There are not many uses for an air force F-6 fuel trailer branded for the salvage yard, but three employees of SAFB worked hard and long to make the most out of one.

Born out of the efforts of the Field Maintenance branch and the three civilian workers, a new fire fighting unit and runway foamer have emerged, improving Sheppard's aircraft emergency landing and fire protection capabilities.

Eugene French, fabrication section supervisor; Gilbert Steele, welder; and William Lee, machinist — are responsible for reconstruction of the salvaged fuel trailer into an efficient foam laying and fire fighting unit. Their efforts saved about \$11,000 in construction costs on this particular unit.

French and Steele are citizens of Iowa Park.

Although built as a runway foamer, this apparatus can be used in fire fighting also. A turret is atop the trailer and can be used to extinguish fires on aircraft and even on a building.

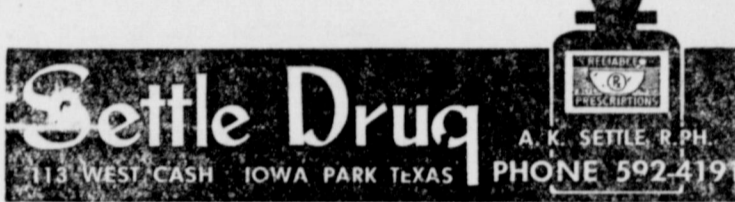
Two of the soloists, Rev. and Mrs. Wilton Goodwin, are friends of the Houses and Yeargans. She was a college roommate of Mrs. House.

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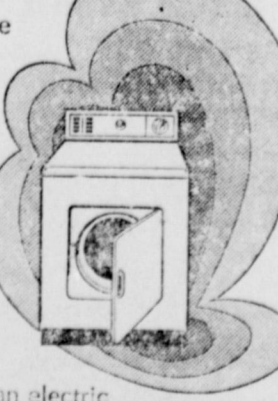


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
