

DWI filed on man here

A Wichita Falls man, Maurice Leotas Calhoun, has been charged with driving while intoxicated as result of a two-car collision here Monday afternoon.

The 55-year-old Negro allegedly ran through a stop sign at the intersection of Johnson Road and West Highway, and crashed into the side of a car driven by 16-year-old Randy Shierry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Darell Shierry, 814 Van Horn.

Though Shierry's car was a total loss, the youth reportedly was not injured other than a small cut on his left shoulder.

Shierry and two witnesses said a second car stopped right after the crash, transferred some coolers thought to be beer, and drove off. The man was taken to Wichita Falls for blood tests prior to the DWI charge being filed.

TEXAS FOOTBALL MAGAZINE:

Hawks ranked 9th in state; Holliday team to beat in A

With its ink still wet, the 1971 edition of Dave Campbell's Texas Football magazine reached subscribers through the mails Tuesday, proclaiming the Iowa Park Hawks as the ninth -best Class AAA team in the state, and the Holliday Eagles top-ranked among Class A ball clubs.

The state's only publication covering all the high school teams in Texas gave defending AAA champions Brownwood the nod to repeat again in that class. . .if they can get out of the district.

Pre-season rankings of AAA teams include, in order, Brownwood, McKinney, Silsbee, Gregory-Portland, Brenham, Ennis, Monahans, Lancaster, Iowa Park and Plano.

In speaking of Brownwood and coach Gordon Wood, the publication stated, "You've got to pick him to win it again. Winning Class AAA state championships is getting to be something of a tradition where Brownwood and Wood are concerned. Tradition, it says here, again will be served in Class AAA in 1971."

In the magazine's breakdown of teams, it said, "Iowa Park has taken numerous Class AAA opponents into camp during two AA state title years, on most occasions with a dazzling offensive game. Now, in the Hawks' move upward, the offensive again appears sharp, with FB Steve Webb and QB Greg Frazier the big names. End Jackie Perkins (205) was all-state on last season's 14-0-1 entry and guards Jimmy Brown and Chuck Buikema and TB Richard Blair are all class talents among 15 returning lettermen (5 offensive and 4 defensive regulars). WB Bobby Morgan, ends James Frazier and Jerry Burkhart, tackles Neal Fanster and Robert Cook and center Mike Leath are other strong performers."

About the District 4-AAA race, the magazine stated "If it could be bottled and sold, it would be worth a fortune - but apparently only coach Gordon Wood and Brownwood have the formula (three state championships in the last four years, four in the last six seasons) and the recipe is a secret. But the master chef is at work again and the finished produce again could well be labeled State Winner."

The article continued, "Brownwood counts 6 offensive and 4 defensive returnees among 16 lettermen from a 12-1-1 state winner. Three of these performers, QB Shae Southall, end Tim Reid and safety Tommy Hollingshead, were all-district and all-area, prompting Wood to attach an "about equal" label between 1970 and 1971 Lion teams. Center Steve Goodwin, guard Donald Knight and tackle Kurt Newton are other line blue chips, while backs Ray Thompson, Bryan Pinto, Rodney Folsom, Steve Cutbirth and guard Bruce Smith are all well worthy of a championship tradition."

Petition asks election to abolish school

A petition was presented to County Judge Calvin Ashley Tuesday morning, asking that an election be called to abolish the City View Independent School District.

Making the presentation was Al Griest, chairman of a committee seeking the abolishment of the district.

Judge Ashley said before he could call for the election he would have to first determine how many qualified voters reside in the City View district, and then check out the signatures on the petition to see if they were eligible to sign it.

Griest said the 165 signatures he presented had been double checked.

Dissatisfied City View school district residents have considerable experience in petitioning. They've asked for annexation with the Wichita Falls district and detachment to the Iowa Park district in previous petitions.

Many in the district have said they've long been dissatisfied with the quality of education offered by the City View schools, and are fearful of the district's ability to finance construction of buildings that are needed.

City View has one school building which serves the first through eighth grades. High school students are sent to Wichita Falls and Iowa Park on a tuition basis. Griest said he was hopeful the election could be called in late July or early August.

A notice must be posted at least 10 days prior to the election.

Three young men save boy's life

Quick, knowledgeable action by three local young men is credited with saving the life of a 16-year-old Burkburnett boy Sunday afternoon at Sand Beach swimming pool.

