This Friday at Fort Worth the mighty Hawks will take on the Willis Point Tigers. They have an 11-0-1 record. Only blemish on their record is a 6-6 tie with Kaufman.

The Tigers beat highly touted Mansfield for the bi-district title. Their forte is speed and quickness rather than overall size. They run from an unbalanced line almost exclusively. Their best offense is with No. 44 Tommy Deen. He is a scoring threat with excellent speed. He has gained well over 1000 yards this year. Most of his slashing runs are to the weak or quick side. Hawks hope to stop this threat with Don Harrison and Jackie Perkins up front and Steve Webb backing the line.

No. 37 Calvin Cunigan is the tiger explosive Tiger back. He is fast, hits hard and loves football. He also has recorded over 1000 rushing yards.

No. 10 Ellis Robertson, QB, likes to stay on the ground and drive the ball right at his opponents.

Two 195-lb tackles anchor the Tiger line that is reputed to be quick, agile and aggressive. Coach Ken Davis has several linemen who can run 40 yards in less than 5 seconds.

Tigers have two fine ends in Brad Green and George Deen. Both block well and are dangerous receivers when Robertson decides to throw, which he does well but not often.

Winner of this game will meet Haskell or Childress.

Iowa Park eliminated Clifton in the regional playoff last Friday night at Abilene, 28-12.

The Mean Green jumped into an early lead the first 6½ minutes, scoring 14 points.

Clifton took the opening kickoff and failed to make yardage. The Hawks took their kick and with long and short gains marched up field to paydirt. Greg Frazier got the TD with a 1 yard plurge. Then Lee Dawson kicked the first of his four good PAT tries.

Clifton again couldn't go and kicked. Again the Hawks made a successful bid for touchdown. Jeff McDonald slithering in from 19 yards away.

Before the quarter ended Iowa Park carried the pigskin deep into Clifton territory, only to have it smashed loose and grabbed by a Cub.

The second quarter definitely belonged to Clifton. They launched a 69-yard drive which ended with a 1-yard punch by Joe Wallace.

Again the Hawks started go-ahead and had the ball filched in midfield. Aided by a beautiful fake punt and some penalties, the Cubs reached paydirt again with Dan Canuteson making a 1-yard run.

After the intermission which was enlivened by the marching of Clifton's fine band and the Mean Green Marching Machine, the game took on the familiar appearance of an Iowa Park victory. Clifton never again could make its ground game click, being held to 43 yards of gain throughout the half.

Substituting freely, the Mean Green ran up great chunks of yardage while scoring 7 points in the third stanza with Frazier's 4-yard keeper. And another 7 points with McDonald's 2-yard plurge.

In all, the Hawks lost the ball 4 times by fumbling and 3 times through interceptions. But the total yardage and tight defense overcame those problems.

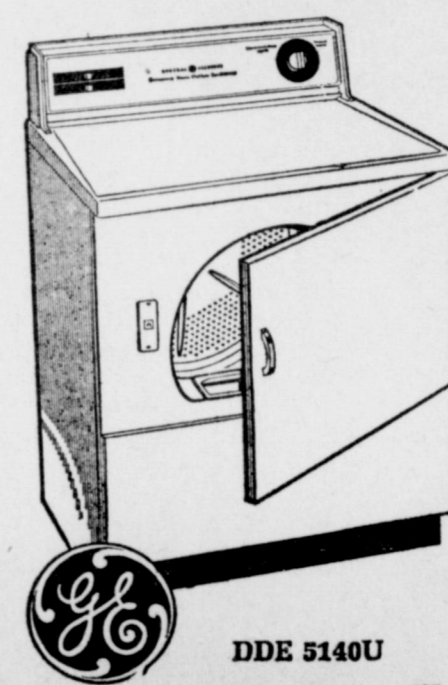
