Half a hundred years ago, I parked a Model T Ford where State National Bank is now located.

After loafing around town a few hours, I failed to meet a man I didn't like. Being a 'worm' about reading matter, I asked a man where I could find a newspaper.

Obviously to be of help, he pulled a folded paper from his lip pocket. He introduced himself as Miles Hines. Without doubt he is the type that gave our town the right to use the slogan "The Town of Friendly Living."

For 50 years the Iowa Park Herald has been a household word in my immediate family. There has been a change of publishers, but the overall makeup of the paper still omits political mud-slinging and pictorial images suggesting a living combination best suited for comic strips.

A few years ago a small town editor in North Texas set up a station in Iowa Park, offering printed matter known as the "Rockett," which was thrown as a newspaper. In one particular issue he went to great lengths to try to convince merchants that an expert merchandiser could rearrange their shelves and counters so attractively their sales would skyrocket.

In another issue the author as if such was unknown in our town, said, "and there are Communists in your locality!"

One Sidewalk Sage said: "If that guy can suck as hard as he can blow, he won't have any trouble getting what he wants from the bottom of the barrel with the bung stuck tight."

As an after thought, to say that for each of those who left, or leave town due to no drinking water, that fifty would move here, is one of the greatest over-statements of the 19th century.

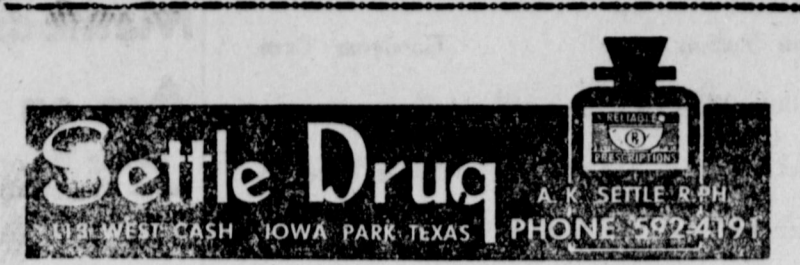

Waste Treatment Hearing Planned

A Hearing will be held at the next meeting of the City Council, Monday, July 12, 1971, at 7:30 o'clock at the City Hall at which time the following Ordinance No. 168 will be heard after which hearing the ordinance will be considered for passage. K. G. Wilks, City Sec.

ORDINANCE 168

An Ordinance Regulating the Discharge of Industrial Wastes into the Public Sewers of the City of Iowa Park, Promulgating Regulations and Establishing Charges for Services Rendered, Providing for a Penalty Not to Exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for Each Offense.

Whereas, the City of Iowa Park has provided facilities for the collection and treatment of sewage to promote the health, safety and convenience of its people and for the safeguarding of water resources common to all, and

Whereas, provision has been made in the design, construction and operation of such facilities to accommodate certain types and quantities of industrial wastes in excess of, and in addition to normal sewage, and

Whereas, it is the obligation of the producers of industrial wastes to defray the cost of the waste treatment services rendered by the City of Iowa Park in linear proportion to the cost of the waste treatment facilities and of the operation and maintenance costs, utilized in treating the industrial wastes, and

Whereas, proper protection and operation of the collection and treatment facilities may require either the exclusion, pre-treatment, or controlled discharge at point of origin of certain types or quantities of industrial wastes,

Now, therefore be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas: (here follows the body of the ordinance. Interested persons may appear before the City Council for discussion.)

SECTION 10.

Penalties

(a) If any person, firm, or corporation shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, they shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the Municipal Court, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense. Each day of such violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

(b) Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall become liable to the City for any expense, loss or damage occasioned by the City by reason of such violation.

SECTION 11.

Validity

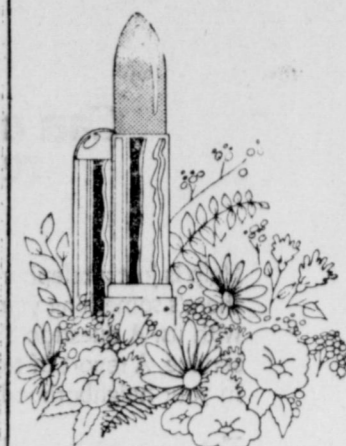
All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. The validity of any section, clause, sentence or provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other part of this ordinance, which can be given effect without invalidated part or parts.
