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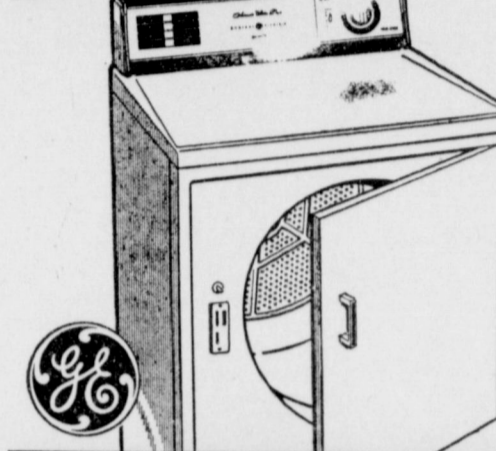
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## PARKWAY FURNITURE

Dove hunters are advised by officials of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to have their shotguns permanently plugged to hold three shells. This applies to hunting of all migratory birds such as ducks, geese, brant, coots, gallinules, rails jacksnipes, woodcock and sandhill cranes. Non-migratory birds such as quail and turkey may be hunted with unplugged guns.
