### Teletypes to Aid Area Lawmen

Teletypes were being installed last week in Wichita county as the first step of a communications network for law enforcement personnel within Northwest Texas. Eight counties are to be included in the network. This system will then be tied into a state crime information center at Austin, providing quick access to information and contact with other cities. This is the first new step in communications for police and sheriffs' departments in many years.

Scheduled to co-operate in the network are Wichita, Montague, Baylor, Archer, Clay, Jack and Hardeman sheriffs' departments and police in Wichita Falls, Bowie, Burkburnett, Iowa Park, Olney, Graham, Seymour, Henrietta and Jacksboro. Pictured is Sheriff Jim Voyles working with a teletype. One of its advantages is having a written notice instead of an oral message which could be misunderstood.

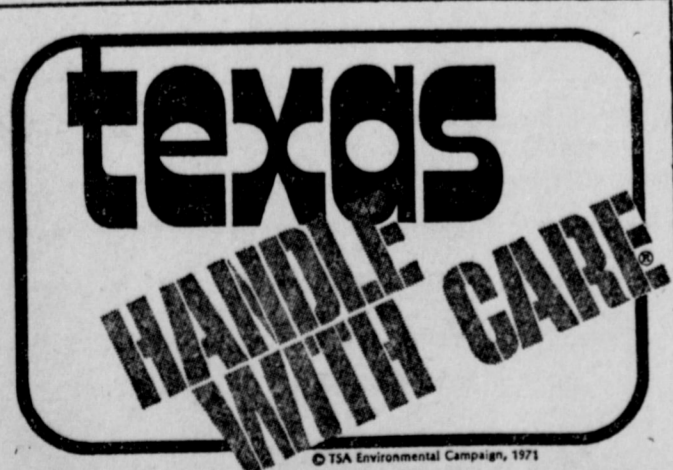
### Read Books

### 6th Grade Moved to V.V.

At a called meeting of Iowa Park school trustees Monday evening, decision was made to transport all sixth grade students to Valley View next school term. Present for the discussion and evaluation session were Chairman Hoyt Watson, C. E. Myers, Robert Wilcox, Stanley Williamson, Cecil Streich, trustees; Supt. Faris Nowell, Principals James Ward and Austin Webb; and Tax Assessor Bill Steger. Conscientious consideration was given for the welfare of all: students, teachers and community, as the advantages of the move were balanced against its disadvantages.

The change will utilize the air-conditioned facilities available at Valley View. The building is also wired for television service. Gym facilities will make for better basketball and intramural programs. These facilities in Iowa Park are so crowded that there must be two sections each for 6th, 7th and 8th grades at present.

With the 6th at Valley View, more effective work will be accomplished with three sections each for the 7th and 8th grades, with no disadvantage to the 6th grade students. Maturity age of the 6th grade will relate better on the elementary campus. The balance in administrative problems will be better. At present there are 600 students at junior high, and 100 at Valley View. With the change there will be 300 at Valley View and 400 at junior high.

Mrs. Fromme will be able to offer training in stringed musical instruments with a reduced enrollment at junior high, where it now is not possible. Where there must now be three lunch periods at junior high, only two will be necessary. On the other side of the ledger: Transportation costs will be more; it will be more difficult for 6th and 7th grade teachers to communicate with each other; and there will be some inconvenience in travel as teachers for band and speech therapy and the like; to commute to classes; and as parents to visit the school; and the utility bills will increase. Other business included accepting the bid of Central Seed and Feed for purchase of a mower; and authorizing payment of \$3000 on the \$5000 due Pardue, Read and Dice, architects.

