At that time the Republican senators from the silver states held the balance of power in the senate.

The Harrison administration had two important measures pending which it had very much at heart; namely: the McKinley tariff bill and the Lodge election bill, known as the Force bill. Both had passed the house and neither could pass the senate without the votes of the Republican senators from the silver states.

So anxious was the administration to make sure of the votes of the silver senators that President Harrison is said to have promised them that if they would pass both measures he would sign a bill for the free coinage of the American product of silver which would have kept silver at a price not less than 90 cents per ounce and would have coined and put into circulation as part of the money of the country every ounce of silver produced in the United States. But these senators from the silver states saw fit to go into the Republican caucus and passed the McKinley bill without any conditions whatever and voted with the Democrats and defeated the Force bill without obtaining any beneficial results.

They thus demonstrated their power by co-operation with the Republicans to pass the McKinley bill and by co-operation with the Democrats to defeat the Force bill, but they used that power to no purpose for the advancement of silver

Why would this not have been a better time to have served the silver cause when friendly silver legislation could have absolutely been obtained than by bolting the Republican party in 1896 when there was no possible show of obtaining any such friendly legislation through either of the great national parties? This is a subject upon which a vast amount of light might be shed.

Without going to South Africa, or the Philippines, without denouncing trusts thousands of miles away from home, without taking recondite subjects with mysterious and double meanings, our Democratic orators can surely find subjects enough of intense interest at home.
