A check for Iowa Park's share in proceeds of the Refugio game reached Supt. Faris Nowell's office this week from Waco. It was for \$4,780.85, which will be added to the Athletic Fund. A major part of the expense of athletic programs in junior high and senior high comes from the football program. Gate receipts from the game at Waco were \$11,128.70. Expenses included \$300 to officials, to UIL \$34.65, expenses while at Waco \$904.34, leaving the net to be divided \$9561.71.

## Urban Renewal Discussed

Bob Hamilton went to Dallas last Friday to learn what he could concerning Urban Renewal from government officials located there. He brought back considerable information and told it to an interested group of citizens Monday evening, meeting in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Urban renewal has several different phases, most of which are performed on a voluntary basis. The parts of interest to Iowa Park folk are in three categories:

1. A program of residential renewal which can bring sub-standard homes up to standard at no cost to the owners or renters. In some cities this might necessitate buying the old home and finding a better one for the family at no cost to the family. Renters can often get the same program of upgrading their homes.

This program is not to be confused with charity. Owners and renters who receive these benefits are entitled to these upgraded facilities because of the federal program of which the city is a part, provided the citizens vote favorably on the Urban Renewal proposition April 5.

2. The City will be permitted to receive federal help on street repairs and improvements, water and sewer extensions and improvements.

3. Business buildings in the city can be brought up to standard with very little outlay of money by the property owner or renter. And much of the money can be borrowed for 3 per cent interest.

None of this work will be undertaken until HUD has made an official investigation of the town's needs, and then the city and each individual must be willing to go into the program.

There are many unanswered questions about Urban Renewal, and most of the answers will not be made until the program is actually approved and proposals for renewing Our Town are submitted, first to HUD and then to the citizens.

The whole deal will have to stand or fall on our faith in the leaders, and our willingness to cooperate and work together for the betterment of Iowa Park.

We hope to have more information to share with our readers by next week.—GRH

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## Garden Club

Iowa Park Garden club met Friday in the home of Mrs. W. A. Black with Mrs. Delbert Todd as co-hostess. Mrs. Dick Reilly, president, called for reports from officers and chairmen.

Members of the Garden club judged Conservation Posters made by pupils at Bradford and Valley View elementary schools.

Jimmy Howell, vocational agriculture teacher of IPHS, was introduced by Mrs. Todd. He gave many good ideas on how to take care of yards and plants.

He said the soil in this area is quite acid, and suggested use of iron sulphate in the soil that is watered with Iowa Park water.

Mr. Howell feels that phosphorus is greatly under-rated. It is important to use phosphorus to make plants bloom.

To have more tomatoes develop on your plants, be sure to shake them often. Use fertilizer just before they bloom. And never plant tomatoes in the same place year after year.

Plants whose older leaves are turning yellow between the veins probably are in need of nitrogen. For new plants, use super-phosphate and peat moss. He urged members to use lots of peat moss; in fact, he said it is as important to use peat moss as fertilizer.

Mr. Howell told about pecan trees. If the leaves are turning yellow on the new growth, the trees need zinc. And for a larger crop of fruit, fertilize just before they bloom. Be sure to fertilize around the drip of the tree. (Or "outside edge" to us amateurs.)

Never fertilize any new plant or tree at the time you plant it. Wait until it takes hold, because a new plant or tree goes through a stage of shock until it starts to take root.

The teacher told Garden club members his students will have plants for sale at the greenhouse at Virgil Woodfin's home after about April 15. This is to help pay some of the expenses of the class.

He is trying to put their project on a paying basis.

Plants available after April 15 will be petunias, marigolds, peppers, tomatoes, periwinkles, rose moss, salvia and many others.

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### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Development Board shall pre-approve such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

"(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Since the Bermuda planting season is near, it is important that we know what we are doing and how and why:

**PLANTING—**  
A firm seedbed with plenty of moisture will get grass off to a running start. If irrigation is used, pre-irrigate when needed. The new planting should get a rain or be irrigated soon after planting.

**FERTILIZER—**  
First step should be soil testing. Follow with complete fertilizer when needed, working fertilizer into top three inches of soil. Generally, nitrogen should not be applied until after the grass has started to grow and run. Soon after sprigs begin to grow, put out nitrogen and keep watering.

