

Russia, Germany and Austria, he says, will join their forces to blow the American battleships out of the water rather than allow them to attack the Turks at Constantinople in the effort to enforce payment of an indemnity for

Independent of the question of the steps to be taken by this country against the Turks, there appears to be at the present time quite a general disposition to predict a struggle between the United States and one or more European powers. Some rather prominent French newspapers have recently spread the story that Germany was about to attack us, and on the other side a usually sensible American cabinet officer recently created something of a sensation by declaring that in the near future the United States might

be called on to defend the Monroe doctrine by force of It is flattering to the national pride to notice that in all these rumors the United States is recognized as the equal if not the superior of any one of the great military powers of the old world. It is also perfectly well under stood that we are growing at a rate which none of the other powers can equal, and indeed it is set down as one of the chief reasons for foreign hostility that the European governments are desirous of checking our growth before we

In estimating the possibility of such a conflict it is worth while to consider what causes if any are likely to bring it about, what benefits would be gained by a successful attack upon the United States and lastly the chances for success in such an attack.

The occasions of war are always present, and it i usually a trivial pretext that brings to a crisis the outbreak of national prejudice or the clash of rival interests.

The benefit to be gained by a successful attack upon the United States is a difficult problem. Rich as our coun try is, it hardly seems probable that any foreign nation would desire to attack us for the sake of a war indemnity Neither have we territory that would prove an inviting spoil to a conqueror. Americans would not make good sublects and the permanent occupation of our territory is genrally declared to be an impossibility by high military authorities. Our colonial possessions, if we may call them o, are not well enough established to be worth taking sway from us. The only benefit would be the negative on hat has already been suggested, that of checking our pr ress, crippling our industry and giving our rivals in busi less an advantage over us. The doubtful advantage of this might be enhanced in old world minds by political cor liderations. The reactionary policy of Germany and Auslria is utterly at variance with the spirit of democracy revailing in the United States. To crush the great repub ic would give enormous prestige to the idea of divinely prdained kings. This may seem like a sentimental consid-)ration, but the worst wars of history have been fought for

The possibility of an attack on the United States deends on the possibility of effecting a combination of Euroean states against us. Admitting that any one state was nore powerful than ourselves, it could not make the effort o conquer us without reducing itself to an inferiority as ompared with other states that had not undergone such tremendous strain upon their resources. Germany has een mentioned as a possible aggressor, but Germany can lot afford while surrounded by jealous rivals to shatter ler fleet, to reduce her army to a fraction of its present trength, to empty her treasury and to interrupt her com derce and industries by an attack upon us. The result just be somewhat uncertain, and no victory could con ensate for the cost of the war. These same consideration apply to any combination that is likely to be formed gainst us. The greater the coalition, the more intense vould be the jealousy and alarm it would arouse in Euope, and a united Europe in such a cause is an impossi-

ility so long as England remains what she is An aggressive attack upon the United States by one or more European powers seems wholly improbable, and intricate work of months will be made useless to us it seems equally unlikely that the United States should ever go out of its way to attack one of them. But If our nation were what many Europeans imagine it to be, the situation would be different, and therein lies the danger. The European nations have learned by experience


