STAR MILL MAY OPEN

American Tin Plate Company Says Men Have Been Secured. STRIKERS ON PICKET DUTY Amalgamated Men Say to Start Star Mill Will Cripple Others-- Mills All Quiet.

Pittsburg, Pa., August 25.—Some remarkable changes in the condition of the strike-ridden mills of the United States Steel corporation are promised for the present week that will change the aspect of affairs considerably if carried out. It was stated on good authority today that before the end of the week those of the plants that have been operating on single turn would be run with full force and for the usual three full turns each day. Men enough have been secured for this purpose, the officials say, in spite of the claims of the strikers that the corporations could not get enough men to operate the plants, and the managers of the various mills say they will be ready with all the skilled men required to start up the machinery and turn out a heavy tonnage. The situation in the Star mill of the American Tin Plate company here promises some developments. The plant was during the summer considered as dormant. The tin plate company had, it is said, decided to abandon the mills and move the machinery elsewhere. Since the strike, however, they demonstrated that operation of the mill with non-union help was possible, and under the protection of a well-equipped force the officials decided to make this move. The most significant feature of this plan has been carried out during the past week. This consists of fitting the mill in the same manner as that of the Monessen, Pa., plant. The former eight mills have been changed to four double mills, where improvements have been added that will give the plants a larger capacity, increase its force of men and make it one of the most modern of all the tin plants of the company. With the completion of these improvements the company will be prepared to place a sufficient number of men in the plant to work the four double mills full turns. This number is said to be expected to take place during the present week. Before Saturday, according to Superintendent Piiper of the Star mills, the plant will be operated to its full extent. Referring to the present condition of the mills, Mr. Piiper said: "We received eight skilled men early this morning. J. R. Phillips of the company accompanied the men to the mill, and they will not until after they were in and comfortably settled for the night that the strikers discovered their presence. SCHOOLS OF BOERS ARE DEFIANT

Report of Superintendent Atkinson on Progress Made in the Work. NEED SUITABLE BUILDINGS English Will Now Be the Only Language Used--No Religious Teaching. SOUTH CHICAGO STEEL WORKERS Chicago, August 25.—The very visible result of the mass meeting of trades unionists and sympathizers held in South Chicago today was the declaration of a skilled worker that he would not again enter the mill until the strike was settled. The steel workers whom the meeting was designed to meet were not present in appreciable numbers. Assistant Secretary Tigue of the Amalgamated association was the only one who addressed and denounced former members of the association in South Chicago for deserting their union under the guise of living up to a contract. Mr. Tigue criticizes that the contract of the steel workers has been rendered nugatory by the encroachments of the steel trust and that it was the duty of Chicago steel workers to join their fellow-unionists in the east in a battle which he said the very existence of the Amalgamated association was at stake.

SCHLEY AND SAMPSON

McQueen Forsythe of the Navy Throws Light on the Controversy. SAMPSON A WASHINGTON PET Senior Officers Resent His Advancement--Dispute Dims the Brilliance of the Victory. Kansas City, Aug. 25.—Captain James McQueen Forsythe, U. S. N., who had charge of the naval station at Key West during the Spanish-American war spent today in Kansas City while en route from San Francisco to his home in Philadelphia. The principal controversy between Captain Forsythe and that paper will quote him tomorrow as saying: "While we have been instructed by the navy department not to discuss the merits of the case, every one knows that the navy department looks upon the occurrence as an unfortunate affair. The fact that a junior man was placed above his seniors is responsible for the whole business," continued Captain Forsythe. "Sampson was a captain and the seventeenth ranking officer of the navy. No one ever thought of him as the successor of Admiral Sigsbee, and I don't believe he ever thought of himself. OVERPOWERED THE SHERIFF AND LYNCHED THE NEGRO

Chattanooga, Ga., August 25.—Henry Niles, the negro who criminally assaulted a child in this city, was killed by a mob of white men. The mob overpowered the sheriff and lynched Niles. The incident has caused a great deal of concern in the city.

PEACE PROPOSITIONS MAY BRING ABOUT SETTLEMENT

Pittsburg, Aug. 25.—In furtherance of the "peace" program which is said to have been in course of preparation for several days it was given out today by one on the inside, and one who should know, that the American Federation of Labor and Congresses of the World have consented to have certain propositions made to the officials of the United States Steel corporation through members of the conciliatory committee of the national federation, which proposals are expected to bring about a settlement of the great strike. Those interested in the settlement are waiting all day today for word to proceed with the program as outlined at the conference. The action of President Shaffer in abrogating the wage contract with the Federal Steel company, has questioned the steel company's position in the settlement. The propositions will be taken up under certain conditions by the Amalgamated association which it is hoped will pave the way for the reopening of direct negotiations between the association and the company. The propositions carry much of terms under which the strike was ended. The terms stand willing to settle. The proposal contains nothing looking to arbitration. This mode of settlement was favored by the steel company and the American Federation of Labor. SAy IT IS A PAPER VICTORY FOR FRANCE

London, August 25.—Although the French papers had Turkey's yielding as a great triumph for France, especially as it was largely believed that the sultan's obduracy was due to the supposed friendship between Germany and Turkey—it is felt in London, despite considerable satisfaction over the outcome that there is a grave doubt as to whether France has achieved more than a paper victory. The British theory is that M. Constans has wished to force Turkey to purchase quays which are notoriously unremunerative. The sultan has avoided this, thus securing the practical results while leaving to M. Constans the empty congratulations.

