Four Iowa Park high school students have been selected as Outstanding Teen-Agers of America for 1971-72, according to the school principal Bob Dawson.

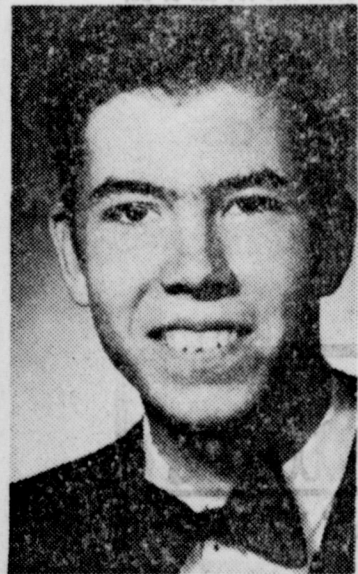

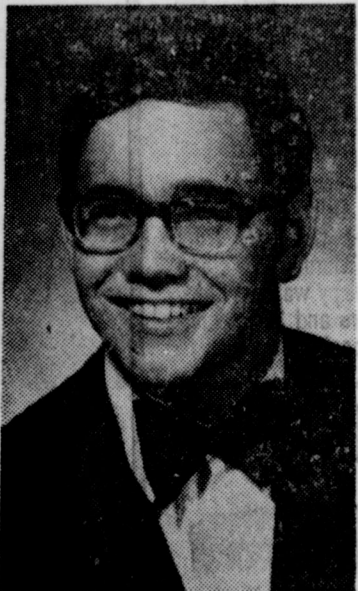
Patti plans to attend Midwestern university.

## 2 Women and 5 Men Enter City Election

Candidates for Iowa Park city offices got busy this week and had their names put on the ballot. Time will run out at 5:00 p.m. on March 1. The election will be conducted April 1.

The term of Mayor Erwin F. Soell will be up for grabs, and he has not filed for re-election. Presently there are two candidates: R. C. (Rip) Smith, now an alderman, and Mrs. Pearl Brooks.

Herman Mahler and L. W. Teel jr. have filed for re-election, and of course Smith will not be seeking his alderman position. However there are five candidates for the three positions: Lee C. Turner, John D. Huff, Mrs. Jeanette Brown, Mahler and Teel.

### Mrs. Brown

Mrs. Jeanette Brown filed for place on the ballot as candidate for alderman. There are three places to be filled.

Mrs. Brown's husband is dean of humanities and social sciences at Midwestern university. She has lived in Iowa Park 19 months and four daughters have been attending Iowa Park schools four years. She is presently enrolled at MU as a political science student.

### Mrs. Brooks

Mrs. Pearl Brooks of 1216 S. Wall has announced as a candidate for mayor of Iowa Park. She filed a petition to have her name on the ballot, Wednesday morning with George Trammell, city secretary.

She has lived in Iowa Park 7 years and is employed in the Intensive Care Unit at Wichita General hospital. She has been a nurse for 20 years.

Mrs. Brooks was born in Georgia and raised in Virginia. She and Raymond Brooks were married in Danville in 1939. A master sergeant in the air force, he retired in 1967 and died of a heart attack on June 4, 1969.

Mrs. Brooks has three grown daughters, one of whom, Mrs. Robert Mitchell, lives in Iowa Park.

Mrs. Brooks is a lifetime member of the Salvation Army and participates in the services of that group. Locally she is interested in seeing that all parts of Our Town receive attention from officials on equal footing. She favors a constructive recreation program for Iowa Park, including such facilities as a bowling alley, swimming pool, etc.

Later she expects to give a more detailed statement of her aims and ideals.

W. J. Wischmeyer, consulting engineer, reported Monday night that manufacture will begin this week on 16-inch pipe for the water line connecting Iowa Park to the pumping plant in Southwales: Wichita Falls. Landowners are being reached to obtain water-line easements.

Corporation Judge Titus Mitchell will continue to collect delinquent city taxes here.

Texas Electric Service Co. request for a six per cent increase in rates was passed on first reading. Approval is expected in the next city council meeting.

Watkins has been head coach here for eight years and has developed a winning tradition unequalled in this part of Texas.

