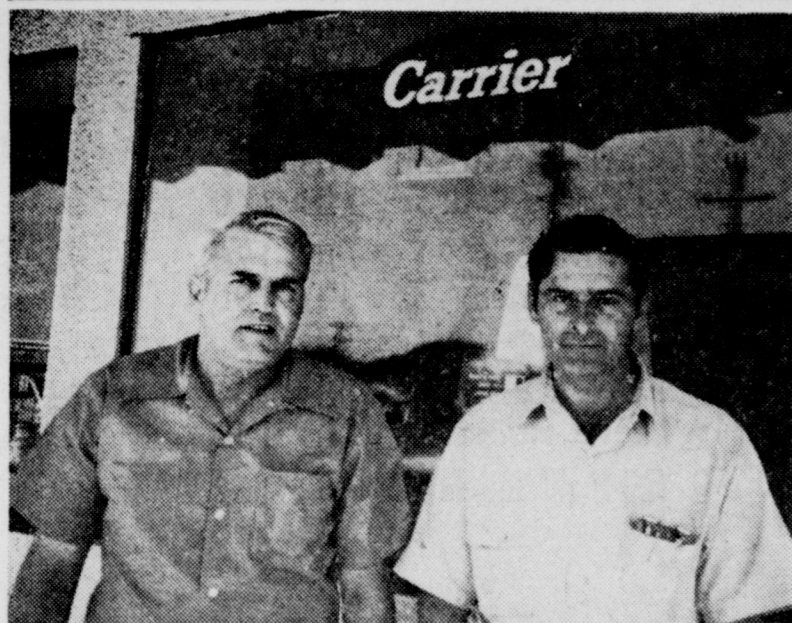

Homecoming Events Enjoyed by Many

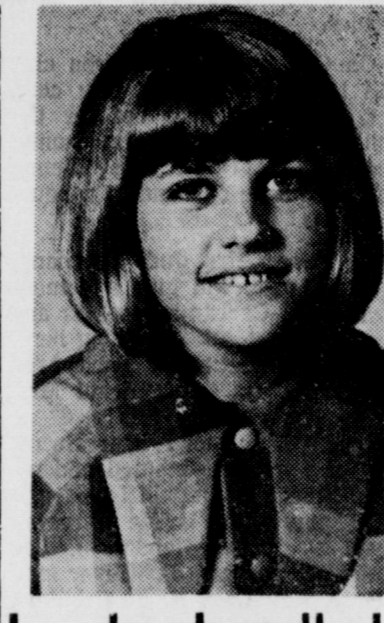

 the board.

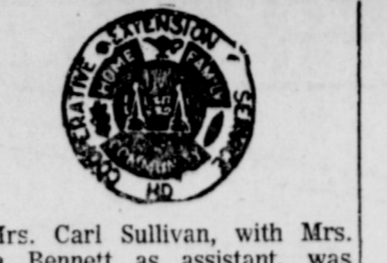