The three young men are Sam Morrison, Randy Newman and Robert Watson. About 6:50 p.m. that evening, according to Newman, some youngsters attracted his and the others' attention by calling for help. They pulled the youth from the four-foot deep water near the slide. Newman estimated he had been under water two or three minutes, because he had already started turning blue.

While Watson went immediately to call for an ambulance, Newman started clearing the youth's throat and Morrison checked for pulse, finding none.

"I began giving him mouth-to-mouth re-

suscitation and in three or four minutes he began breathing strongly," Newman said. "We knew his lungs were almost full of water so then we turned him over and began pumping his back to empty it out."

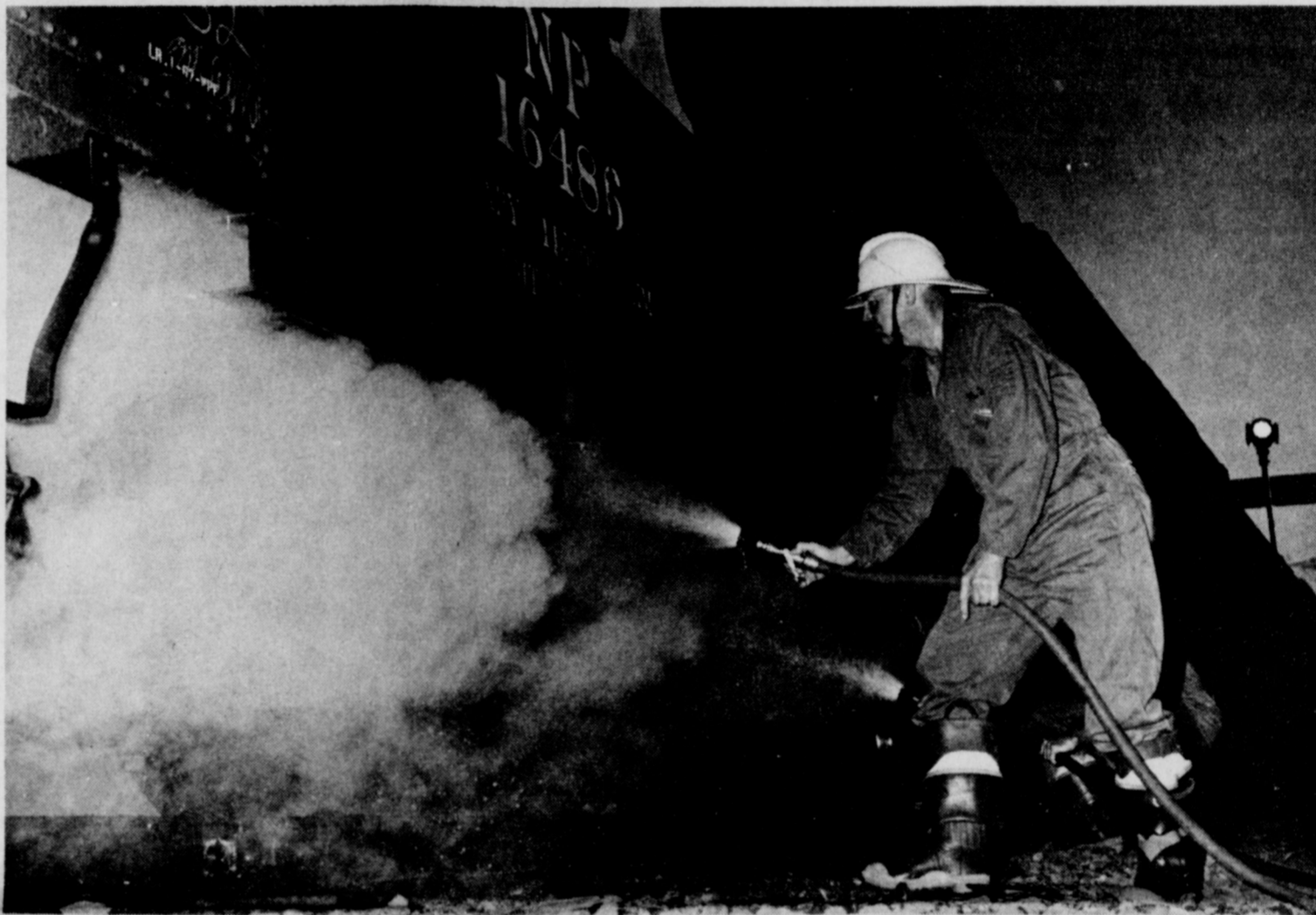
While this was going on, Watson was clearing everyone out of the water and getting the manager. The ambulance arrived in about 15 minutes.

