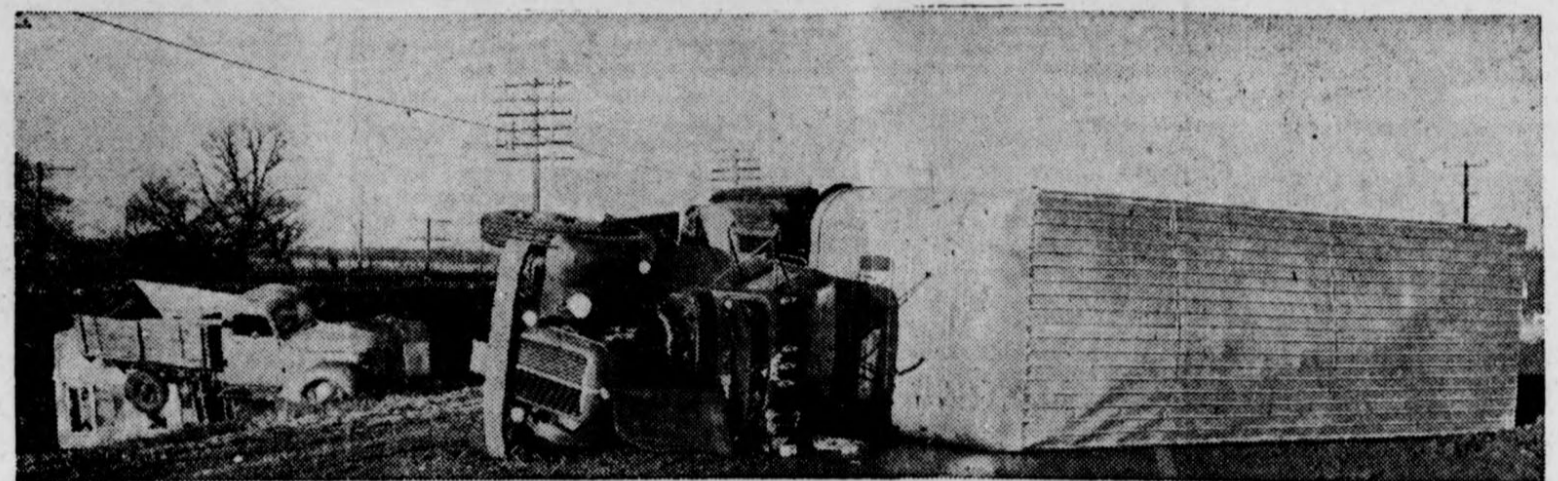

### Truck, Trailer-House Upset Near Town; No Serious Injuries

A huge truck-trailer unit and a truck-house-trailer collided a half-mile east of Iowa Park about 8:00 a.m. Tuesday. One person was injured.

Kent Jackson, 22, of Dallas, passenger in the truck-trailer, received a cut on the back of his head. J. C. Dean, in the armed forces and formerly of Oakley, Kans., was driver of the truck which was pulling the house trailer. Mrs. Dean and her two children were in a car following the trailer house. The Dean family were on their way to Shreveport, La., where

he is being transferred. They had bought the house in Colorado and were taking it to Shreveport for their home. The truck-trailer unit, owned by a Dallas produce company and loaded with onions, fell on its side and blocked east-bound traffic for more than an hour. The house trailer fell on its top in a ditch at the side of the road.

The Dean truck remained upright and is shown above suspended between the edge of the ditch and the bottom of the house trailer. Both machines were headed toward Wichita Falls on Highway 287. The produce truck apparently got off the slab and went out of control, whipping the house trailer into the ditch and upsetting.

In preparation for next Tuesday's opener here with Archer City, the girls have entered the Burk tournament to be run off Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week.

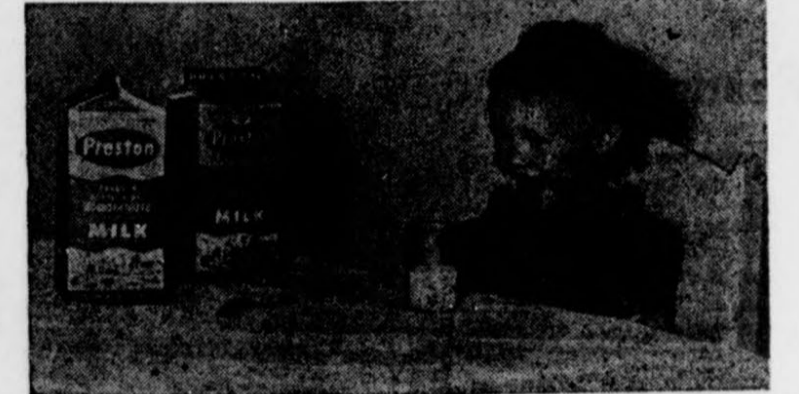
Friday, Jan. 14, the boys and girls teams will play Valley View on the Warriors' home court.

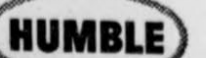
