Iowa Park Hawks continued in their winning ways last Friday, evening by defeating the Graham Steers on their home field, 23 to 12.

The Mean Green put 3 points on the scoreboard early in the game with a field goal kicked by Wayne Hallford. Later in the first stanza Iowa Park scored on a 33-yard pass to Jerry Burkhart from Greg Frazier.

In the second period, Graham made six points with a 1-yard run into paydirt. This was more than matched by Hallford's successful PAT kick following Jimmy Green's 1-yard scoring run.

The score stood at 17-6 when halftime came and the marching bands of both schools strutted their stuff before an enthusiastic audience. The Steers went to a brilliant aerial game in the third quarter and pulled up closer to the Hawks. George Green covered the last two yards of a scoring drive.

Neither team scored again until the Hawks added the clincher in the final period. Graham had been forced to put from the Steer 32. The Mean Green moved by easy stages into scoring position. With a fourth and five situation facing Iowa Park, Bobby Morgan took the call and hacked out the necessary first-down yardage. A few plays later, Morgan plunged two yards for the final 6 points.

Graham's quarterback George Green put on a display of passing which resulted in 18 passes caught of 39 thrown. Net gain was 252 yards.

This Friday night IPHS will host the Burk Burnett Bulldogs, who are still on the winning side of the district ledger. They are standing at the top of the heap and are apparently the only remaining district squad with power and defense enough to unseat perennial winner Brownwood.
