## City Hosts Feed for Firemen

"No one has ever been honored for what he has received. Honor is given for what one has shared," was the quotation expressed by Mayor E. F. Soell as he introduced the program Monday evening when volunteer firemen were guests of the City at an appreciation banquet in the ASCS building.

Feature of the program was a presentation of "Narcotics and Drug Abuse" by Walter Wood of Dallas, who works with the narcotics division of the Department of Public Safety. Accompanying the speaker was Johnny Koonce of Wichita Falls, also a member of the Dallas division.

By use of a display case of dangerous drugs, showing a film in color of the plants and products, and questions from the audience, Wood presented a realistic picture of the problem. He stated that heroin, a morphine derivative, is perhaps the worst narcotic. There is no known medical use for it. It leaves its victims at a "point of no return" quicker than all other drugs.

Each one present was given a leaflet entitled "Problems of Identification: Common Symptoms of Drug Abuse." As part of the program, Koonce set fire to some marijuana to familiarize the group with its smell as an aid to identification. They were surprised to see pictures of the plant growing to the height of 20 feet.

Explanation was also made of some benefits from drugs when administered under prescription of physicians.

The meeting opened with prayer of invocation by O. R. Ackerman. The mayor introduced guests: Fire marshal Van Pelt of Wichita Falls and two retired members and their wives Mr. and Mrs. Ross Smith of Jacksboro and Mr. and Mrs. Miles L. Hines.

Camp Fire girls and Blue Birds had made chubby firemen paperdolls wearing red hats; and red fire-trucks, which made attractive decoration for the banquet tables. More than 50 were present for the food and fellowship.

## Vocation Building Needed

Following an in-depth discussion on what needs in the school system should take priority at this time, trustees of Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District decided Tuesday evening that a vocation building would do more than anything else to provide classroom space and additional electives for the high school within the next year.

Chairman Cecil Streich appointed a committee to figure construction costs and financing possibilities for such a project. Stanley Williamson will be chairman with T. C. Berry, J. O. McCullough, C. E. Myers as members. They were asked particularly to explore ways of making vocational facilities available without a bond issue.

The importance of this move was pointed out by Supt. Faris Nowel when he stated that the tendency now is toward requiring some vocational credit of each student who finishes high school.

Provision was also made for erecting a lighted bulletin board on the campus of the high school by members of the Building and Trades class.

Other board members present were Hoyt Watson, Robert Wilcox, and T. C. Berry, Tax Assessor and Collector. Bill Steger answered questions relating to the current budget.

Mrs. George Roy and Leo Knezek, school patrons, spoke words of commendation for Band Director Larry Kingsley. The board voted to reimburse Kingsley \$500 on the 1970 season expenses.

A special meeting will be convened soon.

**The Art of Belgian Lace**



Lace, that gossamer embellishment on nature's cobweb, has always exerted an irresistible attraction. Belgium, where bobbin lace began, was and still remains famous for its lace. Bruges has remained the center of the industry and in the past four centuries the tools and working methods have undergone very little change.

Bobbin lace is woven over stiff parchment on which the pattern is marked. The number of threaded bobbins varies from 4 to 1200 or more. Bobbin lace, worked on cushions 7 inches thick, is divided into Straight Lace (executed on a square cushion with a particular number of bobbins), and Free Lace (executed on a round cushion where

the number of bobbins varies with the work).

Just as in olden times the lacemakers of Bruges can be seen sitting at their doorsteps, in picturesque little streets. Engraved in their work, they safeguard one of the artistic heritages and touristic attractions of Flanders, the art of Belgian lace. SABENA Belgian World Airlines' jets fly to Brussels daily from New York, and Bruges is just 61 miles from Brussels.

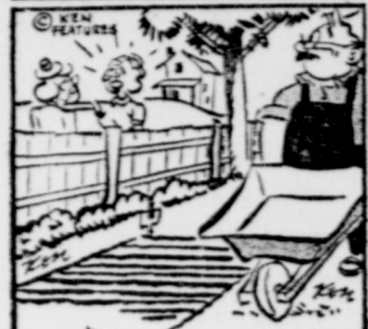

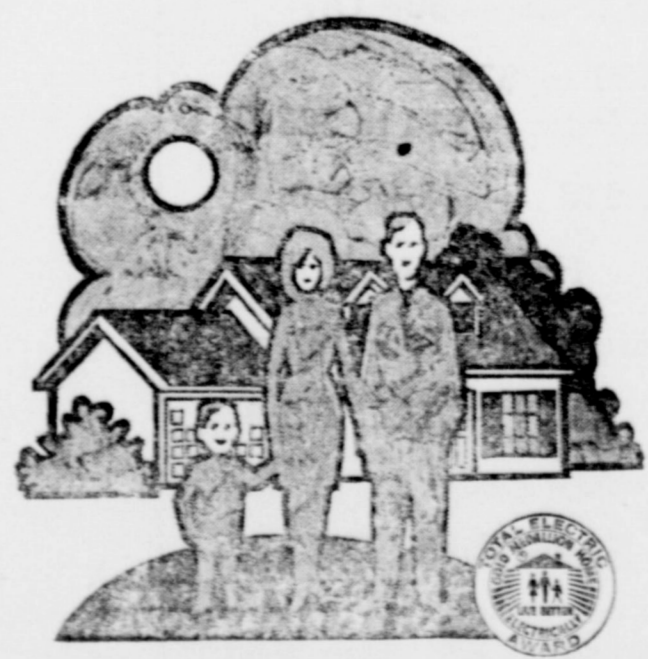

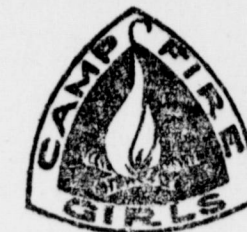
