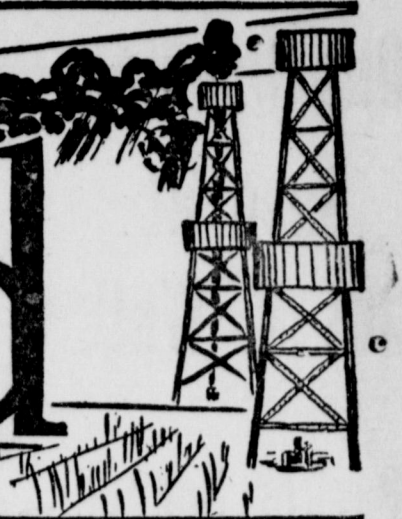

"I can't think of anything to say right now."

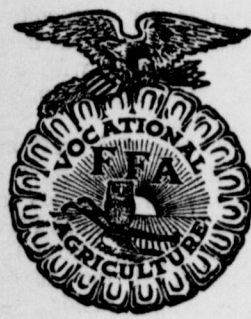
"Sincerely, Alice."

Clean-up Campaign Apr 23-30

Whereas, Iowa Park, the Town of Friendly Living, is our home, and,

Whereas, it is highly desirable for our town and community to be as beautiful as we can possibly make it, and,

Whereas, during the Clean-up, Fix-up campaign in the Spring of 1970, many if not most of the citizens of Iowa Park participated gladly in a Clean-up Fix-up campaign which resulted in a marked improvement in our community, and,

Whereas, with the passage of time, litter and debris and weeds and other unattractive conditions have again arisen in our community, now,

Therefore, I, Erwin F. Soell, mayor of the City of Iowa Park, do hereby proclaim the week of April 24 through April 30, 1971, as "Clean-up, Fix-up, Paint-up Week"

and I call upon the citizens of Iowa Park and its environs to give appropriate recognition to this week by removing weeds, grass, brush, debris, junk and all other unsightly materials and conditions; and repair, fix up and repaint all buildings within the area so that our community will be a source of pride to all citizens, thereby stabilizing the economy, character and spirit of our community.

SCS REPORT

1. General Crop Situations
Farmers are nearly out of hay in all parts of Wichita county. ASCS Committeeman Howard Henderson reports he is now feeding hay that was baled 8 years ago. Chairman Pete Gilbert of Puntkin Center community is completely out of hay and is trying to buy more.

Native grasses were severely overgrazed during the winter and show no prospect of producing average spring growth.

Small grains (wheat, oats and barley) have not received sufficient moisture to produce 25% of normal yields. A good rain now would do little to improve yield prospects. ASCS office is receiving Form 574's daily for acreage credit. Since hay and forage are so scarce, farmers are now grazing out a large percentage of the small grain planted for grain.

The outlook for any summer cash or grazing hay crops appears doubtful. There is no subsoil moisture and a large amount of rain is needed to produce reasonable summer crop prospects.

County ASCS committee has

recommended approval of seasonal haying or grazing on CAP land, and on set-aside acreage.
2. Effect on Water Supply—

Human and Livestock

The last rain that produced any significant amount of livestock water was in April 1970. Many ponds are dry. Producers are hauling water or selling stock. The newest reservoir for Iowa Park is so low it cannot be pumped. The city is using water from an old reservoir and mixing it with water from Lake Kemp. The lake water contains between 3000 and 3500 ppm salts. This produces water of poor quality which is harmful to water system-pipelines, etc.

3. Road Maintenance
There have been some problems with sand blowing across roads in the northern portion of the county. Commissioner Buck Voyles reports his main difficulty caught by the drought is the necessity to haul water for road base work—up to 14 miles in some instances. Water is normally pumped from ponds and streams near the work area.

4. Health Problems
Dr. E. F. Scell of Iowa Park states that he believes there have been some increases in respiratory problems and probably more

dust allergy problems due to wind-storms and dust conditions. He estimates as much as 25 to 50% increase in dust-caused health problems—but less of other illnesses, such as flu.

5. Livestock Sales
At Wichita Livestock Auction last week was about 2400 head. This is about double the normal run. Trend is expected to continue.

6. Rains Received
The Iowa Park Experiment Station received 3.55 inches of rain from Oct. 1, 1970 to March 31. Normal for the period is 10.85 inches. We have received .53 inch in April. Normal for the month of April is 2.65 inches.

Unusually hot temperatures up

to 100 degrees were experienced in March.

7. Program Contracts
Soil Conservation Service reports that seven Great Plains Conservation Program contracts are uncertified. Four unserviced applications are on file now. Adequate funding of Great Plains Conservation Program would make drought effects less severe.

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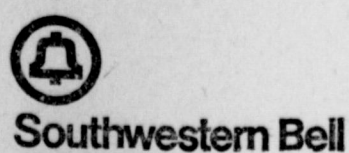
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WSCS

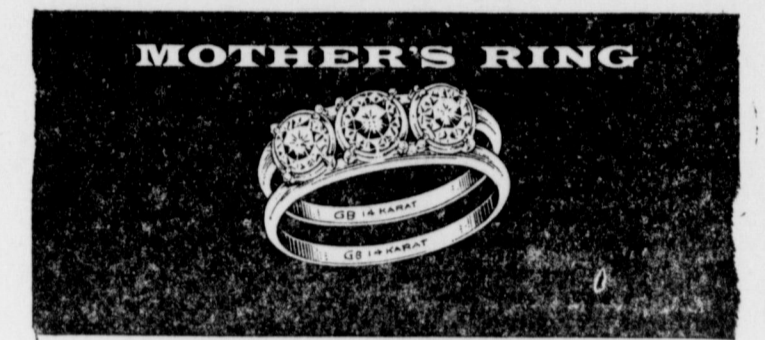
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
