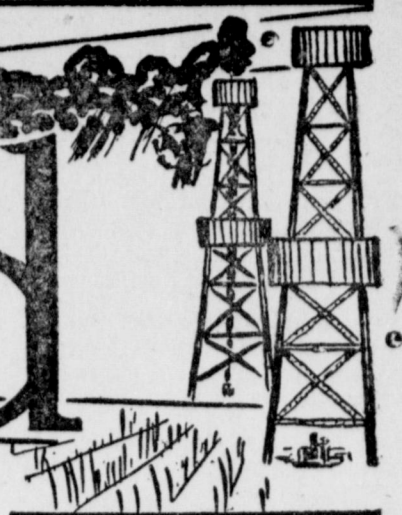

19 SERVICE HELD FOR NEAL MONROE IN AUSTIN

Funeral service for Neal G. Monroe, 56, was conducted Tuesday, May 11, in Austin. He died of a heart attack Sunday, May 9, at his home in Elgin. He was born Jan. 17, 1915, at Custer, Okla.

His mother the late Mrs. Ruby Monroe moved to Iowa Park with her young children following the death of their father in the early 1920's, to be near her sisters the late Mrs. Mary Bishop and Mrs. W. L. Hodges.

Neal was graduated from W. F. George high school here in 1932. He was a member of the firm Moody & Monroe Foods for several years previous to entering the University of Texas at Austin. He completed graduate work there in business administration.

Monroe served in the army in World War II and then became an officer with General Foods corporation. As an executive he had offices in Waco, Oklahoma City, Atlanta, New York City and Chicago.

Following a heart attack three years ago, he and his wife of 29 years retired to a farm near Elgin where they enjoyed riding horses, grazing a few cattle and fishing at the lake near their home. Neal and Fern were in the process of selling their acreage and moving to their former home in Austin when he was stricken Sunday morning.

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



The week of May 16-23 will mark the observance of Soil Stewardship Week, according to Donald Hill of Iowa Park, chairman of the Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District. "The World and They That Dwell Therein" will be this year's theme. It deals with man and his environment.

The earth is the Lord's, as we know, and as his stewards we are responsible for the condition of the resources in our charge. What you and I are willing to do in fulfillment of this responsibility will help determine the state of our environment, for better or for worse. It may even influence whether we will have in the end a new world or no world.

There are those among us who care, and those who don't. Those who care for themselves, their families and their communities are men and women who inescapably care about their natural surroundings—their environment.

They have opinions and goals. They find time to learn the facts, join with neighbors, etc. & above all they make their voices heard and their votes felt.

The environment is not a lofty generality, distant and unreal. It is your front yard or sidewalk, your road or street, your air and water. It is the character of your town, the location of new housing in your county, and the condition of your parks and forests.

Are your streets and roadsides littered with trash? Does the school have useful, well-kept grounds? Does a sprawling junkyard deface the landscape? Has your river become a flowing sewer? Does your planning board use soil capability information? Are zoning decisions changed every six months? Do your woodlands have fire protection. Is your valley subject to floods? Are factories taking over most of the prime farm land of the county?

These are questions concerning your environment. Men and women who care know the answers to these questions and to dozens more. Equally important, they are learning the importance of action where they live. They are coming to grips with problems they can see and deal with. Through their conservation districts, farm organizations, labor unions, churches, women's clubs, chambers of commerce, and civic organizations they are seeking and getting action by their city councils and county officials—and where necessary, by state and federal legislatures.

Anywhere you look and breathe, the environment is yours. Not somebody else's.

Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath said this week that increases in most postage rates will take effect May 16 as the Postal Service begins its task of achieving self sufficiency as required by the Postal Reorganization Act.

Gilbreath said general postage rates have not been increased since 1967 when Congress passed what was to become its final legislative act in this respect.

The new rates—authorized on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations on permanent changes—will put first-class letter rates at 8 cents an ounce. Airmail letter rates will be 11 cents an ounce. Postal cards will go for 6 cents each and airmail postal cards will sell at 9 cents each.

In addition to increases in first-class rates, second and third class will also go up on May 16. The current increases for 2nd and 3rd class will be only one-fifth of the total increase which has been proposed by the Postal Service.

No changes are made in the parcel post rate, which is the principal component of fourth-class mail. Increases will be made in "book rate," which is classified as 4th class.

When the domestic changes go into effect, there will be conforming increases in letter rates to Canada and Mexico.

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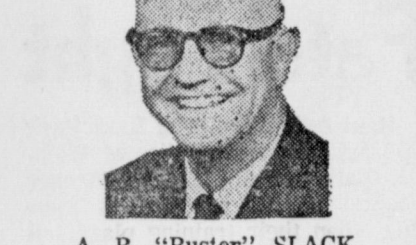

City Council Meeting

The City Council met at 7:30 p.m. May 10 in the City Hall for a regular session. First order of business was the decision to reinvest the money which came from the sale of Sewer Plant bonds. Construction of the new sewer plant is awaiting approval of the Federal Environmental Control Agency, which is expected to provide more than half the cost of this construction.