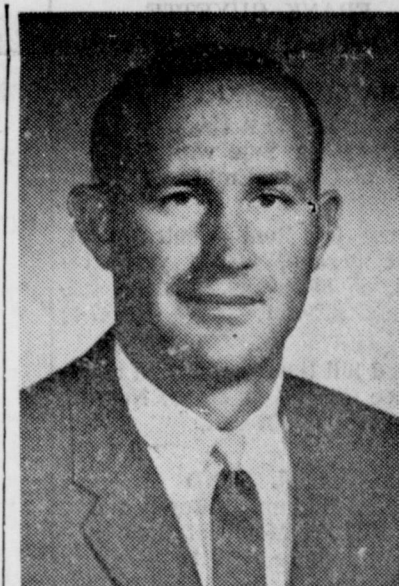
Iowa Park has won six district titles, gone far in the playoffs most seasons, and hammered out two state championships.

"The Art of Color Photography" by G. Isert is so complete there is no other book that would do its job so thoroughly.

## Dental Health

At least 500 hundred children in Iowa Park are aware that last week was National Children's Dental Health Week. Through cooperation of Dr. Richard Carver and principals Bob Cole, John Sibley and James G. Ward, the observation became worthwhile in the elementary schools: Kidwell, Bradford and Valley View.

Because the teachers and pupils had been prepared ahead of time, the dentist was able to give 20 minute lectures and demonstrations in the various rooms that were most effective, both because of what he had to say and of the knowledgeable participation on the part of the pupils.

Topics presented in each group included: Tooth brushes, proper type, and how to use them, with a model of teeth on which to demonstrate; chewing gum does NOT clean teeth; a plak-lite demonstration showing how detrimental plaque can be to the gums; and medical opinions as to various mouth washes.