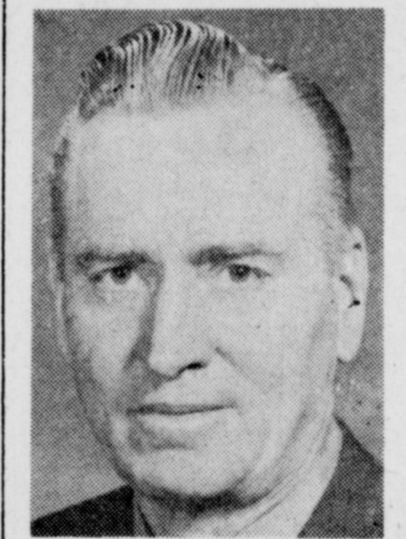
### Masons Elect

### Drought Losses Aid Due

Small Business Administration will host a July 1 meeting in Wichita Falls to explain the agency's drought disaster loan program for small businesses. The session, scheduled for 2:30 p.m. in the auditorium of Fedway Department Store, will bring to the local level the Agency's economic injury disaster loan program to assist small business firms suffering substantial economic injury because of the effects of the prolonged drought on farmers in sections of Texas and Oklahoma. SBA can provide EIDL assistance up to \$500,000 to small firms to provide working capital or to pay debts, except bank loans, which the borrower would have been able to meet had he not lost income because of the drought. Two SBA Advisory Council members from Wichita Falls: Donald H. Wills of City National Bank, and Charles Ward of Times and Record News, are co-ordinating the meeting. Interested businessmen are invited to the meeting. Representatives of the Agriculture department, including Farmers Home Administration, will be present to handle agriculture problems.

This will be the first time First Day Covers have been available in all US offices. A photographic display of modern Postal Service jobs and functions will help visitors learn more about the men and women of the Postal Service and how each mail user can help them serve the community better.

Mrs. Billie Kingcade is in Wichita General hospital. She had surgery Friday morning and is reported doing well in Room 487.

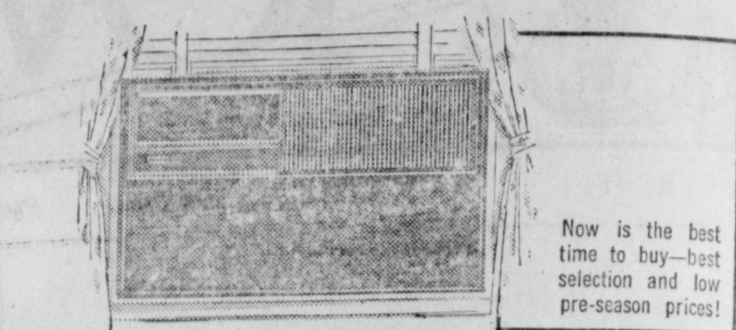

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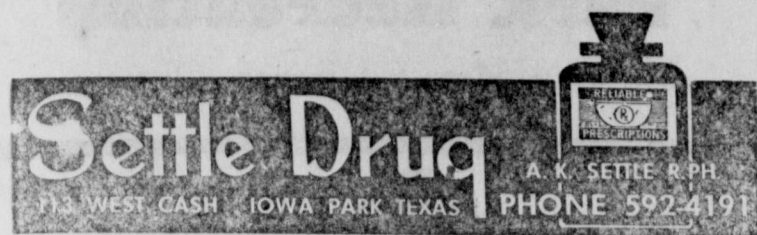