**SPRIG CONDITION**  
Sprigs should be alive and healthy. Planting poor quality sprigs is the greatest single cause of poor stands. They should be kept moist and covered until used. Usually 48 hours is long enough to keep them. Sprig exposure should be at a minimum. Even short periods of exposure reduce germination.

The most critical period is between noon and 5:00 p.m. This is the period when reduction in germination is most likely to occur.

**WEED CONTROL**  
In early stages of growth, weeds may be controlled by the common tillage practices. The latest and most promising development for handling weeds in newly sprigged Bermuda is application of Simazine, which is a pre-emergence herbicide. Simazine should be applied after sprigging and before germination of weed and grass seed.

**Three things grass planting can do for you and your soil:**  
1. Protect the soil.  
2. Conserve water  
3. Improve soil tilth and fertility.

Trees planted around the home can be more than objects of beauty! Properly located, trees and shrubs can form a barrier to the cold blast of winter winds and the hot, drying winds of summer.

Houses, barns and livestock enclosures are more comfortable if a barrier of trees nearby deflects the winds.

Windbreaks are an investment in Better Living few can afford to be without in Texas. Applications for windbreak planting stock are available from your County Agricultural Agent and from Soil Conservation District office.

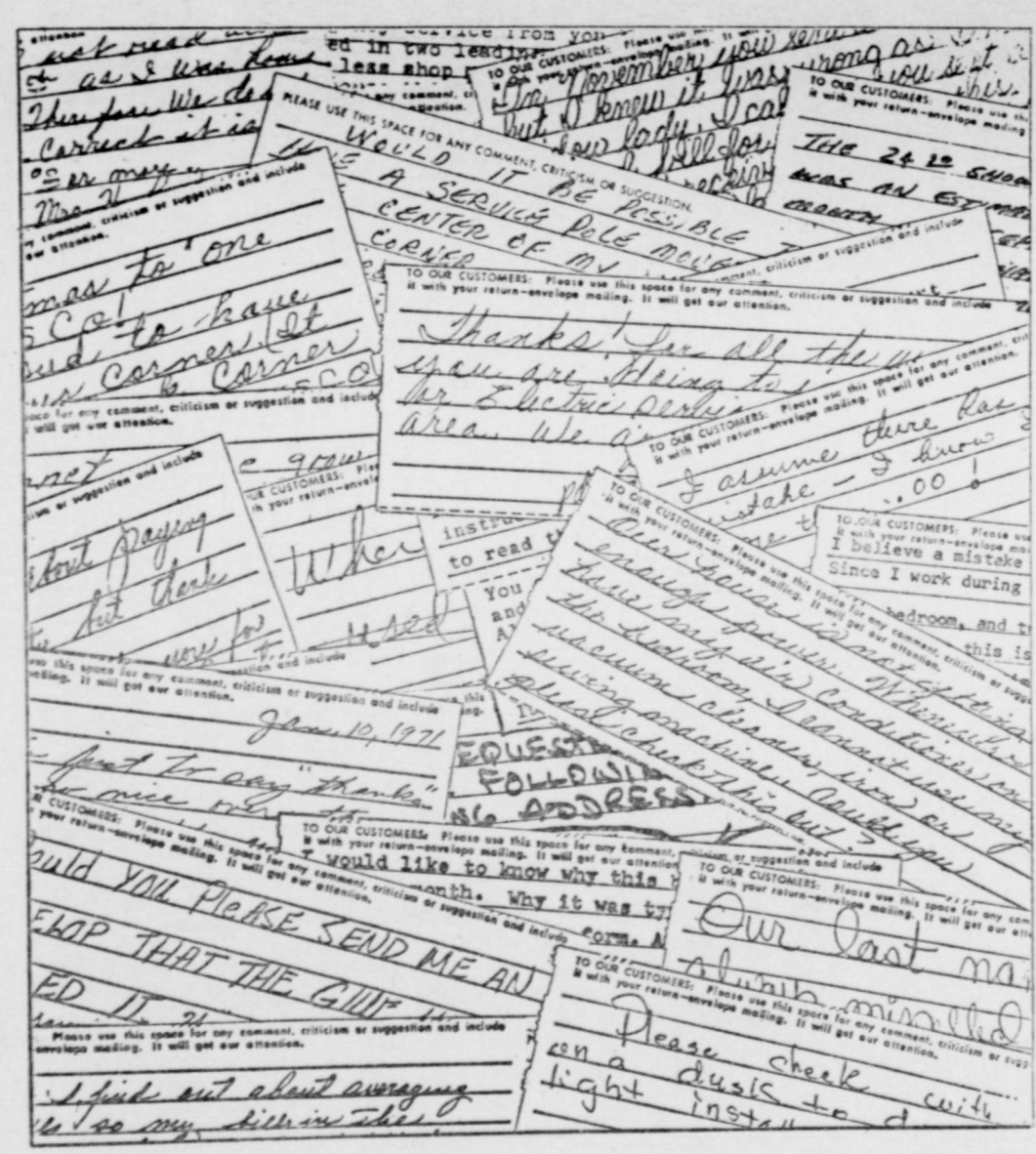

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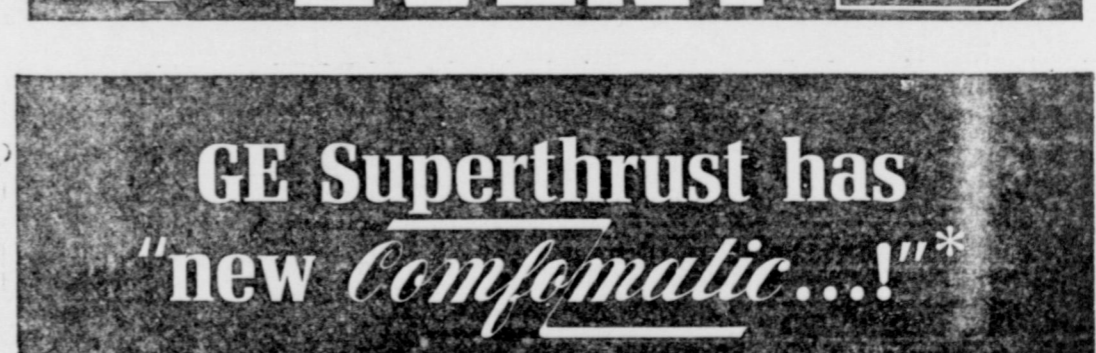