Enroute to the Sheppard AFB hospital the youth reportedly went into convulsions. It was later found that he was a diabetic, and authorities believe insulin shock may have been the cause of him drowning.

"Thinking back," recalled Newman, "The thing that impressed me was that we each went about what had to be done without any confusion or double effort. Each of us did things that had to be done automatically."

All three are life guards at Sand Beach. Newman and Watson had finished their shifts at 6 p.m. and were swimming at the time of the incident. Morrison was on duty.

Morrison is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Morrison; Randy the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. N. Newman; and Watson the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Watson.

The Red Sox finished with a 14-4 season record, followed by the Angels and Twins, 10-8 each, and the Orioles, 4-14.

Allred says redistrict bill Gus Mutcher's revenge

"The redistricting bill is the most outstanding demonstration of vindictiveness that we've seen in 25 years."

That statement was made by State Representative Dave Allred of Wichita Falls, a victim of the bill, as he spoke here Tuesday before the Noon Lions Club.

Allred said the redistricting bill was an axe being used against all members of the House of Representatives who opposed Speaker Gus Mutcher, and favored those who bowed to Mutcher's will.

Most of those effected by the bill have become known as the "Dirty 30". Allred gave his opinion on the background of how the group became known by that name, and told how members were now all running against each other or against other highly-influential incumbents in the 1972 election.

The split with Mutcher's leadership came at the time of the Sharpstown Bank scandal, Allred related, when some of us worked hard to get an investigation started into the incident, and to get each member of the House's business transactions made available as public record.

As his example of how the redistricting bill sought him out, Allred said the splitting of Wichita County took in the house he rents from his mother in City View. And when he was taken in by that boundary, he became forced to run against the other representative from Wichita, Vernon Stewart.

"I could move across the pasture to Mama's other house, and be in the western district (represented by Charles Flnnell of Holliday)," he pointed out.

Allred doesn't believe that the courts will rule the redistricting as constitutional, but he doesn't know what action

the court will take if and when that decision is handed down.

The court may order the legislature to redistrict, either at a special session or the 1973 regular session; the matter might be sent to the commission which is to draw up the senatorial district, as provided under the Texas constitution for legislative bodies that fail to redistrict; or the court might re-draw the lines. Allred said the "Dirty 30" may soon have 110 representatives claiming to be original members. "About the end of the session more and more members were leaving the following of the leadership," he said.

He could think of at least four who will be opposing Mutcher for his Speaker position in the next session. "I'm supporting Fred Head of Henderson," he reported.

On the possible musical chairs movement of politicians (reported by the Leader in last week's edition), should U.S. Congressman Graham Purcell decide to move to Denton and run unopposed as an incumbent instead of staying here and running against Republican Bob Price, Allred said "you are liable to see the wildest scramble of you life." He indicated there would be several candidates for almost all the offices opening.

An acknowledged member himself of the "Dirty 30", a recent article in the Somerville Tribune said the other members were: Bill Bass, Canton; John Big-ham, Temple; Curtis Graves, Houston-

City receives sewer bids

Bids on construction of Iowa Park's new sewer treatment plant were opened Tuesday by the city council, but there will be no action taken on them until Monday's regular session.

Only one of the nine contractors bidding on the job was within the architect's estimate of \$274,000. That was by W. B. Abbott of Lubbock, who bid \$272,904.72. Other bids ranged as high as \$371,613 by Onyx Construction of Fort Worth. Decker Construction of Abilene was second low, \$312,000.

Added to the architect's estimate was \$41,000 for fees and contingencies, making the total estimate \$315,000.

According to city officials, approval on the state and federal level of the bids must be received before contracts can be let. The city has requested and received financial aid on the construction, so the contract approval must be sought first.