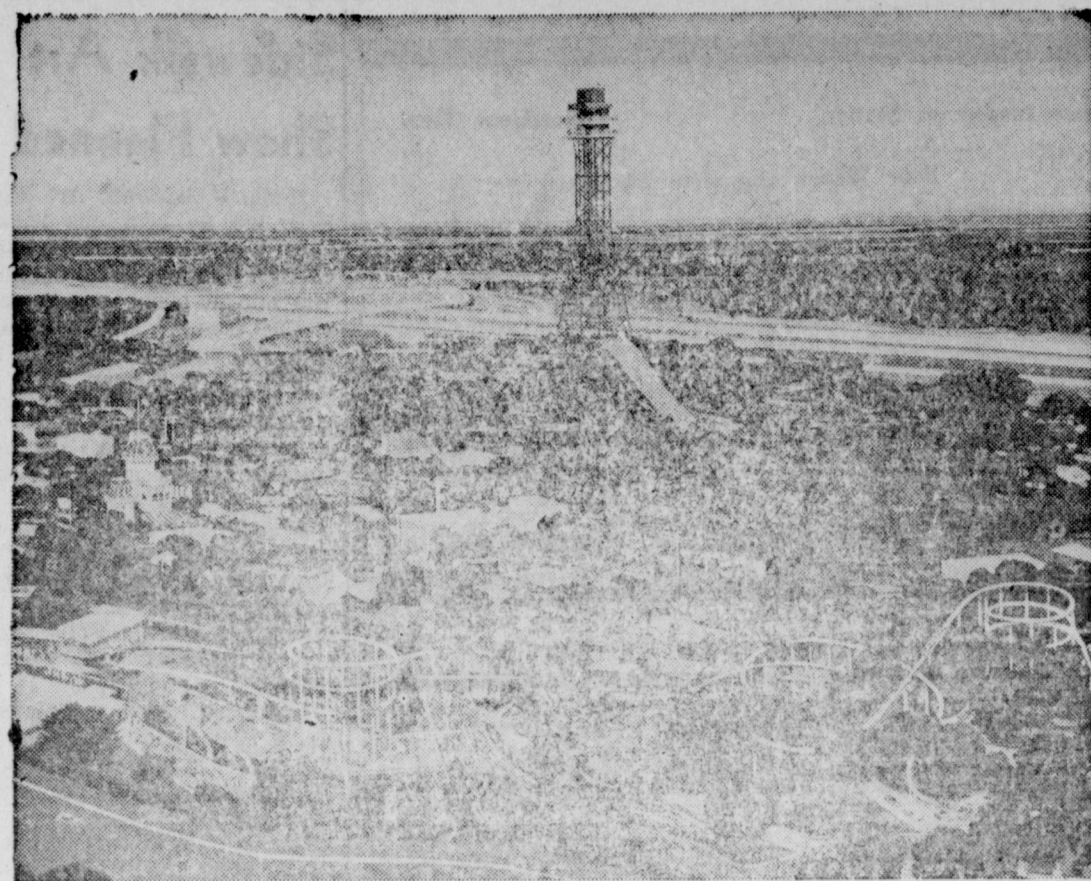

## FASTEST FUN RIDE DEBUTS

Arlington, Texas—The fastest entertainment ride in the United States makes its public debut this weekend at SIX FLAGS Over Texas, the big theme park located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

Called "The Big Bend", the massive tubular rail ride carries passengers over more than a half mile of curving, spiraling track at speeds up to 50 mph... 20 mph faster than the Park's popular Runaway Mine Train.

Streamlined, toboggan-like cars climb a 50-foot tall spiral under power of their own electric motors. At the top of the spiral they become free-wheeling and begin a breathtaking trip around a series of curves with banks up to 78 degrees. At the midpoint of the ride there is another climb up a spiral tower, followed by a plunge during which the cars hit a speed of 50 mph.

SIX FLAGS Over Texas Vice President and General Manager Robert W. Freeman said the new ride, costing more than \$2,000,000 was built in Europe. There are smaller versions of the ride in Germany, France, and Spain. More than 220 tons of steel were used in the manufacture of the 2,660 feet of rails and the supporting columns. More than seven miles of wiring was used for the ride's electrical controls, which include elaborate electronic safety devices. Freeman said the engineers who designed the ride estimate that passengers will feel a maximum gravitational force of two G's during the 2 minute, 15 second ride.

He said, "The Big Bend was designed specifically for SIX FLAGS Over Texas and, as a result, we have been able to fit it into the park's landscaping with an absolute minimum loss of trees and foliage. Most of the ride," he said "is at treetop level. You see a lot of real estate in a very short time."

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
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
