, a public hearing for all interested persons to be heard on the question of annexing the hereinafter described territory should be had and notice of such hearing should be published in a newspaper for not more than twenty (20) days nor less than ten (10) days prior to the date of hearing; and,
Whereas, the notice of said public hearing shall include a description of the three tracts of land as the territory proposed to be annexed and each tract is described as Tracts 1, 2 and 3 as follows:

Tract No. 1
Beginning at a point on the West R/W line of U.S. Highway No. 369, a distance of 600 feet North from its intersection with the North R/W line of U.S. Highway No. 287 for the Southeast corner of this tract;
Thence in a Northwesterly direction along the existing City Limits line approximately 2100 feet parallel with and 600 feet North of the North R/W line of said U.S. Highway No. 287 to a point in the West line of L. F. Miller 136-acre tract for the Southwest corner of this tract;
Thence North along the West line of L. F. Miller 136-acre tract approximately 2750 feet to the Northwest corner of said L. F. Miller tract;
Thence East along the North line of said L. F. Miller tract approximately 2130 feet to a point in the West R/W line of F.M. Highway No. 369 for the Northeast corner of this tract;
Thence South along the West R/W line of said F.M. Highway No. 369 approximately 3180 feet to the place of beginning and containing 145 acres, more or less.

Readers Write

Dear George:
Ever since my family and I came back to America, I have been very concerned for the future of our country. However, that concern has now turned into fear. I fear for the future for all decent people and the future of America as a safe place for decent people to inhabit.

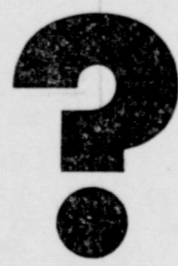

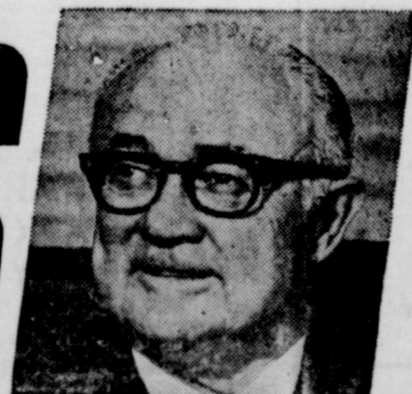

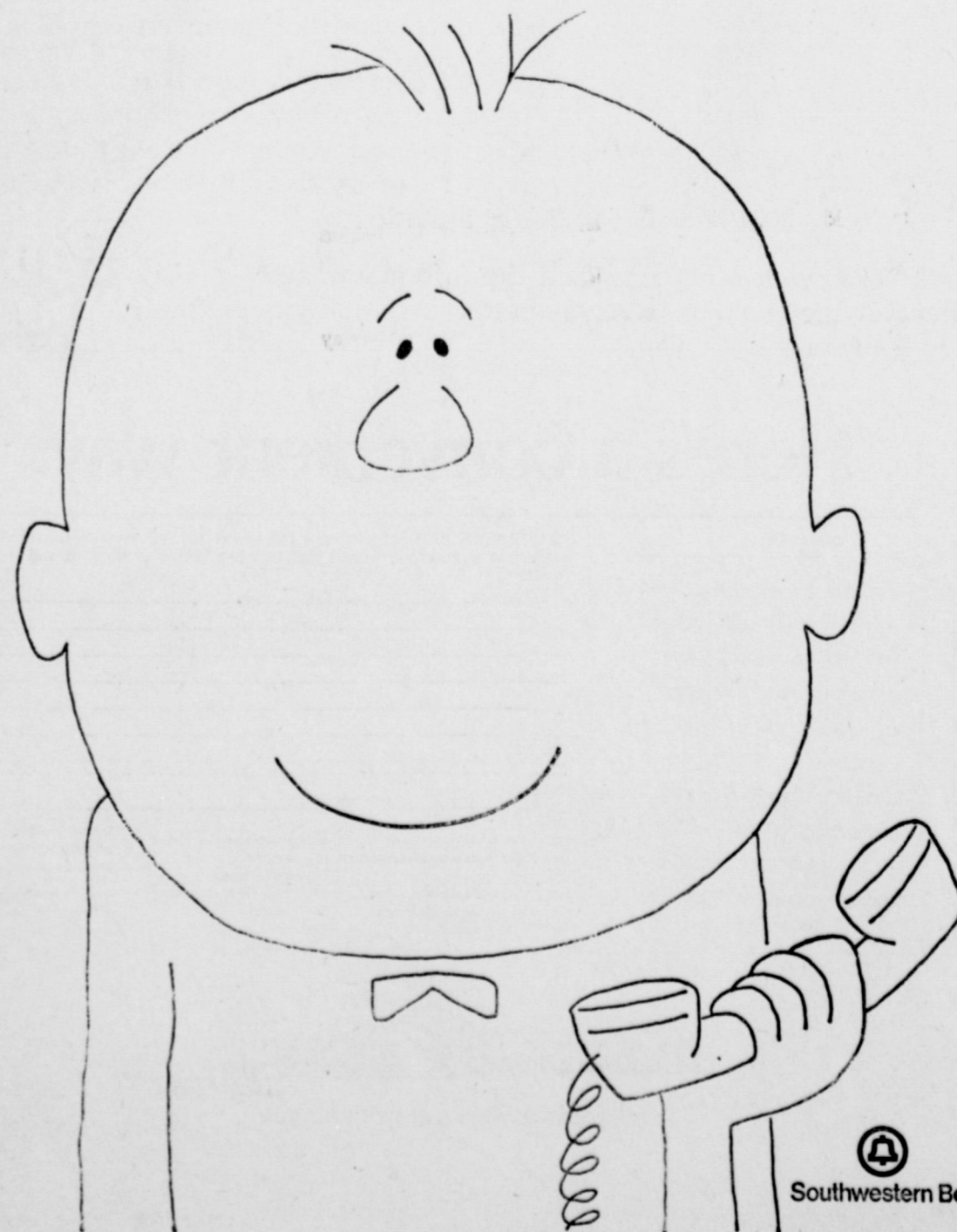