Final reading and passage of Ordinance 164 annexing the Virgil Scott and Jack Ayres land in the southwest corner of the intersection of Johnson Road and Expressway 287 was completed.

Also approved after second reading was Ordinance 165 annexing Expressway 287 from just west of the high school building to approximately one-quarter mile east of Bell Road. The ordinance included the annexation of the short section between West Magnolia and Redin Heights and the spur running up to the high school. The plumbing code was amended to allow the use of plastic yard lines.

After discussion of the dog ordinance, it was amended to provide that anyone interfering with the dog catcher in performance of his duties is subject to a fine. Dog control will continue in Iowa Park with perhaps some slight change in policies.

Aldermen discussed purchase of some property in Garden Valley for use as a permanent city park. The summer recreation program under leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Aisup was approved. The Council accepted bids for construction of a new sewer main to service the animal clinic being built for Dr. Thurman Reitz and to serve the balance of blocks 33 and 34 of Texas Addition.

Dr. Gordon G. Clark was the program at Lions club luncheon Tuesday. His subject was "Iowa Park Water Supply, Past, Present and Future."

Lion Clark traced the history of water through the period of individual wells and cisterns, up to 1920, when a central system was constructed, to be supplied by shallow wells south of town and not far from the irrigation ditch.

This water was plentiful, but the heavy saline content made it unpalatable.
In 1939 the City Lake was built with WPA labor and a \$30,000 bond issue. It served nicely until stock tanks in the watershed cut off much of the runoff. By 1947 the city was forced to supplement the lake water with well water.

Lake Iowa Park was constructed about 20 years ago, and Iowa Park had a source of good soft palatable water until the recent shortage of rainfall. A few years ago Buffalo Creek reservoir was built and has never had a chance to accumulate a full lake of water.
Presently the Water District is buying water from the irrigation ditch. This is not satisfactory, and unless the rains come in the near future, Iowa Park will have to build a pipeline to Wichita Falls and buy treated water from the plentiful supply of that city.