## Do You Ask...

What happened to the bonds we voted?

Authority was voted to sell bonds for Water and Sewer Improvements. The bonds for sewer plant improvements have been sold and the money is invested in interest earning certificates of deposit until such time as the Federal Government approves our plans and specifications and authorizes us to take bids on the proposed plants.

When the bids are taken, if at least one acceptable bid is within the allocated money, then a bid can be awarded by the City Council and the work can be started.

This project is one in which the Federal Government shares in the cost through state channels, therefore the Feds want to know that their money is spent wisely.

What happened to the Water Bonds?

They can be sold anytime. We were not so fortunate in this endeavor in that the Federal Government's share of the cost of the water system expansion has not

been funded. That is, the money for their share is not there yet. However, our application was accepted and approved, but now we must wait our turn at the money mill along with others, some of whom are ahead of us, some are about even with us in the race for Federal Grants, and some are behind us. Indeed, some have been denied.

It is then, either a choice of paying the whole bill for the water improvements ourselves, or a choice of waiting our turn for funding to put the money there.

Mayor Soell and the City Council believe you would rather wait for the Federal share. Have they guessed right?

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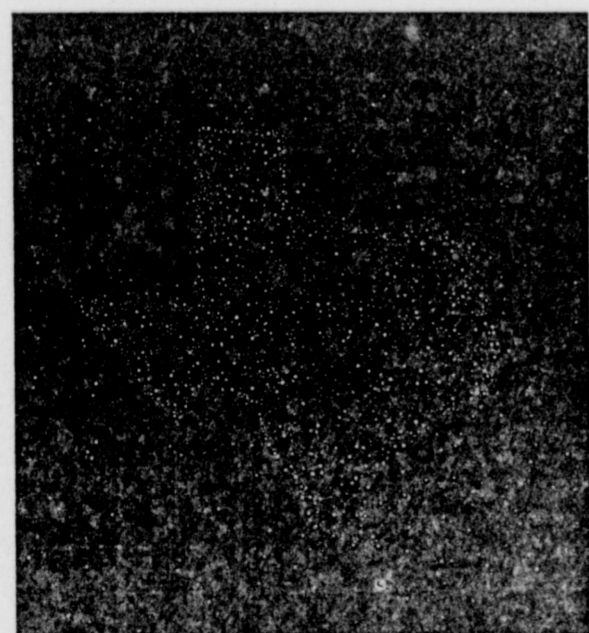
