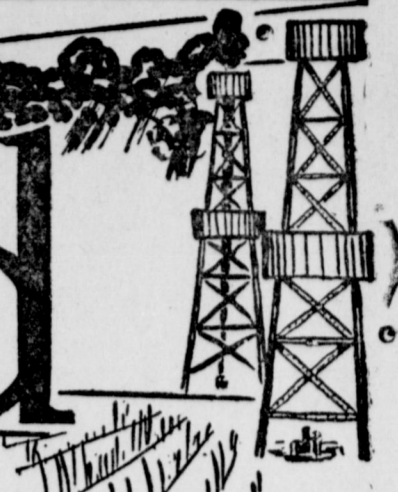

City to Receive \$103,950 Aid on Sewer Job

The Iowa Park Herald received a government paid telegram from Washington, D.C., Tuesday afternoon, which stated:

"Environmental Protection Agency Today Approved \$103,950 grant to City of Iowa Park for Construction of a Contact Stabilization Plant. Total Cost of Project is \$315,000."

Voters authorized the sale of \$315,000 of bonds in the immediate past for this purpose. The City Council has sold about \$225,000 of the bonds. This government assistance will assure the project can be started soon.

School Growth Forecast

An agenda of multitudinous items confronted a group of conscientious public servants when the school board of Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District met at the administration building Tuesday evening. President Cecil Streich directed deliberations. Other board members present were Jesse McCullough, T. C. Berry, Stanley Williamson, Robert Wilcox and Hoyt Watson. Also present were Supt. Faris Nowell, Principal Bob Dawson, Tax man Bill Steger, Lawyer Dustin Fillmore; and several visitors.

At request of the board, Bob Pardue and Don Read, architects and engineers, displayed and interpreted a number of blueprints showing future possibilities for additional construction at all four plants in the system. Nothing is being set up for now, but the look into the future included more classrooms for Kidwell and Bradford, a facility to handle three grades, with a library in the center and a cafeteria by renovating an existing building, and additions ranging from 6 to 16 rooms at high school and use of existing space at Valley View.

The blueprints are on display in the Administration Building. Any interested patron is invited to study them.

Days for the meeting of Board of Equalization were set: Aug. 10, when local property will be considered; and oil property and industrial evaluations on Aug. 11.

Vocational building plans have been laid out, plumbing to be put in soon, and decisions must be made soon as to new courses to be offered next year. It was decided that two would be added to the curriculum. Dawson was instructed to conduct a survey to courses would meet the most immediate needs. Possibility is that one for girls and another for boys will be chosen.

The board adopted the policy of parental involvement in Title I, ESA, Remedial Reading Project, whereby a teacher will devote her time to students who need special help outside the regular class schedule, with the idea that they may be enrolled with the regular class later on.

Driver Education survey reveals that 190 students want the course. It was voted to accept the use of a car free furnished by Baggett-Bridwell of Wichita Falls, one from Shaw Motor of Iowa Park, and two from Longhorn Chevrolet of Wichita Falls.

Fee will be \$50 per student and perhaps four teachers will be required to meet the demand.

Keith Wynn's salary was raised to \$325 a month & Gerald Franks was raised to \$240 an hour.

A speech therapist for next year has been hired and will be functioning under the same program as are the Special Education teachers.

23 Study Club

The beauty of our state came alive for members of the 23 Study Club Thursday when Texas Heritage Day was observed in the program at the home of Mrs. Fred W. Croyer. Mrs. N. E. McKinney was co-hostess.

A display of Texas wild flowers in water color, done by Mrs. Earl Watson, greeted the guests when they entered the living room. All were varieties grown in our yards and often clasped as weeds by some . . . yellow flax, Texas thistle, thelesperma, spider wart, firewheel, rain lily, and devil's claw.

Mrs. D. O. James described the Big Bend Park as the last great wilderness in the state and as a museum of Western saga. Park and not artificial, with 850 varieties of flowers. The mountainous areas are the result of volcanic action.

Palo Duro Canyon, the largest in Texas, acquired as a park in 1933, was the subject presented by Mrs. C. E. Birk. It has become of interest to Iowa Park folk the past two years as the setting for the drama 'Texas' by Paul Green in which our John King has been a leading performer.

The story of the development of the oldest businesses in Texas, the propagation of roses, was told by Mrs. M. L. Hines. She talked on "Tyler, Rose Capital of Texas," using material prepared by Mrs. Lester E. Brooks. In the beginning the nurserymen grew fruit trees, with special attention to the peach. Blight almost destroyed that phase of the industry and caused the shift to roses. Tyler now ships plants to 48 states and 25 foreign countries.

Mrs. T. M. Thaxton was program leader. Mrs. W. G. Steele gave the meditation, basing her talk on passages in the Psalms depicting the beauties of nature. Lovely nosegays made up as small corsages were plate favors. Miss Ethyle Kidwell, club president, poured coffee at the attractive refreshment table.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21) Special Election May 18, 1971.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to the Texas Constitution providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

Whereas, in older portions of the City, particularly the central business section of the City, aging of the buildings has become critical and extremely detrimental and destructive to the business life of the City and to the comfort, health, welfare, safety and morals of homelife in other older portions of the City; and

Whereas, there is available to the residents and citizens of this

City, Federal funds to which our residents and citizens have contributed for just such use; and

Whereas, the residents and citizens of this City are as much entitled to the use of these funds as any other of the many cities of the United States who have made and who are making progressive use of such funds; and,

Whereas, it is the belief of the City Council that the need for such funds is urgent and beneficial to the City, we do hereby certify to you that in order for such funds to be available for renewal of our community, there must be passed an ordinance authorizing an agency under the direction of the City Council to perform the duties of City Government in this respect; and,

Whereas, non-cash credits in a material amount will be lost this year of 1971 if this ordinance and agency is not adopted; and,

Whereas, with the use of those non-cash credits plus Federal grants no tax increases are anticipated for community renewal and betterments,

Whereas, the City Council of said City deems it advisable to order an election for the purpose of submitting to the resident qualified voters of said City the question: "Do the resident qualified voters of the said City wish to adopt a locally administered Urban Renewal Agency within the City?"

PROPOSITION

(FOR) The adoption of (AGAINST) an ordinance creating a locally administered Urban Renewal Agency within the City.

Said election shall be held at the following places in said City and the following named persons are hereby appointed Presiding Judges and Alternating Presiding Judges for said election:

In Election Precinct No. 32 (1) at Ethyle Kidwell Elementary

School Building in said City, with Mary (Dale) Thompson as Presiding Judge, and Mrs. Ray Ackerman as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist her.

In Election Precinct No. 33 (2) at W. R. Bradford Elementary School Building in said City, with Mrs. Ruth Gard as Presiding Judge, and Mrs. Eldon Thompson as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist her.

The polls at each of the above designated polling places shall on said election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

K. G. Wilks, City Secretary, is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Mrs. Virgil Woodfin and Mrs. Orange Lester are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at City Hall within said City and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 26th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the words "Official Ballot" and the following: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR The Adoption of an ordinance creating a locally administered Urban Renewal Agency within the City.

AGAINST The Adoption of an ordinance creating a locally administered Urban Renewal Agency within the City.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 28,

Vernon's Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, Revision of 1925, as amended, and none but resident qualified voters of said City shall be allowed to vote at said election.

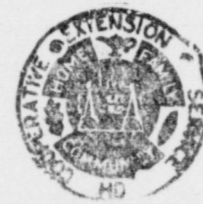
Center of attraction in decorations was a picture of the prospective bride and groom in an arch of pink roses on a white cloth covering the registry table.