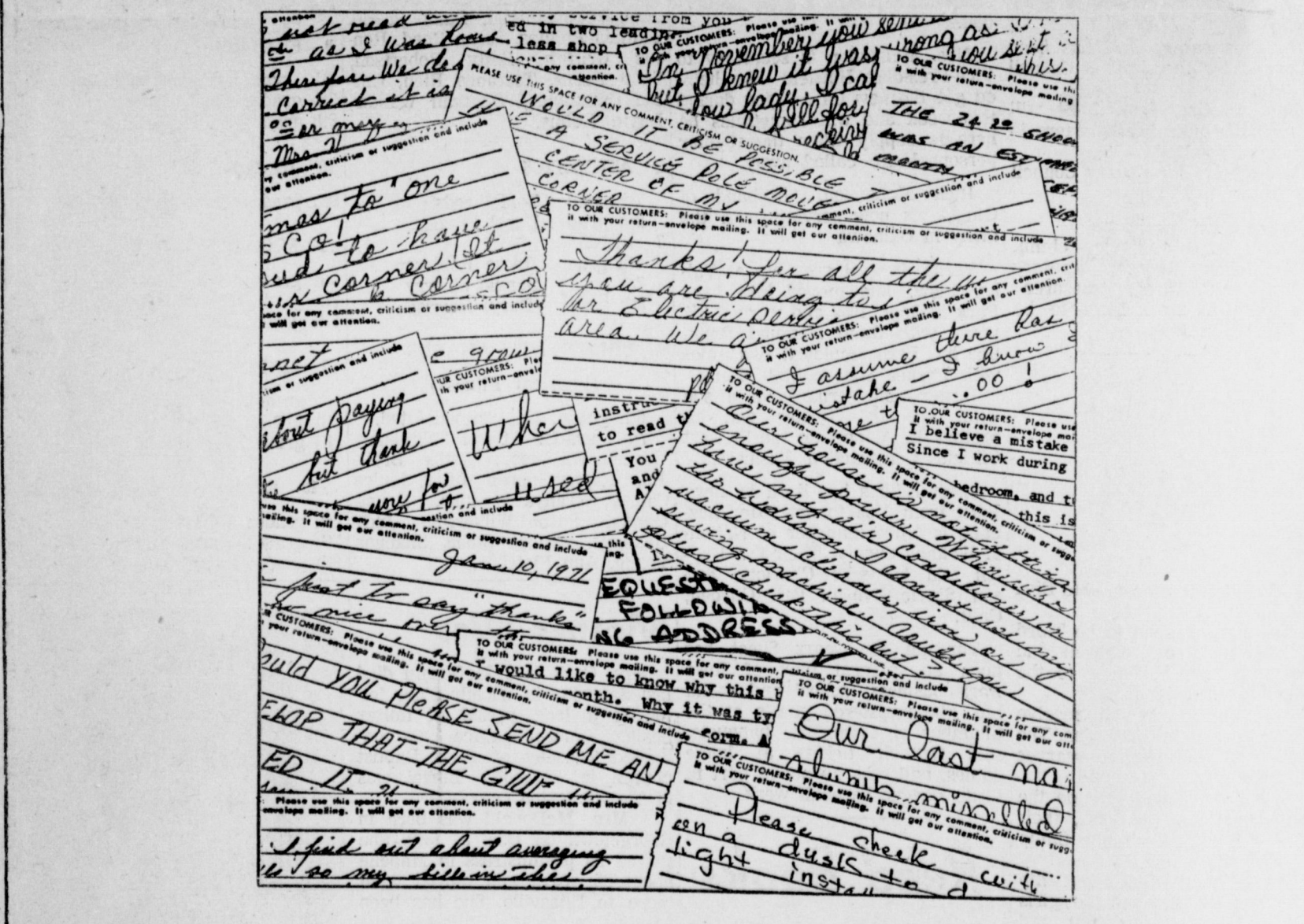

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Nursing Is Honorable Profession

"Nurse! Nurse!" the cry of countless patients is as old as mankind. The nursing profession, one of the most challenging and pacesetter careers in health care today, has struggled to develop from its ancient status of disrepute to one of high esteem and unlimited opportunity.

Nursing in a formalized setting originated with the early Christian hospitals around A.D. 500. The Catholic church founded hospitals in almost all cathedral cities, sponsored by the local bishops and staffed by monks and nuns.

When the Roman Empire collapsed most hospitals disappeared. Folklore and superstition replaced scientific methods, setting medicine back hundreds of years.

Hospitals became pest houses—more places in which to die than places in which to be healed. They were dumping houses for the poor where sanitation was unknown and where little was done to prevent spread of disease. Infections often killed more persons than the problem which first brought them to the hospital.

Nursing care was given mostly by women who were paupers and drunkards. As they were often forced to work in hospitals, patient care tended to be neglected.

Although conscientious nurses may have tried to improve the situation, little was accomplished until Florence Nightingale, a Crimean war volunteer nurse, revolutionized the art of nursing. She incorporated many scientific and humanitarian principles which improved patient care and hospital sanitation almost everywhere. Her training methods for nurses have brought nursing from an almost

disreputable profession to one of the most honorable and desirable.

The first nursing school was begun by Florence in London in 1860. The 12-month program featured ward teaching and lectures by doctors and nurses. The students had special living quarters, indoor and outdoor uniforms, and planned recreational activities.

Life as a nurse demanded almost super-human dedication as recently as the 1900's. The following was taken from a job description of a bedside nurse in an American hospital about 1897:

"In addition to caring for 50 patients, each bedside nurse will follow these regulations:

"Daily sweep and mop the floors of your wards, dust the patients' furniture and window sills.

"Maintain an even temperature in your ward by bringing a scuttle of coal for the day's business.

"Light is important to observe the patients' conditions; therefore, each day fill kerosene lamps, clean chimneys and trim wicks. Wash the windows once a week.

"Each nurse on duty will report every day at 7:00 a.m. and leave at 8:00 p.m. except on the Sabbath, on which day you may be off from 12 noon to 2:00 p.m.

"The nurse who performs her labors, serves her patients and doctors faithfully and without fault for a period of five years will be given an increase by the hospital administration of 5c a day, provided there are no hospital debts outstanding."

Today the duties of registered nurses are far different. They no longer serve as housekeepers or are limited to bedbath and backrub duties. Nurses now occupy a key position on the modern health team. The traditional concept of nursing as a "woman's world" has been revolutionized also. As more life-saving techniques and rehabilitation methods are developed, the health care field not only seeks but demands the presence of men in nursing.

The importance of qualified and conscientious nurses grows as each innovation in the health field is introduced. Starting salary is ap-

proximately \$6,500, and with advanced education and training, \$10,000 or \$15,000 or more can be attained.

Three types of education programs are available to men and women interested in becoming registered nurses: Junior or community college schools offer a 2-year associate degree program. Hospital schools have a 3-year diploma program. Colleges and universities offer a 4-year baccalaureate degree program.

Associate degree programs offer courses in the humanities, sociology, psychology, biology and chemistry. Some of these courses are taken with students in other programs of the junior college. Clinical courses include medical and surgical nursing, mother and child nursing, and psychiatric nursing.

Diploma courses, which are conducted by hospitals, also require general education courses plus biological, physical and social sciences. Student nurses are taught nursing theory and practice in the areas of medical and surgical nursing, mother and child nursing, and psychiatric nursing.

Graduates of both the associate degree and diploma programs are qualified for general and private-duty nursing and with experience often become head nurses.

The bachelor's degree program usually requires two years of general college course work including humanities and sciences. The last two years emphasize the theory and practice of nursing in a hospital setting.

Graduates of these programs are prepared for general duty staff nursing, work in public health agencies, and for graduate study leading to a master's or doctoral degree.

Graduates of associate degree and diploma schools can often receive some credit for their training and experience to apply toward a bachelor's degree in nursing if they wish to further their education.
