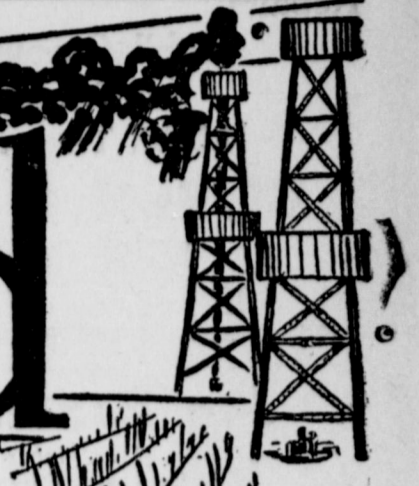

City Council

City Fathers of Iowa Park had as guest speaker Monday night, George Cleveland, director of the Teen - Training and Employment project sponsored by the county probation department.

He told of a federal program under which children from 14 to 17 years of age are employed to work out fines and pay for damages they have inflicted through various offenses.

Cleveland is volunteer chairman of the disaster preparedness program pushed by the American Red Cross. He asked the City to prepare a place for a disaster center in the immediate future.

T. E. Gilbreath and Wayne Williams, representing the post office, met with the council and discussed renumbering of property on Johnson Road. This was referred to the city planning commission for study.

Bob Harper was appointed to replace Bill Robinson of the zoning and planning group.

Aldermen accepted a bid from a Wichita Falls firm for a new street department truck. Rip Smith was asked to make a study of garbage trucks which can be had for service here.

A. W. Smith was hired to handle heavy equipment for the street department when it is obtained.

School Board

A detailed but routine session occupied the Iowa Park school board for several hours Tuesday night.

Gene Lyle, Jerome Mason and Gary Lyles were present to inquire about possibility of organizing a school-sponsored rodeo club. It would be UIL approved and members would not be barred from other interscholastic events. Faris Nowell will investigate with reference to UIL requirements and Lyle will contact the National Rodeo association. There has been quite a bit of interest displayed by boys and girls, according to the visitors.

Budget requests were allowed: choral department \$2,810; volleyball coach \$1,023; tennis coach \$894.76.

The board voted to accept the policy on transfer students from non-accredited schools stating that Iowa Park, regardless of grade level assignments, will make a conscientious effort to place each pupil where he will work successfully at his maximum capacity.

It was voted to pay Reed-Pardue-Dice the \$2000 to complete the school's obligation on architect's fee for the new high school building. Trustees also accepted the bid of Vecta Educational Co. of \$8,744 as purchase price for the bleachers for the gym.

Robert Wilcox, T. C. Berry and Stanley Williamson were appointed to study stadium seat options to further construction.

Sale of a house and lot at Valley View to Wayne Young for \$3,500 and of lots in Iowa Park to Clyde Skinner for \$210 was approved.

Harold Cowley reported that 59 percent of the high school students are enrolled in some part of the vocational training program—that the new building is within \$800 worth of being completed—that Frank Rauschuber and his students have begun work on a residence project—that the cosmetology class is in full swing with 24 students.

Hoyt Watson, president, directed the session. Also present were C. E. Myers, Jessie McCullough, Cecil Streich.

Mr and Mrs. Roy Fortner went to Fogata recently for a visit with his father, who is now 90 years of age. A retired farmer, the elder Mr. Fortner has been sick and is now improving. The Fortners report the black land country was especially beautiful with the tree leaves turning to autumn colors and heavily laden with fruit. The tomato crop was particularly fine.

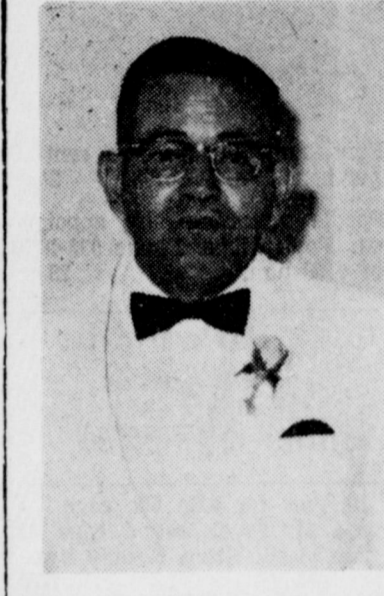
Guest speaker last Thursday was Ron Burks, a psychologist with the Help Center, 1800 Rose in Wichita Falls. He said the Help Center works with the entire family. There is a set of five rules the Help Center uses to hold families together and still let everyone in the family be an individual:

1. Do not assume the responsibility for the thinking or actions of the other person.
2. Do not violently hurt another person. This means physical violence, verbal violence or silent violence.
3. Say what you feel because no one is a mind reader.
4. Speak to each other's behavior — this includes adults and children.
5. Everyone, child and adult alike, will charge with understanding.

Burks said their theory at Help Center is that every mother and father loves their child. And every child loves his parents. This may be a confused love and result in the child's being abused. He said he has seen many cases where the child had been beaten, burned or hurt in many other ways. But they do not try to place the blame on any one certain person in the family. Blame does not count nor does it help any of the persons involved. Their job is to HELP find the answer to the families' problems and then help solve them.

The Help Center works with children from ages 5 through 20, with entire families and now they are going to area counties and testing persons in jail to see if they have some type of mental problem that may have caused them to break the law. They also work closely with the North Texas Rehabilitation Center.