KNIGHTS OF TEMPLARS ARE ARRIVING AT LOUISVILLE

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 25.—Commanderies of Knights Templars poured into Louisville today and tonight from the four corners of the United States. The city is rapidly filling with its planned guests although the triennial convocation does not begin until the grand parade starts Tuesday morning. Imposing religious exercises were held this afternoon and this was the only formal event today. At 5 p. m. the knights assembled at their various commanderies and at 2 o'clock marched to the Galt house where the general formation was made for the march to the Broadway Methodist church, where the services were held at 3 p. m. The column was led by the templars of the Louisville commandery and the entire body formed an escort for the grand master of the grand encampment, Rev. H. Lloyd, and the other grand officers. The ground floor of the church was reserved for Knights Templars in full uniform. The ground floor of the Sunday school room was reserved for ladies of visiting knights and for knights in uniform accompanied by ladies. The form of service had been prepared by Sir Knight, the Right Rev. Thomas U. Dudley, Episcopal bishop of Kentucky. At the opening of the anthem the knights arose and stood while it was being sung and while Grand Prelate J. C. W. Cox of the Washington, Iowa, commandery, delivered the ritual exhortation. This was followed by prayers, the Gloria and Te Deum Laudamus and the reading of Bible passages. The most striking part of the service came when the grand prelate delivered the faith of the knights. After the coronation hymn Grand Prelate Cox delivered his sermon. His text was "What Think Ye of Christ?" After the taking of a collection to be delivered to the almoners of the Knights Templars, the subordinate commanderies of Kentucky will have a reception at Kentucky headquarters at the custom house in honor of the of grand enclosure and their ladies. Hon. W. C. P. Breckinridge of Lexington, Ky., will deliver the grand welcome to the knights temple. The opening meeting of the grand encampment will be held Tuesday afternoon. Among the arrivals today and tonight were the following: Honolulu commandery No. 1 of Honolulu, which is represented at the triennial convocation by Grand Commander Archibald F. Gillilan, Past Grand Commander H. H. Williams, and Standard Bearer J. King. These knights have traveled over 4,000 miles for the purpose of attending the grand encampment in Louisville. Their commandery has 86 members, 12 of whom are natives.

LOUISIANA PURCHASE EXHIBITION BUILDINGS

St. Louis, Aug. 25.—Director of Works Taylor of the Louisiana Purchase exposition said today that the ground plans for the exhibition buildings are complete and that no time would be lost in submitting them to the executive committee for formal approval. As soon as this has been done the ground plans will be allotted one of the principal buildings to design and the actual building work will be commenced. "The plan upon which we have agreed," Mr. Taylor said, "is absolutely novel and will present to the visitors at the fair something which has never been seen. All the members of the committee believe that the ground arrangement is greater than any other exposition. The necessary and hackneyed features have no part of it." SOUTH AMERICAN ORE. Omaha, August 25.—Notice has been received at the local office of the American Smelting and Refining company of a shipment of gold ore from Chile. It is the first shipment of South American ore to the smelting company's plant and is in the nature of an experiment. The ore is said to be very rich and if its treatment proves successful the shipment will be followed by others. Perth Amboy, N. J., is the port of entry.

FACEING STARVATION IN A TEXAS COUNTY

San Antonio, Tex., Aug. 25.—Reports from Zacapata county confirm the news that the people there are facing starvation. They may have had some relief in the way of food but the results will be terrible. Range water has fallen and cattle are too weak to travel and are dying rapidly. The county is literally burned up by drought. There is not a green thing to be seen except cactus plants. Zacapata county is 50 miles from the nearest railroad and whatever in the nearest railroad is sent to the farmers in the famine-stricken place must be hauled from San Antonio by mule pack. The relief fund of this city has started a small fund and has already sent a small amount of money to Zacapata to be used in buying food for the starving. Relief work will be continued here. Nothing has been heard here from the war department in answer to a request for reports sent by Congressman Kieberg.

PRINCE CHUN'S MISSION.

Berlin, Aug. 25.—Prince Chun, brother of the emperor of China and the members of the Chinese mission on the way to Berlin to apologize for the murder of General Ketteler, German minister in Peking, have arrived at Basel, Switzerland. Prince Chun is ill, will remain there for a few days.

