SAN JUAN COUNTRY. From the Denver Tribune.

The Limits of Its Territory--Not All of Southern Colorado.

All that lies south of the Divide is in Southern Colorado. All that lies south of the Divide and west of the Sangre de Cristo range of mountains may be properly called Southwestern Colorado. The San Juan country, which seems to have no bounds or limits, as many seem to think that it embraces all of Southern Colorado, is properly bounded as follows: The San Juan river heads about thirty miles a little southwest of Del Norte, Rio Gande county, and bears a little southwesterly, on to the southern line of Colorado, where it bends and runs west, through Northern New Mexico, on to the Little Colorado river. From the Rio San Juan (San Juan river) this great mining region derives the name San Juan which translated to English, is Saint John. The territory lying west of Rio San Juan as far north as the head of that stream embraces the western edge of Rio Grande and a goodly portion on the west of Conejos county, all of La Plata, San Juan, Ouray, and Dolores counties, and perhaps a portion of Hinsdale county. Gunnison county is not in the San Juan country, but its name is taken from the Gunnison river, and its mining territory is properly the Gunnison country. As Del Norte was the first gateway to the mines of this region, and the principal trading point west of Pueblo, from '73 till '76, it should be admitted as belonging to the San Juan mining region, although the greater portion of Rio Grande county is agricultural. The gold mines of the Summit mining district, in that county, are only a few miles distant from the head waters of the Rio San Juan, and rightly belong to the San Juan mining region. Hinsdale county is so near that it may also be considered as belonging to San Juan.

The Navajo Mountain Explorers. From the Durango Southwest.

Mining circles both here and at Ricc have of late been somewhat anxious in regard to the Navajo Mountain prospecting party until relieved by their return a few days since. From Mr. Foote (formerly agent of the Pioneer Stage line, who is one of the party, we gather the following particulars concerning their trip: The party consisted of 25 men from Rico and Durango, whose purpose was to prospect the country in the vicinity of Navajo Mountain, for the rich claims supposed to have been staked by Myrick and Mitchell before they were killed, in regard to which there has been so much whispered talk Assembling at Mitchell's on the San Juan, Aaron Stull was chosen leader, as he was most familiar with the country, and had been one of the relief party. They fol lowed the old Moencopie trail for about seventy-five miles southwest from Mitch ells, to the mouth of Lake Canon. Fol lowing this canon north they continued about twenty-five miles to Navajo mountain, the only peak rising above the mesa level for a hundred miles, which proved to be only sandstone. Their provisions began to dwindle and after searching several days for a supply of water, concluded to return home. At one time the animals were three days without water, and as there is no snow in the country, except a little on the peak, they suffered much on this account. They saw only three Pah Utes, and were well treated by all the Navajoes they met. They found no mineral, but still they are not discouraged so with a few others, probably a dozen in all, from here, they start Saturday to rejoin their comrades waiting for them at Mitchell's and will try it again.

We learn from a man who came in from Mitchell's yesterday, that two men with burros, started to follow the trail of Stull's party, but wandered off into the Chuck-a-luck mountains, and it is reported by the Indians coming in at Mitchell's that they have been killed. The legends of this section, and the fabulously rich mines, are a part of our history. OF MURDER IN THE FIRST DE-GREE, AS INDICTED.

Dwindling Away.

Judge Porter completed his argument and Judge Cox charged the jury until 4:30. Tailway mail agent should separate the holk of "way" mail if he receives it as the motion was finally put and carried. After the jury had been out twenty minutes a recess was taken until 5:20 o'clock. At 5:35 the jury filed slowly into their seats. When Judge Cox propounded the usual inquiry, clearly and distinct came the reply: "We have!" "What is your verdict—guilty or not

With equal distinctness came the reply: "Guilty, as indicted."

There was immense applause and great disorder for some time, but order was at last restored.

Judge Cox then said: "Gentlemen of the jury, I cannot express too many thanks for the manner in which you have discharged your duty. 