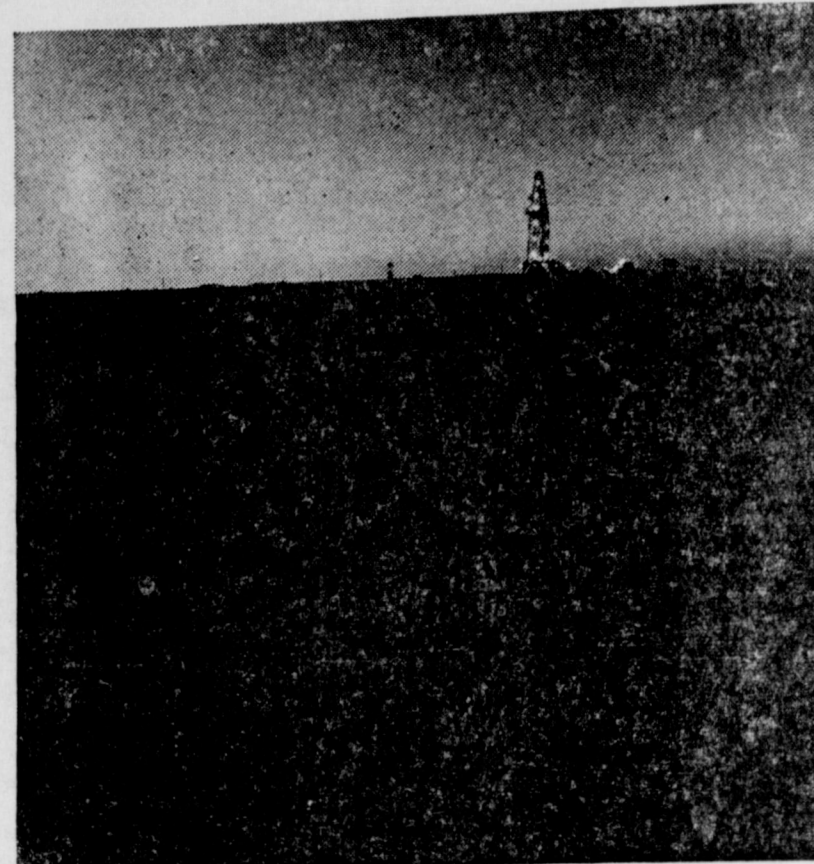

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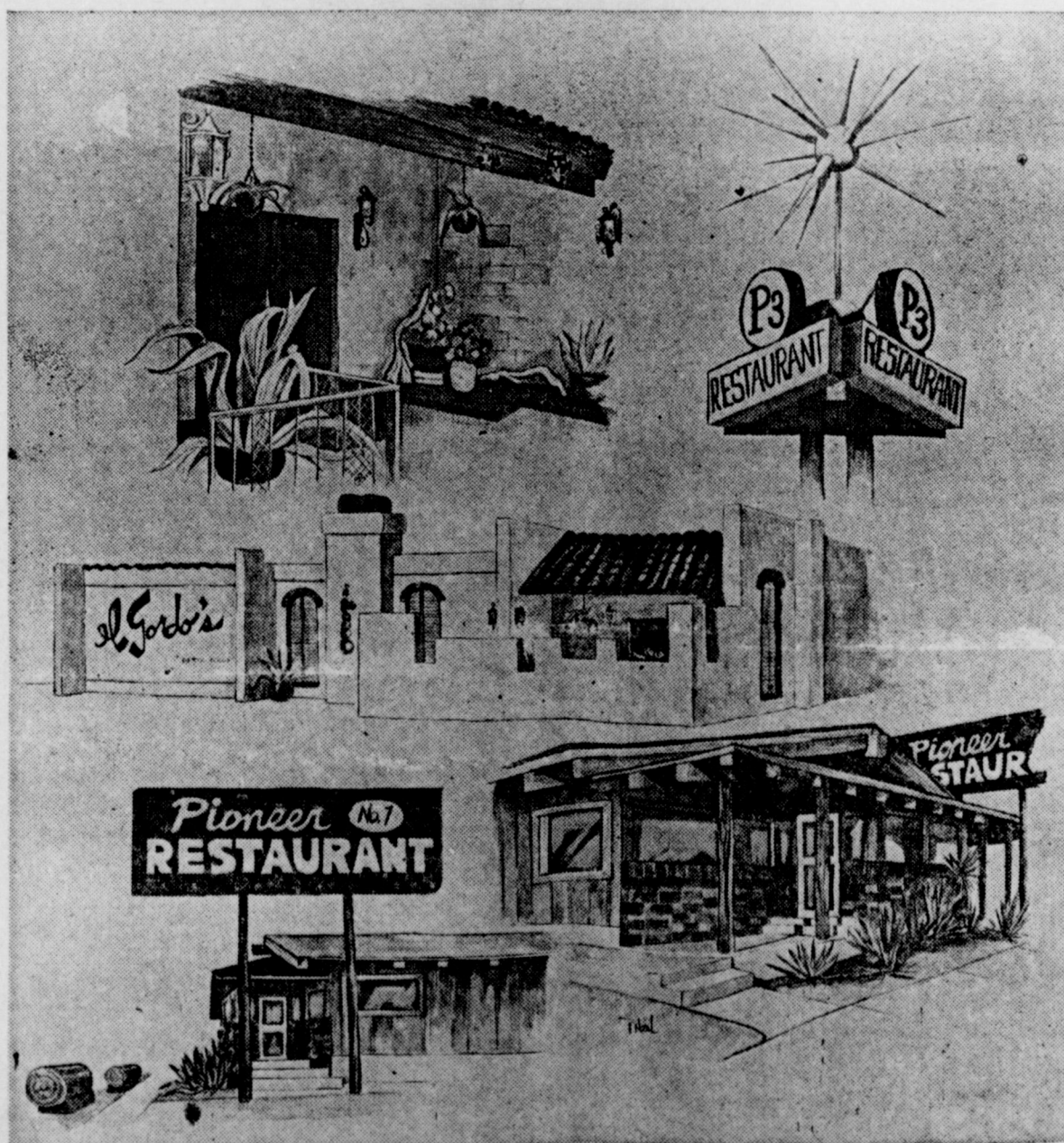

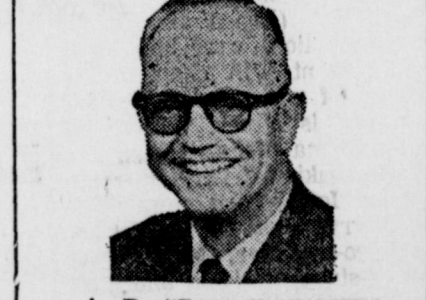
