Brennan on the Bayou

A recent issue of Southern Living magazine carried a fine feature on Houston. In the article you can read a bit of the city's history, how industry has expanded, what exciting things are happening in the theater, and which nightspots to visit. You can learn who is responsible for Houston's government, growth and youthful look.

All that is both informative and as far as I know accurate. What's wrong is that a few items of note were omitted, such as the enormous world-renowned medical center and a whole gaggle of colleges and universities.

Those are good features overlooked. Dare we admit that Houston might be lacking in some areas of concern? Take for instance the school system. Please take it. I would no more send a child of mine to a public school in Houston than put arsenic in his peanut butter. Nor would I teach in the system. Remind me to tell you exactly why sometime.

Take also the air. What's left of it more often than not a thick brown murk—not at all the crystal clear blue shown in photographs. You may have the water too if you don't mind a dose of cyanide in your tea. And you might want to know the whole area is sinking because of underground industrial pumping, resulting in prematurely aged homes and flood-prone residential areas.

We'll not even mention the crime rate, insurance rates, or unemployment, but for some relief we could talk about our professional sports teams and intricate freeway system.

Sour grapes? Not at all. This has been home to my family for 30 years. My complaint is that feature articles tend to be lopsided, presenting only the desirable aspects of a given place. The chambers of commerce do the same thing, and in either case, it is unfair to the reader.

People considering a move or even a brief visit deserve to know in advance what to expect so they can either change their plans or prepare to cope with the negatives.

Houston does not stand alone with its problems. City life is complicated, always has been, always will be. There are people trying to make constructive changes so that residents and visitors can more fully enjoy the beauty and progress of cities. It's just that some are succeeding more rapidly than others; and Houston is a bit slow on some vital projects.

The author of the article emphasized one point; Houston has a history of determined effort, accomplishing all its goals one way or another, regardless of the price tag. I wish them well and give my whole-hearted support. Houston and its people are worth the effort that has been and will be expended to make the city even more beautiful than it already is. Come see for yourself. Wear your sunglasses but don't forget your raincoat.

We appreciate the following report by Mrs. Elmo Traylor on the trip to Hawaii she and her sister Mrs. Emma Gauntt made.

We met the Textour Group at the Love Field Airport at 1:00 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 21.

The 747 we were to have been on was grounded for inspection, so the group of over 150 was divided and put on two 707's. We were lucky and got on the first flight and arrived in Honolulu at 6:00 p.m. their time.

We were met by a representative of the tour who was a very happy Hawaiian host called Elliott. We were greeted with a lei of orchids and carnations around our necks and a kiss on the cheek.

Directed to our buses which were our means of transportation while we were here, we went to Ho'el Sheraton Waikiki and were assigned to rooms. This was our home away from home.

We had a beautiful flight over as it was daylight all the way and the Captain pointed out many things for us to see. The Christmas lights were fabulous. Each building and hotel was outlined with many-colored lights. They seem to celebrate as much as or more than we do.

We met Friday morning at 8:30 with our Hawaiian host. He briefed us on our trips on the island and we were then free until 7:00 p.m. to shop or do as we pleased. We took a city bus to the Ala Moana Shopping Mall which they claim is the largest in the world and after spending the day and not covering half of it, I have no reason to doubt them.

As we boarded the bus to the Mall to our surprise the driver asked if we had a Medicare Card and this time we didn't mind our age as we only had to show the card to ride the city buses free.

That night the group was taken to the C'est Sibon club where we were served a delicious dinner and entertained by the Surfers; then we were transferred to Duke Kahanamoku's club where we were entertained by Zulu, who is a detective with Hawaii Five-O, and the Hula girls and fire dancer.

Saturday morning we boarded buses for a trip to the University of Hawaii, to Robert Louis Stevenson's original grass shack at the Waioli Tea Room, to the Punchbowl National Cemetery where many of the men who lost their lives in the attack of Pearl Harbor are buried. Ernie Pyle is also buried there. The natives were decorating the graves of loved ones for Christmas.

On to the Iolani Palace and the State Capitol of which they are very proud. At 1:25 we were on a tour of the Polynesian Cultural Center. We were entertained by the different tribes on the island by their songs and dances as they floated down stream on rafts. We

then rode through the Center on a tram to a Polynesian Restaurant for dinner, after which a program portraying their history in song and dance was presented in a large outdoor theater.

