EX-PRESIDENT HARRISON STATES HIS POSITION

New York, Oct. 10.—General Benja-nin Harrison gave out an interview and statement tonight. He was asked: the United States. In 1896 I submitted myself to very hard usage, and then made up my mind, and so said to my friends, that I would do no more campaigning. Of course, they will be under the gover-nor of Mississippi. The rest of the ter-ritory will probably be locked up from American settlement, and under the elf-government of the native occu-

Thus were the colonial idea and the system of subject dependencies simul-taneously introduced by Thomas Jef-ferson; and his programme has been carried out for a century, the republic surviving the experiment, if we are ot misinformed.