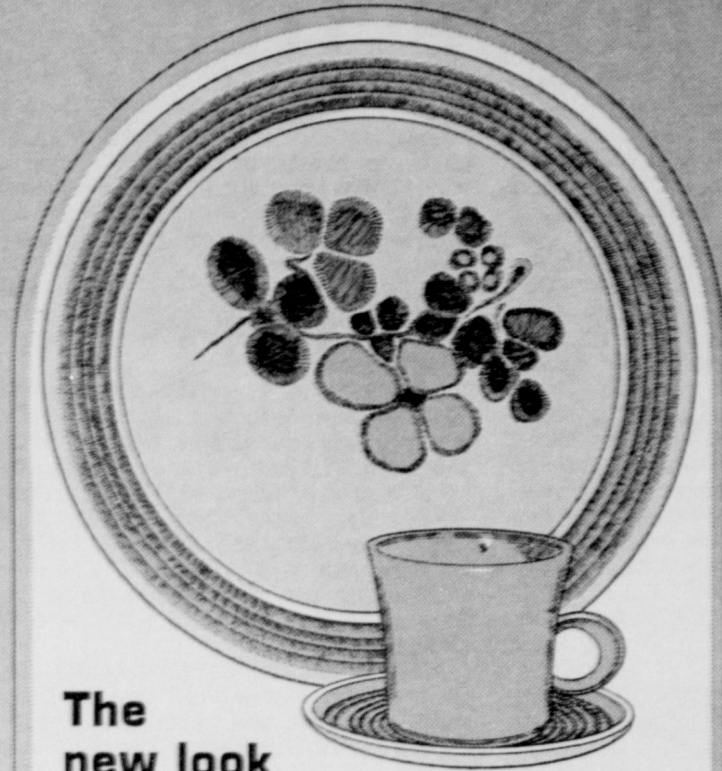

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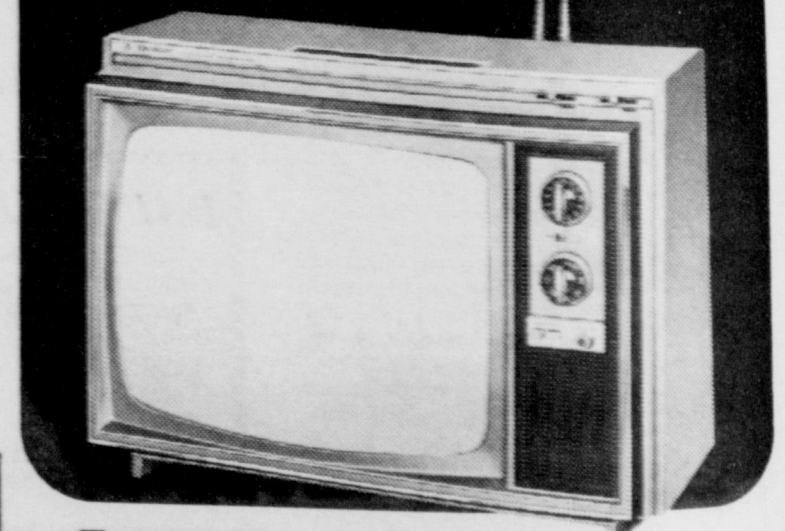
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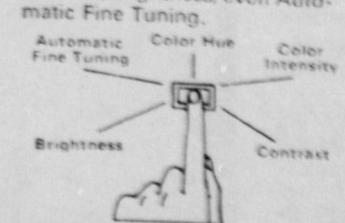


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Cook of the Week

BLUEBERRY-BANANA PIE
1 No. 3 can blueberries
2 1/2 Tbsp. cornstarch
1/2 cup sugar
1 Tbsp. butter
2 Tbsp. lemon juice
3 bananas, sliced
1 cup heavy cream
1 8 in. baked pie shell

Drain blueberries; mix cornstarch, sugar, butter and lemon juice with juice. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add blueberries. Line baked pie shell with sliced bananas and add cooled berry mixture. Chill in refrigerator about 2 hours before serving. Top with whipped cream.
Good also with canned strawberries.

TEXAS HASH
3 medium-sized onions, chopped
1 large green pepper, minced
1 lb. ground beef
2 cups canned tomatoes
1/2 cup uncooked rice or 2 cups uncooked noodles
1 tsp. chili powder
2 tps. salt
1/8 tsp pepper

Cook onions and green pepper in 3 tps. fat until onions turn yellow. Add beef and fry until mixture is crumbly. Stir into mixture the remaining ingredients. Pour into greased 2 qt 8" casserole. Cover and bake one hour at 350 degrees. Remove cover the last 15 minutes of baking.

THREE BEAN SALAD
1 can green beans
1 can yellow wax beans
1 can red kidney beans
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
1 medium onion, sliced very thin
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1/3 cup cooking oil
1/2 cup sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. pepper
Drain beans, rinse well, and drain again. Add green pepper and sliced onion to beans. Mix