Sunday morning we left for Kewalo Basin aboard the ship Leilani for a cruise through Honolulu Harbor into Pearl Harbor to see the battleships Arizona and Utah and the Arizona Memorial.

It was hard to believe that so many of our sailors are still in the hulls of the ships, as we could see tips of the ships under water.

At 1:00 p.m. we boarded buses for the Oceanic Sea Life Park tour which included the tropical countryside of windward Oahu, Makapuu Point, Koko Head Crater Blow Hole and Hanauma Bay. We were entertained with a porpoise show.

Christmas was a free day so we called George and Delores Fairchilds who lived in Iowa Park for several years while he was stationed at Sheppard and they are now stationed at Hickam AFB. They came to the hotel and we spent several hours telling them all about the old home town.

Tuesday morning we again went on a bus trip to Kodak Hula and Paradise Park. We had lunch in Paradise Park and then saw the exotic birds perform. In the park the birds and flowers are beautiful.

At 10:30 p.m. we walked over to the Polynesian Palace where we watched the Don Ho Show. He and his two sons and many dancers put on quite a show which we enjoyed very much. Our group was so large he wanted to know if we left any Texans at home.

Our bus drivers were so happy and entertained us on the bus with songs and jokes. We all had to sing with them. All the people of Hawaii seem to be very happy, friendly and very patriotic and are proud to be part of the United States. They refer to us as the Mainland.

Wednesday morning we had to have our luggage inspected and checked and our seats on the plane assigned, which this time was a 747. We had our last meal on top of a tall building in a revolving restaurant. We left Honolulu around 7:00 p.m. Elliott, our source of information, was there to see we were all there and bid us Aloha with a kiss on the cheek. We arrived in Dallas about 6:00 Thursday morning.

Our group became as one big happy family and we spent a Christmas we will long remember.

Mr. and Mrs. Bill Stewart and family came Christmas Day and took his sister Mrs. Floyd Busby to their home in Wichita Falls for Christmas dinner. She fell last Friday night at her home and broke two bones in her left arm. She is now at home.

Mrs. Effie Blair of Mankins died Friday in a Wichita Falls hospital. She had been a resident of Archer county since 1919.

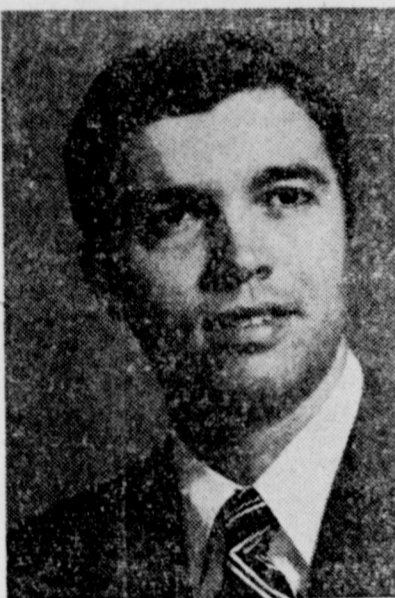
Funeral service and burial were conducted in Wichita Falls with interment in Crestview.

The worship service will also include a time of re-dedication for participation in "Key 73, Winning a Continent for Christ."