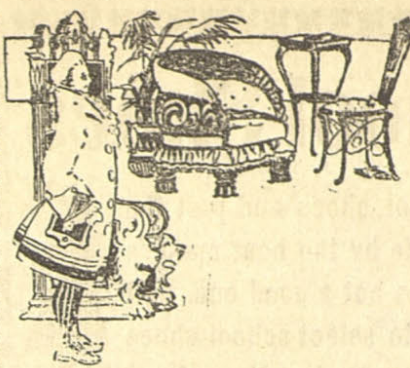

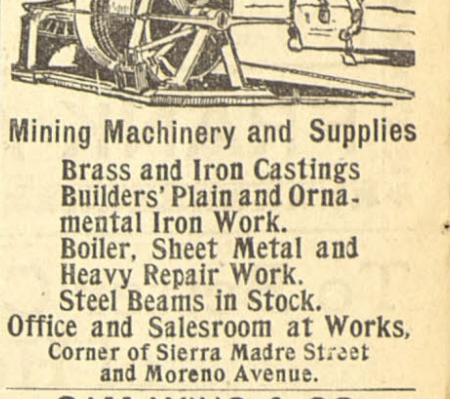

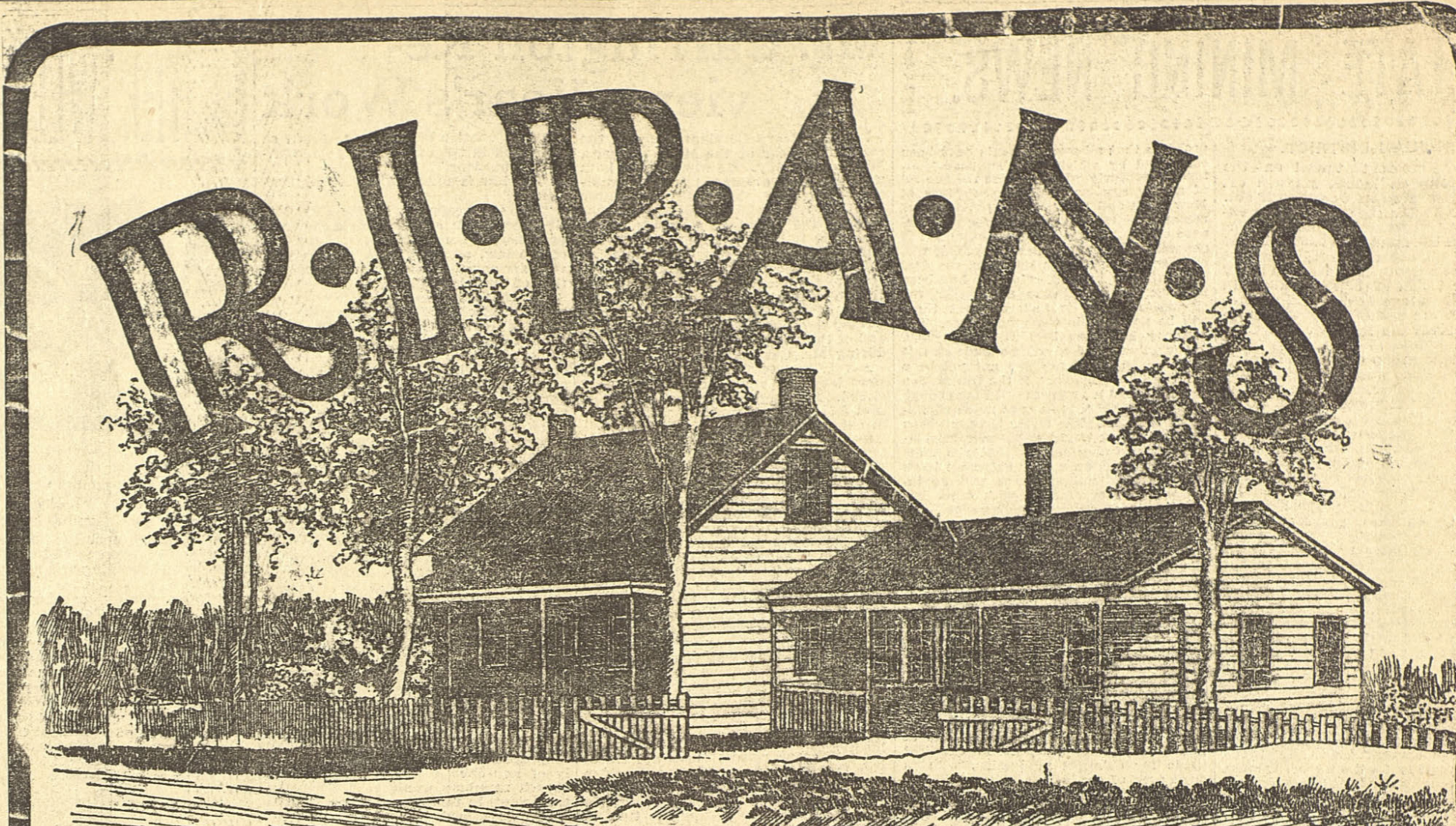