Hawks 24 Vernon 0

Iowa Park Hawks made their winning points against the Vernon Lions when the game was only 3 minutes and 5 seconds old. But of course the game did not end there. In fact it went on and on into the night until the Mean Green piled up a 24-0 victory and showed everybody present that Iowa Park is ready and able to play ball of AAA caliber.

On Vernon's third play from scrimmage, Chuck Buikema took possession of the ball on a fumble deep in Lions territory. The Hawks used seven plays to go 24 yards into Vernon's end zone with Steve Webb scoring the TD.

Of the four scoring opportunities, the Hawks failed on all points after touchdown attempts.

Strong defensive play on both sides of the scrimmage line held the game scoreless until the 2nd quarter was well underway.

With 5:20 left, Taby Strobbe was back to punt when Jimmy Green rushed in to block his kick. The ball rolled into scoring territory where Jackie Perkins took possession and brought the IP score to 12.

Our third scoring drive was produced mainly through the air. Perkins took a pass; Webb caught another; Perkins wound up the deal with a 5 yard reception.

Halftime found Iowa Park in possession through an interception.

What the Lions lacked on the playing field was made up for by a marvelous marching band effort by Vernon. Their show was outstanding by all ways of measurement.

The IPHS marching band did its usual Class A-1 bit, complete with two drum majors, fine baton artists and fast stepping, tuneful band members.

Vernon had its only opportunity to kick the ball off the tee at beginning of the 3rd stanza. We responded by returning to the 47 yard line and working the ball on down into scoring territory with 8:19 left in the quarter. This was the final scoring of Iowa Park's initiation into Class AAA football.

Then followed Vernon's best showing of the night. They reeled off four 1st downs and wound up losing the ball on downs on Iowa Park's 35.

The Hawks made one 1st down to the 45, and the quarter ended. Hawks kicked to Vernon to open the 4th quarter. They made three 1st downs before Jerry Burkhardt intercepted a pass and ran to the Vernon 42.

The Hawks made a 1st down and made four more plays, losing possession on the 28.

The Lions wound up the time by making three 1st downs in the middle of the field, with the final whistle finding Vernon in possession on Iowa Park's 16 yard line.

Such scoreless midfield gains gave Vernon a respectable listing in the yards-gained by rushing column, but the Hawks defense was always able to contain the Lions when danger arose.

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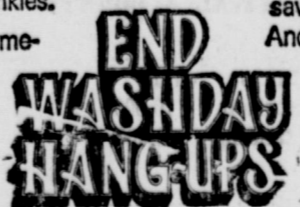
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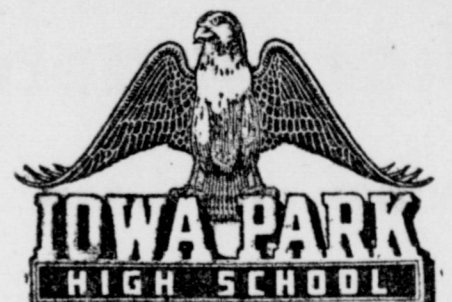
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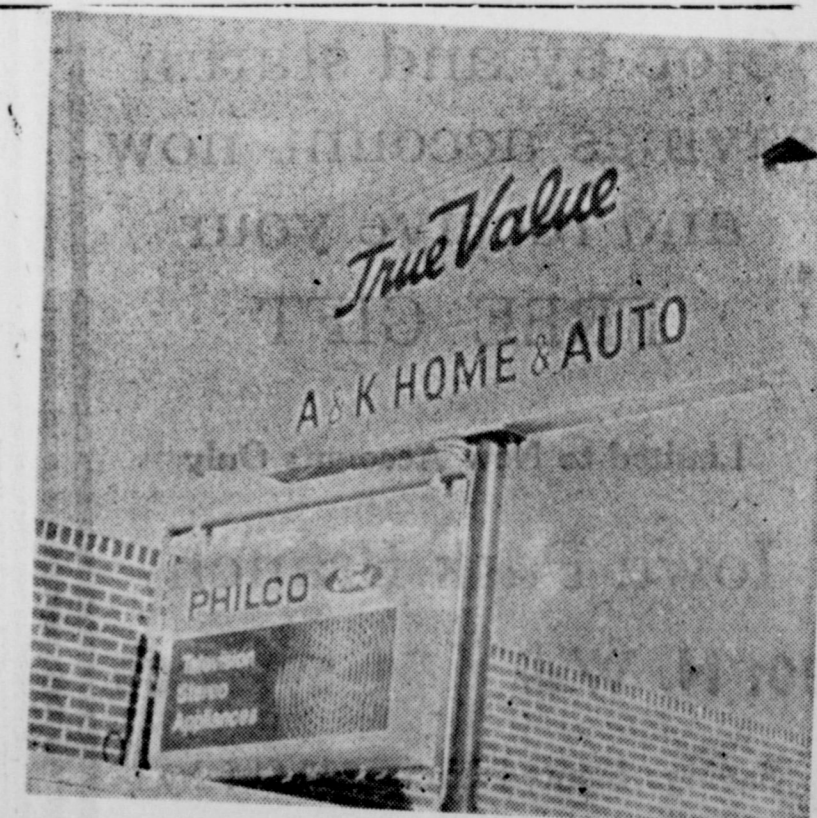
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