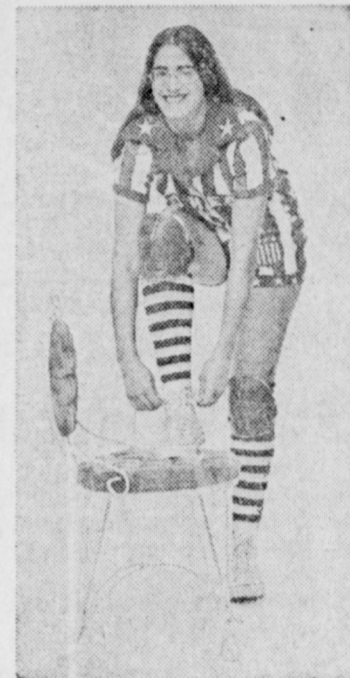

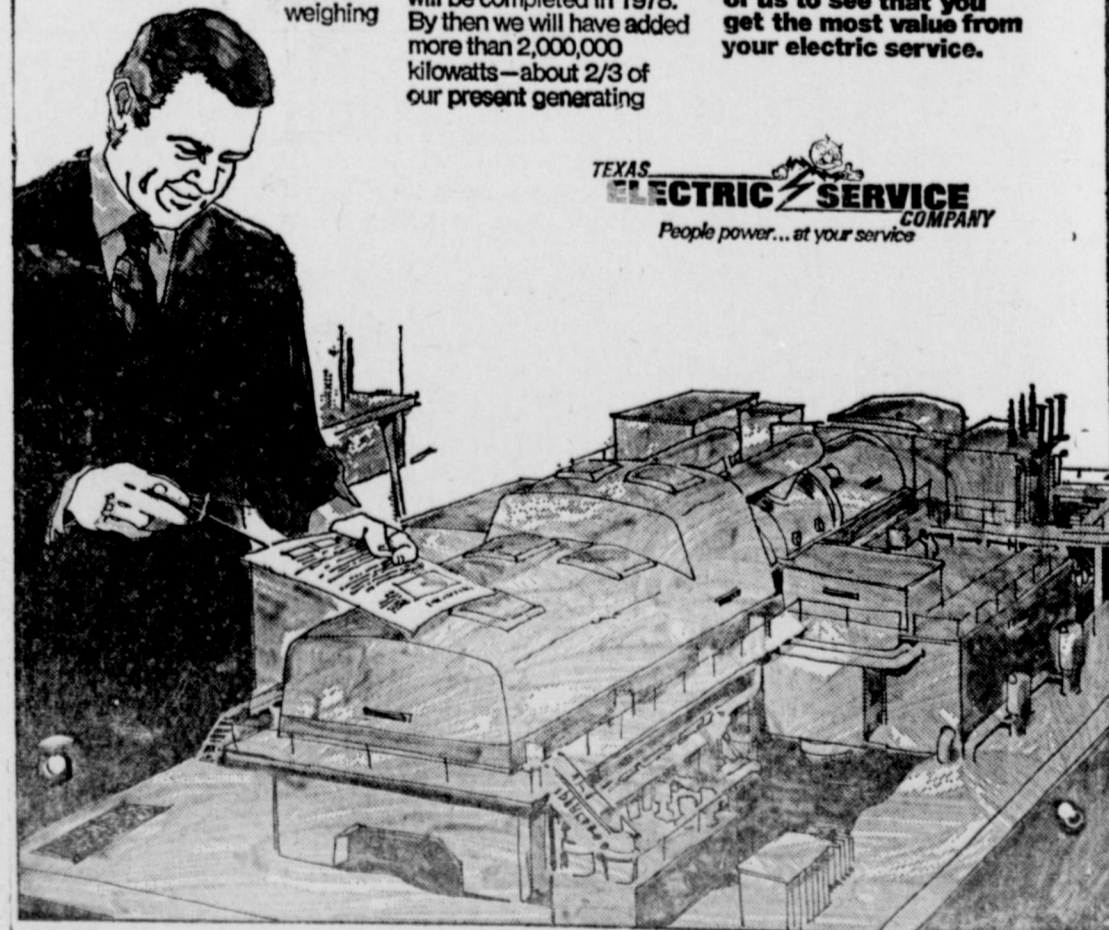

HOW TO SAVE MONEY ON TAXES

A fortune is lost needlessly every year because many taxpayers are simply unaware of how much they spent on prescription drugs, how much actually went for sales and gasoline taxes, or how much went for other deductible items.

You can also reduce your Federal Tax bill by deducting some of your local and State taxes. Which ones? Any tax you deduct must meet these three tests:

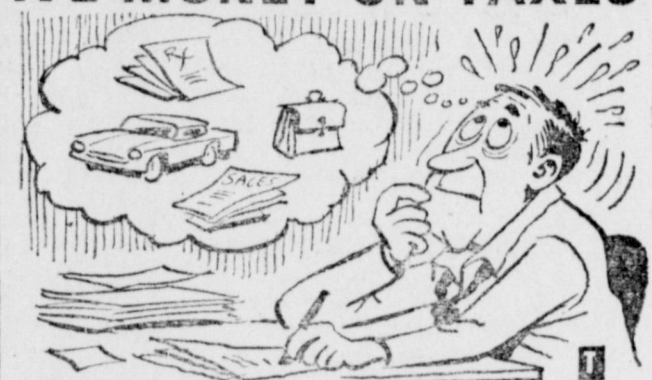
1) The payment is legally a tax. Charges for governmental services—municipal water bills, parking meter charges, sewer fees and service fees are not true taxes. They count as personal expenses, not deductible by one who is not in business.

Other non-deductibles in this category: postage, hunting, fishing or dog licenses, automobile inspections and title registration. But payments for State licenses for an automobile and for an operator are deductible. A city permit to build a personal residence is not a deductible tax but an additional building cost.

2) The tax was imposed on you and you paid it. Real estate and school taxes on your own property are deductible. But if you paid the taxes on a relative's property, they're not your obligation. However, you can get a deduction for real estate taxes without meeting this condition when you buy or sell realty.

3) The tax is not one of the following. You can't deduct: Federal income taxes, including Social Security taxes paid by the self-employed or withheld from your wages. But state and city income taxes are deductible from your federal tax return.

Federal excise taxes, including admission, telephone, telegraph, transportation, club dues, custom duties, passport fees, and the employer's por-



tion of the Social Security tax paid for a domestic employee. The only exception to the rule: you may deduct excises if they are paid as an ordinary and necessary expense in your business or in production of your income.

Federal stamp taxes on sales or securities or real estate, if you're not a dealer. Though you can't deduct these, you can take them into account in computing gains or losses for the sales. But both dealer and non-dealers can deduct State stamp taxes on security and property deals.

Estate, inheritance, legacy, succession or gift taxes imposed by the federal, state or municipal government.

You can deduct all State and local taxes imposed on you, the customer. The deductible retail sales tax includes any tax imposed on anyone who retails personal property or services—even if the tax isn't specifically labeled a sales tax. If the sales tax is imposed on the retailer, you can deduct it anyway if you paid it and if the tax was added to the sales price and charged to a separate item.

How do you figure your deduction for State and local sales taxes? Estimate how much you spent for taxed items during the year. Then multiply this amount by the sales tax percentage to get your

estimated sales tax paid.

Your state's gasoline tax is an allowable deduction. Here is how you figure the deduction. Estimate the number of miles you drove your car last year. Divide that by the average number of miles your car runs per gallon of gasoline to find the total gallons bought. Then multiply by the tax per gallon. If you don't know the exact amount of some taxes you've paid, you might be allowed to deduct a reasonable estimate.

The problem most of us face is saving the appropriate receipts which represent tax deductible purchases.

One way of solving this particular problem is by centralizing your source of receipts through the use of charge cards. At the end of the month, one bill is received with all the receipts grouped together and you can categorize those payments that may be deductible.

The bank card, then, actually has become a convenience for record keeping and tax purposes. Furthermore, more and more individuals are using charge cards, such as Master Charge, to get cash advances to pay federal, state, and local taxes.

Also, many companies which prepare tax forms permit consumers to pay for the service with their card.

Title Insurance Also Helps Buyer

Before you close a real estate purchase, it's important to be aware that the title insurance usually required by the mortgage lender also can be written to safeguard you, the buyer. Here are some basic facts.

Title insurance, available for a one-time premium paid at closing, safeguards you against possible problems originating before the title to a piece of real estate is transferred to you.

A. W. Long transferred to you. It includes a search of separately-located public records for land title defects affecting your ownership, such as an unsatisfied mortgage or an unpaid special assessment. And, title insurance protects against defects including those even the most thorough search won't reveal, such as a mistake in the records or a forged deed that transfers no title to real estate.

The coverage of title insurance includes payment of claims proved to be valid and cost of a defense against an attack on a title as insured. Title insurance remains in effect as long as you or your heirs have an interest in the real estate concerned.

There are two basic types of title insurance: owner's and lender's. It takes owner's coverage to protect the home buyer. Before a real estate purchase is completed, a new search and new title insurance are desirable for the new owner. Through updating these services, the new owner will be informed on problems found on the public record that have arisen since title to the property last was transferred — and will be financially protected against hidden land-title defects.
